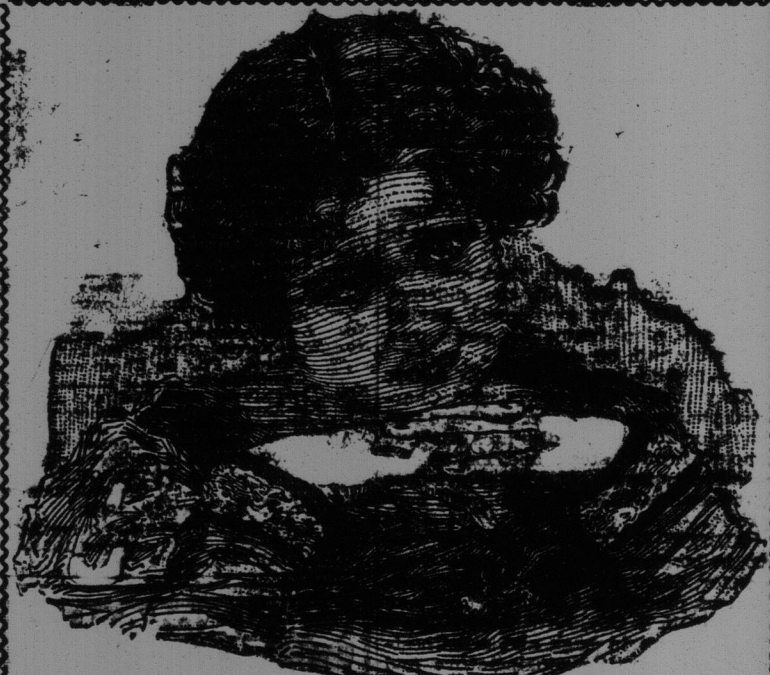

CIVIC REFORMERS PAST AND PRESENT.

Some Considerations For Those Who are Now Giving Attention to the Question of a Better Administration of Affairs in St. John.

To the Editor of the Times:

Sir:—History seems to be repeating itself in civic politics. A little more than 11 years ago a number of gentlemen met in the Dockrell building on Union street and organized what was afterwards known as the Tax Reduction Association, which was to prove a panacea to all the ills of civic misgovernment.

The Increase in Debt.

The highway to Indiantown and the Carleton place between St. John and Portland. They were to have cost \$120,000. The highway to Indiantown cost \$120,000 more than was provided, because of the widening of Main street at Port Brown and the widening of Indiantown and other hills. This was due to demands from the people of the north end, but it was the result of the question as to the advisability of issuing 40-year bonds for such work.

A Light that Failed.

The mayor in his inaugural address referred to the general subject of re-arrangement in expenditures and suggested a committee to examine into the receipts and expenditures of the various departments. This committee was appointed and met in January 1895. The report was not presented and was never printed. It contains a large amount of valuable information concerning the revenues and expenditures of the city and a number of recommendations which were not carried out.

The Water System.

Regarding the expenditures on account of water and sewerage, which are responsible for additions of \$418,000 to the city debt, the aldermen of the past and present have to take the responsibility for wanting at least \$600,000 of the people's money in a vain attempt to make water rise above its natural level. The new Carleton bridge cost the city \$1,000,000, but the public and the private underwriters never asked for the money to be raised to build the bridge, which the council alone is responsible for.

A Bit of History.

Following the fire of 1877 there were expenditures resulting in additions to the debt of about \$150,000. The crisis which broke in 1879 and 1880 and there were differences in obtaining funds to meet current expenses. The council of 1879 immediately reduced salaries 20 per cent, stopped all but the most necessary work and at the same time a lively campaign was commenced for the collection of back taxes. In 1884 an entirely new method of book-keeping was introduced, gross receipts in various departments were kept in a light, a new assessment act was passed which greatly reduced taxation on salaries paid to the city.

The Present Movement.

Now another movement has been started, which will in all probability be the people provided the gentlemen who are responsible have studied the civic question which a revolution in the method of doing the business of the city is necessary. The aldermen are aware of this. No man can occupy a seat in the Common Council for a year without realizing how necessary as a complete change in method. But like the water question and the assessment question, it will require more time and attention than the aldermen are disposed to give to the matter.

A LIVELY MEETING HELD LAST EVENING.

Present Administration of Civic Affairs Condemned by Citizens—Difference of Opinion on Question of Dividing City into Districts.

At a public meeting held last evening in the Bresser's corner hall to discuss the proposed election of aldermen by divisions of the city instead of on the present system, the subject of civic affairs was dealt with from a variety of standpoints and the speakers condemned the present administration as inefficient.

Other opinions. John Montgomery paid it seemed to be the wish of the meeting to clear the present crowd out and get a better one for much of the troubles the chief engineer of the city was to blame. The men at the council might be all right but the trouble was they hadn't got the brains for the work.

Resolutions Submitted. H. H. Pickett, in moving a resolution, said no return to the ward system was intended, but St. John was divided geographically into north, south and west wards.

Give Mayor More Power. Ex-Mayor Edward Sears said he was anxious to notice the little interest taken in civic affairs, it seemed to matter little to the private individual if the council were elected for one or ten years.

Aldermen Want No Change. Ald. Maxwell thought the meeting would do well to unite with the new league of civic reform and if possible evolve something in the interests of the whole community.

Bowler and Painter.

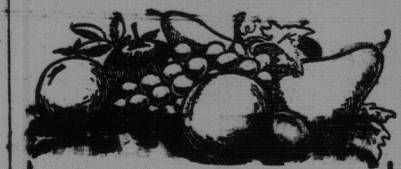

"As many times as you want," replied the Californian's backers. Smith quickly said, "Ten."

The result of the fight is now a matter of history. At its close Smith collected \$10,000 in the same unobscured manner he made the wager.
