six (96) letters, 105 post cards, and sent out by mail 198 Reports of the District, 23 of which were to the Press.

In December our W. C. T. U. undertook the getting up of an entertainment in the Horticultural Pavilion, which lasted the greater part of a week and was much appreciated by those who attended.

January 3rd of 1893 was appointed Crusade Day, it being anniversary of the birthday of our honored friend and faithful worker, Mrs. Letitia Youmans, and a present of fruit and flowers was sent her as a loving remembrance.

In February a deputation was appointed to the Young People's Convention held in Broadway Methodist Church, and Mrs. Nicholls, a noted temperance lecturer being in this city was requested by the District to present the greetings of the W. C. T. U.

Deputations were also appointed to the meeting held to discuss Social Problems—to the Royal Templar Convention—to the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance, and our members joined with other women in interviewing Sir Oliver Mowat on the Women's Enfranchisement movement.

In May, teachers of the City Schools were invited to a Social at Headquarters. Many accepted the invitation; excellent papers were read urging upon the teachers greater diligence in instructing the children under their care in the principles of Temperance and Hygiene. An interesting address from Rev. W. Patterson of Cooke's Church was given, and all these, with vocal and instrumental music combined to make the evening a success.

At Christmas time prizes were offered in the public schools for the best essays on Temperance. A number of scholars competed and several of our members visited the different schools and presented the prizes.

Towards the end of May, rumors arose that the Street Car Company was again intending to press for a street car service on the Lord's Day, and on a recommendation from Central Union, a meeting was called in Y. M. C. A. Parlors on June 25th, where rumor having at that time become a certainty, women of all denominations responded to the call organized into ward Committees for active canvass of the city. The W. C. T. U. do not desire to take the glory of the victory which followed to themselves, for all Christian women were united in the work, but they are thankful that they were permitted to share in the work and aid in bringing about the grand victory of August 26th. The day the vote was taken, Headquarters' Building was kept open and our sisters served lunch there for the workers in Ward No. 3.

In June, a series of evangelistic meetings was held at Headquarters, continuing for one week at which the following subjects were considered and discussed: "The Gift of the Holy Spirit for the members of the W. C. T. U.," "Guidance and blessing in their work," "Union and

co-operation amongst Temperance Workers," "The Observance of the Lord's Day," "That Sabbath Desecration may not be legalized in our city and country by running of street cars, trains or boats." One day was devoted to Y. W. C. T. U. work. Another to consideration of Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic, the Plebiscite and that "Christian people may do their duty by voting for Prohibition," and another still to "The Children of our Public and Sabbath Schools, that teachers may use their influence in teaching Temperance Principles." Unfortunately the week chosen for these meetings proved to be one of the hottest of the season and they were not as well attended as they should have been.

The social element has not been neglected this year. During the winter Mrs. Hilborn and Mrs. Bascom, Mrs Forster, Mrs. MacMath and Mrs. Jarman, gave "At Homes" for the benefit of the Furnace Fund. The old furnace having been found insufficient for heating purposes, a new one had to be put in.

On June 24th, Mrs. John MacDonald of Oaklands, opened her beautiful grounds for a Garden Party, for benefit of W. C. T. U. funds and a very enjoyable afternoon was spent.

In August, the Royal Templars held a Camp Meeting at Centre Island Park. One day was kindly placed at the disposal of our W. C. T.U. Very interesting papers were read and addresses given by several of our women, and more inspiring than all was the presence of our valued friend Mrs. Youmans, whom we have not had with us for many years.

One feature of this year's work must not be forgotten. Mrs. Youmans' book, "Campaign Echoes" has been published. Our District W. C. T. U. has been largely instrumental in helping on this good work and the book is pronounced most interesting and helpful by all who have read it.

Very good work was done at the Fair this year by our District. Each Union in Toronto united to assist in making the two weeks a great success and were rewarded by netting the sum of \$369.00. Gospel Meetings were held in the afternoon, when an address was given and literature distributed to the amount of 17,000 pages in all. The need of larger building was felt, as every afternoon our tent was too crowded for comfort.

The members of Toronto District take this opportunity of thanking their friends, both in the city and from a distance, for their kind remembrance of them and trust the kindly feeling now existing between all temperance workers may long continue.

At the beginning of the year our President suggested that we take for our motto, Psalm 71, 16, "I will go in the strength of the Lord God." Often these words and others similar, have given us hope and courage when we seemed about to fail. Our earnest desire is, that each member may ever remember that "They who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." Our membership is 84. We have held 32 business meetings with an average attendance of 13. There have been written about 30 communications and 109 notices of meetings. At one of our devotional meetings, the subject for papers and discussion was, "What Christianity has done for women." September 6th, Mrs. Fraye, President of Associated Charities in Lucas County, Ohio, gave an interesting talk, touching upon the effective work done by the police matron in that place. In September, Sunday Gospel Temperance meetings were begun in our Headquarters, but continued only for a short time on account of small attendance. October 25th, representatives were appointed to attend a meeting of United Temperance Workers. The report showed the chief discussion to have been concerning a proposal to transfer a license to a new hotel, corner of Yonge and Alexander Streets. It was shown how detrimental to the cause is the fact that only provincial voters may sign a license petition, thereby excluding women, 13 of whom out of 18 in that sub-division would have voted against the transfer. A resolution was also carried favoring a plebiscite.

We have held during the year 4 socials, one for our own Unicn and three for Headquarters. Some of our members secured a number of subscribers for Mrs. Youmans' book. On May 31st, a meeting under our auspices was held in Bond Street Church, to welcome Mrs. Williams, Dominion President. The ladies of the Foreign Women's Missionary Society, then in annual session kindly gave up to us the evening. The meeting was addressed by Mrs. Williams, Mrs. McDonell, Mrs. Cowan and Miss Tilley.

Our meetings were discontinued during July and August and not resumed until September 18th, when delegates were elected to the coming Convention of United Temperance Workers to be held Oct. 3rd, 1894; also to the Provincial W.C.T.U. 17 members have subscribed for the Woman's Journal. As we make known these statistics we regret that our average attendance has been so small and sincerely hope that

Scientific Temperance Instruction.—Work has been carried on regularly in Miss Howe's class, Elizabeth Street School. A written examination was held in December and another in May, highest marks obtained were 57 out of a possible 60, and 48 out of 50. Mr. W. H. Howland reports the present class in Elizabeth Street School the strongest temperance class ever held there. Among the boys the tobacco habit is gradually falling into disrepute. Our library is greatly enjoyed by the girls and boys of the class and in many cases by parents and older sisters and brothers. We have to report as an outcome of the pledge book circulated last year, the establishment of a flourishing "Band of Hope" with 75 pledged members. The "Y" Bicycle Club report.—There are 29 names on the roll. Receipts from members fees and other sources \$48.65, and expenses \$34.15, of which \$24.40 was paid to the Y.W.C.T.U. President, E. L. Caswell; Secretary, F. G. McKay; Captain, E. L. Harrison,

Flower Mission.—During the year members have visited weekly, General Hospital, Old Folk's Home, and an average of eight cases in St. John's Ward, and occasionally the Children's Hospital and Home for Incurables. There have been distributed 6,087 boquets with texts attached, 261 glasses of jelley, 4 dozen eggs, 5 large and 135 small baskets of fruit. At Christmas 1 case of oranges, 1 basket of holly, $2\frac{1}{2}$ dozen Christmas cards, and to the inmates of the Old Folks' Home 14 small boxes biscuits and 14 small packages of tea donated by Mr. Christie, Band receipts were \$48.00, all of which has been expended on Flower Mission work. We have only a glimpse at the results of our work but that is sufficent to fill our hearts with thanksgiving to Him who has given us the privilege of working for Him in this world of suffering and sin.

EVANGELISTIC.

The term evangelistic is applied to those departments in our W.C.T. U., work which more especially emphasize the doctrines, that those who are kept by the power of God are safely kept from the liquor habit as well as every temptation of "the world, the flesh, and the devil." The other departments ought to be working indirectly towards the same end uplifting humanity through the senses, in fact glorifying God through the body as well as the spirit. In proportion as we keep the spiritual end in view so will we be strengthened and blessed in all our work. For this end the monthly devotional meetings of the District Union are held ; for the quickening and growth of our own spiritual life, and seeking God's blessing and guidance in our work. These meetings though not so well attended as they might be, have been helpful to many of us who feel the burden and discouragements of our work, and we were able to say "it is good for us to be here." Two were held at Mrs. Youmans' house, and it was touching to see how much she enjoyed the presence of the Master and of his servants. Mrs. Youmans' suggested that some of our women speak in the churches on temperance as the Missionary women did on their work. This idea was carried out by holding one of the monthly devotional meetings in Parkdale, another in the East, and still another in the Willard Union. The Superintendent of Evangelistic work gave Bible readings twice under the auspices of the Parkdale Union, once in Dovercourt, once in the Eastern Union and once in the Western. A service of meetings was also arranged for the middle of June. Different subjects of prayer and discussion for each, thoughtful papers and addresses were given but the attendance was not what it should have been. At one of the meetings the subject was "Sabbath Observance," and as the Street Car agitation was commencing it was decided to call a Public meeting of women. Notices were sent to a large number of churches, the response was cordial and in every division our members took a good share of the work. From individual Unions which have reported, we find that literature was regularly distributed at the boxes at the Union Station Willard and Fire Halls.

The Central Union also held gospel meetings in Headquarters for about two months.

The Western Union reports holding 32 Mother's Meetings, with an average attendance of eleven, also temperance work in five churches.

The Eastern Union held monthly Evangelistic meetings and now attends entirely to the gaol. The gaol report is not yet forwarded.

The Central Y's report twelve Devotional meetings, two of them in connection with the District, one of them "a delightfu! one held at the house of Mrs. Youmans."

The work of visiting the jail as carried on by East End Union, has been regularly attended to during the past year. Fifty visits were made, a fresh supply of gospel and temperance literature supplied each week. Gospel services conducted and women spoken to personally about their souls. The average attendance this year at the services was 30.

The homes or haunts of women who are about to be discharged are visited, and clothing brought therefrom. As many are arrested with barely sufficient clothing to cover them, garments of all kinds, boots, hats, etc., had to be secured for them by personal application to members of the Union, or friends interested in the work; to such thanks of this Union are due. While the drink traffic is legalized there will be no scarcity of inmates for the gaol.

It is encouraging to the workers of the Union to have such help afforded them at the meetings, as is given by the matrons of the institution in influencing and encouraging the women to attend the Gospel services.

AMONG LUMBERMEN.

Central Y.W.C.T.U. report a partial list of literature, 124 papers, books and magazines, distributed among three camps. Dovercourt Union sent 600 pages of literature. Willard Union sent 960 pages of pamphlets, papers, etc., also a testament, hymn book, scrap book and a comfort bag well filled with a good variety of useful articles. Central Union sent 6 parcels to the lumber camps, containing the following : 290 papers and magazines, 11 books, 3 gospel hymn books, 200 leaflets, 1 British workman and 2 Band of Hope Almanacs. Eastern sent 180 papers to Lumber Camps. I received a card this week, which says that the men are very grateful for the literature.

SCIENTIFIC TEMPERANCE INSTRUCTION.

KITCHEN GARDEN.

SACKVILLE MISSION HALL.

The Kitchen Garden class was organized in October, 1892, with 24 girls. The attendance was very good throughout the winter and better than ever before. Some who joined in the beginning dropped out but their places were filled without any trouble. In April we gave an exhibition of the work in the hall, to which we charged the small admission of five cents. The evening was not favorable it being wet, still some of the mothers came and seemed well pleased. They appreciate the efforts made to train their children as many of them are obliged to go out working all day and so have not the time to give to this part of their girls education. One mother told us that her daughter made some very good starch according to the Kitchen Garden receipt. We believe we are at work in the right place and that God's blessing is resting upon us.

JUVENILE WORK.

We believe the future hope of the temperance cause, is with the young people of to day, and the most potent factor in our best and most rapid development is our educational department.

Central Union had a band of Hope that held weekly meetings in the mission hall for about six months, during that time 56 signed the pledge. At Christmas they had an entertainment given to them, they were treated to cake, candy, oranges, &c. They also had a magic lantern exhibition given by Mr. and Mrs. Henderson.

Western Union has two Bands of Hope one meets in the schoolroom of Wesley Church Dundas Street every Wednesday at 4 P. M. They are divided into Junior and Senior classes, Mrs. Holmes gives regular lessons, to the Junior Class; Mrs. Bulman uses the temperance manual in the Senior class. There are 180 names on the roll, 80 having signed this year. \$15.00 were spent for prizes last Christmas. The other Band of Hope is held in the Baptist Church.

Eastern Union has a band of Juvenile Temperance workers under its fostering care, organized by your District Superintendent on the 27th of February, 1893, it has now more than doubled its membership. There are 38 members pledged against Alcohol, Tobacco, Gambling and Profanity. They had a picnic in August that all enjoyed very much, they had a ride on the cars, a sail on the water, and were quite ready after that to enjoy a good substantial tea.

BATHURST UNION.

There is a Juvenile Temple meeting in the Mission hall every Monday evening at 7 p.m. 39 members have taken the fourfold Pledge. The catechism is regularly taught, and good work is being done there also.

Hope in order to reach as many as possible of the girls and boys of St. Johns ward. This Band of Hope met fortnightly on Wednesday in Mission Hall, Mission Avenue.

On the last Wednesday of each month a programme was given also a short address on Scientific Temperance and Gospel Temperance combined, teaching of temperance catechism, &c., review of previous lesson. At these evening meetings besides the 75 pledged members of the band there was an audience of many other children and young lads, also from 30 to50 parents and grown up friends of the members. The 75 members have not all taken the triple pledge, all are of course pledged against the use of alcoholic liquors and many against tobacco and profanity. It was thought wise not to exclude any who were willing to abstain from liquor although they might not be prepared to take the triple pledge. During the season several temperance stories were given with magic lantern accompaniement. Three "Penny Teas" followed by games, were a new feature in the work of the year and proved most successful as a mode of entertainment. Lest any one should imagine that a "penny tea" is a tea that costs only ap = ... "ywe hasten to explain that a "penny tea" derives its name from the fact that admittance to it is obtained for the small sum of one penny Only pledged members of the band of Hope are admitted. We teach as a rule questions and answers, as all are or have been members of the scientific temperance instruction class in Elizabeth Street School, they learn quickly. Instruction is given from Richardson's Teacher's Manual and any and every book on the subject that can be pressed into service.

The Band is carried on by some of the mission workers in St. John's Ward and several of the members of this Union. The Superintendent of Scientific Temperance Instruction addressed the Band of Hope the last Wednesday of each month and also adressed five other Bands last year.

Our kind friend Ex-Ald. J. L. Morrison, who takes a deep interest in this department of our work, contributed seven dollars to assist in defraying expenses. Our grateful thanks are due to all the friends who donated books, papers, &c.

CONSTITUTION OF THE TORONTO DISTRICT W.C.T.U.

Pledge.

I hereby promise, God helping me, to abstain from all distilled, fermented and malt liquor, including wine, beer and cider, as a beverage, and to employ all proper means to discourage the use of and traffic in the same.

ARTICLE I.

Name—This organization shall be known as the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Toronto District.

ARTICLE II.

Object—The object shall be to strengthen the local Unions, and assist them in carrying out the plans of the Provincial Union, and to arouse the women of the District to organized effort for the banishment of the liquor traffic.

Officers—The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor. These officers, except the Auditor, together with the President of local Unions (who shall also be *ex officio* Vice-Presidents) and Superintendents of Departments, shall constitute an Executive Committee, with full power to provide for the interests of the work. These officers, with the exception of local Presidents and Superintendents of departments, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, and in the following manner : Tellers having been appointed by the President, an informal ballot shall be cast for each officer separately, and the members of the Convention shall then proceed to vote by ballot for the two candidates having the highest votes cast.

Superintendents of Departments—Superintendents shall be nominated by the Executive Conmittee, and elected by the Annual Meeting. Their election shall be by acclamation, unless otherwise ordered.

ARTICLE III.

Sub-Committee—The President, Vice-President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurer shall form a Sub-Committee of the Executive board for the speedy transaction of business, with power to fill vacancies which may occur during the year; three of whom shall form a quorum. This Committee shall meet at such a time and place as the President shall direct.

ARTICLE IV.

Annual Meeting—The Annual Meeting shall be composed of the Executive Board, and one delegate for every five paying members of each affiliated local Union. This meeting shall be held not later than the

ARTICLE V.

Committee of Arrangements—The President and the Corresponding Secretary of District shall be a Committee of arrangement, selecting topics for discussion, and devising means to make the meetings interesting and profitable.

ARTICLE VI.

Affiliation—Each local Union shall contribute to the funds of the strict Union at the rate of five cents per paying member yearly, thus coming auxiliary to the District Union.

BY-LAWS.

1. The duties of the president shall be to preside at all meetings, have supervision of work in the city, organize new Unions, and issue calls for meetings, and, at the written request of eight members, call special meetings.

2. Vice-President shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and shall preside in the absence of the President.

3. Local presidents shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and aim to create and stimulate interest in the same; assist in organization, and preside in the absence of the President and Vice-President of the District.

4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Union, notify Local Unions of new branches of work; secure reports of Corresponding Secretaries of Local Unions, from which she shall formulate a report for the Annual Meeting; assist the President in preparing programme, etc., for the same; and send Annual Report of the District Union to the Provincial Corresponding Secretary.

5. The Recording Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Union and of the Executive Committee, and keep a correct record of their proceedings; and send to each member of of the Executive Committee notice of such meetings. She shall apprise all members of committees of their appointment and duties; notify the public of its meetings; and fyle and sign all orders at the request of the President.

6. The Treasurer shall pay bills, on order of the President and Recording Secretary; keep an exact book account, and present a monthly report of the same. She shall endeavor to secure contributions for District work; collect unpaid affiliation District fees, and forward to the Provincial Treasurer the affiliation fee received from Local Unions.

7. Superintendents of Departments shall advise and encourage each local Superintendent in the prosecution of her branch of work, subject to the approval of the Executive; secure reports of same, and embody each separately in their representative reports to the Provincial Convention, giving each Union credit by name.

8. All members of Local Unions in the city of Toronto, affiliated with the District Union by the payment of five cents per member, shall be members of this Union. Every third monthly meeting is called "The Quarterly," and every member of the W.C.T.U. is privileged to attend.

9. Funds for carrying on the District work may be raised by any means determined on by the Executive

10. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice having been given at the previous Executive meeting
