## MONTREAL TRAIN, ON WAY HERE WAS IN ACCIDENT

Several Cars Derailed in Maine -- No One Seriously Hurt--Passengers Will Be Late Reaching Here

The C. P. R. Atlantic express bound from Montreal to St. John was derailed at 3.15 o'clock this morning at Clear Station 69.5 miles west of Brownville Junction. Fortunately the train was running slowly at the time of the accident and the damage was not as bad as it would otherwise have been.

The derailment occurred while the train was passing over a switch. The locomotive, baggage and mail cars passed over safely but the rest of the train jumped the rails. Auxiliary trains were sent out from Brownville and Megantic to clear the tracks and make necessary repairs. A physician accompanied the train from Brownville and reported that no serious injuries had been received by any of the passengers or train crew.

Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter in spider; Cook two tablespoons flour and a quarter of a teaspoon each of salt and pepper in butter, then stir in slowly half cup of cream and half cup water. Stir till the sauce thickens then add one and a half cups of cooked lamb cut in small pieces and one cup of green peas. Serve on rounds of toast, season with butter pepper and salt on top of each portion.

NEW CAKE.

Beat whites of 4 eggs stiff, until you can turn bowl upside down. When stiff add I cup sugar, gradually, beating all the time. Then into your mixing bowl put the yolks of 4 eggs, beat until light and add I teaspoon of vinegar. Turn the beat cur whites on yolk in mixing bowl and beat a little. Then remove the egg beater and add I cup sifted flour to ingredients in the mixing bowl and stir or fold in with spoon until well mixed. Bake about ½ hour.





Ottawa, Dec. 6—The Liberals will give the Borden naval policy a searching criti-ism. There was a fully attended caucus of Liberal members and senators this torning. The caucus was called to con-ider the naval announcement made yes-
