THOMAS JENKINS, 1880-1934.

Probably there was no man bet's years ago than "Skipper" Jent'ns. To begin with, he was the biggest men physically, that ever came to Tri-ity; and 'till within a short time before his death, he had the healthiest-ros ev-cheek-complexion of any man or how in Trinity Bight. Thomas Jenkins was born in Shirminster-Newton, Dorset, England, in 1808, and came to Trinity when he was seventeen years of age. He came to Trinity, consigned to Mr. Slade; but he spent some time with Mr. Richard Brown in Trouty. Then he moved back to Trinity, and became one of Mr. Slade's faithful servants for several years. The following entry in the old Church register, tells of his home-making and settling down for Te:-"1828. Married. Thomas Jenkins. of Shirminster-Newton. Dorset, England and Ann Elizabeth Dampier. of Trinity. Witnesses: Charles

Granger, Richard W. Hibtich."

At this time he owned all the waterfront land in Goose Cove. A part of this he gave to old Mr. Dampier-and the Dampiers still own it-whilst that now owned by the Bartletts was bought from Mr. Jenkins by old Mr. Bartlett in 1885. After selling this property, he bought the land known to-day as Jenkin's arm, including that on which the Railway Station is built. This property at the time included land belonging to George Churchill, Charles Granger, Captain Facey and Rev. William Bullock. Mr. Jenkins was in charge of the Stores belonging to Slade, and later, with Messrs. W. Grieve and Bremner. on Slade's premises; and when Messrs. W. Grieve and Bremner moved down to Garland's premises, he went there in the same position. He gave up the work about 1890, and lived quietly amid home surroundings, 'till he was called to rest in 1894, aged 86 years. Mrs. Jenkins had died ten years before, aged 75 years.

LOCAL CHURCH INTERESTS.

For some time I had been at a loss to know why certain Baptisms, Marriages, and Deaths of people in the Eastern part of St. Paul's Parish (English Harbor, Salmon Cove, etc.) were not to be found in the old registers of St. Paul's Church, Trinity. Those books have been so well kept, and the entries have been so faithfully attended to since 1758, that it was always a humiliation to me. as cll as a disappointment, when, after careful search for an entry, I had to aimit that it was not there. It was daubly so because I had taken it for granted that the books in possession of the Parish Church, Trinity, were the only books used for such Registrations of the official work done by the Clergy of the Parish. I became aware of the fact, that the entries I cuid not flu i were between the years or 1540 and 1386. Not very long ago I heard (for the first time) of an old register in possession of the Church Wardens of English Harbor. I did not get very deeply interested in it, because I was under the impression that all the Registrations were in the eld books at Trinity; and hence the hook at English Harbor could not be of any great value. Recently, however the Church Warden of English Harbor kindly allowed me to examine h. book, and I am glad to find it contrins entries of Baptisms and Burials at St. Siles' Church there from 1843 1879, and of marriages from 1848 to 862; and burials from 1843 to 1879. hase are the entries that I could ot find in the old books at Trinity.
