WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Ontario's return to liquor will not increase general rum-smuggling from Canada, but will allow Americans to go at will into the province and drink as much as they desire, prohibition officials said today. "The only problem arising from this new situation in Canada will be to prevent individuals from bringing a quart or two of liquor back into the country after they visit Ontario," Frank Dow, assistant to General L. C. Andrews, prohibition enforcement chief, said. Wets and drys in the capital have turned to the Ontario elections for their latest vehicle upon which to







FOR THE CHILDREN

THE Women's Council of Saint John make their annual appeal to the citizens tomorrow in behalf of the Children's Aid Society. The purpose of Rosebud Day is to collect enough funds to enable the Society, if possible, to get through the year without a deficit. The Society receives an annual grant from the Municipal Council, but it has never been large enough to meet all the expenditures necessary in carrying on the work

The Children's Aid Society is authorized by law to care for neglected and dependent children. While its chief work is to bring about better home conditions in families where children are not well cared for, it also conducts a Home where little ones committed to its care by the courts are kept until foster liomes are found for them. Such children, if of school age, are sent to the public schools. There are always in the Home, however, some children who have not been committed by the courts to the Society's care. It may be that a mother must go to the hospital to undergo an operation and the father is unable to meet the expense of having a housekeeper. In such case the Society may give shelter to the children until the mother is again able to care for them. Such appeals for aid in urgent and pitiful cases are frequently made, and while the Home was not established for this particular purpose, the Board cannot be deaf to some of the appeals that are made, especially when in the case of an afflicted family there is no other source of he'p. Always, therefore, there are to be found in the Home some children whose stay is but temporary, but for whom the Home is a veritable Godsend. A group of devoted women on the Children's Aid Board give much time and thought to the institution, which is under the care of an exceptionally able matron, and which meets a real and ever present want in this city. "There was, first, the endeavor by peoples from distant homelands to found upon far-flung, John. widely varied and separated territories, a system of government for all those territories and to build a nation despite the disintegrating influences of zeography. There was, second, he said, the problem of maintaining this nation upon the basis of equality and toleration between the two principal races who had opened up the country. Third, there was the endeavor to retain this nation as part of a wider unity, the British commonwealth, and to work with other British nations, in meeting problems that were common to the whole Empire. Finally, there was the problem of preserving the Canadian nation, not only politically, but culturally, from the inevitably strong influences

of the friendly American neighbor." To solve these problems, Mr. Spry contended it was better that Canadians should be organized as Canadians rather than as spokesman for this or that particular interest. Hence the value of the Canadian Club.

The most enthusiastic member of a Canadian Club will hardly contend that these Clubs have caught the vision of what they might accomplish in the development of a national spirit. So far as the Maritime Provinces are concerned there are, of course, good reasons for some lack of interest in the Canadian Club movement. During the past sixty years our people have been much more conscious of being British subjects than of being contented Canadians. The Dominion is gradually finding itself. When the doctrine of the square deal is not only preached but practiced in relation to the various sections of the country, the development of a national spirit will come as a matter of course. If that doctrine is not preached and practiced, the Canadian Clubs can have but little influence. The signs of the times, The question: lowever, are most hopeful.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

THE old conception of a treaty between Powers was a commitment to make war whenever the other contracting party or parties did so. Later there evolved an idea of purely defensive treaties and ententes, binding the signatories to go to war only in the event of aggression on the part of outsiders. These treaties implied the maintenance of armed forces, of strength sufficient to meet treaty obligations. At the conclusion of the Great War the League of Nations, springing from the Treaty of Versailles, called on its signatories to combine to prevent wars rather than te make war, and struck at the old conception of balancing power. While the maintenance of peace implies preparedness for war, the League of Nations has set itself the task of reducing armaments. The original Treaty of Versailles did not really make provision for a lasting peace,

The League has many critics, and numerous people point to lack of definite results. Yet are the results lacking? When the avowed object of an institution is to prevent, its visible achievements are never spectacular. But the prophylatic physician is no less valuable than the surgeon. In actual fact it is possible to point to many incidents during the past seven or eight tense years when League restraint has undoubtedly relieved dangerous situations; and probably-who can affirm or deny?-averted war. The Locarno Pact has been sometimes held as a retrogression much-deserved attention—the Peace River country from the idealism of League principles in that it | the new empire of the north.

commits the signatories to intervention in case of aggression by any of the parties. But the Locarno Pact is quite different from the old type of defensive treaty, because the contracting parties include all who might conceivably be aggressive, and not only one group of Powers balancing an-

The League is no more perfect than is any other human contrivance. It may tend to idealism, but its aim and object is idealistic; it may be sentimental, but sentiment is a great force and nust not be confused with sentimentality; it may ndulge in academic discussion, but out of theories all practice evolves; it may sometimes leap ahead of civilization and sometimes lag behind. That is only to acknowledge it is not perfect, not to suggest that its aim is other than the nearest to perfection in an imperfect world. And the League is laboring under difficulties. One mighty force, Russia, is strongly antagonistic; and another, the United States, declines to commit itself to the

final arbitrament. When Bolshevism has run its course-and its course to date has been extraordinarily parallel to that of the French Revolution, except that it seeks to proselytize and is able to attempt this by reason of world communications not available to Robespierre-and Russia settles down to reconstruction; and when the United States is able to think in terms of world-politics, it is safe to predict a bright and useful future for the League of Nations. Meanwhile it forges ahead.

An Editor and His Paper

CEREMONY which must be almost without precedent in the history of journalism occur-red in Manchester, England, on October 28. It marked the gift to the Art Gallery of the city of a bust of Mr. C. P. Scott, editor of the Manchester Guardian. Still vigorous and active after his eightieth birthday, and after editing the Guardian for fifty-two years, the tribute was both to onan for hity-two years, the tribute was both to him personally and to the newspaper which has long had so commanding a position in England.

In his reply to the official greetings on the occasion, Mr. Scott modestly put himself out of the picture, so far as he was able, and devoted most of what he had to say to the position of newspapers in the modern world.

He pointed out their immense development on the business side. That was inevitable, but was

not at all inconsistent with the idea of performing "a public utility service." One way to do this is, without abating, a jot of his own convictions, for the editor to give the other side a fair hearing. "A great newspaper," declared Mr. Scott, "should be an open platform where no honest opinion is barred."

Mr. Scott said a few words about the relation Mr. Scott said a few words about the relation of the press to popular government. Without mentioning any names, or definitely pointing his moral, he laid down a general position which obviously has a bearing on what is going on today in several different countries:

"A free press is essential to the working of the modern democratic State. A democracy uniform modern democratic State. A democracy uniformed is a blind giant, which may destroy the very things it should most value and may end by destroying itself. The first act of a tyranny is to suppress or shackle the press. Let us never forget that the liberty of unlicensed printing is the foundation of all our other liberties."

Tracing The Birds (Toronto Mail and Empire)

WHERE do birds go in winter? Do they return to the same place?" were some of the questions that used to bother naturalists. An eighteenth century theory that swallows, at least, did not go far away but buried themselves in mud was accepted incautiously by Dr. Johnson, but it was exploded by Peter Collinson, the botanist, through communication with a sea-faring friend. More accurate knowledge about the flights of birds on this continent has become possible through the Migratory Birds Convention between Canada and the United States.
In a recent address at Quebec H. F. Lewis,

chief migratory bird officer for Ontario and Quebec, explained that by tagging as many birds as possible with a small aluminum band bearing a number each of them could be identified wherever it was found. This work is now being carried on operation by the Governments of Canada and the United States with the assistance of many volunteer workers all over the continent. When a band is placed on a bird, records of the place, the date and the bird banded are prepared and sent to Ottawa and Washington, where they are kept on file. These bands bear the printed request that the finder notify the Biological Survey Department at Washington, which forwards notification to Ottawa in the case of Canadian birds. In this way it has been found that a cormorant banded on Pilgrim Island, Kamouraska County, Quebec, in 1925, was killed the following winter in Florida. A green-winged teal banded near Toronto in the autumn was killed in less than three months on the Island of Trinidad. A gull banded on the northern coast of Great Britain was taken in Newfoundland, and a tern banded on the coast of the State of Maine was found dead floating on of the State of Maine was found dead floating on the river Niger, in West Africa.

As these records accumulate we shall be able to get a fair picture of the lives and movements of native birds.







That fact gives the key to the Poobashship of the South Manchuria Railway.

The S. M. R. is the "Lord right Everything" of South Manchuria because it has to be. It is a benevo-lent despot but a despot nevertheless because from an economic point of view there is war in Manchuria already—trade war with Russia, underground political war with various Chinese, and even a war with nature herself for the fullest development of the country in the shortest possible time.




ROADS DAMAGED BY WET WEATHER
