#### PAROCHIAL ASSOCIATION.

THE first regular meeting of the Parochial Association was held in the School House on Monday, 28th February, when a fair number of members were present. The Meeting was to some extent of a devotional character—as it is proposed that all such meetings shall be—but was principally devoted to receiving and acting upon reports of various branches of work in the parish. The evident interest taken by the e present was such as to make us hope that this Association will prove to be a valuable aid in carrying on and extending the work of our parish. A large increase in its membership is earnestly desired, even among those who are unable to become active members, for all such can frequently, either at meetings of the Association or otherwise, give help and encouragement to the active workers. Members of the congregation at large will be welcomed at all meetings of the Association, but more especially at those which are to be devotional.

#### INCREASE.

During the period of three years from the winter of 1877 to the winter of 1880 our congregation increased on the whole by only six families. Our growth in the past year has been more satisfactory, for we number now twelve families more than we did last winter. Our numbers now are but little short of what they were before the erection in our neighbourhood of the three new churches—Grace Church, Ascension, and St. Fhilip's.
