SABLE TAILS TRIM PALE BLUE FELT

There is a very decided reaction in favor of the soft French felt shape rather than the stiff pressed felt shapes that obtained last year. Some of those former, however, find a little wire, milliner's wire, of course, he it understood, quite an assistance in maintaining the elevated curves and undulations, but there must not be a hint of any set stiffness to the result, if it is to hold a place in the fashion procession this winter. Such is the effect produced in the pretty model that is pictured on this page. The soft felt is in a clear and rather cold pale blue, the softness of tint relieved by the trimming of fur that is daintily applied. This fur trimming is altogether of little sable tails sewed to a ribbon band, and so cunningly arranged that instead of falling in a straight fringe effect a curved and convoluted effect is gained. LOOKING FOR NEW MARKETS

Secretary Shaw Points to South America - - - Wants Better Merchant Marine.

Louis D. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, and the lion's share of attention among a long list of speakers at the three sessions of the Ways and Means Committee at Kansas City last Friday. Secretary Shaw declared: "If this country ever develops international commerce, it will accomplish it by granting them encouragement, not alone by dredging harbors and deepening channels, but by carrying them a merchant marine in which to carry, under the most favorable terms, the products of our farms, our mines, our forests and our factories. Secretary Root has gone a step farther than I propose to go in favor of a merchant marine. He commits himself to the ship-machinery industry. I do not say that I am in favor of a ship subsidy, but I will say that I am in favor of anything that will procure a merchant marine for the United States."

George McAvilly went to Montreal last evening. Where shall these new markets be found? The answer is easy, for there are but few places possible. South America and South Africa import \$250,000,000 per annum, to which the United States contributes a paltry 12 per cent. Oriental countries import a thousand millions to the United States and contribute only 10 per cent. Our manufacturing competitors know where these countries lie. They have learned their languages, have studied their desires as well as their needs, and for years have presented a well-planned and well-executed campaign for their commercial invasion, and with the aid of large merchant marine they have been very successful. We scarcely know where these countries are located, their languages, their habits, their needs, or their desires, and we send them, all combined, less than \$150,000,000 of our more than \$15,000,000,000 of manufactures, and this pitance we send in foreign bottoms and beneath alien flags. Argentina has just subsidized a line of steamers with which to market her surplus rather than to send it under foreign flags in competition with her neighbors. Wherefore she send three ships? To Europe of course, for of Europe only has she heard in a commercial way. If this country ever develops international commerce it will accomplish it by granting them encouragement, not alone by dredging harbors and deepening channels, but by insuring them a merchant marine in which to carry, under the most favorable terms, the products of our farms, our mines, our forests and our factories. And without international merchants sustained by a merchant marine we will never put these products into the ports of countries unable to maintain merchant ships with which to come after them. The outlay of \$50,000,000 in the purchase of the right of way, and \$200,000,000 additional in the construction of an isthmian canal, \$200,000,000 spent in the last decade on rivers and harbors in aid of shipping, and \$12,000,000 expended on the revenue cutter service, largely for the protection of ship-







 Representative of Wellington Ward Warns up the Water and Sewerage Board This Time--Says Concrete Pipe Through Dry Lake is a Miserable Job--Special Meeting Called.

At a meeting of the water and sewerage board yesterday afternoon, Ald. Christie severely criticized the work on the water works on a matter like this. We must have reports or our officials should be here, written reports. We presume everything is right."
 Ald. Lantulum—"I know that many people are of opinion that the concrete pipe through the lake is not a good job."
 The chairman—"I'm no expert, but Mr. Hunter has said to me it's not a good job."
 Ald. Bullock—"He says so?"
 The chairman—"That's news to us."
 The chairman—"Since these repairs have been made I believe it is satisfactory. I follow the details of the work as closely as I can, but it's a very difficult matter, and I'm constantly asking for reports. Citizens come to me with news."
 Ald. Lantulum—"There ought not to be much difficulty. Your worship is the responsible head of the department and answerable to the citizens for all that is done."

THE G. T. R. WILL USE THE SHORTEST ROUTE ACROSS THE PROVINCE

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—It was decided in the house today that the debate on the proposed route for the Grand Trunk Railway across the province would be held after the adjournment. It could be decided afterwards said the minister of finance, whether or not this would be done in respect to the tariff duties.
 Questions and notices of motion were then proceeded with.
 In reply to Dr. Stoddard (St. John), Sir Frederick Borden said that 200 sub-target guns were delivered during April, 1906, and fifty additional during October, 1906. They were purchased from the Sub-target Gun Company, Limited, Toronto, and the price paid was \$220 each. He signed, as he generally had done, powers of attorney in blank, to be filled in, and if these had acted as scrutineers it was without his knowledge.
 A batch of motions for papers were passed.
 Mr. Crockett (York) moved in the house for papers not already brought down touching the Transcontinental between Moncton and Quebec. He said that he discovered one document among the papers brought down last year, which was not in the return when it was seen by him last year, and was not asked for in that return. It showed that the correspondence was not complete. IN THE SENATE.
 OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—(Special)—Sir Mackenzie Bowell, in the senate, asked why, in the contract with the Elder-Dempster Company for the services between Canada and Mexico, the boats were forbidden to call for cargo at Cuban ports on their northward voyage.
 Sir Richard Cartwright said that Mexico furnished half the subsidy for the service and objected to the steamers carrying cargo from Cuba, as it was a competing country. Canada would probably object to steamers calling at American ports for freight destined for Mexico.
 Secretary of State Scott introduced a number of bills. One amended the immigration law to enable British citizens from other parts of the empire to be naturalized here within three years residence in Canada. Another was to legalize the revised statutes and to provide for the French version. The revised statutes are to come into force on January 1, 1907.
 Another amends the criminal code and gives the magistrates wider powers in sentencing boys under sixteen years of age under seven in order to remove them from criminal environment. The bill was introduced at the request of the Children's Aid Society.
 Other bills give Japan the benefit of Canada's favored nation treaties and confirm the recent treaty made with Japan.

Secretary Burns said last night that the city council in 1904 obtained the passage of the act which provides for the removal and disposal of garbage and other refuse in the city of St. John and if this act were enforced it would do away with the board of health officers having to go to the police court so often in a spring.

An Italian named Polineno, from Gloucester, is now in the city. He came here from the mine to get "Dad" Babes, whom he claims is his wife, she having married him four years ago in Sydney. Last year she left him and came to this city. She is now living with Mr. and Mrs. James Miller, on Sheffield street, and Polineno accompanied by Sergeant Baxter went there yesterday. The Italian claimed her as his wife but she denied being married and now a telegram has been sent to Sydney for a copy of the marriage certificate.

Mary Glose, a colored woman, who figured recently in police circles, was again in court this morning, charged with wandering about Princess street and being unable to give a satisfactory account of herself to the police. Patrolman Nelson, who made the arrest, says that she had evidently been drinking, and although she seemed able to get along without difficulty, her tongue was thick and she was rather "at sea" when asked as to her destination, and he thought she would be safer under lock and key. She was remanded for further hearing.

Albert McCalliffe and Daniel Fitch were fined \$4 or ten days each for drunkenness.

High winds and generally unfavorable conditions have caused rather unfavorable conditions in the fish market, and from present indications tomorrow's supply will be slim. A local dealer in conversation with the Times today said: "I have been in the fish business now about 27 years, and while, in that time I have known periods of scarcity, I have never seen it hang out so long at any one time." Prices for this week range as follows: Cod, 6 cents; halibut, 15; haddock, 6; mackerel, (cold storage), 15 to 25; cold storage salmon, 15 to 28c; and haddies and lippers about the same.

MONTEZUMA HERE TODAY

C. P. R. Liner Brings 310 Passengers and Large Freight—Empress of Ireland Sails Tomorrow.

C. P. R. steamship Montezuma from Antwerp for this port passed Brier Island, N. S. bound inward at 9 o'clock this morning. She will be due here about two o'clock. The Montezuma has on board 310 passengers and a general cargo for this city and the west.

The C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain, sails from Liverpool tomorrow, Friday, for this port, calling at Halifax to land her mail. It is expected that over one thousand passengers will come here by the Britain.

On Saturday next the new steamer Cassin of the Canadian line will leave Glasgow direct for this port. A warm welcome will be given Captain Mitchell. The Cassin will bring a large number of passengers.
