

# Insurance Investigation

Interesting Admission Made by President of the Mutual Life Company.

McCurdy Loses His Temper and Inveighs Against the "Persecution."

One Kicker Was Bought Off to **Prevent Threatened** Agitation.

N EW YORK, Oct. 17.—Testimony in the insurance investigation was resumed today after a week's adjournment of the legisweek's adjournment of the legis-lative committee, taken because of the death last week of S. Fred Nixon, lative committee, taken because of the death last week of S. Fred Nixon, speaker of the assembly. The testimony was most exciting throughout the entire day, and only the repeated threats of Senator Armstrong, chalman of the committee, to clear the room, prevented violent demonstrations of disapprobation of the witness, who was Richard A. McCurdy, president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company. As it was, however there were jeers at several periods of the day's testimony that temporarily interrupted the testimony. These came when Mr. Hughes, the counsel for the committee, asked questions that Mr. McCurdy was reluctant to answer and tried to evade.

In Mr. McCurdy's testimony today it was disclosed that the Mutual Life Insurance Company employed a literary bureau to send out to the press of the country notices that were of benefit to the company. This information was elicited during the probing of the "legal expenses" account. It came out when a voucher for the payment of \$2,500 to Joseph Howard in 1904 was discussed. Another voucher for the same amount paid in May, 1905, was



British Institute of Journalists.

The matter of copyright on news was one of the chief topics of discussion at the annual conference of the British Institute of Journalists held recently at Bournemouth. F. J. Higginbottom submitted the report of the council on copyright, which stated that it had been laid down by Justice Joyce, in Springfield vs. Thame, that the writer of a report which had been converted in the course of sub-editing into different language to that employed by the writer, had no copyright in his report, but that such copyright was vested in the sub-editor, who had used the writer's information and had presented it in other language. The committee appointed to consider the questious were of the opinion that the interests of journalists of all classes, as well as of newspaper proprietors, were seriously affected, and that parliament should be invited to redress an undoubted grievance.
