

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

- I. A total eclipse of the Sun, April 26th, invisible. Confined to the South Pacific Ocean and west coast of South America.
 - II. A partial eclipse of the Moon, May 11th, partly visible in Canada, the Moon rising eclipsed. The ending visible generally in South America and the extreme easterly portion of North America.
 - III. A partial eclipse of the Sun, October 20th, visible in North America. Magnitude of eclipse = 0.906 (sun diameter = 1).
 - IV. A total eclipse of the Moon, November 4th, invisible. The beginning visible generally in the north-west portion of North America, Asia and the easterly portion of Europe.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS

Venus is an evening star to July 9th, then morning star.
Mars is a morning star to August 3rd, then evening star.
Jupiter is an evening star to March 20th, a morning star to October 12th, then evening star. The Satellites of Jupiter are invisible from February 24th, to April 17th.
Saturn is a morning star to March 16th, an evening star to September 25th, then morning star.
 The planets will be brightest, **Venus**, June 2nd, August 15th; **Jupiter**, October 12th; **Saturn**, March 7th; **Mercury**, April 23rd, August 3rd.
