Commercial Failures. NEW YORK, Jan. 5—The dispatches to Brad-screets this week show that the general trade throughout the country is in a fairly active state although still suffering from the suspension inci-dent to the close of the year. The dry goods trade shows a marked inactivity ; a better feeling prevails in the iron market. There were 257 failures in the United States reported during the gest week fitteen more than the preseding week and 105 more than the corresponding week last year. This is the largest number in any single week in two years.
