HESSIAN FLY HISTORY
Some Facts About This Enemy of the Wheats.

The Maggot Stage the Dangerous Period-Late Sowing to Evad Injury - Trap Crops Are Also

orms Come From the Click Beetle-Rotation of Crops Best
Remedies for These Insect Pests -Oider Making. HITE grubs are the larvae
of the large dark brown
May beetese, or "uune
Bugs," as they are commonly called, which are familiar to
everyone. The grubs breed for the most part in old pastures where the
sod has not been broken up for some sod
years. When fully grown they are
thick. thick, fat creatures, white in color,
with the body partially curled up and
thin With the body partially curled up and
the last segments of a darker hue
from the food showing through the
 spent underground, then the beetles
appear, often in great swarms, in the
earis summer and devour the tender eariy summer and devour the tender
foliaze of trees and shrups. After
buzzing about in the terly evenig
they settle down to feed and when buzzing about in the early evening

alent iodea that salt will kill them,
