NEW FINANCE MINISTER NAMED TO HEAD BODY

Will Vote Bill Covering Currency Circulation Arrangements

BRIAND HAS TASK

Asked to Form Cabinet, Pleads With President For More Time

ASKS MORE TIME

PARIS, April 13.—M. Briand, who yesterday was entrusted with the task of organizing a new cabinet, called on President Doumergue this morning and asked for more time in which to select his ministers.

SOCIALISTS ADAMANT

The Socialists hold the key to the situation and they do not appear inclined to help out in any combination other than another Herriot cabinet. Their leading organ declares today that the ministry must be organized either by former Premier Herriot, or by the Socialists, and that the left bloc remains in power. M. Briand is their logical and only possible leader.

PAINLEVE'S POSITION

M. Painleve thus far has refused absolutely to undertake the task, but it is expected that President Doumergue, if M. Briand refuses the commission, will put the question to the leaders of the left bloc in a way to make them understand that if they do not want to accept the responsibility of forming a new government, they must make the attempt to dictate how the government will be formed.

Gaona brought as high as 1,000 per cent premium.

Ask That Wholesale Killer Be Subjected to Parents' Quiz

HANOVER, Germany, April 13.—Relatives of the victims of Fritz Haarman, the "wholesale murderer," who was convicted in December of having slain 26 persons, and was sentenced to death, have demanded of the state's attorney that Haarman be confronted with a deputation of parents who desire to obtain from him authentic information regarding the fate of their children. The state's attorney also had been requested to produce a lengthy confession which Haarman is alleged to have made recently.

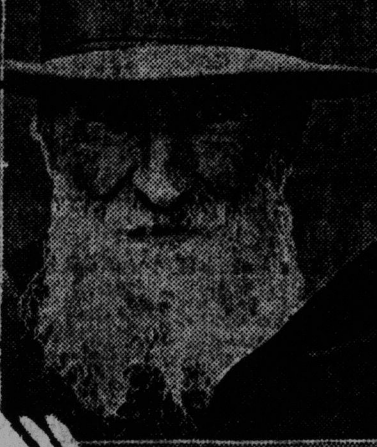
1,000 Passengers Land At Halifax At Week-End

Police Suspect Poison Plot In Mysterious Deaths of Five of Family Within Six Years

CHICAGO, April 13.—The coroner of Cook County, Illinois, and Porter County, Indiana, prepared today to exhume the bodies of five members of the David Cunningham family to examine them for traces of poison. Authorities redoubled their efforts to untangle the mystery of five deaths in the family within six years, when it was revealed that Mrs. Anna Cunningham, mother of the family, had attempted yesterday to kill herself. She is guarded in her room at a hospital here.

THROAT GASHED AND RAZOR IN HIS HAND

Harold Mascaden Found in His Cabin on S. S. Montrose Here.

Harold Mascaden, aged 23, of Liverpool, England, was found in his cabin on board the steamer Montrose in port here this afternoon with a gash in the right side of his throat and a razor in his hand.

Mascaden and a pal were in their cabin about 12 o'clock when the pal was called out. When he returned about 12:30 he found Mascaden lying in a pool of blood. It is thought he will recover.

WAR MEMORIAL NOT CONSIDERED

Mayor Announces Several Communications Objecting to Fountain Removal.

The war memorial matter did not come up at today's meeting of the city commissioners. Mayor Potts said after the meeting that he had received several communications objecting to the moving of the W. C. T. U. fountain. These were from the West Saint John Field Corn Association, which donated \$500 toward the monument, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Selien, who lost a son in the war, the Loyalist Society and the North End W. T. U. who were opposed to the plan to move the fountain. Mayor Potts said yesterday that he will shelve the matter until he has received more information. Commissioner Bullock thought the spirit of the trust would be observed if the fountain was moved to some other location and set up again. Commissioner Frank declined to make any statement on the matter. Commissioner Wigmore said he was quite willing for the fountain to be moved if it was the will of the people to do so.

TO RETURN BOND

The opinion of Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., city solicitor, in regard to the right of the Commission Council to interfere in the matter of the bond taken by the police from George T. Kane was read to the council this morning. He advised that this was a matter for the police and not for the council; that he felt the police had been in error in asking Mr. Kane for the bond without an information being sworn out, and that it should be returned to him. After the bond had been received the necessary steps to return it were taken. Commissioner Potts said that the letter be filed, as the matter was being attended to. Mayor Potts moved that the recommendation be received and the recommendations carried out, and this carried.

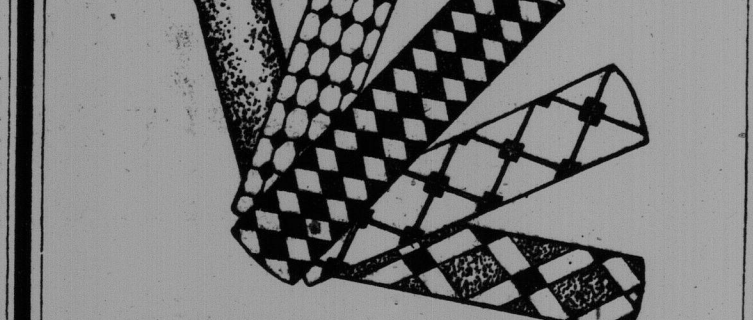

E. S. CARTER GIVES UP EDITORIAL POST

Retires From Newspaper Work After 40 Years of Activity in it.

E. S. Carter, editor of the Telegraph-Journal since the amalgamation of the two papers, and previously editor of the Journal, has resigned, having decided to give up newspaper work. When he graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1885 Mr. Carter joined the staff of The Daily Telegraph, and throughout his newspaper career he displayed conspicuous ability. He has a wide knowledge of provincial affairs and people, and his writings of provincial politics under the pen name of "The Gallery Man," were masterpieces that were read with avidity by an eager following.

His associates heard with keen regret of his decision to retire from active newspaper work, and the reading public also will greatly regret his retirement.

Mr. Carter started work as a reporter in the same building as that in which he closes his newspaper days, the build-

ing which is now the office of The Telegraph-Journal. During the forty years intervening he became thoroughly conversant with all branches of newspaper work, work which he thoroughly enjoyed and in which he was entirely at home.

Mr. Carter was for several years organizer of the Liberal party in the province, and during Hon. Dr. W. E.

Poster's term as Prime Minister, was the Premier's secretary. Mr. Carter has been for several years secretary of the Public Utilities Commission of the province. He is possessed of a happy faculty of making friends, and has perhaps as wide a circle of friends of any man in New Brunswick.

Mr. Carter is now on a trip to Montreal and New York.

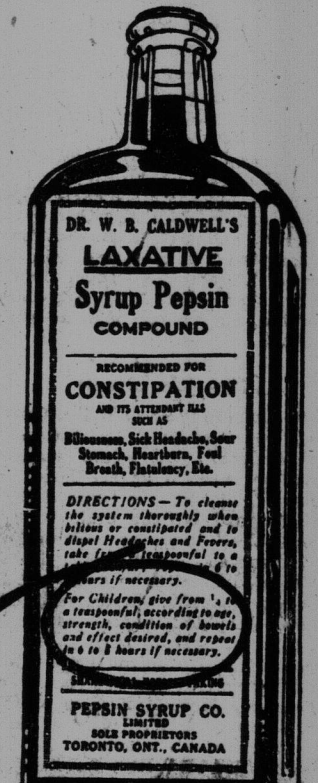

MELITA BREAKS PORT RECORD FOR SEASON

Canadian Pacific Liner Lands
1,058 Passengers at Sand
Point

3 FAMILIES FOR
PROVINCE ARRIVE

Mr. and Mrs. J. McManus of
Moncton Return From
Rome

A new season record for passenger travel here was established by the Canadian Pacific steamship Melita, which arrived in port this morning from Antwerp, Southampton and Cherbourg. She had 97 cabin and 1,061 third-class passengers, general cargo and mail.

The passengers were sent forward to their destinations in special trains. Among the cabin passengers were Mr. and Mrs. J. McManus of Moncton, who are returning home after a visit to London, Paris and Rome. They were in a party of pilgrims received by the Pope. They were abroad for two months and thoroughly enjoyed their trip. They left this afternoon for their home.

W. A. Hinds, manager of the Rising Sun Oil Company in Japan, was another passenger on the liner. He has been in the Orient for 12 years and is returning there after a vacation in London.

22 FAMILIES
With their faces wreathed in smiles, happy children playing about, mothers and fathers sat in the waiting room of the C. P. R. at Sand Point this morning after disembarking from the Canadian Pacific steamship Melita. There were 22 families, comprising 44 adults and 80 boys, girls and babies. They came to Canada under the British Empire land settlement scheme and are to settle on farm lands. Included in the party were three families to locate in New Brunswick. All are from the British Isles.

The newcomers were met here by R. I. Donaldson and his staff of the local branch of the Land Settlement Board of the Immigration Department and assisted in preparing for their land journey. Of the three families to locate in this province, one is that of Charles Connor, who has his wife and six grown up children. They are to locate at Millville. D. Miller, wife and child, are also to locate at Millville, while D. V. Orsag, wife and child will go to Centreville.

CANCER RESEARCH
After nearly two years' study in the universities of London and Edinburgh, Dr. George D. Little arrived en route to his home in Montreal, where he will become attached to the staff of the Montreal General Hospital. Speaking about research in regard to cancer, Dr. Little said some progress has been made and that the time might not be far distant when effective measures would be forthcoming to combat this disease. Dr. Little is a son of W. J. Little, one of the directors of the Montreal Star. He was accompanied by his wife.

After three years in Persia, where they were employed drilling oil wells for the Anglo-Persian Oil Company, L. A. Stevenson and E. B. Holmes of Petrolia, Ont., return on the Melita. The two young adventurers plan on visiting relatives in Canada for some months and will then proceed to South America.

Among the passengers was Jonas Rimancowy, Hungarian violinist. He has been engaged to play at the hotel in the Royal Alexander Hotel in Winnipeg.

IS GIVEN THIRTY
DAY SENTENCE

Thirty days' imprisonment was imposed on James Conway in the police court this morning. He is being found guilty of stealing a bottle of wine, valued at \$2.50, while working in the hold of the Canadian Pacific steamship Bosworth at Sand Point on Saturday. His Honor said there had been very few cases of broaching cargo before him this winter and in view of the fact that it was the first time defendant had been in court, he would inflict a minor penalty but that it would serve as a warning to others. William Massyn, first officer of the Bosworth, said he found the accused with the bottle in one hand and a large drinking can in the other. Some of the wine had been poured into the can. The accused swore he had found the bottle hidden in behind some barrels where he was working. To H. H. McLean, Jr., appearing for the company, he did not know why he had not reported the find to the foreman. E. J. Hennesberry appeared for accused.

A fine of \$10 was imposed on James Fleming by Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning on charge of assaulting Mrs. Annie Perry. He denied the charge and said he had only chased some boys out of the yard. Mrs. Perry said she was her landlord and that he had taken her by the neck and shaken her and called her insulting names. Louis Sullivan corroborated Mrs. Perry's evidence while Mary Wayne, called by accused, said she did not see Mr. Fleming assault Mrs. Perry. His Honor, however, found accused guilty and imposed a \$10 fine which was paid.
