THE EXODUS FROM SANTIAGO. Fifteen Thousand Refugees Leave Santiago to Escape the Bombardment.

El Caney, Province of Santiago de Cuba, July 6, per the Associated Press despatch boat Dandy, via Port Antonio and Kingston, July 7.—Fifteen thousand refugees to day fill the roads leading from Santiago to El Caney, Boniato, San Vincent and San Luis, adjacne tplaces. The exodus was in response to a proclamation by General Ros, a political general in Santiago, who gave all people desirous of leaving the city to escape the bombardment a chance to go between 5 o'clock and 9 o'clock this morning. The time between the issuance of the proclamation and the period set for leaving gave a small opportunity for transleaving gave a small opportunity for trans-porting household effects or any of the com-forts of life, particularly as the Spanish authorities had forbidden any horse or carriage to be taken out of the city, as horses are needed there for carrying water to the men in the trenches.

The way to El Caney is long, and the weather excessively hot. As the fugitives had no means of carrying water, and, as there is none on the road between Santiago and El Caney, there was great suffering. Men, women and children lay alongside the road, wherever there was a great suffering. the road, wherever there was a small patch of shade, begging passers by, particularly soldiers with dangling cateens, for water, which was always freely tendered.



Paris, July 7.—In the Chamber of Deputles to-day, replying to an interpolation of Count de Castelaine on the subject of Alfred Dreyfus, the prisoner of Devil's 18-land, the Minister for War, M. Cavaignae, made an exhaustive statement, adducing the strongest evidence of the guilt of Drzyfus. In so doing he read several official documents in proof of the prisoner's guilt, and the Chamber, by a vote of 572 to 2, approved the Minister's statement, and ordered it to be printed and placarded throughout France.
