### MOORS TROUNCED IN A SEVEN HOUR FIGHT

TORONTO, Sept. 3—In pursuance of the plan formulated some time ago the department of education is calling for tenders for the supply of flags for the rural schools of Ontario. The ensigns are to be "Union Jacks, with the coat-of-arms of the Dominion of Canada." The offers of firms having such flags for sale will be received until Wednesday, Sept. 11.

For the purchase of ensigns of this type the legislature voted an appropriation of \$5,000 as a beginning. Each rural school will receive a flag, which must be displayed in the class-room at the discretion of \$5,000 as a beginning. 


