PLAN OF THE UNIONISTS ANNOUNCED

Force on Government the Issue of Re-Construction of Upper House

THEY DO NOT LIKE VETO

Decide to Accept Asquith's Challenge to Prove Government Guilty of Corruption in the Matter of Appointment of Officials—Returns Asked For

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 16.—It is apparent that the Unionists intend to force on the ministry the issue of the promises they made, when the lords veto bill was passed, to reconstruct the House of Lords later on. They will propose an amendment to the address in reply to the king's speech, declaring that it is improper to proceed with the consideration of the vital measures named by His Majesty while the composition of parliament is incomplete and the country is deprived of the safeguards of the constitution.

ALLANS' PLYMOUTH SAILINGS FORTNIGHTLY

London, Feb. 16.—In the Allan line service between Plymouth and Canada the first steamer, the Plymouth, will sail on April 10. The service will be fortnightly. SAY LETTERS GIVE AWAY DYNAMITE PLOT

State's Evidence in Dynamiting Conspiracy From 40,000 Documents Seized

Committing or Abetting in Almost 100 Cases is Charge Against 54 Labor Officials—Amazing Freedom in Committing Plans to Writing

(Canadian Press) Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 16.—New disclosures made in the dynamite conspiracy case, through 40,000 letters and telegrams quoted in the indictments as implicating practically all the officials of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, will be the basis, it was declared today, upon which the government will seek to convict the fifty-four defendants charged with committing or abetting in almost 100 explosions.

COST OF LIVING, INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(Broadest)

Several matters of interest are dealt with by President Taft in a special message sent to Congress recently. One of these is that much discussed question as to the causes of the high cost of living. The president notes the fact that there has been a movement on the part of business men, economists and others to secure the appointment of an international commission to look into the reasons for this phenomenon, and he suggests that a great deal of very valuable light could be shed by a commission of unprejudiced and impartial persons upon the reasons for the high prices that have distressed the people of the world, and that information might be derived from an investigation by such a commission upon which action might be taken to reduce the cost of living. He proposes that this time for the purpose of preparing plans to be submitted to the various governments for an international inquiry into the high cost of living, its causes, effects and possible remedies. To enable him to invite foreign governments to such a conference, to be held at Washington or elsewhere, he, therefore, recommends that Congress provide an appropriation not to exceed \$200,000 to defray the expenses of preparation and of participation by the United States. The preliminary conference itself would, the president says, entail only a comparatively small expense, and most of the subsequent investigations for which it would prepare the way could be carried on by existing bureaus in this and other governments or part of their regular work and would require little, if any, additional appropriations for such bureaus.

Mr. Taft also proposes the appointment of a commission to conduct a searching inquiry into the subject of industrial relations, which shall be authoritative, balanced and well-rounded, as well as non-partisan, thorough, patient and courteous. Numerous special investigations of

Lord Leitrim in States in Search of Missing Brother—His Experience With General DeWet in Boer War

Lord Leitrim, who arrived in New York last night on board the S. S. Carmania, has come over on a somewhat romantic mission, namely, to prosecute the search for his only brother, the Hon. Frank Clements, who is believed to have been entangled in the Boer war, and who, it is said, is now in the hands of the Boers.

Frank Clements' disappearance constitutes a still unsolved mystery. Educated for the royal navy, he left the service as a midshipman. He left the service of his own accord, being met by a woman, who, it is said, was his only love. In 1907 he went to Southampton and sailed for America as a deck-hand on board the American liner St. Louis, but as there was no news of him, he was believed to have perished. He did so well, that when the vessel reached New York, he was offered a permanent position as steward, but did not accept it.

Lord Leitrim, interviewed about that time on the subject, said that he had the following statement: "For some time past my brother has desired to earn his own living, and I have endeavored to believe that he is now in America. He knows American life, as he was for some years on the Pacific coast, and he is in the navy. He left the service about a year ago. I wish to state that he was in no way in debt, nor was he in any trouble. He has independent means. My brother was certainly in earnest in his desire to earn his own living, and would not take more than a few pounds with him when he left. He did not at all present the appearance of a man who would be likely to be taken advantage of. He would write when he found suitable, but the family are in no way anxious to take up his case. He had no money, but he had a letter from him which he had written, and which he was about to take up, when he left some weeks ago."





EYES TURNING TO THE PACIFIC

Dominating Factors There in Complications of The Future

THE PANAMA CANAL

The Position of Japan in the International Scheme—An Argument for Keeping Britain's Navy Most Effective

London, Feb. 9.—The centre of international gravity has now shifted to the Pacific, and it is mainly in that direction that the dominating factors will be found when any serious future complications arise. The "Itinerary" of Lord Roberts, made in 1904, is quoted by T. Miller Maguire in a paper on "The New Pacific," at the Royal Colonial Institute, said Mr. Maguire, "there are strategic possibilities and risks as well as a grand field for finding enterprises. By dwelling the ancient communities in Asia, which have renewed their mighty youth and are now fully armed in all the panoply of modern civilization. The yellow race is the great reserve labor fund of humanity. It is the danger of racial rivalry also. But if Europe insists on sharing in the wealth of China, sending expeditions to Cathay, and making alliances with the children of Nippon, the yellow race will demand its-foe's lot, and a nation that seeks to give commercial security to nations like England? As England gained most in strategy and commerce by the completion of the Suez, so the United States seems likely to gain most in both strategy and commerce by the Panama Canal and they seem resolved to gain most—even by very strenuous methods—towards bordering states and preference to their own mercantile marine. "The strategic value of these canals, if commanded at sea by the power which controls them by land, is enormous; and the importance to the United States of securing convenient harbors and excluding therefrom other powers became apparent at once, hence the acquisition of which she range and application of the Monroe Doctrine were extended, the war with Spain, and the acquisition of the termination to exclude other maritime powers from positions like the Galapagos Islands.

"On the other hand, I am informed by admirals that in this respect also, 'command of the sea is an abridgement of sovereignty, and that if another power got command of the Caribbean Sea and of the Pacific it would control the commerce and thus they repudiate the suggestion that the construction of the canal will put an end to British naval supremacy. "Clearly the yellow race is lord of the seas on the Asiatic Pacific coast, with the exception of the few territories remaining to France, to the United States, and Germany, and the few native states, such as Siam, which still survive through their geographical position. It is also true that Japan is our ally. But let not this comfort us, for the Japanese are not only our ally but our enemy. Baron Sydenham, in his 'Rising Sun,' tells us how the anti-

Mueller is Said to Have Obtained \$100,000 By Frauds

Berlin, Feb. 15.—A remarkable swindler named Hans Mueller has been convicted of obtaining money, amounting to more than \$100,000 on false pretences. He was sentenced to four years' imprisonment. Mueller, who is just over thirty years of age, was a subordinate clerk in the Berlin courts of justice and, attracted by advertisements in the newspapers offering remuneration for assistance in acquiring patents, he felt that this was the very business which suited him. In the course of three years he had entered into relations with all sorts and conditions of men and women, receiving sums varying from \$125 to \$25,000 for bogus services. He assumed the title of Court Counsellor Mueller and the name and title of "Doctor Martini." He professed to be on intimate terms with high officials in the imperial patent office, and had all sorts of documents, stamps, and seals prepared, some of them with the imperial eagle. When arrested something like \$25,000 was still in his possession. Mueller made a sorry appearance in the dock. He declared himself a degenerate, and said it was an inner voice which had led him into paths of dishonesty. The few remaining eagles in the Alps are to be protected by the Swiss federal government. Last year the eagles made off with fourteen lambs, four kids and one cat, which were duly paid for. The cost to the government was \$22.00.

SENDS POISON TO HER SISTER; CHILDREN DIE

Fearful Crime of Girl in Order to Get Money for Her Wedding

Vienna, Feb. 16.—An extraordinary poisoning trial has just been brought to a close at Olmutz with the passing of the death sentence on a servant named Franziska Bornischke. The girl was engaged to be married to a young artisan, but one day she received a letter from him saying there was no prospect of a wedding unless some money could be obtained and that falling it they had better part.

The girl was madly in love with the man, and she set her mind upon getting the money by any means within her power. An attempt to steal some jewelry from her mistress failed, in failure, and then, in desperation, she deliberately planned the death of her sister, also a servant, who had \$200 in the savings bank. She had in her possession a bottle of arsenic powder, and this she mixed with sugar through some pastry, and spread the poison of mixture over the top. Then she dispatched the food to her sister, hoping thereby to cause her death.

The parcel of pastry was opened by the intended victim in the presence of her mistress and two little boys, her mistress's sons, and each partook of the contents. The little boys, who had eaten most of the sugar coating, were soon in agonies, and though they were taken with all speed to the hospital they died soon afterwards. The mistress and her servant recovered.

In the dock the girl showed no sign of regret at the death of her innocent victims, but she broke down and sobbed bitterly when her lover said he would have worked hard for the money with which to marry her had he not thought she had a cold, mercenary nature, which would not have found contentment in the home of a poor man.

RARE JEWELS HIDDEN IN ANCIENT MUSKET

Now There's Dispute as To Whether Antiquary or Purchaser is Owner

Paris, Feb. 16.—A wonderful find of turquoise was made by the purchase of an old Arab musket at an antiquary's shop in Paris. Thinking how well the musket would look on the wall of his study the amateur collector bought it, and placed it on a table to be wrapped up.

An old cork plugged the end of the barrel, and the purchaser idly pulled it out. A shower of precious stones poured from the rusty muzzle, 235 turquoise of splendid color being picked up.

The owner of the musket prepared to pocket the treasure, but the antiquary raised violent protests, and a magistrate has been asked to decide whose the jewels are.







Bourbon Beau was hauled down from 3 to 1 to 4 to 3. The Ring. He Was in Many Fights. Gus Ruhlin, the former heavyweight prize fighter and wrestler, who died suddenly this week at his home in Brooklyn, was born in Canton, O., in 1872. In the days of the Horton law he was under the management of Billy Madson, and took part in many battles. Tom Sharkey knocked him out in one round at Coney Island, but Ruhlin came back and beat Sharkey in two other bouts. He fought James J. Jeffries twice in California, the first battle being a twenty-round draw, while in the second Jeffries knocked Ruhlin out in the fifth round. He received a terrible beating from Fitzsimmons in Madison Square Garden in 1900, and although he fought some hard battles after that, he often complained that he was not right. McCoy got a decision over him in a twenty-round bout at Syracuse. Ruhlin defeated Peter Maher, Marvin Hart and others, but the ring experts never considered that he showed championship form. After the Horton law was repealed Ruhlin turned to wrestling for a time. In recent years he has kept a saloon on Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn. He was over six feet two inches tall and weighed 245 pounds when in his best fighting condition. Ruhlin is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ruhlin is the founder of the Progressive Political League, a woman's suffrage organization, which she once entertained with a boxing night at the Long Acre Athletic Club in Brooklyn. One of the meetings was held in a room of Gus Ruhlin's cafe and the recipient was one of those who spoke in favor of the cause. Packey Beats Murphy. South Bend, Ind., Feb. 15.—In a fast and clever ten-round bout Packey McFarland of Chicago won the decision over Eddie Murphy of Boston at the Interurban Athletic Club last night. In the fourth round Packey put the eastern boxer down for the count of seven with a vicious right swing to the jaw. As soon as Murphy got to his feet Packey went after him in relentless fashion, but he could not put the customer away for the desired count. In the eighth round, Packey, in executing a right swing slipped to the canvas on one knee. It was not a knockdown, because the Windy city boxer was not hit. McFarland gave a rare exhibition of his cleverness and made Murphy miss repeatedly with blows which had they landed, would have put the stock yards miller to the canvas. Whenever Murphy missed Packey was on top of him, pecking away at his face with left jabs or getting him into positions where he could land right upper cuts or swings. In the fourth session, when Murphy was put down for the count of seven, the blood of the contest was drawn as McFarland had landed a stinging left on Murphy's nose. Murphy reentered in the seventh round when he caught the red stuff to flow from Packey's nose. Packey had the better of the argument in seven of the ten rounds. Murphy was in distress several times, but his almost perfect knowledge of the art of working saved him, especially in the fourth round. In the closing session they stood toe to toe several times and threw science to the wind, each trying to land the blow which would bring victory to the one and defeat to the other. Baseball. National League Agrees. New York, Feb. 15.—The National League today adopted the new national agreement, the revised peace pact being approved as it was read section by section to the magnates at the closing session of their annual meeting here by Chairman August Herrmann of the national commission. American League Declines. Chicago, Feb. 15.—The American Baseball League owners, in session here today refused to ratify the revised national agreement and referred it as a whole to President B. B. Johnson for revision. No date was set for his report on it. Numerous objections were offered to the agreement, but the most unpopular clause seemed to be the one relating to inter-league waivers, non-drafted and purchased players. It provides, among other things that neither a drafted nor a purchased player shall be sent to a minor league club until all the clubs in both leagues shall have had an opportunity to waive on him. Drafted players must be delivered immediately. But in the case of a purchased player the clause provides: "The waiver price of a purchased player shall be fixed by negotiations between the interested clubs and, in the event of their inability to agree, by the commission, whose decision shall be final; of a drafted player, the amount paid for his selection, plus \$250." In the past it has not been necessary for team owners in either of the big leagues to obtain waivers on purchased players outside their own organization and in cases where high-priced players were concerned it has been customary to reimburse fully the seller for his outlay in obtaining the player. Under the proposed ruling several team owners see a possibility of high-priced players going for the waiver price, a few hundred dollars, and \$250.
