BEIGOS IS IN HANDS OF THE NATIONALISTS

Place Ten Miles from Constantinople Hold on Under Bombardment from British Fleet—Threat That Brussa Will Be Destroyed—Turks in Defiant Attitude.

London, July 6.—Turkish nationalist troops on Monday occupied Beigos, on the Asiatic shore of the Bosphorus, about ten miles from Constantinople, and opposite the Allied headquarters on the European side, according to a despatch to the Mail from Constantinople.

Constantinople, July 6.—Bombardment of the Great Mosque at Brusa and destruction of the town by airplane attacks are threatened in an ultimatum received by the governor of Brusa from Vice-Admiral DeRobeck, British high commissioner at Constantinople, who has been in charge of British landing parties along the Sea of Marmara.

Constantinople, July 6.—Greek troops have swept the country west of Beigos, clear of Turks as far north as Adramiti. They also have landed large forces at Chalkidiki and Thessalonica.

Constantinople, July 6.—Greek troops have advanced so rapidly and unexpectedly that the Turks were unable to destroy the railway, which with its rolling stock was left intact.

London, July 6.—The Prince of Wales, emerged unscathed and smiling through the window of an overturned car when his train was wrecked yesterday, says a despatch from Perth, Australia, to the London Times.

The accident occurred near Bridgetown, according to the report. The prince's parlor car and one adjoining, which were late on the train, were derailed, dinged for 200 yards and then overturned.

Some members of the prince's staff received bruises of a slight nature.

MONTREAL BARBERS DECIDE ON STRIKE

Montreal, July 6.—The journeymen barbers have decided to go on strike for higher wages. They are asking a minimum of \$25 a week and fifty per cent. of all taken in above \$25. Employers say this would necessitate charging twenty-five cents for a shave and fifty cents for a haircut.

FLY FROM NEW YORK TO ALASKA

Expedition to Aid Economic Development—Route in part Over Canada. Toronto, July 6.—Plans for an experimental flight from this city to Nome, Alaska, and return, by way of Canadian territory in part, were announced yesterday by the U. S. War department. The expedition, composed of four airplanes of the D. H. 4 type, manned by army aviators, will start on July 16 from Mitchell Field. The purpose will be to prove the feasibility of opening new transcontinental lines of communication to aid economic development.

RUSH OF CANCER SUFFERERS TO ST. MICHAEL'S

Toronto, July 6.—Premature notices in the press concern the treatment of cancer, at present being investigated in St. Michael's hospital, have caused Dr. Glover and the hospital authorities considerable embarrassment, said Rev. J. J. Dench, secretary of the board of governors of St. Michael's hospital yesterday. He said the hospital is overwhelmed by the number of patients seeking treatment, and no new cases can at present be accepted.

Democrats on 44th Ballot Choose Cox To Run For Presidency

McAduo Supporters Gave Up at 1:40 This Morning

Swing to Ohio Governor began on Third Ballot of Evening—Franklin D. Roosevelt Prominent for the Vice-Presidency. San Francisco, July 6.—James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, was nominated as candidate for the presidency of the United States in the democratic national convention at twenty minutes to two this morning. The nomination came at the conclusion of a forty-four ballot struggle in which he had steadily beaten down the forces of Wm. G. McAduo, former secretary of the treasury, and president's son-in-law.

THE CANDIDATE OF THE DEMOCRATS

James Middleton Cox was three times governor of Ohio—an honor enjoyed by only one other Ohioan, Rutherford B. Hayes. Born on a farm, educated in the public schools, a printer's devil, a school teacher, a newspaper reporter, a private secretary to a congressman, owner, manager and proprietor of two newspapers, member of congress for three years and three times governor of his state is his record to date.

Business success paralleled his political achievements and through his own efforts Cox has amassed a fortune. Mr. Cox became the leader of the Democratic party in Ohio in 1912 when he was nominated for governor. As one of the radical changes in the state constitution, he took the field in its behalf. His first term as governor was a close one, for he purchased the enactment of laws to put the new state constitution into effect.

After ten years with the Equator, he went to Washington as a private secretary to Congressman Paul Rose of Ohio. At close of this service, he purchased the Dayton Daily News, borrowing most of the money to pay for it. Later he purchased the Springfield Daily News. He was first elected to congress in 1908.

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POTATO FIELDS IN NORTH SECTION SHOW POORLY

Official of Agricultural Department Investigates

Fredericton Plans for Entertainment of Imperial Press Party—Resignations at Victoria Hospital. (Special to Times.) Fredericton, July 6.—On account of reports that the potato fields in the northern St. John valley were showing very poorly for the time of year, G. C. Turney of the provincial department of agriculture was sent to that district to investigate. He reported by telephone to Hon. Mr. Tweeddale last night that some fields seemed to contain no plants and that there was a general failure. He described this condition of affairs to the effect of inferior fertilizer used upon the soil.

IMPORTANT SESSION OF PRESBYTERY

Vote This Morning for Prohibition Act. Some Comments on Matters Arising Out of Session of the General Assembly—Church Affairs in Province. The quarterly meeting of the St. John Presbytery was begun this morning. Fifty-three congregations were represented. The meeting was held in St. Andrew's church under the moderation of Rev. A. J. W. Back of Milltown, in the chair, and Rev. Frank Baird, secretary, Rev. Archibald Sutherland, Rev. H. H. Blanchard and Rev. Macintosh MacLeod, who have settled in the presbytery, were welcomed by the moderator. The matter of the transfer of Rev. M. H. Manuel from Florenceville to Muskeg was taken up. Appreciation of his untiring efforts in Florenceville was expressed by ministers who had some time contact with him in his work there. In reply, Rev. Manuel said he had been in Florenceville for ten years and desired a change. He had been spoken to regarding reconsidering his resignation but remained firm in declining. He asked to be released by July 16. Permission was granted by the presbytery. Appreciation of Mrs. Manuel's work was also voiced.

CAUGHT IN SHAFT

Joseph Logan Was in Perilous Position in Local Foundry. Joseph Logan, aged forty-six, of 29 Johnson street, a machinist in the James Fleming foundry, narrowly escaped death this morning about 10:30 when he was caught in the shaft and he was twisted violently around, but by quick action on the part of his fellow employees the machinery was stopped and he was extricated from his perilous position. His clothes were badly torn but his injuries were not so bad as expected. He was taken to the General Public Hospital. It is thought his jaw was fractured. He is resting comfortably this afternoon.

WILL NOT HELP BARBER IN EFFORT TO BRAVE NIAGARA

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 6.—Charles Stephens, a British barber who says he will make an attempt to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel some time this month, has arrived in Toronto and is expected here soon. Captain R. F. Carter, former captain of the Maid of the Mist, a steamer which flies in the river close up to the falls, was asked to manage the affair, but refused, saying that "he did not want to be a party to a suicide."

AGED NOVA SCOTIA MAN KILLED BY AN ACCIDENT IN WOODS

Barrington, N. S., July 6.—Isaac Crowell, aged seventy-five, is dead from a shot fired by Alton Stoddard in a shooting accident in the woods near here. The coming development was obvious to the platform, secured recognition from Chairman Robinson. Everybody knew Cox was nominated several minutes before the motion was put. With the nomination the convention gave an exhibition of relaxed energy. The delegates cleared out, leaving the big hall a desolate dark litter of torn papers, banners, ribbons, flags and other abandoned paraphernalia and a mass of discarded chairs. The presidential candidate had been nominated after forty-four hard fought ballots which had threatened to eclipse the celebrated forty-six that it took to nominate Woodrow Wilson in Baltimore eight years ago.

FOUR MILLION LOSS BY FIRE, REDS SUSPECTED

Tokio, July 6.—Fire has swept the entire fishing district of the western shore of the Sea of Okhotsk, which was leased to Japan under the treaty of Portsmouth. The area burned over includes the city of Okhotsk, according to a wireless report received by the Hokkaido Fisheries Company, from the steamer Kankachi. The financial loss is estimated at \$4,000,000, and so far the fate of the fishermen along the coast is unknown. The fire is believed to have been set by Bolsheviks.

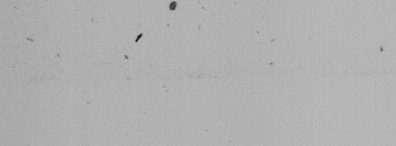

**SPANISH TITLES RESTORED.**

### GROCERY REPORT FROM THREE CITIES OF THE DOMINION

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week:

Grocery markets generally continue with a firm undertone. Business throughout the Dominion is very encouraging, although many wholesalers and retailers have adopted the hand-to-mouth buying policy. The sugar shortage is apparently past and supplies are now arriving freely.

Montreal—The produce market has this week strengthened up with several advances. Butter is up three cents a pound for creamery and dairy is a little dearer proportionately to the brand. Eggs are one cent per dozen dearer. Fresh salmon is a little cheaper. There is very little other change in the produce market. Vegetables are more plentiful this week and prices are easier. The price on flour is very strong and sugar is very firm at the advance prices. The new jams are higher in price and canned fruits are scarce until the new supply arrives.

Toronto—The markets for general grocery lines are firm with advances registered on raisins, prepared icings, custard powder, jelly powders and jams. Supplies of sugar are arriving freely and from now on sugar will probably be plentiful. One brand of corn flakes has advanced 85 cents per case. Corn meal and corn flour will be higher. The spice market is fairly quiet and will probably remain so until about the middle of August. Black peppers are steady; white peppers, ginger, red peppers and cream of tartar are scarce and firm. Lower grade teas took another tumble downward in primary markets during the past week. This will not affect this market as very little of this grade of tea is consumed in Canada. High grade teas continue to rule firm and are very difficult to obtain. Rice continues with a strong undertone; high grades are scarce and quotations are firm. Shelled nuts are steady. New home-grown vegetables are arriving. Old potatoes are about cleared up. Oranges have advanced and the market is firm. Cured meats are up one to three cents per pound. Canned beans are higher and a scarcity note. The cheese market is steady. Eggs are firm and higher. Spring chickens are lower.

Winnipeg—Reports this week show that business has been very quiet. Supplies are arriving a little more plentifully. Cane syrup advanced during the week. The bean market is very strong. Dried fruits are unchanged. Canned salmon will be much higher for the new pack. Importers who represent Stenaverg and Norwegian agencies are expecting quotations on the new pack. Spices remain steady. Jams and rice are firm. Shelled nuts are unsettled. Fine teas and coffees are ruling firm. Pancake and buckwheat flour has advanced, also pork and beans, English biscuits, candied peels and Clark's canned meats. New

### FARMERS OF QUEBEC PROVINCE SEEKING BASIS OF AGREEMENT

The executives of the United Farmers of Quebec and the Union of Cultivators of that province have come to an agreement whereby each body will work separately in their respective districts, but will assist each other when such assistance is required. It is pointed out, in this respect, that the aim of the latter is strictly commercial, while that of the former is both social and political, but that where the interests of both are concerned the forces would be joined and every endeavor made to secure the object aimed at.

In order to ensure the arrangement and to make it possible for the agreement to be lived up to, it has been decided that three directors of each organization will resign, and be replaced by three from the other organization. The political platform of the organizations has not yet been definitely decided on, but now that an agreement has been reached at by which each organization will help the other, it is expected that the meeting of the executive of the farmers will be held soon, a political platform drawn up, and submitted to a general meeting for ratification.

One of the officials, in referring to the agreement arrived at, stated that the tendency of the farmers of Quebec is to link up with the labor party here and work in unison with the United Farmers of Ontario and of the other provinces. As soon as all the farmers of the various provinces are organized an effort will be made to establish a national United Farmers' party independent of either of the political parties now existing.

Better roads, better market accommodation, and the establishment of standards and prices for farm produce will be some of the things aimed at by the United Farmers of Quebec.

**CONDEMNED DEGRADED DRAMA.**  
Rochester, July 6.—A resolution deploring "the frequent degradation and demoralization of the drama and moving pictures to the menace of our youth and to the peril of the nation," was adopted at the annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

The resolution commends "the unbounded possibilities of good" of the legitimate drama and movie shows."

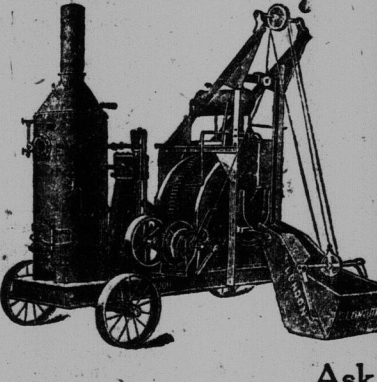

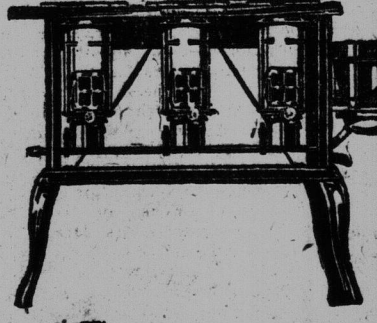

FIGURES THAT SPEAK.

The following testimony as to the effects of prohibition in the United States is found in the New York Evening Post: "Decrease in the population of the county jails of New Jersey amounting to 25 per cent. since prohibition went into effect, on July 1, 1919, was announced by Burdette G. Lewis, Commissioner of Institutions and Agencies of New Jersey, before the joint session of the American Association of Public Officials of Charity and Correction and the National Conference on Education of Truant, Backward, Dependent and Delinquent Children. This decrease in the prison census will make possible a saving of approximately \$500,000 to the state, declared Mr. Lewis.

THE POPPY VICTORIOUS.

Out on the plains the ruined towns lie in the little towns, the quiet familiar places. The little villages, steeples and taverns and all. Heave their shoulder of stone amid many a mound. Turn to the heedless crowds their sightless faces; Like begging that once were soldiers swaggering tall; Like women, once lovely, now ragged, holding out unheeded a beggar's hand. But over it all, like an easy forgetful laughter, The Poppy flutters and tosses her flaming wings; Lifts her black throat, and flutters her scarlet wings; Scatters a million seeds to bloom again after; Leads over trenches and gulfs and the graves of the dead; Curtseys and dances over unspcakable things. "Forget it, forget," says the Poppy, "all finished and over, and abysses I make rain ruin gay, and abysses I cover."

THE COAL SITUATION.

Discussing the coal situation in its latest issue, The Canadian Mining Journal takes a serious view, and says: "We have studied the coal question in Canada for many years and the conclusion has been reached upon us that Canada can not persist as a separate political entity in the West unless it can become self-sustaining as to bituminous coal supply. If any person could point out a source of escape from this conclusion we shall be extremely glad to hear of it. The conclusion is an uncomfortable one, but it is one that must be faced, and must be faced if Canada is to pursue in future years the thought that we own the second largest coal reserves in the world. All we can call our own is 18,000,000 tons annually. We could use 80,000,000 tons annually. The United States is actually producing 700,000,000 tons annually.

Mr. James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, is the Democratic candidate for the presidency. His strongest opponent in the convention was Mr. William G. McAdoo, son-in-law of President Wilson. The deadlock was finally broken at an early hour this morning and the manager of the McAdoo forces moved to make the nomination of Gov. Cox unanimous. Ohio is a pivotal state. The Democrats will fight the Republicans on their own ground. Mr. Cox has had experience as a legislator in association with a workmen's compensation act and a child labor law which have been copied in other states, and a school code that is said to possess great merits. He has been the owner of two newspapers, has been a member of congress, and three times governor of his state. In regard to prohibition, he is classed with the wets rather than the dries. The convention, however, refused to take any stand on that question, either in favor or more or less rigid enforcement of the law. Mr. Cox is a man of unquestioned ability and will be a strong candidate. The presidential struggle this year will be the most bitter that has been waged for a long time, and colossal efforts will be made on both sides to sway public opinion this way or that.

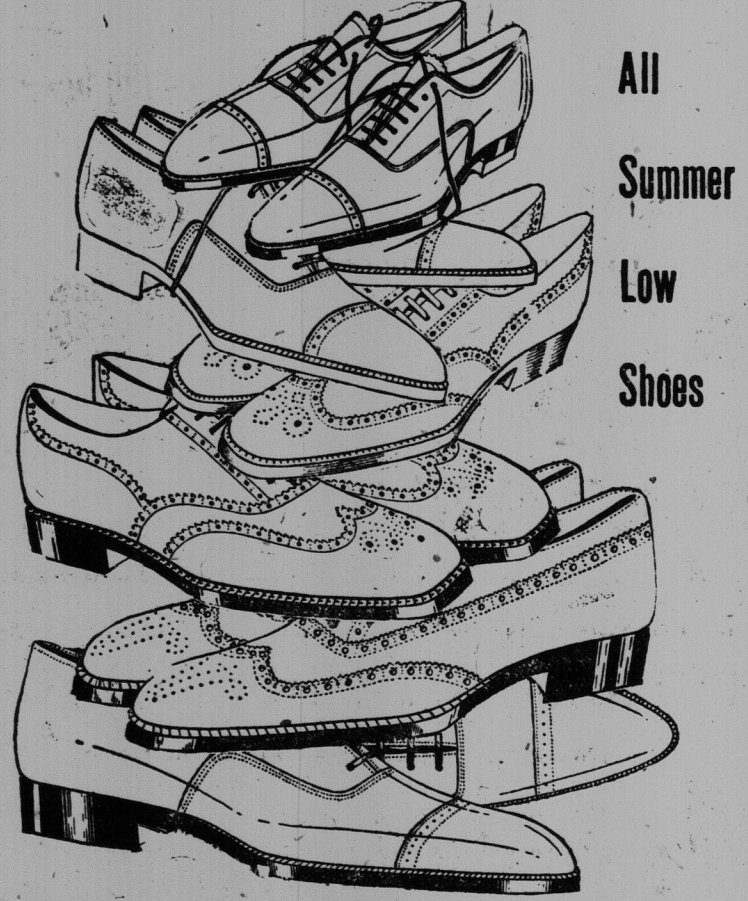

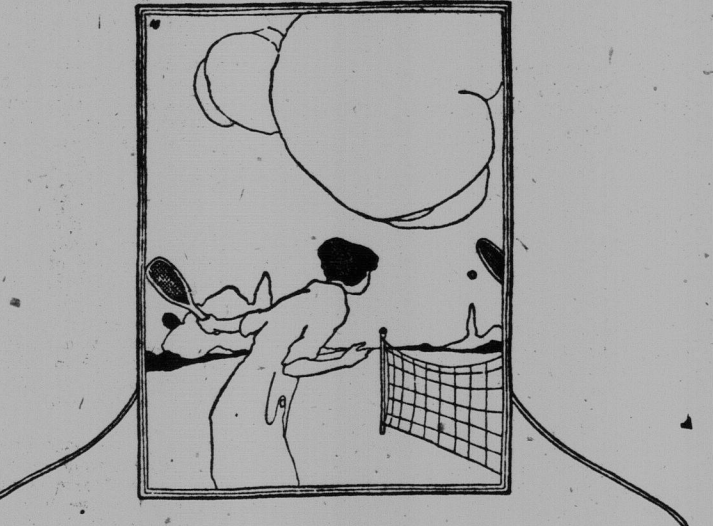

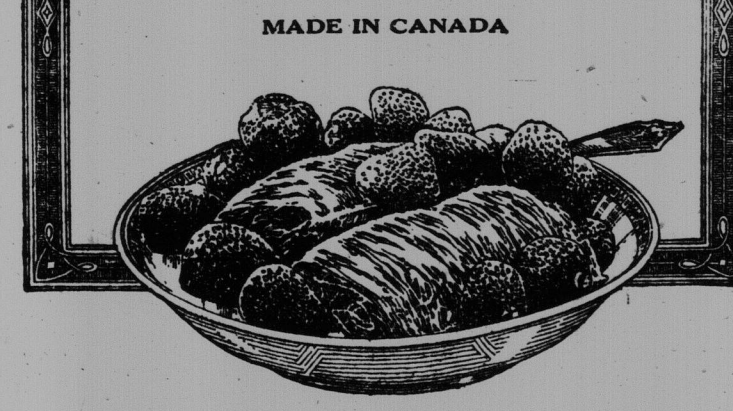

Canadian Affairs Are Brought Up in British Commons

G. W. V. A. DISCUSS WINE AND BEERS

A meeting held by the local G. W. V. A. last night with first vice-president, S. C. Tippet in the chair, discussed the beer and light wine question. W. C. Pink moved that a resolution be passed in favor of beer and light wine. The resolution was seconded by Joseph Hayden. The chairman spoke in favor of the motion, saying that the evils of liquor and that the sale of light beverages would put an end to all this. Rev. Canon Kuhnring objected to the question being acted on by a meeting so unrepresentative as the majority of the members were not present, saying that if the resolution were adopted he would resign from the institution and do all in his power, not only to prevent returned soldiers from joining the association but to reduce its present membership. An amendment to refer the matter to another meeting was defeated. The resolution was adopted by a ballot of twenty-one to eight. Six did not vote. Norman P. McLeod, president of the G. W. V. A., was not present and stated later that he wished the public to understand that the meeting last evening was not representative of the association.

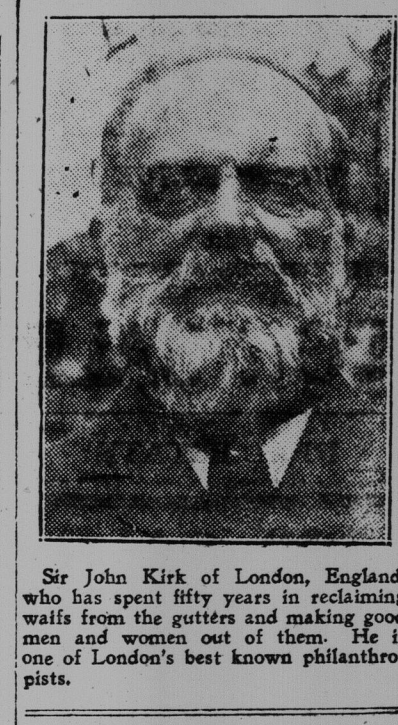

question, for fossil turtles, some of them not less than 8,000,000 years and others 1,000,000 years old, have just been un-earthed in San Juan County, Northern New Mexico. Remains of extinct turtles have been found before, but most of them consist of many small pieces, badly crushed and flattened or otherwise damaged.  
Those that have been discovered in New Mexico are remarkably well preserved and the bony box-like shell is almost as perfect as when occupied by the body of the living animal. No fewer than fifty specimens were perfect enough to be identified and described by specialists of the Geological Survey. Sixteen of them were found entirely new to science and have therefore been given new names.  
A comparison of these shells with those of living turtles showed that the collection consisted entirely of river or swamp turtles. The little ones were about six inches long, but some of the largest measure nearly thirty inches.  
Robert F. Smith of Minneapolis, a junior at the University of Minnesota, was admitted to the United States Military Academy at West Point at 9 o'clock on the morning of June 17, three hours before he was twenty-two years old. Candidates are legally entered at West Point July 1, and no candidate is admitted if he is more than twenty-one, unless he has had a year's military service, as Smith has not. Smith's congre-ssman fixed it so that he would not have to wait till July 1, and his people fixed it so that he managed to get from Min-neapolis to West Point, arriving three hours before he was twenty-two.  
Crowded by a road hog, a Massachusetts automobilist passing Cavendish Gulf, near Gasset, Vt., turned quickly to one side, went into the ditch, over a stone wall, down a bank, and across a brook before his car stopped on the other side. In the car with him were his wife, his two daughters, and a son. QUEBEC TO LIVERPOOL  
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PUT ME UNDER THE SOD, WAS LAST REQUEST

(Montreal, Star.) Thomas Allen of 5 Jurois street apparently committed suicide some time during last night, cutting his throat with a razor.

The body was found at 9.45 this morning by Gordon Dowden, who has been rooming with him for the last two years, the two occupying the upper part of 5 Jurois street, consisting of two bedrooms and living room.

It is said that Allen lost his wife almost two months ago, after a long illness of five or six months, and that he had been drinking heavily ever before her death. Both were elderly, Allen being about sixty years of age or more. So far as is known, there are no relatives, nor was any address left behind with which communication could be made.

The only thing found was a letter from Allen, given below, which was apparently written after he had made up his mind to end his life. It was unstamped and not addressed.

Mr. Dowden, If you see Mrs. Dillon get all things of marray I want you to take rest of stuff and put me under the sod.

Your In P. L. 7. THOMAS ALLEN.

This letter was written quite plainly and it would seem that Allen was sober when he performed the act. The name Marry evidently referred to his wife Mary, and Mr. Dowden said that P. L. 7 is a lodge to which they both belong.

The neighbors say that Allen had been gradually selling off his furniture

and effects to buy liquor, and that he had had hardly anything to eat lately. An acquaintance said that it was known that he was drinking, and some watch had been kept to find out from where he was getting it, so as to stop him, but with no result.

Mr. Dowden said that there was \$1.25 standing in Mr. Allen's name at the Merchants' Bank, corner of University and St. Catherine, and as he was selling his goods to buy drink he could not have had any money.

The steamer Stratcona, the hospital ship previously employed by the mission is now laid up for repairs.

The steamer Calvin Austin which lost a propeller blade on her trip from New York, on Tuesday night, put into Miramichi for repairs and was expected to resume her service on Saturday.

The steamer Kanawha arrived in port last night from Halifax and docked at No. 6 berth.

The M. S. P. Carquet arrived off the island about midnight and will dock at Pettingle wharf at 7.30 this morning to discharge passengers and general cargo.

The steamer Turret Court arrived last night and is anchored in the stream. She has a cargo of coal for the Dominion Coal Company.

It is expected that the Empress of Canada, a new C. P. O. S. liner, will be launched from the Clyde yards on Aug. 15. The Empress of Britain which has been practically rebuilt since the war will be ready to leave Liverpool for Quebec on September 1.

HYPNOTISM TO TAKE PLACE OF ETHER?

Says Magnetism and Auto-Suggestion Will Replace Use of Anaesthetic.

London, July 6.—Will hypnotism take the place of anaesthetics?

Great specialists in every branch of surgery are beginning to feel that application of the power of the mind to the weaknesses of the body can be directed in such a way as to solve mental and surgical problems in a manner which our forefathers would have denounced as magic.

Quietly and unobtrusively on account of the grave danger of proceeding with such work on a grand scale until continued and repeated experiments have justified its claims, doctors and dentists, too, are beginning to replace chloroform and other anaesthetics with magnetism and auto-suggestion.

They will not, as a rule, discuss the matter with laymen unless they are sure of a sympathetic hearing, which shall not lead to a mischievous and ill-considered, if not scandalous, criticism, for to the lay and unsympathetic mind the idea that difficult operations may be conducted without any other anaesthetic than the personal magnetism of the operator, and yet leave neither pain nor the memory of pain in the mind of the patient, is one which might well be rejected as incredible and denounced as something little better than charlatanry.

And yet the men who are experimenting in this way are the last men in the world to be charlatans.

If the names of the specialists who are today studying auto-suggestion, with the idea of incorporating it into the practice of surgery, could be published, the lay world would be astounded, for they include men whose reputation in the medical profession and in scientific circles is far too high to be affected by the breath of suspicion.

In their heart of hearts these men hope that it will not be long before a patient who is wheeled into the operating room will not require chloroform or methyl-ether-alcohol, but will be "put to sleep" by the influence of a stronger mind acting upon his own.

Now will the dentist's chair, to compare small things with great, maintain its former terrors. The dentist of the future, instead of terrifying his patient with the grisly array of technical instruments reminiscent of the torture chamber of Torquemada, which is able

to reduce his patient to a condition in which not even the most sensitive nerve will pain him when it is touched. "But, this is to joke upon a serious matter," said an authority upon medical hypnotism. "We want to go on with our experiments quietly and systematically, and we do not want to let any one know our results until they are so complete that they will stagger the world and demand public confidence in us. Already, as scientific men, we are satisfied that we can do what we claim."

"On the Continent, in the United States, everywhere, our work is being carried on by men of genius and learning, men of science and men of character, who are all contributing their bit toward the development of what will be the greatest scientific discovery of the future, and a development of possibilities of which we cannot yet foresee."

MORE ADVANCES IN HARDWARE ARE REPORTED

(Hardware and Metal, July 3.) Important advances in hardware prices have again been made this week and many basic lines have been marked up as a result. The price tendency on nearly all hardware commodities manufactured from iron or steel is still upwards and there seems little indication for lower quotations at present.

Scale prices have been revised upwards and new lists and discounts have been issued. Carpenters' tools have again been marked higher. Wrapping paper, snare wire, scythe stones, ash weights, fire tape and buggy washers are also higher in price. Hose nozzles, tower bolts, ash rollers, screen door spring hinges and stove boards all have higher quotations. Fuel oil prices have again advanced and some grades of machine and gas engine oil have also been marked higher. Some makes of heating stoves and ranges are also higher priced.

The removal of the war tax of 7 1/2 per cent, has favored certain lines of silver plate and game traps.

The situation regarding freight transport of coal and other fuel and in some cases raw materials and some industries have had to close down as a result, while others are greatly handicapped.

Jobbers are very much concerned for future deliveries from their buying sources and state that their stocks are becoming very low and if replenishments do not soon come forward some lines may be entirely exhausted.

In spite of the shortage merchants are enjoying very brisk trade and the demand for nearly all commodities is seasonably heavy. Collections continue to come forward freely.

CROWD IN SUBWAY TRAIN

IN PANIC WHEN BRAKE FELL

New York, July 6.—Passengers in a crowded subway train smashed windows and trampled each other in an effort to leave the train when a brake shoe fell from beneath the rear car at the Canal street station and came in contact with the third rail.

None were injured seriously, but several were treated by ambulance surgeons for cuts, bruises and shock.

Because of the darkness, the frightened passengers were unaware that the station platform had been reached. A wild scramble to get out of the coaches resulted.

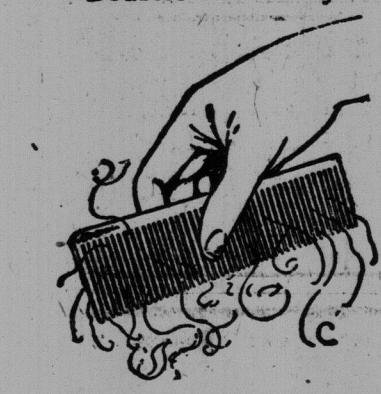

**ST. JOHN WOMAN IS 106 YEARS OLD.**  
The oldest woman in British Columbia and one of the oldest if not the oldest citizens in Canada, has just celebrated her 106th birthday. She is Mrs. Geo. Delbeck. She was born in St. John on June 27, 1814, and spent nearly half her lifetime here. At present she is living in Marpole, B. C. She retains the use of all her faculties and takes a daily stroll in the garden when the weather fine. She takes a great interest in the affairs of the household. She has lived through the reigns of five kings and remembers the visit of King Edward in 1860 more clearly than the recent visit of the present Prince of Wales, though she was presented to both. She has three sons and two daughters living, as well as fifteen grandchildren and more than 100 great-grandchildren.

**LEAK IN SPRUCE LAKE MAIN FOUND**

Wedges Blew Out of Joints—Part of Lancaster Supply Shut Off—Will Be Resumed Today.

A leak in the 24-inch main from Spruce Lake, which was discovered last evening in the Gypsy Settlement road, about 800 yards from the South Bay road, necessitated the shutting off a portion of the water supply to parts of Lancaster this morning. The Provincial Hospital is included in the area affected.

The water department's new touring car, which is the third of a job for the first time, when a crew of men and tools were taken to the scene of the leak. It was found when excavation had been made that several of the pine wedges which are used to make joints in the pipe had blown out.

Workmen engaged on the job said this morning that the wedge system of joining was not satisfactory, as they blew out so easily and that it was possible that the whole pipe will have to be covered and sealed with lead at some time in the future. It is expected that the service in Lancaster will be resumed in full this afternoon.

**TO PENITENTIARY FOR THREE YEARS**

A session of the Kings county court was held this morning at Hampton with Hon. W. J. Joseph presiding. The first case on the docket was that of George White, charged with stealing \$45 from Norman Brown of Smithtown, by whom he was employed. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to three years in the Dorchester penitentiary.

A case against Dora A. DeLong charged with stealing \$50 from Gordon Fairweather, was to be taken up this afternoon.

**HIGH COURT OF FORESTERS HERE**

For the first time in four years the high court for New Brunswick of the Independent Order of Foresters met this afternoon at three o'clock, in the Supreme Court building, presided over by Chief Justice E. A. McKay, of Fredericton, and a full staff of officers in attendance. About 150 delegates are present from all parts of the province.

Among the visitors at the convention are Supreme Chief Ranger W. H. Hunter, and Assistant Supreme Chief Ranger Harvey Lloyd of Toronto, representing the supreme court, and High Chief Ranger C. F. Mann, of Lisbon Falls, Maine, and W. B. Lewis of Hiram, N. B., high secretary, representing the high court of Maine.

This forenoon's session was taken up with the appointment of committees and preparation for the presentation of reports.

**POLICE COURT**

In the police court this morning there were no charges of drunkenness read out, but several postponed cases occupied the attention of the court. In the matter of breaking into and stealing whiskey from Geo. K. Bell's, Policeman Frank Killen corroborated the evidence given by Detective Bidsonbe also gave evidence as to the arrest of two of the men. The case was postponed until Friday morning.

J. B. Dever appeared for two, K. A. Wilson for one and J. A. Barry for two.

Wilfred Graham and Fred Mahoney were charged with stealing a storage battery, valued at \$20, the property of Edward Ricketts of Short street. The latter said that an automobile in which the battery was placed was put in the yard on Friday at midnight and between that time and morning the battery was taken out of the car. He said that yesterday morning he was told that the article was in a garage in Erin street.

The police were notified and the battery was identified and arrests made soon afterwards. The witness said he knew Graham and he had often seen him around the premises.

Detective Bidsonbe, who made the arrests, told of finding the battery produced in court. Before he went down to it, he and the two accused went to the detective department to tell them about a battery which they said they had found in the Christie Wood Working Company's yard, and which they had taken to a garage in Erin street and cut out of the car. The detective said he placed them under arrest. The case was postponed.

Arthur Cobham was charged with non-support. The case was amicably settled. K. J. MacLachlan appeared for prosecution and Urban J. Sweeney for the defence.

A case against Richard Caples, charged with supplying liquor to John J. Fitzgerald, was resumed. Fitzgerald again said he did not remember where he got his liquor, nor remembered going into the store. The case was dismissed. Fitzgerald, who was charged with drunkenness was fined and allowed to go.

A case against Haley Bros, charged with allowing hot water to run across Broad street, in which Audrey Power was scalded, was resumed, but postponed until July 16. W. H. Harrison appeared for the prosecution and K. J. MacLachlan for the defence.

A case against James McCann, on suspicion of breaking into and stealing from the summer homes of Fred de Forest, Struan Robertson and F. E. Williams, Loch Lomond, was resumed. He pleaded guilty at a former hearing and was remanded for sentence. He was brought in this morning and at his request the case was again postponed.

One man was arrested at noon on drunkenness charges, but he was not in a condition to appear before the court.

**ACTION OVER TAXES**

In the Circuit Court this morning before His Honor Judge Barry argument was heard in the case of the Dominion Coal Co., vs the City of Saint John, a claim for \$14,824 paid under protest, for taxes. The company contended that they were liable on the average value of that commodity throughout the year while the contention of the city was that they were liable on the average value of the commodity on half of the total stock in trade. His Honor reserved judgment. F. B. Taylor, K.C. appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C. for the defence.
