Seven or More Zeppelins Cross East Coast of England; One Lost on French Front

London, Oct. 20.—The following official communication was issued this morning: "Hostile airships attacked the eastern and northeastern coasts last evening. The enemy aircraft proceeded some way very definite action. Six or seven raiders took part and bombs were dropped at various points including a few in the London area."

A FARMER'S SUGGESTION

A farmer, in a letter on the milk question, published in the Halifax Herald, says:—"Why not have a sufficient building erected at the depot so that all milk and cream, immediately on arrival, can be put on ice, and made ready for distribution. Then, just as they do with their water (but don't do with their gas and electricity) have the dirty distribute the milk. There is no need to sell milk on credit. Sell milk tickets (blue ones for summer and red ones for winter, at prices differ) and a ticket in the empty bottle taken up, means pay for another full one. It might throw some milk dealers out of business, but to their own ultimate advantage. These men know more about dairy farming and producing cheap milk than we farmers, and let them come out on the land and themselves share our big fortunes."

SHIPS FOR FRANCE

Washington, Oct. 20.—To meet France's urgent shipping needs, the shipping board has ordered twenty steel ships of from 2,500 to 6,000 gross tonnage each turned over under charter to the French government. The vessels are being built at Cleveland, Toledo and Detroit, and are to be contracted for by British and French firms.

MATCH FACTORIES OF SWEDEN IN COMBINE

Stockholm, Oct. 20.—The merger of all the match factories in Sweden is announced. The new trust will be the greatest match concern in the world, and has an output of five million boxes of matches annually.

Chinese Warned Over It

Pekin, Oct. 20.—The Chinese press is agitated greatly over the proposed so-called Arms-Alliance loan, which a combination of Japanese munitions manufacturers is endeavoring to make to China for the equipment of the Chinese army. The Chinese, it is understood, desire the control of the materials and also seek to have Japanese military advisers employed by China.

LA FOLLETTE CASE HELD UP

Investigators Will Hold No More Sessions Until Nov. 26.

Washington, Oct. 20.—No further sessions of the committee investigating Senator La Follette's speech at St. Paul will be held until Nov. 26. The committee found itself unable to proceed immediately because Senator La Follette's refusal to take part in the inquiry under the conditions imposed. A requirement of plans will be necessary, and for the convenience of members of the committee it was deemed best to postpone further meetings until just before the opening of the next session of congress.

"LOST" SOLDIERS FOUND.

American Troops Were Sent to British Camp in Error.

London, Oct. 20.—The American Young Men's Christian Association reports that a detachment of ninety-nine American soldiers which had been "lost" in England for more than five weeks has now returned to the United States. By some mistake these men were set down in a British camp without a single officer or a penny. The day after they arrived at this camp twenty-eight of them fell victim of the German measles and were sent to an isolation hospital. For five weeks the Americans were unable to obtain stamps for letters home or even tobacco. Then they were discovered by an American college student who is in a British Y. M. C. A. hut. He arranged to have each man supplied with a package of cigarettes and six postal stamps daily and a weekly credit of ten shillings at the Y. M. C. A. canteen. Later the plight of these men was communicated to the American authorities, who sent \$10 each to tide the men over until arrangements could be made to restore them to their proper units.

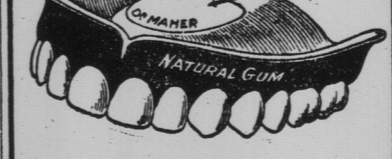

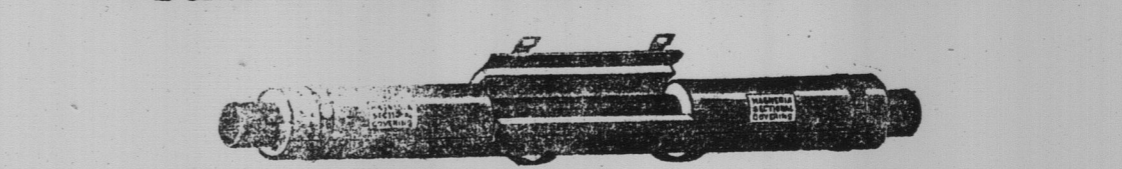

Having lost faith in the old government, people look to the new one with hope, but not with a boundless charity. It has a stock of good-will which its predecessors will admit that it was too dependent on large financial and industrial interests, or too fearful of them, to compel them to carry their proportionate share of the burdens of the war and subordinate their selfish interests to the service of the country. The present government can better afford to be courageous; it cannot afford to be anything else. Its first duty must be to strike at the cause of popular discontent by demonstrating that it has the intention and the will to lay a firm hand on the machinery of big business, and make it work for the state. The war has poured fortunes into the pockets of many great industrial and distributing enterprises. Some of these have been lately placed under direct government control, but there is need of widely extending state regulation in the interest of the public exchequer and of the masses. Fiscal reforms are necessary, especially a stiffening of the new income tax, and direct imposts on luxuries. It cannot have escaped the notice of the minister of finance that the amended income tax in the United States will touch a greater number of people, relatively, than the corresponding tax in Canada, and that the larger American incomes derived from professions and occupations will pay double the Canadian rate.

Above and beyond these things the government can do much to curb extravagance and stimulate thrift. It can be not only economical itself, but the cause of economy in others. A great many people must be shaken out of their present habits of spending. It is difficult to modify custom in a hurry, but Canadians must be made to realize that they face an industrial emergency. The amount of money needed to market the crops and establish British credits so as to keep factories busy and labor employed on British war orders will be beyond the resources of the country unless the people are smitten with a zeal for saving. One way in which the government can aid in this laudable object is to change, as far as practicable, the direction of industry. The employment of more labor and material in the production of essentials would reduce their price. This can be effected only by the transfer of labor and material from the production of the non-essentials on which too many Canadians are spending money that should be invested in war bonds so as to keep essential industries at work. In the realm of food control and regulation the government, through the food controller, must do much farther in plans for conserving and distributing supplies, for stimulating production, and for protecting the public against speculators and profiteers.

The country looks for a bold and progressive programme from the new government as a justification for union. The Globe believes that the administration will prove that it is not a mere office-holding combination, and will do big things now that it is unfettered by party and patronage considerations.

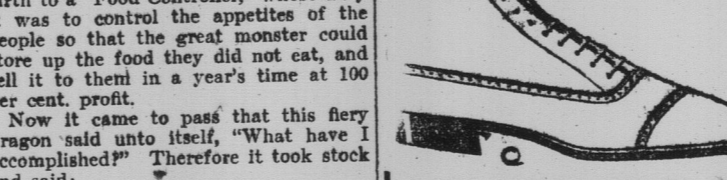

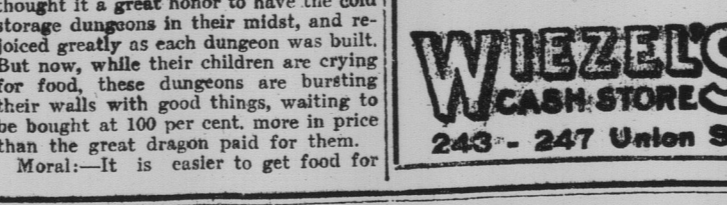
THE FABLE OF A FIERY DRAGON

WILL CO-OPERATE WITH FARMERS' ORGANIZATIONS

Hon. T. A. Cramer, the new federal minister of agriculture in the recently formed administration, has been organized up to the amounts prescribed by the fuel administration without obtaining special licenses. Permits will be granted only to shippers who sent coal to Canada last year. The plan is to hold Canada the rest of this year to supplies not exceeding ten per cent. more coal than was received last year. This arrangement is based on a ten per cent. increase in production in the United States this year and permits Canada to share equally with the United States.

The council of the board of trade will meet a joint committee of the Fredericton council and board of trade here on Wednesday next to discuss the proposed change in the schedule of night rates of the New Brunswick Telephone Company. The board has been advised by L. R. Ross that, after November 1, a full staff of night telephone operators will be put on up to 11 o'clock at the union depot.

He left home on October 5, and did not return. Mr. O'Brien had evidently been out all night and had been so chilled with the cold that he did not recover from the effects and died the following Tuesday. Mrs. Thomas Cole of Centerville, and Mrs. Charles Robinson of Cookville, are sisters of deceased.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

John Kemp was elected president, J. E. Tighe vice-president, and Charles McGowan auditor of the Trades and Labor Council, to fill vacancies, at a meeting last evening. The council advised wives of working men not to sign food pledge cards until the government gives assurances that excess profits will be reduced. A communication on this subject will be sent to Premier Borden. The council also will ask the premier why labor representatives were not included in the New Brunswick exemption tribunals. The council expressed the opinion that the names of all subscribers to the British Red Cross fund should be published. 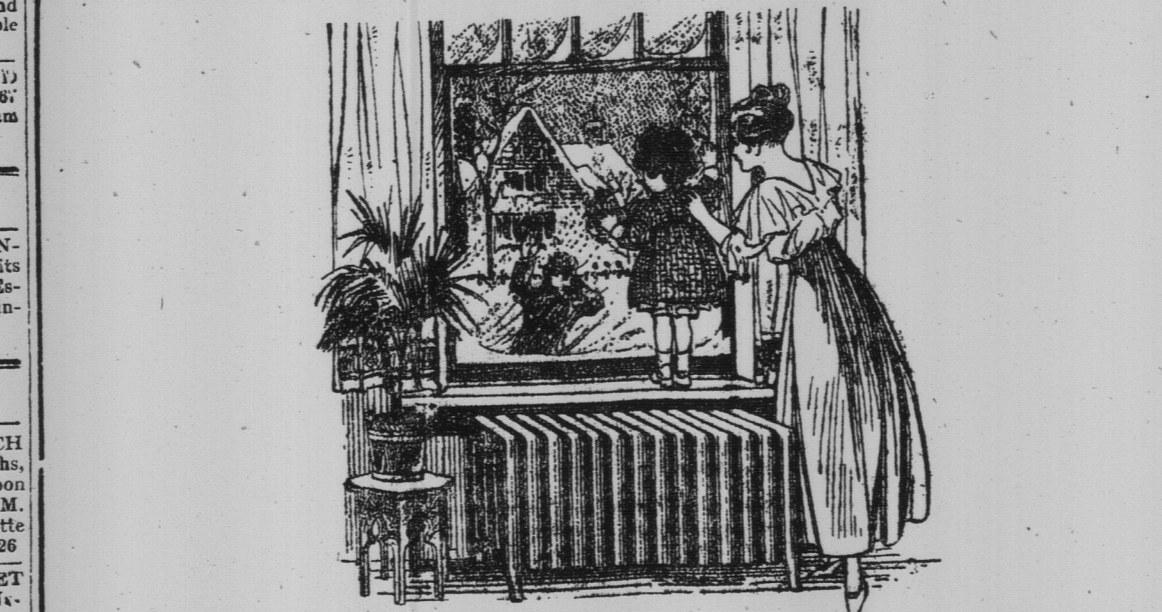

Twenty-three births, seventeen boys and six girls, and fourteen marriages were reported to the registrar during the week.

POPULAR LOGS FOR EXPORT

A Montreal company is purchasing popular logs for export, and H. S. Alexander of Campbellton is making contracts for carload lots. The Graphic says he is offering a good price.

FIFTEEN DEATHS

Fifteen deaths were reported to the board of health this week as follows: Pulmonary tuberculosis, two; diabetes, asthma, anemia, pyemia, mæsennus, malnutrition, eclampsia, convulsions, gastritis enteritis, heart failure, cholera infantum, chronic endocarditis and carcinoma of stomach each one.

NOW IT'S POTATOES.

When the citizens of St. John were urged last spring to do all they could to assist in the programme of increased production, the hope was expressed by some that they would not be rewarded by hold-up prices in the fall. Today in the St. John market \$4 or more a barrel is asked for potatoes, and the dealers say the farmers are to blame.

POLICE COURT

Henry Bishop appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of drunkenness and also using abusive and threatening language to Edmond Brittain. He was fined \$16 or four months in jail. Two other men charged with drunkenness were remanded and an endeavor will be made to find out where they procured liquor.

LIBEL ACTION

The case of Miss Smith vs. Carry Basen was taken up in the circuit court this morning before His Honor Judge Barb. This is an action for libel. The plaintiff claims damages to the amount of \$2,000. The facts are similar to those brought out in the case of Miss Smith vs. David Basen, the husband of the present defendant, which was concluded yesterday afternoon, the judge entering a verdict for the defendant.

NO CHEAPER SHOES FOR A LONG TIME

Some Reasons for This Expression of Opinion by Canadian Leather Firm

A letter received from an American leather company says:

"As hides have advanced during last week from four to six cents a pound, we would ask you kindly to advise us immediately of your requirements, so that you may be protected before the price of leather goes up, which we expect will be very soon on account of the developments in the hide market last week."

Answering the question: "Why meat is costly and why shoe prices will be high for years," this letter says:

"Best of twenty millions of men in European armies eat meat at every meal who used to get it once a week; because not only fighting men, but at least as many persons who are engaged in war work are all eating meat every day—a thing unusual among the European labor classes; because the cost of feed has forced the European farmers to kill off their cattle, sheep and hogs, in such numbers as to reduce their flocks and herds in the past three years by a total amount equal to the entire flock and herd of the United States in 1917; because the world has eaten into its capital stock of meat by the slaughter of calves and lambs to that if peace were to be declared tomorrow it would be ten years before there would be as many sheep, hogs, and horned cattle in the world's pastures as there were in August, 1917."

A letter from a Canadian leather firm says:

"Hides, leather, calfskins, kips and putents have not come down in price, except that it is easier to buy. Dongola is the only line that was offered below last June's quotation, but we did not expect England would be a competitor. She has bought out all the surplus of kid. Hence we are no better off, as leather has been bought up again. We figure shoes will not come down in price for a long time."

A letter from a Quebec house says:

"Regarding the leather situation we might say that we have been following the market very closely, and although the hide market was easier some time ago, it has been impossible to get any lower quotations on leather; and since Britain has lifted the embargo on leather, the leather market has simply gone wild and prices of hides are jumping higher every day. In fact, had we to buy leather today on prices that hides are quoted, and on leather, we would have to raise all our last prices 25 to 50 cents a pair."

THE N.B. DEPOT BATTALION

Although it has been generally understood that Lieutenant-Colonel J. L. McAvity was to be the commanding officer of the 1st New Brunswick Depot Battalion and that Major Douglas McArthur was to be the second in command, yet nothing of definite nature was known until this morning, when the approval of the appointment of these two officers was received at the office of the New Brunswick command.

Now that the appointment of these officers has been made it will be possible to make some headway in the getting ready of the training staff of the depot. The officers on the staff are all to be recommended by the commanding officer.

There has been some doubt in the minds of some of the returned officers who still are at home as to whether or not they would be taken on the staff. It was learned this morning that only about sixteen officers have applied for appointments on the staff. If there should be only ten companies in connection with the depot battalion the services of the sixteen officers would be required. Should there be more than the two companies, the extra officers would be available for other appointments.

SAYS DINGLEY, COBB AND AUSTIN TAKEN

The Bangor Commercial says: "According to lists just published the only coastwise steamers not taken over by the government are the Hanson, B. Fuller, City of Bangor, City of Rockland, Belfast and Camden. The first three named are sidewheelers and would be useless except for short and protected runs, while the Belfast and Camden are presumably too shallow for off-shore work."

"Some of the boats familiar to Bangor people now under federal control are the Governor Dingley, Governor Cobb, Calvin Austin, of the International and Portland Divisions of the Eastern Steamship Lines, the Massachusetts and Bunker Hill running until recently between Boston and New York on the outside lines, and the Northland and Old Colony, formerly plying between Portland and New York, and now on the Boston to New York outside line."

"The Fall River and Providence boats, as well as the majority of the shorter Long Island Sound run steamers, are side wheelers and cannot be used in very rough water."

NAMES OF ALL WHO GAVE A DOLLAR OR MORE

Some criticism was offered at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last evening of an alleged decision to publish only a list of those giving \$50 or more to the British Red Cross. There was no such decision. At a meeting in the mayor's office yesterday with F. A. Dykeman in the chair, it was decided to publish the names of all who gave one dollar or more. Even this must be incomplete, however, as great numbers of bills were given without names. The donors having no desire for publicity.

SHORTAGE OF CARS

One Restigouche lumber operator who has orders for five hundred cars of lumber, is only able to obtain a few cars each week, and the car shortage is a serious handicap.

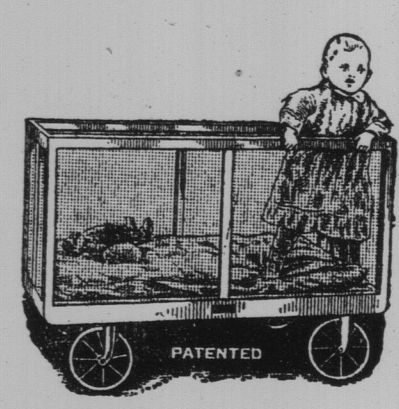

MONTREAL CHURCHES UNITE

Amid scenes of enthusiasm and expressions of great hopefulness for the carrying out of the future work of the church, two of the oldest Presbyterian churches of Montreal, Crescent and Knox, were united on last Wednesday night. At the close of the meetings which consummated the union the Doxology was sung by both congregations with a heartiness seldom equaled. Then the ministers bestowed the benediction, and the congregations and officials returned to their homes with a confidence that the work of the church would be carried to even greater success in the future than it had in the past. According to the plans made, the union will go into effect on February 1, next, the united congregation—which will be known as Knox church, Crescent street—will from that date worship in the present Crescent church, corner of Dorchester street west and Crescent street, with the Rev. R. W. Dickie, D.D., and the Rev. L. A. Montgomery, B.A., as joint ministers.

Exemption Tribunals. Illustration of a man sitting at a desk with a sign 'EXEMPTION TRIBUNAL' and a coat of arms 'CANADA'. Text: Exemption Boards have been chosen in such a way as to make them absolutely independent and removed from all influence. There are over 1,250 boards throughout the country, each composed of two men, one appointed by the county judge in the district concerned and one selected by a joint committee of Parliament. Being familiar with local conditions where they sit, the members are well-fitted to appreciate such reasons for exemption as are put before them by men called up. Exemption will be granted to those who can establish that it is in the national interest that they remain in civilian life. This is for the Exemption Board to decide after having received full information in each case. The grounds on which exemption may be claimed (which are similar to the grounds recognized in Great Britain and the United States) are as follows: (a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged. (b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications. (c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in Military Service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated and trained. (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position. (e) Ill health or infirmity. (f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service and is prohibited from doing so by tenets and articles of faith, in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he is in good faith belongs. (g) That he should be exempt because disfranchised under the War Time Election Act. No Claim for Exemption should be put forward unless one or other of these grounds in fact exists, and no loyal citizen should assist in, or allow himself to be made a party to, any Claim for Exemption unless thoroughly satisfied that it is made in good faith. Exemption may be applied for by the men selected themselves or by their parents, near relatives or employers. Application for exemption must be made on printed forms to be found at every post office, which are to be filled in and left with the postmaster if exemption is desired. The postmaster will forward the form to a Registrar, who will send it to the appropriate Exemption Board. In due time, then, the Applicant will get notice as to when he must present his case before the Board. Issued By The Military Service Council. 110

Persecution Of Greeks By Turks

More Than 700,000 Reported To Have Fallen Victims To Death, Suffering or Deportation

New York, Oct. 17.—Not satisfied by the slaughter of hundreds of thousands of Armenians and Syrians, the Turk has also turned against the Greek Christians in his dominions and more than 700,000 have fallen a victim to persecution in the form of death, suffering or deportation, it was declared here today by Frank W. Jackson, of this city, chairman of the Relief Committee for Greeks of Asia Minor. He said the real details of these new Turkish atrocities were just beginning to leak out.

"The story of the Greek deportation is not yet generally known," said Mr. Jackson. "Quietly and gradually the same treatment is being meted out to the Greeks as to the Armenians. Although closely guarded, certain echoes of these horrors come out from time to time.

"There were some two or three million Greeks in Asia Minor at the outbreak of the war in 1914, subject to Turkish rule. According to the latest reliable and authoritative accounts some seven to eight hundred thousand have been deported, mainly from the coast regions into the interior of Asia Minor. The Greeks of Asia Minor have always been law-abiding and perfectly loyal to the Turkish government. Under Abdul Hamid they were well treated, but his successors adopted a programme to crush them.

are being emptied of their Greek population. From Lyndon S. Crawford, missionary of the American Board at Trebizond we have a letter dated July 24, 1917, in which he says the following order came from Turkish army headquarters at Sheishie: 'By 12.35 July let no Greek man over sixteen and under fifty be found in Ordu. Send all such on into the interior. As for the families, we will send further order later.'


"Mr. Crawford also wrote: 'First let us express once more our thankfulness to God for the deliverance He has sent us by the great, grand Russian army and people. We are more and more appreciating what the Russians have done for this region. Immediately after the Russian occupation of this province, in April, 1916, hundreds of Armenians began to come out of their hiding places.'

"From the Greek minister to the United States, George Roussea, I have a letter September 21, 1917, in which he says:

"Backed by the Germans, the Turks have put into execution and even organized their wildness. They have decided to exterminate the Greek element which is the most important and most numerous in Asia Minor.

"Under pretext of necessities of war entire populations have been deported. Members of families have been separated. The old, the men unfit for military service, and the women, were sent into the interior of the country, abandoned without the slightest help and exposed to all sorts of deprivations. The men fit for military service were taken by force into the army despite the fact of having paid for exemption; some of the wealthiest have even been called on to pay this exemption fee three times over."

The Relief Committee for Greeks of Asia Minor, Mr. Jackson said, has been organized for non-political and purely humanitarian purposes, and aims at securing means to aid these Greeks reduced by sudden persecutions to a state of want.

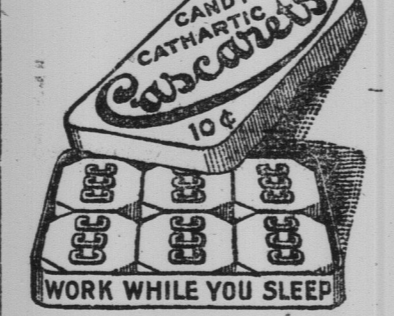

Prohibition in Quebec Province

More Than 1,100 Municipalities in That Province Now in the Dry List

(From the Toronto Star)

The fact that Quebec has voted for prohibition goes far to weaken the popular impression that the province is a stronghold of opposition to prohibition. It must be borne in mind, however, that this impression is gained largely by visiting the two largest cities, Quebec and Montreal. Many smaller municipalities, urban and rural, have no licenses, more than 1,100 having established prohibition.

The action of the Roman Catholic church is worthy of note. It boldly challenged the powerful liquor interests and the inclination of a good many of its members, and threw all its influence on the side of prohibition. Those who imagine that the church is not interested deeply in social reform have here food for reflection. Protestant and Catholic clergy in Quebec joined hands in the work and share in the credit of the victory. It does not appear that the Catholic clergy acted differently from the Protestant ministers. The weapons were prayers and persuasion, not coercion. The Catholic voters did not tremble at the voice of clerical authority. A decisive majority voted as the church desired, but a very substantial minority opposed the church, while in one ward, St. Saverus noted for its fervent piety, hundreds refrained from voting.

There was respect for the church, but by no means the abject submission that is so often ascribed to the Roman Catholic laity. There are two cheering indications in this vote, apart from the victory for prohibition. One is the enthusiasm and leadership of the Roman Catholic clergy in social service. The other is the attitude of the laity, responsive to leadership, sympathetic with reform, and also independent doing its own thinking and forming its own judgment. It is true that this attitude of French-Canadians is not new or surprising to close observers. But there are many who do not take the trouble to observe, but accept carelessly the stories of prejudiced men.

"In many cases they have put it over on us, but we catch most of them. In case of death you can't be too sure even though there is a lot of dramatic talent loose in the place, for you'd rather be on the safe side and fooled, than hold a man up to the regular routine and find out too late that the wire was authentic.

"We try to get the fellows off with all the dispatch we can muster. Not a

Won V. C. But Both Are Dead

Sergt. Frederick Hobson of Toronto and Private Brown of Gananoque

London, Oct. 17.—Two more Victoria Crosses are gazetted to Canadians. Both men lost their lives while earning the distinction, 57,113. Sergt. Frederick Hobson, enlisted in November, 1914, at Toronto. He was aged forty-one, and born in England. His occupation was store-keeper, and the next of kin, Miss F. Hobson, 184 Lansdowne avenue, Toronto.

"During a strong enemy counter-attack, a Lewis gun in a forward post leading to the enemy lines, was buried by a shell. The crew, with the exception of one man, were killed. Sergt. Hobson, though not a gunner, grasped the great importance of the post, and rushed from the trench dugout, and the gun was got into action against the enemy, who were now advancing down the trench across the open. A jam caused the gun to stop firing. Though wounded, he left the gunner to correct the jam and rushed forward to the trench across the open. He was shot. Single-handed he held them back until he himself was killed by a rifle shot. By this time, however, the Lewis gun was again in action, and reinforcements shortly afterwards arriving, the enemy was beaten off. The valor and devotion to duty displayed by this non-commissioned officer, gave the gunner the time required again to set the gun into action, and saved a most serious situation."

222,253. Pte. Harry Brown, enlisted in London, Ont., August, 1916. He was aged nineteen, and a farmer, born at Gananoque, Ont. The next of kin is his mother, Helen McAllister, of East Emily, Ont. "For most conspicuous bravery, courage and devotion to duty. After the capture of a position the enemy massed in force and counter-attacked. The situation became critical, all the wires being cut. It was of the utmost importance to get word back to headquarters. This soldier, and one other were given a message, with orders to deliver the same at all costs. The other messenger was killed, and Brown had his arm shattered, but he continued through intense barrage until he arrived close to the support lines, where he found an officer. He was so spent he fell down the dugout steps, but he retained consciousness long enough to hand over the message. Then he became unconscious and died in a dressing station a few hours later. His devotion to duty; was of the highest possible degree imaginable. The successful delivery of the message undoubtedly saved the loss of the position and for the time prevented many casualties."

At Boonville, Charlotte county, on Wednesday, following a short illness, Miss Ida Alice Turner, formerly of St. John, but who for some time has made her home with her sister passed away. She was seventy years of age.

BLANCHE BISHOP

On Tuesday, Miss Blanche Bishop, M. A. of Wolfville, a prominent teacher and writer, and one of the first women to graduate from a Canadian University, passed away at the home of her father, Gustavus Bishop, at Greenwich, N. S.

Miss Bishop graduated from Acadia University in 1886. She had traveled in Europe and held important teaching positions in Moulton Teaching College, Toronto, Harding Hall, London, Ontario, and in Acadia Ladies' Seminary, Wolfville.

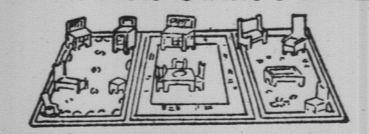

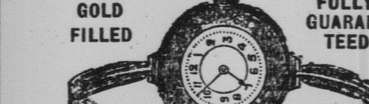

Find Coal Cache Of 1,000,000 Tons

Federal Agents Uncover Reserve Supply Hidden in Cleveland District

Washington, Oct. 20.—The fuel administration has found approximately 1,000,000 tons of soft coal "cached" in the Cleveland district by private interests now obtaining a steady supply to meet present needs, and has made plans to commandeer much of this surplus at government rates if the shortage in other sections makes such action advisable. Under this scheme mines would later be directed to replenish the supply seized as it was needed at the price the administrator had paid for it.

Investigations are being made in several other districts to ascertain if corporations are storing quantities above immediate needs. Dr. Garfield has persisted in his assertions that the alleged shortage was not as "real" as some operators and manufacturers insisted and has said that he was prepared to "go the limit" where any situation not to the government's liking presented itself.

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**India Is Loyal To
The British Crown**

Factories of That Country Are
Manufacturing Shells Without
Profit—Report of Missionary

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)
All the speakers scheduled to speak on "Foreign Missions" at last night's meeting of the Toronto and Kingston Synod of the Presbyterian Church gave the minutes allotted to them to Dr. J. Waters, a medical missionary from India. Dr. Waters furnished interesting descriptions of the consternation of the news of war had on the natives of India, of how they casted notes into gold, which they buried, how the young men hid in the jungle, and of the educational work of the missionaries which brought about a better understanding and a firmer link between India and the homeland. Missionaries were told time and again their place was among the native who had given them their confidence rather than in the war zone, and part of the teachings of the missionaries had given this message to Canadian proficients that there are today in India 200 factories turning out shells without making one cent of profit. One of the greatest aspects we have in India today, said Dr. Waters is the loyalty of the natives to our king and queen, and from India's point of view the greatest possible disaster would happen if England became a republic. What the Presbyterian missionaries feared now was a mass movement such as the Episcopal church had in the Punjab when 85,000 were baptized and 22,000 were turned away. It was up to the church now to prepare for such a movement for the state of keeping baptized natives in ignorance of the Divine truth would be worse than the first. There was a great demand for preachers, medical missionaries, which might be met by the men now at the front, if the Presbyterian Church rose to the situation.

STIRRING UP THE EAST.

Governor Capper of Kansas, returned after a trip to Washington, makes the following significant statement in "Capper's Weekly":
"I told them all that Kansas was making great sacrifices for the war in the right spirit, that it would not spare itself, but that nothing would put more heart in western people and give the west greater confidence in what you are doing here in Washington than to have you put the money-grabbers out of that business. If you demonstrate to the people that this government is terribly in earnest about making this a rich man's war as well as a poor man's fight, the west will back you with an enthusiasm as fervid as a camp meeting. Get the gougers that are moving up the cost of living, draft excess profits and the west will go down to the last ditch with you in this war, if need be, as cheerfully as to a picnic. You can judge yourself what it would mean to the nation to have the people face the war in this temper."
"Everywhere I went in the east I took pains to make it known that the west wishes and expects the government to go the limit in making this a pay-as-you-go war, that it was everlastingly in favor of Senator Johnson's plan of conscripting wealth, that our western men of wealth, as well as the rest of the people, believed the nation should take 80 per cent of the big incomes and all of the war profits except a reasonable return on the capital invested."
"The west believes that our greatest enemies in this war are the enemies at home, the steel profiteers, who are making it impossible for the average farmer to buy machinery, and the horde of others who are stinting the food and fuel supply in more than half the homes of the nation and will bring upon these

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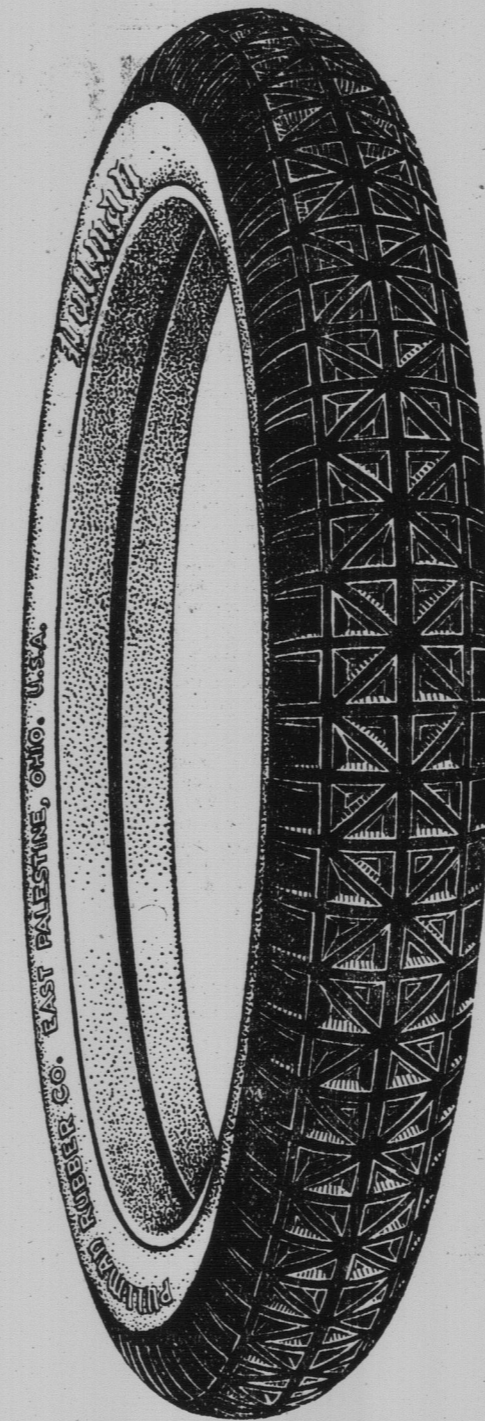
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
