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

New Department Created at Co-Ionial Office - Attitude Laurier Subject for Press Criticism-Conference to Be Advisory.

LONDON, April 20.-At to-day's session of the colonial conference it was unanimously agreed to change the title to "imperial conference."

The conferences will be held every four years to discuss the common interests of the empire. The premier of the United Kingdom

will be ex-officio president of the imperial conference and the premiers of the colonies and colonial secretary will be ex-officio members.

will be ex-officio members.

The various gotvernments will appoint other members, but with the exception of the special confirmation of the conference not more than two representatives of each government shall participate in the conferences. Each government will have two votes. Each government will have two votes. A department of the colonial office is created with a permanent secretarial staff, which shall be charged with the duty of obtaining information for the use of the conference and dealing tentatively with such matters of general imperial interest as arise in the intervals between the conferences.

It was further decided that when matters arise requiring the consultation of two or more governments which cannot conveniently be postponed until the next conference, a subsidiary conference may be held be-

subsidiary conference may be held between especially chosen representatives of the governments concerned.

Imperial Defence.

The Earl of Eigin, secretary of state for the colonies, referring to the matter of military defence, outlined the general principles of an imperial military organization, and the premiers concurred in his views. The premiers tary organization, and the premiers concurred in his views. The premiers then explained the defence organizations of their respective colonies, and the extent to which the general organization could be put into practice. The draft of a resolution creating a general staff for the empire was tabled.

It resolved that the colonies be authorized to refer to the committee of Sir Robert Bond, the premier of Newfoundland, attended the conference for the first time to-day. He was greeted cordially.



THE BRITISH BUDGET.

For the first time in twelve years a British budget wholly the production of a Liberal government was on Friday last submitted by the chancellor of the exchequer. Altho it was, of course, known and anticipated that Mr. Asquith had not only a large realized surplus, amounting to \$26,-995,000, for the financial year 1903-07, appropriated automatically towards reduction of the national debt, but would have a substantial prospective surplus for the current year available for the readjustment of taxation, his proposals were awaited with unusual interest. The government had on the one hand to consider the clamant demand for the income taxpayers for a relief from a war rate of 25 cents in the \$5 and on the other the calls made by many Liberals for further differentiation in the income tax scale by the radical and labor members for the initiation of a scheme of old age pensions. Smyth dropped in next, followed by the Conservative, whip, Dr. Preston, Alex. McCowan, R. R. Gamey, Col. Hugh Clark (who remarked that his honer was coming to give acent to the sessional indemnity), Hon. G. P. Graham, A. G. MacKay, J. J. Craig and W. K. McNaught. With the premier and Hon. 



ORONHYATEKHA A TRIBUTE

Sixty-six years ago a Mohawk boyl was born on the Indian reservation near Brantford, who was destined to accomplish great things. When Oronhyatekha, for that was the boy's name, laid down his useful life last month, he had helped white men more than Tecumseh, Tyendenaga or any other red man famous in this continent's history. Theirs were the victories of war; his were the victories of peace.

The Mohawk boy grew and thrived. In due time he went to the Industrial School, established by the New England Company for the training of young Indians. He soon knew all the Indus-Indians. He soon knew all the Industrial School could teach him, and something more. He learned to dream long dreams, and needless to say, those dreams did not end at the Indian Reservation near Brantford. Boy of 15 tho he was, ambition had him in his grip. He did not fall in with his father's idea that his education was finished, and that the rude routinary life of the Indian on a government reservation Indian on a government reservation was all that lay before him. Oronhyatekha looked about him, saw that his tribe was but a remnant, realized that opportunity dwelt somewhere outside in the big world, and followed where his fate led.



At the close of the week the market had a much better appearance than it has had at any time in the past two months. Then suddenly Alfano disappeared.




