London, Oct. 5-There is authoritative confirmation of the statement that the offer of the Enter powers to Bulgaria, conditioned on her adhesion to the allies in the war, has now been withdrawn.

Petrograd, Oct. 5—Russia's ultimatum to Bulgaria was not delivered to Premier Radoslavoff until four o'clock yesterday afternoon. This statement was made officially here today.

Previous advices from Petrograd were that the Russian ultimatum had been delivered on Sunday, and that the 24 hour limit within which a reply was demanded, expired yesterday. 



To Relive Britain of Part Of Burden

FOR DOMESTIC INVESTORS

Issue of \$100,000,000 or \$150, 000,000 at Five Per Cent Suggesred to Get Moncy Out of Savings Banks

Ottawa, Oct. 4—Canada, which has up to the present been paying four and a half per cent, interest on the advances from Great Britain for war purposes, will shortly have to pay five per cent.

The total advances from Great Britain to Canada for war purposes now aggregate a little over \$100,000,000, and for the last few months £2,000,000 per month have been advanced. Under the arrangement made with the Imperial treasury, at the outbreak of the war, the rate charged by Great Britain to Canada was 4½ per cent., payable half yearly. Now, however, Great Britain has become a borrower herself in the United States market and is paying five per cent. interest. In view of the exchange situation, any further advances to Canada will probably be made from this new loan, and the rate charged to Canada will probably be made from this new loan, and the rate charged to Canada will be, of course, the same rate which Great Britain has to pay for the money. What Technical Terms of War Really Mean

SOUAD TO ARMY CORPS

Since the present war started many persons have been mystified by the techical military terms used in the deatches describing the operations at front and particularly the work of the Canadian troops. In this it must be borne in mind that the composition of a unit for active service is completely different from that for militia work in peace time, the battalions being increased in size, and put on a war footing, that is of establishment and drill as the British regular army.

For this work the whole force is divided into a large number of units, running from a squad, which may only mean a half dozen men under a corporal to an army division, with upwards of 18,000 men under a major-general, but the sequence throughout is continued soo that the responsibility is continued down without a breakfrom the Field Marshal in charge of the forces to the last lance-corporal. The numbers in these various units may change considerably under active service conditions, and naturally do so with the inevitable wastage of war, but as far as possible the regular strength is kept up from reserves at the bases behind the fighting lines.
