

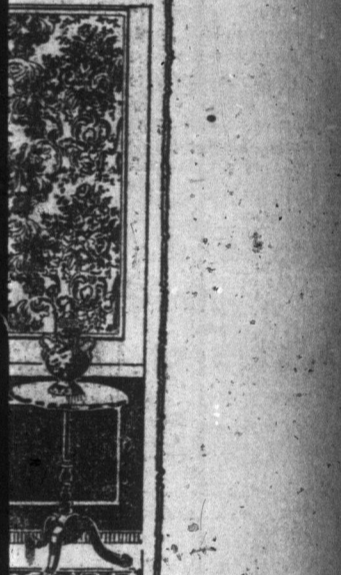

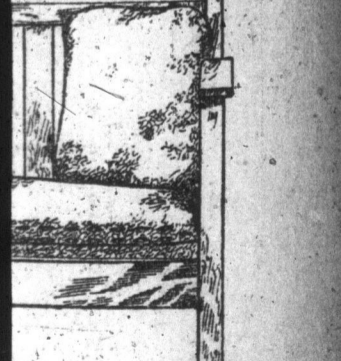

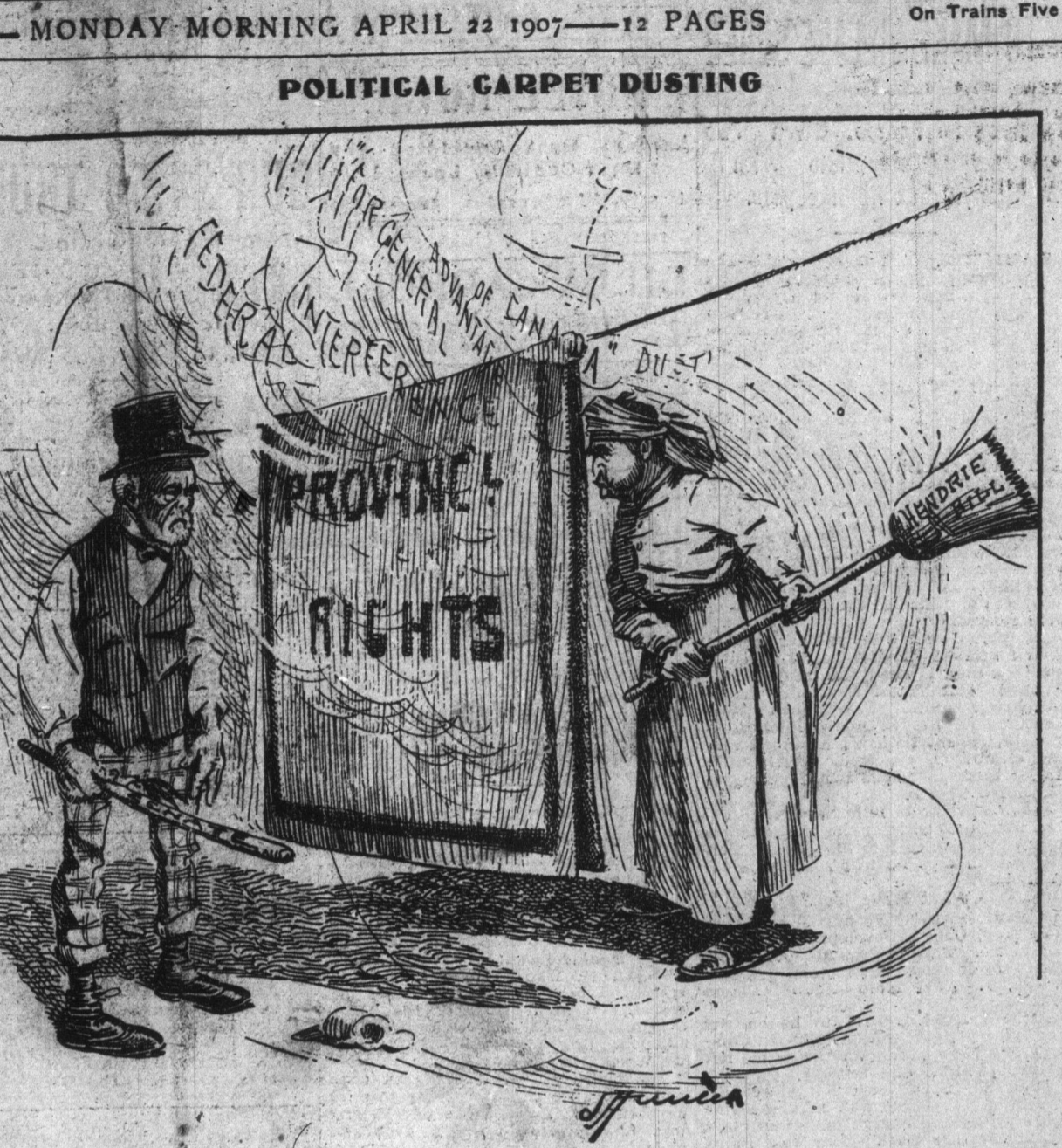

**LAST COAL MINE CLOSED IN B. C. AND ALBERTA**

Conference Between Operators and Employers Will Be Held to End Strike.

of the coal mines to close down in British Columbia and Alberta was the Pacific Coal Co.'s collieries at Banahed, Alta., where the men quit to-day.

W. H. Aldridge, managing director of the Pacific Coal Co., will leave to-morrow for Fernie, to attend the conference of mine operators and employers for the purpose of endeavoring to end the strike.

The C. P. R. has given notice that owing to the shortage of coal, it will handle no more freight, and to-day refused freight consigned from Rossland to Greenwood and other points.

W. A. Mackenzie, secretary of Rossland Board of Trade, was interviewed here to-day in regard to the coal mine trouble and the situation, and in response to enquiries he said:

"I cannot understand the statement made by the Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, minister of labor, in the house at Ottawa, yesterday, that there was no coal strike or lock-out. There is certainly a strike in all of the coal mines in Eastern British Columbia and Alberta. I see that the statement is made that difficulty has arisen out of posing of certain notices and President Schuman and his co-conspirators. **OFFER TO BUY OUT HOTELS TO MAKE VILLAGE SOBER**

Temperance People Given Two Weeks to Negotiate With Stony Creek Hotelkeepers.

HAMILTON, April 21.—(Special.)—The temperance people of Stony Creek have got on to a new wrinkle for wiping out the liquor business. There are two hotels in the village and the temperance people want to get rid of them, and on Saturday they waited upon the license commissioners and offered to buy both hotels, Rev. Dr. Clark, Methodist minister, headed the deputation and he had a petition signed by 153, asking the license commissioners to buy the hotels. The license commissioners refused the offer. The temperance people volunteered to buy the hotels and the commissioners adjourned until 29th inst. to give them a chance to negotiate. If the negotiations are successful, both hotels will be turned into temperance houses. The license of William Bookstader, Stoney Creek, was cut off. All the other licenses were renewed.

The police started on another tack in their moral reform crusade, at an early hour Saturday, when the raided say Taylor's establishment, North Catherine street, the one which was fined last week. The Citizens' League has complained to the chief about such places and a general clean-up is expected. Chief Smith declares that the league has anything to do with the raids.

English Journal Sees Signs of a Return of the Vogue.

**U. S. PROBES IMMIGRATION**

Committee to Make Trip to Europe in Quest of Information.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—An exhaustive investigation into all phases of the problem of immigration, as it affects the United States, is about to be begun by a national commission created for the purpose. The commission will meet here Monday morning to perfect its organization.

The members of the commission will visit many of the countries of Europe, either as a body or if all the members cannot go, as a sub-committee, for the study of immigration of aliens at close range.

The commission consists of nine members appointed under the Immigration Act, passed by congress last winter, and is as follows: Senators Dillingham of Vermont, chairman of the immigration committee; Lodge of Massachusetts; Lister of South Carolina; Representatives Howell of New Jersey, chairman of the house committee on immigration and naturalization; and Prof. Charles F. Nelson, commissioner of labor; Prof. Jenks of Cornell; and William R. Wheeler of Oakland, Cal.

The law places no limit upon the time the commission shall consume in making its enquiries or on the expense it may incur.

It is the purpose of the commission to acquire into the restrictions placed on the Chinese and Japanese immigration, but it is not probable that the commission will visit either China or Japan.

It is regarded as likely that out of the work of the commission will grow an international conference to deal with the whole general subject.

**HYMAN RESIGNS AGAIN**

**PAPER REACHES SPEAKER**

For the Third Time Minister of Public Works Attempts to Give Up Seat.

OTTAWA, April 20.—(Special.)—Hon. Chas. S. Hyman has made a third and powerful effort to resign. Mr. Speaker, at the opening of the house this morning, read his resignation. It is adorned with two witnesses and a red seal and is probably regular. The letter is as follows:

"April 11, 1907.—Hon. R. F. Sutherland, I beg herewith to tender my resignation as member of the house of commons for the elective division of London. (Signed) Charles S. Hyman; witnesses, Clarke and Flynn."

The house got into reply at noon and took up estimates of the interior department. Two thousand dollars were appropriated towards deporting undesirable immigrants. Last year 127 undesirables were deported.

In discussing Indian affairs, there was a general complaint that Indian lands and islands were being sold for nominal sums to political friends of the government. Mr. Boyce spoke for Algoma, and Mr. Bennett (E. Sim) for the islands in the Georgian Bay.

In reply to a question Mr. Oliver stated that F. T. Congdon, legal counsel to the Yukon council, has resigned.

Mr. Fowler revived the Moncton land scandal. Last session the high price paid to Matthew Lodge as middle man in the sale of the land in Canada, and Mr. Fielding by producing departmental records showing the amount paid a few years before by the Conservative government for half an acre of land at Moncton. It now transpires that it was 1-2, but in some way the price was deceived thereby.

Mr. Fielding said that he relied upon Mr. Emmerson. The latter was absent.

Mr. Clement (W. Kent) appealed for more protection to the tobacco growers of Canada. Mr. Fielding thought that the farmers already had enough protection.

Mr. S. H. Fleming, Ottawa, is expected in town this week to be the guest of Mrs. Critchley, Weston.

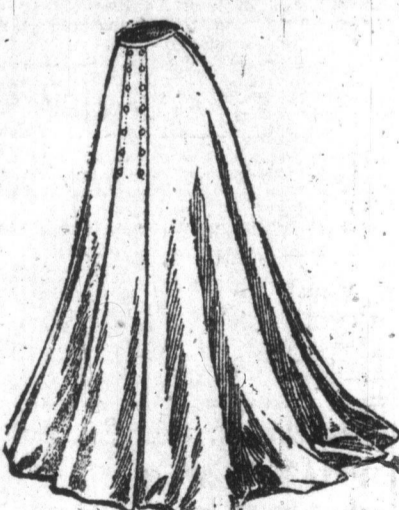

HEIR TO MILLIONS STARVING

Charged With Attempting to Commit Suicide in London.

LONDON, April 20.—A. F. S. Dundas, claiming to be a son of the late Mrs. Wurtis Dundas of Philadelphia, and rightful heir to millions of dollars, stood in the prisoners' dock at Reading to-day charged with breaking into a private dwelling with the intention of committing suicide. The caretaker of the house found a note protruding from the door. It was signed by Dundas, and said he was sick as the result of not being able to find employment, that for some time he had been without food, and that he had locked up himself with the intention of ending his life.

PHILADELPHIA, April 20.—Arthur Fitzroy Samersat, of Dundas, as he called himself, claimed to be a son of Mrs. Anna M. Wurtis, Dundas, a wealthy woman, who was prominent in Philadelphia society.

In the trial of the case the Dundas family claimed that the defendant was an impostor, who had never been heard of by any member of the Dundas family until he made his claim.

REJECTED BY SENATE

Amendments to the Railway Act Which Upper House Threw Out. OTTAWA, April 20.—The following amendment to the Railway Act was passed by the house of commons the second time this year. For the second time the senate threw it out: 1. Section 227 of the Railway Act, 1903, is repealed and the following section substituted in lieu thereof: "227. No train shall pass over any highway crossing at rail-level in any thickly-peopled portion of any city, town or village in force with a speed in excess of a gross speed that exceeds ten miles an hour, unless such crossing is properly protected, or unless such crossing is constructed and thereafter maintained in accordance with the orders, regulations and directions of the railway committee of the privy council and of the board in force with respect thereto. The board may limit such speed in any case to any rate that it deems expedient."

### MARKET EVENTS ADVERSE TO RISING QUOTATIONS

But Inside Interests Show a Disposition to Accumulate Stock  
—Toronto Market Dull.

The Wall-street market has resolved itself into a traders' affair, wherein the principal transactions are made and confined to the floor of the exchange. This is the ultimate end of a series of violent fluctuations, the natural result of a cancellation of most of the speculative accounts. The trend of prices for the week has been toward a gradual improvement, but sufficient stock has come out on each advance to immediately check any attempt at buoyancy. The temper of traders has leaned to the sterner side, so that it might be inferred that the supporting interests have, whether from choice or necessity, been the principal buyers on occasions when stocks were under pressure.

The week has not been prolific of new matters of market profit. Money and the crops have constituted principally to the topics of discussion, and no further solution of the former has been arrived at. The crop situation has become a big feature, but by general consent, it is believed that without another successful crop year, the position of securities will be subject to further weak spells. The grain market has been too erratic to present any decided ideas on the crop outlook, but the consensus of opinion is that some damage to wheat by insects has already occurred, and that bad weather is not beneficial to the growing crops. It is growing more apparent that the United States will have to finance its own obligations. The trend of exchange is strongly against gold importations, and it is hard to conceive that the United States can offer considerations which will change this until the next harvest period arrives.
