THE THIRD SESSION OF THE SYNOD

OF

## THE CANADA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

## FIRST SEDERUNT.

At the City of Hamilton, and within Central Church there, the second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty three, the Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church met, and, after sermon by the Moderator, Mr. Robert Ure, from Psalm 110, 1st and 2nd verses—"The Lord did say unto my Lord, sit thou at my right hand, until I make thine enemies thy footstool. The Lord shall send the rod of thy strength out of Zion; rule thou in the midst of thine enemies"—was constituted

The Moderator addressed the Synod.

The Roll of Synod, compiled from the Rolls of the several Roll called. Presbyteries, was called, and the attendance of members marked.

The Minute Clerk here stated that the names of three ministers ordained appeared on the Roll of the Presbytery of Montreal, under the missionaries in title of "ordained missionaries" and inquired whether or not roll of Presbytery title of "ordained missionaries," and inquired whether or not of Montreal. those ministers were to be regarded as members of the Synod.

Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Topp, and seconded by Mr. McTavish, that the names be removed from the Roll of Synod.

It was moved, in amendment, by Mr. Cross, and seconded by Mr. Kennedy, That the names be allowed to remain on the Roll.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Mr. Smellie, seconded by Mr. McLaren, That the names of ordained missionaries on the Roll of the Presbytery of Montreal, be referred to a Committee, with instructions to inquire into the facts of the cases, and report as to the status which should be accorded to the parties in question.

It was agreed to refer the commissions of Elders appointed by Commissions of their respective Sessions to represent them in Synod, but whose names had not been placed on the Roll, as also all amendments or additions which should be made to the Roll of Synod, to the same Committee to whom was referred the question on the Roll of the Presbytery of Montreal.

Election of Moderator.

The Synod proceeded to the election of a Moderator, when there was read from the table a list of ministers nominated by Presbyteries for the office of Moderator, containing the following names:-Mr. William Aitken, of Smith's Falls; Mr. James Dick, of Richmond Hill; Mr. John Baird, of Pickering; Mr. William Barrie, of Eramosa; Mr. William Caven, of St. Mary's; Mr. John J. A. Proudfoot, of London; Mr. James Skinner, of Proof Line, London township; Mr. Alex. Topp, of Knox's Church, Toronto.

Votes were taken between the several ministers nominated, Mr. Dick chosen when Mr. Dick was successively preferred. The yeas and nays were then called for, and the election of Mr. Dick as Moderator was declared to be unanimous. Mr. Dick thereupon took the chair and addressed the Synod.

The Committee on Business gave in a Report, which was received, and its recommendations were adopted, with the excep-Business Committee, Report of tion of that relating to the hour of adjournment at the closing Sederunt in the evening.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Principal Willis, 2nd amendment. seconded by Mr. Cuthbertson: Sustain the Reference; approve of the Presbytery's diligence; redeclare, in terms of the Deliverance last year, the Synod's conviction that the arrears in question are morally due to Mr. Beattie; but, considering the peculiar complications of the case, and especially the disorganized circumstances of the congregation as a body, and the impossibility of defining the proportional duties of individuals, while remitting the case to the Presbytery for further affectionate dealing, in carrying out the Deliverance of the Synod, direct them, quoad ultra, to rest in the solemn declaration of individuals, applying for privileges, that they have not failed in implementing their part of the obligation, according to their understanding of the arrangement.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Mr. J. Scott (London), 3rd amendment. seconded by Mr. Coutts: Sustain the Reference; approve the conduct of the Presbytery; reaffirm the principle of moral obligation; and declare that, inasmuch as the congregation is in a disorganized state, and has virtually ceased to exist, the Synod find that it is impracticable further to deal with this matter as a congregational liability, and instruct the Presbytery of Stratford to grant certificates to former members of Chalmers' Church who, in the judgment of the Presbytery, have done their duty in this matter.

On calling votes, the amendment of Mr. Scott was successively 3rd amendment carried, by considerable majorities, over the other amendments carried. and the original motion; and the yeas and nays being called thereon, the said amendment was affirmed by a very large majority, and the Synod did and do decide in terms thereof.

To extend its sympathy and countenance to Mr. Chiniquy, being convinced that nothing has been established against him which should affect his Christian and ministerial character.

While, therefore, prepared to vindicate and sustain, as far as possible, Mr. Chiniquy in his peculiar and very trying position, the Synod do not deem it wise in the meantime to incorporate the Congregations at Illinois, together with Mr. Chiniquy, with this

Resolve to appoint a committee to aid Mr. Chiniquy by advice, and, if necessary, to aid him in his work, as the liberality of the Church may enable them; instructing the Committee also to assist Mr. Chiniquy in vindicating his integrity and Christian character before the Church Courts in the United States, as this Synod believe may be done.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Mr. R. F. Burns, 3rd Amendment. seconded by Mr. D. H. McVicar, as follows: Inasmuch as it

appears from the Report of the Committee that Mr. Chiniquy is under sentence of deposition, for contumacy, by the Presbytery of Chicago (O. S.), and having good reason to believe that a statement of the grounds of said deposition is about to be published by that Presbytery, the Synod, out of respect to that reverend body, whose kindness and courtesy to their delegates they fully appreciate, agree, for the present, to delay final action in this matter.

They would, in the meanwhile, respectfully recommend their Reverend Brother to bring his case, by memorial, before the recognized Courts of the Presbyterian Church of the United States (O. S.)

They would further commit the whole matter to the Presbytery of London, with assessors, instructing them, if they see their way clear, to take a temporary supervision of the stations at St. Ann's and Kankakee, that they may by them be brought before the next meeting of Synod in due form, it being fully understood that no pecuniary responsibility involving the Synod be assumed without the Synod's sanction.

They would at the same time express their continued interest in this most hopeful field of Missionary labour, and their earnest desire that circumstances will emerge to admit of Mr. Chiniquy and his people receiving speedily the formal recognition of this Church.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Mr. Topp, seconded 4th Amendment by Mr. D. Inglis, as follows: The Synod, whilst sympathising with the Rev. C. Chiniquy in the circumstances in which he is placed, being under sentence of deposition for alleged contumacy, in connexion with charges which, on the report of the Committee appointed at last Synod, appear to be insufficient to warrant such a sentence, resolve to defer any direct steps towards the reception of Mr. Chiniquy as a minister of this Church, till he has taken constitutional means to prosecute his case before the Courts of the Church with which he has been connected.

4. They would tender thanks to Mr. Nisbet, who, at considerable inconvenience, has come to this meeting of Synod, that he might advocate the claims of the Red River mission. They would further bear testimony to the devotedness with which Messrs. Black and Nisbet have fulfilled the trust reposed in them, and would remit to them to make such temporary provision for the settlers of the Saskatchewan as may be in their power.

5. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND-RULES AMENDED.

On motion of Mr. Reid, duly seconded, it was agreed, That the Aged and Infirm Regulations for the management of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, amendment of a more appeared and interior with the following alterations. Ministers, be re-enacted ad interim, with the following alterations, Regulations. viz.:—The word "may" to be substituted for the word, "shall," in the fourth of those Regulations; and the words "through the Presbytery of the bounds," to be inserted between the words "deal" and "with," in the sixth Regulation. The fourth and sixth Regulations, with these amendments, will read as follows:

4. That for every year over ten, which a minister serves in it, before he is invalided, he may receive, if the funds admit of this, the sum of \$8 yearly, till the sum of \$200 is reached.

6. That when application is made to admit a minister to the benefits of this Fund, the Committee shall have power to deal, through the Presbytery of the bounds, with his congregation, in order to arrange with them what he is to receive from said congregation as a retiring allowance; and that no Presbytery dissolve a pastoral relation, on the ground of age or infirmity, without first communicating with the Committee for this end.

### STATED COLLECTIONS.

The Synod ordered that the stated collections for the schemes Collections at of the Church be made, in all the congregations, at the same times, same times, last year. as were ordered for the past year, that is to say:

For Foreign Missions, on the third Sabbath of January;

For Home Missions, on the third Sabbath of April;

For Synod Fund, on the third Sabbath of July;

For Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, on the 3rd Sabbath of October.

### MEMORIAL ON TEMPERANCE.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

In presenting this their second Report since the Union, your Committee are enabled to exhibit the Statistics of the Church in a more complete form than last year, and they cherish the hope that, with a little more care and attention on the part of office-bearers, full returns will in future be received from each

Out of 230 pastoral charges connected with our Church, only the following eleven, Kemptville, Westport, Dalhousie, Ashburn and Utica, Flamboro' West, Mornington, Guelph (1st Congregation), Mandawmin, Detroit, Lake Shore and Normanby, have sent no returns. To these are to be added the newly settled Congregations of Elma Centre, Culross, Carlisle, St. Thomas, Southampton, and West Arran, together with about twelve vacant charges, which need not be mentioned, as they appear in the general return.

On the Presbyteries within whose respective bounds these several defaulting Congregations are found, devolves the duty of taking order that they be suit ably dealt with, and that the necessity of rigid compliance with the instruc-

tions of Synod be urged upon them. The comparative completeness of this year's Return is due, in a great measure, to the zeal and labour of the various Presbytery Clerks, who are, however, hampered and hindered by the dilatoriness and vis inertia of nota few of our office-bearers. And while referring to improvement, it is well to bear in mind, that much has yet to be done in the way of rendering the Congregational Returns themselves more correct, as several of those given in are incomplete, and compiled without sufficient care and exactness. To accomplish this desirable object, the more thorough and systematic oversight of Presbyteries is needed.

Your Committee call attention to the fact, that the fuller returns of this year confirm the general correctness of the approximate vidimus last year, based upon the imperfect returns which were then sent in, with the exception of the average attendance, which was misprinted 70,000 instead of 62,000. Taking, then, this sour basis of comparison, and adding one-tenth for the defaulting congregation of this year, the general increase is encouraging. It is seen that, in regard to membership, attendance on ordinances, Sabbath schools, Bible classes, Prayer meetings, and the other outward indications of a Church's prosperity, there is gratifying progress.

Though the columns headed "Addition" and "Diminution" indicate a larger increase of communicants, yet your Committee, from an examination of the Returns, insert 2,000 as more correct; and, in connection with this, it may be necessary to observe that, from the loose way in which some of the Congretional Returns are made up, much care and trouble are required in revising the various items, and getting at the general results. After every allowance has been made, the following representation may be deemed approximately dance on ordinances approaching ro,000; upwards of 25,000 of the youthful books placed for their perusal in their numerous Sabbath-school Libraries; by (including the Professors and Retired Ministers) about 240 servants of the Lord, besides a considerable number of missionaries without fixed charges, and extending over the length and breadth of the Province; more than 400 Prayer

meetings as centres of spiritual influence and means of stirring up sound doctrinal feelings; and lastly, between 3,000 and 4,000 zealous and devoted office-bearers, to take the oversight of things temporal and spiritual.

Should not this general outline of our Zion's bulwarks arouse us to praise the Lord for our exceeding great and precious privileges, and cause us to tremble in view of the mighty trust committed, and our unfitness, as standard-bearers under the great Captain, for caring aright for so large and influential a portion of God's sacramental host?

Your Committee call attention to the circumstance, that many of our churches are only partially filled on the Lord's day; there being, from the comparison of the Returns, at least ten thousand unoccupied sittings throughout our various churches. Though pastoral visitation be in general attended to by our Ministers, yet, considering the empty state of many houses of God, a great work is in this way open to our other office-bearers and communicants. In view of the vast numbers of non-church-going people throughout the land, a more faithful carrying out of the divine command, "Compel them to come in," is much needed.

Your Committee, before leaving this branch of the subject, have to remark, that the attendance of members of Synod is somewhat larger than last year, and consists of about 170 Ministers and 90 Elders.

An abstract, in tabular form, of the leading items of the Financial Statement, is next submitted, and its careful examination urged upon the Elders present, as it exhibits features worthy of their gravest consideration:

From the evils incident to an unpropitious season, the Christian Church is usually the greatest sufferer, and Ministers feel with most force the poverty and other unhappy consequences that result from a meagre harvest. Considering, then, the partial failure of last year's crops, your Committee anticipated a large deficiency in the Stipend Fund, and they regret to find that their anticipations have been unhappily realized. The tabular abstract exhibits arrears as due to 83 Ministers, or considerably more than one-third of those who have reported; and they have good ground for believing that the Returns present the most favorable view of the case. Could your Committee get within the veil of the bare facts and figures, they would witness a niggardliness and grasping covetousness on the part of some of our people, that are absolutely appalling; and a patient, suffering and self-denying spirit on the part of our Ministers, that may be regarded as heroic. When the rise in the price of all articles of merchandise, and the arduous, life-shortening labors of the pastors of our Zion are conjoined with the facts, that two-thirds of them are receiving incomes less than the minimum stipend of \$600 per annum, and that not a few are striving to live (or rather to starve) on less than \$400, it is high time that some of our influential laymen were bestirring themselves in behalf of the worst paid, the most laborious, and the most self-denying of any class through-

The amount which has been thus inconsiderately kept back from God's servants, exceeds \$16,000, or exactly one-seventh of the entire Stipend Fund reported; while it is believed that a full statement from the congregations which have sent no report, would augment it to upwards of \$20,000.

For the purpose of removing this painful state of matters, your Committee suggest the more faithful and frequent dealing with non-paying congregations, on the part of Presbyteries. It is to be feared that, amid the pressure of business of a less worldly and more spiritual character, the temporal claims and necessities of God's servants are cast into the shade by our Church Courts. As it is also evident that our people are very imperfectly educated in the duty, and not fully alive to the privilege of giving, your Committee seek to impress on this Court the advisability of indoctrinating our members in the principles, and of urging them to the practice of a higher Christian liberality, by means of a Pastoral Letter, read at a stated time from each of the pulpits of our Church.

So many elements have to be taken into account in estimating the average stipend of our Ministers, that only an approximation can be obtained. Without indicating the process, your Committee would fix upon \$520 as the most probable sum.

The average contribution of each communicant for the Stipend Fund may be stated at \$3 15.

Owing to the pecuniary state of the country, the disbursements for congregational purposes have reached barely one-half of those of last year. When the financial condition of the Province is taken into account, the various Synodical schemes may be regarded as in a prosperous state. The College Fund, as might have been expected, is rapidly recovering from the pressure to which it was subjected by the Building scheme on the one hand, and the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the late United Presbyterian Church on the other, though it is not by any means so liberally supported as its importance and intrinsic merits demand. Were it as generously sustained as the Home Mission, or were a contribution of less than 20c. obtained each year from our

38,000 communicants, the College would not only be able to meet its annual expenditure, but also have a moiety to spare, for the liquidation of its past debt. The total contributions for all purposes, as indicated by the Returns, amount to nearly \$220,000, or the approximate rate of \$6 25 for each communicant.

Your Committee would earnestly urge on Presbyteries the necessity of lightening their arduous labours, by taking a more careful and special oversight of the preparation of the Statistics, and by making it rather a Presbyterial duty than devolving it entirely on the Clerk, who is usually burdened with other work connected with his office. They also ask permission of the Synod to make such changes in the printed Schedules as they deem necessary.

In conclusion, your Committee believe that, as a Church, we have reason to thank God and take courage, on account of his favour to us. The figures embodied in this Report, at least, exhibit progress, and show that the means of grace are regularly dispensed, pastoral visitations universally attended to, prayer meetings almost universally held, Sabbath schools and Bible classes generally established, and the whole ecclesiastical machinery in continuous and active operation. What and how many spiritual blessings may be wrapped up underneath those outward forms, the great day alone will reveal; and then, your Committee would fain hope that, as the history of our denomination is reviewed before the Court of Heaven, the saying may be often repeated: "This

#### II.—THE STATE OF THE FUNDS.

The Treasnrer's Account shows an increase of income for the present over that of the past year, to the extent of \$1,111 14; the total amount received in 1861-2 being \( \frac{1}{2} \)3,628 82, while the amount this year is \$4,739 96. This difference is no doubt mainly due to the special effort made in the former of these years, in aid of the Building Fund. It will be observed that the income this year, though considerably in advance of that of the last, is still inadequate to meet the necessary expenditure, and that the balance previously existing against the Ordinary Fund will be further increased. The deficit for this year, added to the previous arrears, makes a total of \$,904 39.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION.

The Committee appointed at last meeting of Synod, to take into consideration the whole subject of the preparatory theological education of candidates for the ministry, beg to submit the following Report.

The first point to which the Committee directed their attention was one frequently referred to in previous discussions on this question, viz., the propriety of abolishing the purely literary classes in Knox College, restricting the teaching within that institution to theology, and the cognate branches. The Committee are not insensible to the weight of argument by which such a change can be supported, nor do they doubt its propriety in the abstract; but,

while thinking it a point of too great importance to be lost sight of, they cannot, under existing circumstances, recommend its immediate adoption by the Synod. While alluding to the matter, the Committee may be permitted to express their satisfaction that provision was made by the Senate, during the past session of Knox College, for the efficient teaching of the classics within the institution; and to recommend, not only the continuance of the arrangement in the meantime, but also the appropriation by the Board of Management of a small sum in connection therewith, in the event of the students' fees failing to afford a suitable remuneration to the person employed in giving the instruction.

Farther, the Committee unanimously and strongly recommend the appointment by the Synod of a Board of Examiners, who shall be empowered to subject to a uniform examination, at the beginning of each session, all candidates for entrance to the College, with the view of determining whether their attainments would justify their entrance, and if so, at what point in the curriculum. Also, that this Board should, at the same time, take on examination, on certain prescribed subjects, the students of each successive year, with the view of deciding whether they are entitled to pass into a higher stage in the course of study. The Committee would propose that students passing a regular course in the University and taking a Degree, should be exempted from examination by the Board until the period of entering on the theological course.

With the view of adjusting the relation of Presbyteries to the Board, the Committee would propose that no student be taken on examination by it for entrance to the College, without having been first examined by the Presbytery in which he resides as to his moral and religious qualifications for the work of the ministry—and if deemed desirable, as to his literary attainments as well—and thereafter duly attested; and that the Presbytery's attestation should be necessary, not only for entrants, but at each successive year of the course.

The Committee trust that the Synod will see its way clear to give the proposed change a trial. It will secure uniformity of standard, and a more thorough examination than is always and perhaps often possible, where the time of Presbyteries is so much engaged with attention to the mission stations within their bounds, and work of a similar kind, while it might be expected to supply a stimulus to effort on the part of the students, which could hardly be looked for from a plan like that now in operation, according to which, the examination is divided over a number of Presbyteries with only a few students in each. The proposal is not a new one in the Presbyterian Church. It has been long in operation in the Presbyterian Church of Ireland. It was adopted several years ago by the Free Church of Scotland, after the fullest consideration. It will be apparent to all, that if such a Board is required in countries where the whole students pass through a regular University course, it must be much more imperatively demanded in the present circumstances of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

# DRAFT OF AN ACT FOR THE CONSTITUTION OF A GENERAL ASSEMBLY, AND DISTRICT SYNODS, REMITTED TO PRESBYTERIES AND SESSIONS, BY THE SYNOD.

Whereas it is of importance for the welfare and good government of the Church, that a General Assembly and certain District Synods should forthwith be instituted in the Canada Presbyterian Church:

Be it therefore resolved and enacted, by and with the consent of Presbyteries,

in terms of the Barrier Act, viz.:

I.—That, in the year —, there shall be constituted a Supreme Court of this Church, instead of the present Synod, which shall be styled and entitled the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, and which shall possess and enjoy all the powers, privileges and immunities which at present belong to the Synod of the said Church.

II.—The General Assembly shall consist of one-half of the whole number of the Ministers on the Roll of the several Presbyteries, with an equal number of representative Elders, or of such other proportion as may at any time be lawfully determined on; and said members shall be appointed in the manner

following, viz.:

1. At an ordinary meeting of Presbytery, held at least sixty days before the meeting of the General Assembly, one half of the proportional number of Ministers which any Presbytery may have to send shall be appointed by election; the other half by rotation, beginning at the top of the Presbytery Roll, and so on in succession from year to year. The Elders shall be appointed by election from the Roll of the Presbytery, provided always that it shall be awful to appoint one fifth part of the number from the acting Elders of any of the congregations of the Church.

2. The Presbytery shall forthwith grant to the Ministers and Elders thus elected and appointed, Commissions in due form, attested by their Clerk, which Commissions said members shall forward to the Clerk of the General Assembly at least eight days before its meeting; and said Clerk shall from such Commissions prepare an interim Roll, to be called at the opening of said Assembly, and which, being amended and corrected if necessary, shall be confirmed as the

Roll of the General Assembly.

3. If uneven numbers should occur in the Rolls of Presbyteries, then they shall in every such case make an equitable adjustment of the representation

thereto, subject always to the review of the Assembly.

III.—The General Assembly shall meet at Toronto, C. W., on such day and in such place as may on adjournment be determined by the present Synod; and the Moderator shall be nominated and appointed in the same manner as the Moderator of the Synod has heretofore been, or as may otherwise be hereafter determined.

IV.—There shall be constituted three District Synods, immediately subordinate to the General Assembly, but having superior and appellate jurisdiction over the Presbyteries, Sessions and Congregations within their respective bounds; and which shall possess and enjoy all such other subordinate powers and privileges as may from time to time be granted them by the General Assembly. There shall also be the right of appeal, reference, petition and overture from and to said Synods; and they shall be styled and constituted as follows, viz.:

4. The Clerks of the several Presbyteries shall send certified Rolls of their Presbyteries to the Clerks of their respective Synods, at least eight days before the meetings of said Synods; and such Rolls shall be the Rolls respectively of

5. The Moderators of said Synods shall, in all meetings after the first, be nominated and appointed by open vote, or in such other manner as the Synod itself may from time to time determine. The business shall be conducted in the same manner, mutatis mutandis, as is the business of the General Assembly; provided, nevertheless, that the Synods shall have power from time to time to frame, alter and amend such other and additional standing orders as they may deem necessary for their own orderly procedure.

6. The powers and functions of said Synods shall be purely administrative of the existing Constitution and Laws of the Church, and exercised in harmony with the government of the Church by Church Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and a General Assembly.

7. Said Synods shall not meet oftener than twice during the ecclesiastical year, and shall annually send up their Minute Books for examination by the

## REGULATIONS ANENT PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

Regulations adopted by the Synod as to points of form, which are to be observed in the keeping of Presbytery Records.

1. That the number of every page be given in words, as well as in figures. 2. That every page have the signature of the Presbytery Clerk at the foot

3. That the time of a Presbytery Meeting be given in words, and the building, as well as the town or village in which the Presbytery meets, be stated.

4. That all erasures, or other changes on the Records, be noticed on the margin, with the initials of the Clerk's name.

5. That all items of recorded business, &c., be indexed on the margin.

- 6. That the place and date of each meeting of Presbytery be put on the margin, at the head of the page.
  - 7. That all sums of money be given in words, as well as in figures.
  - 8. That no unnecessary vacant space be left between the minutes of sederunts.

#### OVERTURE ON CERTAIN STANDING ORDERS.

Whereas, by the present method of voting on resolutions, confusion arises and time is lost; and whereas it is desirable to have some regulations by which discussion may be closed and any matter—which a majority of the Synod may be unwilling, for the present, to consider—laid aside; it is humbly and respectfully overtured by the undersigned, that the "Standing Orders" anent the "Conducting of Business" be sent down to Presbyteries, that the same may be amended by the adoption of the following:—

- 1. That sections 10 and 11 be repealed.
- 2. That each motion shall be put to the House, and voted upon by itself, beginning with the last amendment, and the first resolution that obtains a a majority shall be declared carried, and the remaining ones, if any, lost. In voting, whether by a show of hands, or by calling the roll, the question shall be "aye" or "no."
- 3. That the previous question may be moved, and when moved no further discussion shall be allowed until it shall have been decided. The previous question shall be, whether the vote on the resolution or resolutions before the House be now taken. Should it be carried, the vote shall be immediately taken, but should it be lost, the discussion may proceed.
- 4. That it shall be competent for any two members to move that the matter before the Synod be laid on the table. When this motion is made, no further discussion shall be allowed, until it is decided by a vote of the House. Should it be decided in the negative the discussion may proceed; but if in the affirmative, the matter shall not again be taken up, except by a resolution to this effect carried by a majority.

## REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have done what they could to carry out the instructions of Synod. They have had four ordinary meetings during the year; two in Hamilton, in July and January, and two in Toronto, in October and April. They would take up in order the different matters that have come under their

### RED RIVER.

Mr. Nisbet arrived at his destination on the 19th July last, and since that time has been faithfully and energetically cooperating with Mr. Black. have charge of four Stations—Kildenan, Little Britain, Fairfield (Assiniboine,)

The distance between the extreme points, is 34 miles. They have each two services on Sabbath, and conduct a Bible Class. They take charge of three Prayer Meetings each week, at which an expository lecture is given. A fourth is held at Assiniboine, and conducted by the people themselves. The Presbyterian population of the settlement numbers between five and six hundred—who are nearly all Scotch, or of Scotch descent. A few are more or less allied to the Indian tribes, and a few pure Indians may be occasionally

The Church at Assiniboine is completed. It cost about \$380, of which some \$150 were contributed by the people themselves, and a little over that sum by the children of the Church, leaving \$75 yet unprovided for: but thoroughly to finish and furnish the Church there, and at Little Britain, would require \$200 additional. Two bells are very much wanted, and a good Sabbath School

In October last, Mr. Dallas, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, applied for supply of preaching at Fort Garry, five miles south of Kildonan. as being the head-quarters of the Company, and likely, in the event of the country being thrown open, to form the Town, is a point of much importance. Eight families in the neighbourhood besides the chief salesman, and several young men at the Fort, belong to our Church. Our brethren had contemplated a movement in that direction, and were only too glad to comply with the Governor's kind invitation, by granting fortnightly supply.

Your Committee would gratefully record the kindness of Governor Dallas and the Company in granting to our Church at Little Britain, 82 acres of

Most hearty resolutions have been received by your Committee passed by the people at their last Annual Congregational Meeting, expressive of their high appreciation of Mr. Nisbet's services, and their gratitude to our Church for

## THE SASKATCHEWAN MINES.

Pressing applications have been made to your Committee, to send a Missionary to Fort Edmonton, which the discovery of gold has made a point of attraction. Your Committee feel fully the force of the considerations addressed to them, and, remembering besides, the fertility of the Saskatchewan Valley, the likelihood of its being ultimately settled with an intelligent and industrious population, and the fact of its being on what will yet prove the highway of communication with British Columbia and the vast regions beyond, they

would deem it of great importance to have a Missionary settled there, with all convenient speed.

#### MISSIONS TO THE INDIANS.

In connexion with the mission to Red River, the payment, at least, of the first instalment of an old debt due by the Presbyterianism of Canada, to the "Poor Indian" was contemplated. It was not expected that, during the first year, almost any thing would be done in the way of direct effort, but, that such information would be gathered as might furnish the basis for future action. In the carrying out of this, Messrs. Black and Nisbet have done all that could be reasonably expected. They have brought under our notice, two fields possessing peculiar features of adaptation for Missionary work among the Aborigines. It will not be necessary to enlarge on these fields now, as our much esteemed brother, Mr. Nisbet, has kindly volunteered to visit us at his own expense, and to make a personal representation of their claims.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Our beloved brother continues to labour at New Westminster with much fidelity and devotedness, During the Spring, Summer, and Fall of last year, he preached forenoon and evening every Sabbath and taught a Sabbath school in the afternoon. Since the middle of November, he has conducted an additional service at the Royal Engineers' camp every Sabbath at 3 o'clock, Mrs. Jamieson

taking efficient charge of the Sabbath school.

The average attendance during the Winter has been—forenoon 90, afternoon 25, evening 50; Sabbath school children in attendance, 20; Prayer meeting every Thursday, average attendance 8, of whom 5 have led in prayer. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed on Feb. 8, being the first Presbyterian Communion in British Columbia. Fifteen names were placed on the roll, 10 males and 5 females, six for the first time, 2 have been received by certificate since;—a little flock indeed, gathered out of the lands, and representing every branch of the great Presbyterian family. It was a day much to be remembered, and led the minds of some to revert to those "footsteps of the flock," amid scenes of hallowed reminiscences, by which they were wont to "go forth," and those "shepherd's tents" far away, around which they were accustomed to "feed." Mr. Jamieson has baptized nine children, attended five funerals, and celebrated one marriage, the first marriage by any minister, except Church of England, on the soil of British Columbia.

The people of New Westminster have expended \$1,346 on the Manse, which is comfortable and commodious, on a site beautiful and commanding, with an excellent garden attached. By the efforts of your missionary \$1,300 more have been subscribed for the new church, over and above the \$300 donated by the committee. As the lots set apart for a Presbyterian church, at the laying out of the town, were not considered sufficiently central, a most eligible site has been purchased for \$100, worth three times that amount. The church will, in all probability, be fit for occupancy by this time. The Sabbath collections have amounted to \$290. The fact that within the year upwards of three thousand dollars have been collected or subscribed by a people, comparatively few and feeble, and surrounded by many difficulties and temptations, speaks well for their liberality, and for the hold which our missionary has obtained of their hearts and hands. As there was no school in the Town, Mr. Jamieson felt it to be his duty, in July last, at the urgent request of several respectable families, to devote a portion of his time to the work of education. He thus

got the opportunity of communicating a large amount of Scriptural knowledge, and through the children, of exerting an influence on the parents. He has now given up the school, having secured the services of one, who, for several years, proved a good teacher in Canada, and who attended his ministry at Yorkmills. He got the parents to guarantee \$500 for one year, and the Governor has added \$500 more; the school to be conducted on unsectarian principles, and to be managed by a committee representing each denomination. The school realized during the brief term of Mr. Jamieson's connexion with it, \$250, \$100 of which he generously handed over to the Church Building Fund, and the remaining \$150 was devoted to the erection and furnishing of a small school house, which can be rented at from 6 to 8 dollars a month.

### VANCOUVER'S ISLAND.

The esteemed representative of the Irish Presbyterian Church continues, with characteristic energy, to prosecute the work at Victoria. The foundation stone of a handsome new Church, (to cost, we understand, \$6,000) was laid lately by Chief Justice Cameron, one of the congregation.

### DEMAND FOR MORE LABOURERS.

Mr. Jameson has repeatedly urged on your Committee the importance of sending reinforcements, for there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed, and if we go not up to possess it now for Him whose right it is to reign over it, we may lose golden opportunities. In his last, he says, "As I have expressed myself so fully already on this all important question of more help from Canada, ministerial and financial, I will not dwell on that subject at present, full as I am of it every day, and almost every hour of the day.

It is not from any insensibility to their power and pathos that your Committee have not given an immediate response to these pressing appeals. Most willingly would we have sent forth one or more additional missionaries to labour in the gold fields at Cariboo, and to occupy Lytton or Lillooet, could we have done so, without involving ourselves in financial embarrassment, and doing injustice to other claims, to which, as a church, we stand partially committed. It is true we have a Capital Fund on hand, but this arose from causes which will never likely occur again, and it is desirable to reserve it for special extra demands, in whose behalf it has already been considerably drawn upon. Your Committee are of opinion that the ordinary current expenses should be met by the Annual Collection. Acting on this principle, they feel that they could not incur any additional responsibility without the consent of the Synod, for, in point of fact, the ordinary receipts have not, thus far, met the

The Committee sounded the Church through the Presbyteries on the subject of sending another missionary. Communications were sent to each of the Presbyteries, through representative members, asking their opinion on the matter, and also the names of any parties whom they deemed eligible in the event of such an appointment being found feasible. The result of these applications disposed your Committee the more to defer action.

## CORRESPONDENCE WITH CHURCHES IN SCOTLAND AND IRELAND.

Understanding that the Colonial Committee of the Free Church of Scotland might be disposed to unite with us in defraying half the expenses of a missionary from Scotland, correspondence was opened up with that Committee, intimating our willingness to enter into such a partnership, on the understanding

that whoever was sent should be placed under our supervision. Two letters have been received from Dr. Bonar, the Convener of that Committee cordially reciprocating our friendly overtures, and intimating that a special effort was about being made to raise the requisite funds, and that the Committee unanimously approved of whoever was sent being directly connected with the Canadian Church.

Your Committee further entered into correspondence with the United Presbyterian Church in Scotland, and the Presbyterian Church of Ireland. No direct reply was received from the latter, but a very friendly notice was taken of our communication in their Missionary Herald, and enough said by the respected convener of their Colonial Committee to show that our Hibernian sister is fully alive to the claims of the Far West.

A long and interesting letter has been received from Dr. Somerville, Missionary Agent of the United Presbyterian Church, a portion of which has appeared in the *Record*. The decision of their Committee with reference to our appeal was to the effect that "the growing claims of the Missions which they are already pledged to support, put it out of their power to comply with your request."

#### PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF THE LOWER PROVINCES.

Your Committee have enjoyed pleasant fraternal correspondence with the Presbyterian Church in the Lower Provinces. Our Synod's grant of \$500 for their New Hebrides Mission (equal to the support of one Missionary for a year,) was gratefully acknowledged.

In this connexion, we would notice that we are favoured with the presence of Mr. James D. Gordon, a Missionary elect of the Nova Scotian Church, who will soon set sail in the Children's Ship for his far distant field of labour. Mr. Gordon is brother to the late lamented Rev. George Gordon, the second Martyr of Erromanga. It is true Christian heroism in him thus readily to volunteer for the post yet wet with the blood of a beloved brother and sister. He has been enabled to say "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself." As he goes bound in spirit to that field of blood we will follow him with our prayers, that he may be hid in the Pavilion of Jehovah, and that amid those coral gems which sparkle in the bosom of the Pacific—

#### "Where every prospect pleases, And only man is vile,"

he may have great doors and effectual opened for him though there be many adversaries.

#### ONE VOLUNTEER.

Your Committee have pleasure in reporting that one of the most promising of our students, who has just completed his curriculum, has offered his services for the Foreign Mission Field wherever the Committee may choose to send him. We would that there were more such, and that when they do thus respond to the call of Christ and the Church "whom shall I send and who will go for us,"—and the call of the perishing "come over and help us," by saying, "Here am I, send me"—our people, by an increased liberality, would place us in a position to avail ourselves of such voluntary consecration.

The Congregational Collections amounted to \$2,798 23, the expenditure to \$3,521 41. The balance on hand amounts to \$5,590 99. This is encouraging, considering the monetary pressure that has been too severely felt in some parts of the Province. Still, taking into account the increasing numbers and resources of our Church, and the weight of our obligations, it comes far short of what we might and should do. The English Presbyterian Church, with numbers not much over a third of ours, collected last year for their

### MACHINERY NEEDED.

Your Committee are impressed with the idea, that had we the suitable machinery in operation, in all our Congregations and Sabbath Schools for the development of a systematic beneficence, we could realize yet greater things than we have ever attained or anticipated. While not disparaging the importance of our Annual Collections, your Committee feel how precarious and insufficient is the foundation which it supplies. They would strongly recommend the formation of Missionary Associations. These where they have been formed, in our Congregations already, have elicited a Missionary feeling, and enlisted personal effort which would otherwise have lain dormant in the Church, have secured the regular presentation of the great Missionary Enterprise periodically before the people's minds and have increased their contributions fourfold. Let each Congregation, where it is feasible, be divided into small districts; let one or two Collectors be appointed to each, and subscriptions be taken up monthly by the Collectors, on a day to be intimated from the pulpit the previous Sabbath, and we are persuaded the result would astonish us. The scheme of Congregational Monthly Contributions for Missions recommended by the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, will be published in an early number of the Record, and will shew the machinery by which their Missionary resources have risen from £1,650, in 1835, to £31,000, in 1862. By this, or some other similar course that may better commend itself to the brethren, we shall realize the truth of a remark made by Dr. Somerville, in a letter already referred to-"I believe that when the Spirit shall be more fully poured out, and the claims of Christ better felt, it will be seen, that, in the school of benevolence, we are not much past the alphabet."

Your Committee feel increasingly the importance of deepening and intensifying the interest of our children, in the Missionary work. Of late years, the improvement in this respect is marked, and furnishes ground of encouragement.

Your Committee would recommend that once a month, say, the first week of each month, our regular weekly meetings should assume a Missionary character. They would further recommend that, as far as practicable, on the first Saturday evening of every month, one hour, say between 8 and 9, be set apart for special prayer in behalf of Missions in general, and our own Missions in particular.

Your Committee would conclude by affectionately urging on our faithful people, more fervent and believing prayer, more enlarged and enlightened liberality, and more direct personal effort, that we may not, as a Church, lag behind in the great work of the world's evangelization. This day is to us a day of good tidings. If we hold our peace, mischief shall befall us. We are our brothers' keepers; and if we be not found faithful to this trust, we will be convicted as verily guilty concerning our brother, and the voice of our brother's blood will testify against us. The Lord hath been mindful of us. He hath enlarged our coast, and blessed us indeed. If we altogether hold our peace,

then shall enlargement and deliverance come to these perishing ones from another place; and who knoweth but that we have come to the kingdom, and reached our present elevation for such a time as this. But we are persuaded better things of a Church to which the glorious Head has given a banner, because of the truth. Having opened our mouth to the Lord, we will not go back. We will go forward. We will come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty—till the Prince of this world be cast out, and the standard of salvation wave triumphantly over his remotest stronghold.
