ST. JOHN PRESBYTERY

Some Difference Over Matter of Union—Rev. Mr. Baird to go to Woodstock

There seems to be considerable difference of opinion among the members of the St. John Presbytery over the question of the union of their church with the Methodist and Congregationalists. The debate was held on March 21, by which means the caucus of the anti-union men had been held previous to the meeting in Fredericton on March 21, by which means the secured the election of commissioners to the general assembly who were openly sympathetic with their particular views.

CANADIAN WOMAN IN SENSATIONAL SUICIDE

Miss Marie Hugo Believed to be One Who Threw Herself Under Engine in New York Town

Binghamton, N. Y., April 6.—The Binghamton police authorities have received a message from Toronto asking for information regarding Marie Hugo, the woman who last Monday committed suicide under an engine. Mrs. Hugo, of 3 Montezith Street, Toronto, believes the woman was her daughter, and the police believe that the victim's home was in Toronto, from an address found among her papers.

For two years the woman had lived here under the name of Sadie Sylvester. She was employed in a cloak establishment. She was of a religious turn of mind and of late had appeared to be in a thoughtful mood. Last Monday she left her boarding place for the place of business where she was employed but went to the depot and lay down in front of a freight engine. Two employes riding on the locomotive tried in vain to rescue her and say that as she wheeled over her she looked up and smiled in their faces. When taken practically mangled from the track she gasped, smiled again at her rescuers and expired. Toronto, April 6.—The facts would seem to indicate that the woman suicide in Binghamton was a daughter of Mrs. Richard Hugo, who lives with her daughters at 6 Montezith Street. The Hugo claim to be the direct descendants of Victor Hugo, the French author, and say they have a copy of the family tree showing the lineage.

MAINE DRIVES WILL BE LATE IN STARTING

(Bangor Commercial).

If there is any class of business men wondering when spring is really going to show up, it is the lumbermen. Present weather conditions indicate a late start of the drives and unless there is a decided and remarkable change in the weather within the next week or two, it will be the last of April or the first of May before a single log can be even started on the first leg to the booms.

Usually the lumbermen figure on starting their logs from the landing about the middle of April. This is about the average date, although last year it was in March that the drives were started. This spring, however, it is going to be a different proposition. The ice in the lakes and streams is very thick at the present time and with freezing weather, as has been experienced in most up-river sections, has increased in depth instead of melting. Coupled with a heavy depth of ice, is the low condition of the water.

Lumbermen figure that it will take several weeks of very warm and summerish weather to start the ice melting and moving to the lakes. April is already here and there is no sign at the present time that warm weather is coming. It is at least long enough to start anything in the way of driving logs.

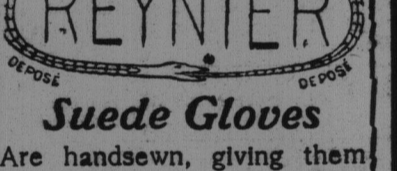

CLAIMANTS OF PART OF THE EVANS MILLIONS

Richard Evans of City Traces Family Line at Hearing Before H. H. Pickett This Morning

A hearing in the matter of several local and provincial people who are claimants for a portion of the \$12,000,000 which was bequeathed by Robert Dawson Evans who died in Boston, some time ago, was held in the office of H. H. Pickett this morning. Dr. W. W. Smith, a Boston attorney, who is representing claimants, was present and explained the particulars of the matter to all present. Only one witness, Richard Evans of St. Andrew's street, was examined, and he traced his family connections back to show that he was a first cousin of the deceased millionaire. Mr. Smith explained that, according to the statutes of Massachusetts, second cousins would have but little chance of securing any of the fortune.

J. A. Barry appeared on behalf of Emily Foster, Sarah Ann Lundy, Williams Scott McMurray, Mary Alice McMurray, and Melissa Finnegan, and J. A. Sinclair for Thomas J. McMurray. Both Mr. Barry and Mr. Sinclair's claimants are all first cousins, either of Mr. Evans or his wife, and nearly all reside in this city. The depositions of Mrs. John Lundy and Mrs. Thomas H. Lawson were taken yesterday by Mr. Smith and will be used by him in his case. Mr. Smith said this morning for the benefit of the claimants that about 20 years ago the family of Evans was one of the fifteen royal ones of Wales. He will leave for Boston tonight in the morning to be watched with great interest in this section on account of so many local people being interested. Mrs. George Baxter, wife of police sergeant and Mrs. Sprout, wife of the alderman, are among those interested.

BATHURST CASE IN COURT HERE TODAY

Judge McKeown Decides Matter of Boundary Line in Dispute in North Shore Town

In the king's bench division today the case of McIntyre vs. White was taken up. It is an action of trespass tried before Justice McKeown without a jury at the March Court in Bathurst. The question involved was the location of the boundary line between the lots of the plaintiff and defendant in Bathurst; the plaintiff's property formerly belonging to the late Hon. K. F. Burns and the defendant to the Postmaster Bishop of Bathurst. The plaintiff claimed that the defendant had erected his house about nineteen inches over the line on his land. The defence set up was—(1), that the defendant had not encroached; (2), a conventional line, (3), an estoppel. The estoppel relied on was an understanding between the late Mr. Burns and the defendant as to where he could build his house, to which the plaintiff replied that there was no writing with reference to it, no dispute as to the real line and that after the plaintiff's survey the defendant had signed a writing acknowledging the correctness of a survey made by his surveyor, Mr. Malone.

Judge McKeown, after reviewing the evidence, found in favor of the plaintiff on all points involved namely—that the plaintiff's survey was correct, that there was no estoppel either in point of fact or law and that the defendant was bound by the writing he signed acknowledging the correctness of the survey. He gave judgment accordingly in favor of the plaintiff for the purpose of having the plaintiff's rights declared and the boundary line established, and as the whole case was for the purpose of having the plaintiff's rights declared and the boundary line established, he thought the amount would meet the requirements of the case. W. A. Motz, K.C., and Dr. L. A. Currier, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and A. J. Gregory, K.C., and Mr. R. A. Lawlor, K.C., for the defendant.
