TYPHUS EPIDEMIC
PERIL THWARTED
IN VOLGA DISTRICT

Samara, Feb. 1—(By Mail.)—Typhus which scouraged the Volga Valley and claimed thousands of victims from one end of Russia to the other last year, has appeared this winter only in scattered localities, and unless the unexpected occurs medical authorities consider the danger of epidemics on a vast scale is ended.

There are several areas in the Volga Valley and the Ukraine where the 1922 harvests fared poorly, and in these famine already is raging again. Nothing like the terrible conditions of the ghastly winter of 1921-'22 exist, however, and although 8,000,000 persons are listed as needing complete or partial support by charity even the most pessimistic observers will be repeated in the proportions of last year.





The first person to solve the problem was a Frenchman, Comte de Chardonnet, who in 1884 deposited with the French Academy of Sciences a sealed document. Three years later this was opened and found to contain a method of making artificial fibre by treating cellulose with nitric acid. The resulting compound, which is a mild form of gun cotton, can be dissolved in alcohol and ether, like the common collodion that we use to cover our skinned knuckles. But the nitric had to be thoroughly eliminated from the yarn; otherwise it was too inflammable.

Another process, invented by the French and worked by the German, got the cellulose into fluid form by dissolving it in a solution of copper and

solving it in a solution of copper and ammonium salts.

In the making of viscose a third method is employed. Wood pulp, such as is used in paper making, is treated with strong soda lye and then with carbon disluphide. This brings the cellulose into solution as an orange liquid. This is forced through minute holes in a platinum nozzle into dilute acid, which hardens each fine stream into solid fibre and the sulphide is then removed.

During the war another form of soluble cellulose found extensive em-loyment as "scac," or dope for air-dane wings. This is the acetate, made



There is a time following every war when it is nearly impossible to tell the truth. During a war propaganda is absolutely necessary, to make people hate the enemy as much as they should hate him, and it takes, after each war like our own civil struggle, a great many brave and chivalrous spirits to break down the effects of the propaganda of hatred which war induces.
We suppose that in 1866 it would have been comparatively easy to get up an argument to go down and whip the South again, just as the subsequent yellow fever epidemics were regarded in some quarters as further visitations of the wrath of the Almighty upon an unrepentant people.
When you went South thirty years ago you heard terrible stories of the atrocities committed by the northern-ers, and of the sufferings and starvation of southern soldiers in northern prisons, in Elmira and elsewhere. It took men like the late Nathaniel S. Shaler, himself a Kentuckian, and a brave soldier of the Union, to tell the truth, as he did in his classes at Harvard, in regard to the comparative atroeities of the two sides. And the truth, as was said of old, "makes men free."
We do not envy the Rev. Dr. Clark the things that will be said about him. But he can at least have the consciousness of telling the truth at a time when the momentum of war propaganda has disordered men's minds.

**Episcopalians Hail** Spirit of Youth **Entering Religion** 

Young People Turning More to Church For Answers to Modern Problems, Says Dr.

(New York Tribune.)

cently at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

Dr. Gardner's subject was "Are Boys and Girls Between Sixteen and Twenty-five Interested in Religion?" and he answered it by the membership figures of more than 250,000 of the Young People's Service League and the Young People's Fellowship organized in the Episcopal churches.

H., March 16-Recommendation that the maximum allow ance to a disabled workman should be increased from \$10 to \$15 a week and the maximum death benefit from \$3,000 to \$5,000 is made by Labor Commissioner John S. B. Davie in a report to the legislature suggesting amendments to the present workmen's compensation and employers' liability law.

Mr. Davie further recommends that the law should take under its provisions all classes of labor, except domestic and agricultural, and that the time between the accident and the first payment of compensation should not exceed one week.

He takes the position workmen should receive two-thirds of the weekly pay received. 






