It is reported that lithographers have for sometime been using plated 1 paper instead of thin metal sheets, preferring the former as the paper body gives a soft cushioning effect which cannot be obtained with the solid metal. For this purpose the metal is electro-plated on the sur-face of the paper, which has first been coated with a laying of graph-ite to give it a conducting surface. The principle thus employed is old, but the difficulty has always been that the liquid in the plating bath would soak into the paper and would loosen the metal film from it even while this was being deposited.
