The following Report was read, and referred to Committee on State of the Order, together with copy of Circular addressed by Committee to the subordinate Divisions :

The Committee appointed at the Annual Session, in Oct. last, "to make the necessary arrangements preparatory to the Session of the National Division, to be held in Halifax in June next," beg to submit the following Report of progress :

Your Committee was duly organized on November 10, by election of following named Officers :—

Chairman—The Grand Worthy Patriarch ;
Vice Chairman—P. G. W. P., Rev. J. McMurray ;
Secretary—The Grand Scribe ;
Assistant Secretary—P. W. P., R. M. Barratt ;
Treasurer—The Grand Treasurer.

At the same meeting, P. G. W. P., Rev. P. G. McGregor, was added to the Committee.

Sub-Committees have been appointed to obtain, if possible, the room occupied by the members of our Provincial Parliament during the Legislative Sessions, for the use of the National Division ; and to obtain a reduction of railway, stage and packet fares, for the benefit of members of the Order, throughout the Province.

The Committee have decided to include in their Programme of Arrangements, in connection with the Meeting of the National Division:—A Public Breakfast to the members of that body on the morning of the 11th of June; a Public Reception to the body on some evening immediately after their arrival; a Procession of the Order; a steamboat Excursion; Public Meetings, and other interesting social occasions, in order to make the stay of our distinguished visitors as pleasant as possible.

Details of the foregoing, and other arrangements, will be made known to the subordinate Divisions in due time, and, possibly, to the Grand Division at its next Quarterly Meeting.

In carrying out the objects committed to us, there will be some expenses to be borne in their accomplishment; and as we are appointed by the Grand Division, we are to act in behalf of the whole Order in this jurisdiction. We therefore have invited, by circular, the subordinate Divisions to unite with the City Divisions, in contributing towards a fund for this purpose.

The Chebucto Division has guaranteed the sum of \$150, at least; the Athenæum Division, \$100; and the Mayflower, \$50. The other City Divisions, no doubt, will be equally as liberal. Many of the brethren in the city have given liberal contributions to their Division lists, ranging from *one to ten dollars*.

In presenting my usual Quarterly Report, I have much pleasure in announcing the establishment of two new Divisions since the Annual Meeting, viz.:

1. STAR OF HOPE, No. 190; at St. George, Bermuda, on 31st day of October last, by special Deputy G. W. P., Bartholomew Flynn.

2. MARINER'S GUIDE, No. 191, at Argyle, Yarmouth Co., on November 21st., by D. G. W. P., R. H. Crowell, of Barrington.

Both of these Divisions promise to be useful auxiliaries to the cause, in their respective localities.

INOPERATIVE DIVISIONS.

The names of *one hundred and fourteen Divisions* are now on the Grand Division Roll. Of this number the following named are not working: *Roseway*, 25; *Truro*, 41; *Lanenburg*, 60; *Aurora*, 68; *Lake*, 71; *Margaretville*, 80; *Kellogg*, 92; *Evening Star*, 97; *Tremont*, 102; *Flowing Fountain*, 118; *Emblem*, 126; *Hebert*, 138; *Waterloo*, 143; *Enterprise*, 149; ———, 156;—fifteen in all.

Tremont and *Hebert* may be considered as dead.

As stated in my Annual Report, nearly, if not quite, all of these Divisions would soon be in active operation again, if an agent could but visit the places where they are located.

D., as there

would not be sufficient time to return them to the Divisions from which they have been received.

NATIONAL DIVISION DEBT.

As intimated in my last Annual Report, I have much pleasure in stating that the indebtedness of this Grand Division to the National Division has been entirely liquidated.

AGENCY DEPARTMENT AND FUND.

No agents have yet been appointed to travel through the Province; but the Agency Committee have opened a correspondence with two gentlemen, possessing abilities requisite for the work required. It is possible the services of one or both may be secured; should this be the case, it will be necessary for the Divisions, and Temperance men individually, to contribute towards the Permanent Agency Fund, as without a liberal contribution of money, the work desired cannot be prosecuted.

Since the Annual Meeting the sum of \$12.12½ only has been received. Bro. Wm. Bryden, County Deputy for Queen's, has informed me that New Era Division, of Liver-

pool, has passed a resolution to pay into the Agency Fund, every quarter, *one and a half cents* on each member on the Financial Scribe's books. Bro. Bryden himself now pays the sum of *one dollar per quarter*. I have no doubt the example of New Era will be followed by other Divisions, and trust Bro. Bryden's example will be the means of adding considerably to the fund.

DECEASED MEMBERS OF G. D.

It is with regret I have to announce the demise of three members of this Grand Division, viz.: Bros. James Starr, of Central Division, No. 2; Thomas Spurr, of Olive Branch, No. 44; and J. W. Keveney, of Star in the East, No. 61.

Bro. STARR was one of the oldest members of this Grand Division, being one of the *twelve* Representatives present at its organization at Yarmouth, on 22d April, 1848. At that date, and up to the time of his decease, he represented Central Division, No. 2, in this body. He died at Yarmouth, on 7th January, at the age of 71 years.

Bro. SPURR as the Representative of Olive Branch Division, No. 44, took his seat as a member of this body at the Quarterly Session held at Bridgetown, in January 1851. He died at Bridgetown on 16th inst., at the age of 59 years.

Bro. J. W. KEVENEY died at N. W. Arm, Sydney, C. B., on 5th inst., in the 47th year of his age. He was initiated into this body at the Quarterly Session held at Sydney, in August 1860.

These Brothers were all good Temperance men in the localities where they resided, and were faithful to the Order "unto death."

PER CAPITA TAX FROM SUB. DIVISIONS.

I would direct attention of Grand Division to part eight Constitution of the National Division, which requires that each Grand Division shall pay "two cents for each member in its jurisdiction, to support the National Division, not counting suspended members." Under this Rule, it will become necessary to exact the per capita tax of six cents from

all members on F. S. books, of Divisions in this jurisdiction, suspended members excepted. The privilege extended to subordinate Divisions to withhold the tax on members over twelve months in arrears, was done away with, on the amendment of the Constitution at last meeting of the National Division. I would suggest that the G. Division should give the G. W. P. or G. Scribe some instruction on this subject. As the G. Division has to pay per capita tax on all members, except those suspended, it is but reasonable to expect that the subordinate Divisions should pay the tax on the same members. By the Constitution of National Division, the G. Division would have been justified in exacting the tax on all members, from the first of October last, but I deemed it prudent to wait instruction from this body on the matter.

As an example, I would here state that one Division, having 128 members on the F. S. books, pays tax on 22; another, with 74, pays tax on 36; a third, with 67, pays only on 30; a fourth, with 88, pays on 47; a fifth, with 70, pays on 29. This will shew that it will be unreasonable for the G. Division to pay per capita tax on all except suspended members, unless the subordinate Divisions pay on the same.

Referred to Committee on state of the Order.

The G. W. P. presented the following Report, which was referred to the same Committee:—

Officers and Representatives,—

The all-pervading sentiment of our hearts should be gratitude to the giver of all good, who has mercifully preserved us to meet again for the purpose of promoting a cause second only to that which has more directly in view our eternal salvation. Love to God is the fruitful source of all that is good in human action; and it is as gratifying as encourag-

ing to know that this sentiment inspires many hearts engaged in the work of ridding the world of the folly and curse of drunkenness.

On the other hand, it must be conceded that some whose purity of motive cannot be questioned, still stand aloof from this benevolent movement, and a few blindly oppose. This is an inconsistency only accounted for by making liberal allowance for the force of education, social influences, and other operating causes, which we will not stop now to trace.

But while restrained from a minute investigation of the causes which produce this unsatisfactory state of things, it may not be improper to advert to the fact, and arouse attention, if possible, to the grave delinquencies existing in relation to this momentous subject. A large amount of indifference and wrong-doing is without doubt attributable to positive baseness of character; but we must still allow a considerable margin for want of reflection. The application of this sentiment requires discrimination, however.

It would be an undue extension of our charity to believe that many indirectly connected with the liquor traffic can be unconscious of its iniquity. Any relation sustained, or profit derived from immorality or vice is highly censurable, but this is tolerable in comparison with the conduct of him who not content with pocketing the gains of an iniquitous traffic, ventures to make pretensions both of patriotism and philanthropy, by ostentatiously connecting himself with the various religious and benevolent enterprises of the day.

'Tis said that truth is stranger than fiction; and, certainly, we have some instances, in connection with the liquor business, strikingly illustrative of the force of the saying. What writer of fiction could so extend his fancy, as to depict a rumseller engaged in the distribution of the Bible, or the propagation of religious sentiment! or who that glances his eye over the advertising columns of our Provincial newspapers, and notes how often the attention of the public is called to stocks of enticing liquors, could believe upon any principle of analogy that the name appended to some of these notices may be found on the roll of the "Young Men's Christian Association," or associated with the "Union

Prayer Meetings," and the records of the Church of God!

We may regret our want of power to reform abuses, but this must not deter us from making an effort to correct them. May we not hope the day is not far distant when no member of a Christian Church, especially, shall stand connected in any way with this demoralizing traffic; and when those who make and those who administer the laws, shall take a higher stand in favor of this vital question; when, indeed, the people with general voice shall demand freedom from the scourge of rum.

STATE AND CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

PICTOU COUNTY.

Brother Beattie has been employed, for some time past, lecturing in this county, and through a report of his, forwarded to me by brother P. G. W. P. Fraser, I learn that there are in this county fifty-seven temperance organisations, with a membership of 3,217. Brother Beattie has travelled over a considerable part of the county, and gives it as his opinion, that were the question of Prohibition submitted to the people, "irrespective of party interests, 'twould be affirmed by an overwhelming majority." Too much praise cannot be accorded to the friends of temperance in Pictou county, for the system and zeal with which the work is carried on.

COLCHESTER.

I have no general report from this county, but Deputy A. McArthur represents "Arctic" as flourishing, and adds, "the traffic is annihilated in Economy."

CUMBERLAND.

Brothers Rogers and Huestis represent the cause in some of its aspects as progressive and encouraging, in others as somewhat languid and retrogressive. No licenses have been granted in the county the current year; and this of itself is an indication for good.

HANTS.

I have had no report from Hants county; and I fear it must be set down as far behind some of the other sections of the Province in energy and zeal for the cause.

CITY OF HALIFAX.

Brother Mathison reports the Divisions in the city as less active and progressive than could be desired, yet holding on their way.

Through the laudable efforts of brother Mathison and others, quite an interest has been excited among the military. Several meetings have been held at the "Wellington Barracks," and also in the "Artillery Park." At one of these meetings the Captain of one of the companies, and forty of his men enrolled themselves under the temperance banner. The Captain who had the moral courage necessary to this step, would not, we are persuaded, falter in the hour of battle; nor would the men who followed the worthy example be a whit less valiant.

I had myself the pleasure of addressing meetings in both of the above named places, and shall be very happy to do the same again should the opportunity offer. This is a somewhat new feature in the movement.—Thus while old agencies die out new ones are employed, which keep the wheels of the temperance chariot successfully rolling on.

KING'S

Rev. Dr. Cramp reports the Divisions in this county in a somewhat unsatisfactory state. Invincible, true to its name, is again urging its way onward. Wolfville is indebted to a faithful few for the maintenance of its position.

ANNAPOLIS.

The Divisions in this county are less active than formerly; and two or three are not working, I believe. Nelson, North, Clyde, and some others are measurably active and prosperous. The same may probably be said of two or three others from whom I have not heard particularly.

DIGBY.

Digby county, in number of Divisions, is equal to or ahead of any county in the Province; and some of the Divi-

sions are represented as quite prosperous, and others feeble or inactive.

YARMOUTH.

A new Division has been instituted in this county, during the last quarter, under promising circumstances, and from the practical character and prosperous circumstances of the people, doubt not the cause will progress.

SHELBURNE.

Brother Locke reports "Star Division healthy and progressive—intemperance on the wane: may it soon be so all over the land!

QUEEN'S

Accounts from this county are most encouraging. County Deputy Bryden reports all of the four Divisions in a prosperous condition. There are prospects of other Divisions being established in the county in the course of a few months.

LUNENBURGH.

Brother Dimock reports Chester flourishing,—Kinburn, Phœnix, and Watford holding on,—Siloam and Oliver dead, and Lunenburgh and Evening Star inactive. Notwithstanding this, the temperance feeling, it is said, was never better, and as a proof of this the Grand Jury unanimously declined to recommend the granting of any licences for the present year.

GUYSBOROUGH.

Brother McDonald reports "Wellington" Division holding its ground, but regrets the introduction of the traffic in connection with the mining districts, &c.

CAPE BRETON.

Brother Johnston, with his usual promptness and fidelity, has reported as regards the Island of Cape Breton.

Two or three of the Divisions are not working, others are not advancing rapidly, but several are flourishing. Among the latter are North Sydney and Bethlehem—the latter having recently initiated twenty in the space of three weeks. Star in the East, Archangel, and Cape Breton, also highly prosperous. Cape Breton has erected a Hall costing £270,

and has nearly paid for it. Several of these last-mentioned Divisions also own libraries, which add much to the general interest.

Since writing the above, I have received a report from Brother Barratt, deputy over "June Rose" and "Sackville" Divisions, in the county of Halifax, who having recently visited both, reports a decided improvement, attributable in part, no doubt, to the inspiration infused by his visit.

The Bond of the Grand Scribe has been duly executed, and placed in my hands.

Two new Divisions have been opened during the last quarter: one in Bermuda, and the other in the county of Yarmouth: both promise to be highly useful, especially the former, which may be instrumental in the diffusion of temperance sentiment all over the Island.

We have still to deplore a most unhappy state of affairs in the neighboring Republic, which has had a depressing effect upon our Order, not only throughout that country, but in the Provinces, and indeed in every place where the Order exists.

The approaching session of the National Division in June next, at Halifax, is looked forward to with much interest and hope, and preparations are being made to give to our brothers from a distance a suitable welcome.

It may be questioned whether the Order in this Province is as active as formerly, but it is believed the temperance sentiment is as strong and deep as ever. As one proof of this there are at least one-third of the counties where no licenses have been granted, for the sale of intoxicating drinks. I hope we may succeed this winter in getting the "Amendment of the License Law," introduced and carried through the Assembly's last session, which will, it is believed, give additional power to the friends of the cause.

We aim at nothing short of the suppression of the traffic in intoxicating drinks. May the Great Patriarch above direct to the adoption of such means as shall secure this end, that we may be saved from this fearful scourge to the human race.

Rev. Dr. Cramp, as Chairman, presented the following Report from Committee on State of the Order :

Your Committee have examined the Reports furnished by the Grand Worthy Patriarch and the Grand Scribe, and are gratified to learn that upon the whole the Order is in a fair state of prosperity in this Province. Failure in one part is compensated for by increased activity in another; and although some Divisions are in a state of langour, and others have altogether ceased operation, there is good reason to be

lieve that the employment of suitable agency will have a restorative and invigorating effect. There is a Temperance power in Nova Scotia, which only requires to be roused and judiciously directed in order to secure permanently good results.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch, it is earnestly hoped, will be encouraged and sustained in his efforts to procure an efficient License Law, by the operation of which, the path to Prohibition will be smoothed and straightened, and the public generally prepared for a consummation so "devoutly to be wished."

The approaching Session of the National Division in Halifax is anticipated by your Committee with much pleasure and hope. They trust that it will inaugurate a new era in the history of the Total Abstinence movement in this Province, and that numbers will be induced to join us who have hitherto kept aloof, and whose neglect of the claims of this good cause is alike unaccountable and injurious; for the enemies of Temperance are greatly emboldened in their opposition when they see that many, who are usually engaged in the work of Christian philanthropy, decline to identify themselves with this form of protest against vice and disorder.

It is of great importance, in the judgment of your Committee, that the National Division should meet with a reception worthy of the dignity of that body, and fitly testifying our respect and esteem for its members. The excellent arrangements proposed by the Committee appointed to prepare for that occasion cannot but secure the approval of the Order throughout the Province. Considerable expense will, of necessity, be incurred, even on the most moderate scale of calculation; and your Committee, therefore, beg to commend to the generous attention of the subordinate Divisions the Circular issued on that subject. Many of the members of those Divisions, it is confidently hoped, will liberally contribute to the object, and all may share in the effort by consenting to grants from the funds at their disposal.

Adverting to sundry matters of practical interest in the Reports and other documents placed in their hands, the Committee offer the following suggestions:—

1. That the Grand Scribe be instructed to notify subordinate Divisions that in future they will be required to pay the *per capita* tax on all members whose names are on the books of the Financial Scribes, suspended members, only, not being included. The reason for this requirement is, that the Grand Division is called on to pay in like manner to the National Division.

2. That the Grand Scribe be instructed to report to the Grand Division, from time to time, all incorrect or defective returns made to his office.

3. That an order be drawn on the Grand Treasurer for the amount of per-centage due to the National Division for 1862, as soon as there shall be sufficient funds in hand to meet that claim.

4. That the Agency Committee be requested to direct the especial attention of the Agents about to be employed, to those districts in which Divisions have suspended operations, and to places in which it is probable that new Divisions may be formed.

Your committee rejoice to learn that there is a prospect of the renewal of Agency on behalf of the cause. They wish abundant success to the brethren who may be appointed, and they entertain the conviction that the subordinate Divisions, and the friends of Temperance generally, will sustain the effort by their contributions.

In conclusion, the committee appeal to the members of the Order for more vigorous support of their valuable periodical, the *Abstainer*. It deserves a far larger subscription list. The objects we have in view will not be secured till the Temperance Press is better sustained. The circulation of the *Abstainer* might be doubled with the greatest ease, if a few active brethren would take the matter in hand, and most encouraging effects would follow.
