- (3.) That the Walpole Circuit fall into the care of the Missionary Committee, as a Mission.
- (4.) That Walsingham Station have leave to erect a Chapel. Economy to be exercised, as the Mission Fund cannot assist in any erection.
- (10.) That in all cases where the Stations do not contribute their just proportion to the respective Funds, they be reported, and the cases printed in the Minutes.
- (11.) That the Stations shall not be required, in future, to send subscriptions to the Conference and Relief Funds, for Members on Trial.
- (12.) That each District Meeting shall appoint a Board of three persons, to examine probationers, as to their studies, and especially in regard to the course of reading specified in Regulation 24th of the Can-

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ada Conference Minutes, 1855; and that as soon as possible after each District Meeting such Examiners shall prepare and place in the hands of each probationer a List of Questions on the specified reading; and that the said Examination shall take place one day before, or at the time of the District Meeting, as the said Examiners may appoint. Moreover, the said Board shall correspond with each probationer once or twice in the year, by way of encouragement and instruction; and should they find, that from distance or other just cause, any of the probationers cannot attend the examinations, they shall appoint some fit person in the vicinity of the probationer to examine him; which examination shall take place not less than *twenty-one days before District Meeting, and of which a Report shall be sent to the Board of Examiners; and that the said Board shall make a Report to the District Meeting, as to the mental aud ministerial progress of the probationers within its jurisdiction.

That all our Missionaries on Mission Stations are required to take up at least four week evening preaching appointments, except they be engaged in Protracted Meetings, or other important Services; and a Plan of the Station, to accompany the Quarterly Report, regularly sent to the Missionary Committee.
- (17.) That the Conference expresses its sympathy with Brother Lyle in his weakness, and on his retiring from the active work; and trusts he may be long spared to assist the Connexion with his counsel and prayers.
- (18.) That the Addresses now read be approved of, and sent to the Wesleyan, New Connexion, Episcopal, and Bible Christian Conferences; to the Connexion in Britain; and to the Eastern and Western States Conferences, United States, Also that the Pastoral Address be accepted; and the Address to the House of Assembly, to resist Intemperance and the Desecration of the Sabbath.

DEAR FRIENDS,

We, your Ministers and Representatives, assembled in Conference, for the transaction of business concerning the welfare of our Zion, address you once more. Another year has gone, with its labours, privileges, and opportunities of usefulness; and we hope that some progress has been made by us all in the way of holiness. We again assure you of our unabated affection; and that our aim has been, through all the anxiety and deliberations of Conference, your good and the extention of the work of God in the land.

In laying before you a few particulars of our state, we beg to say: a W - boil of beloneh what ed su tol.

1st. That the Session of Conference has been characterized for general peace and harmony, and though widely different views have sometimes been taken on various subjects, there has notwithstanding, been a general oneness of feeling. The Conference has had to deal with some difficult and perplexing cases, an hopes that with respect to them it has been guided by wisdom that cometh from above.

2nd. As to our numerical state, we are happy to inform you that the great Head of the Church has given to his servants souls for their hire, and seals to their ministry; for, after making up for the loss of 279 members by removals and 17 by deaths, we report a nett increase of 309 members.

3rd. Our friends are in as good condition, on the whole, circumstances considered, as we can expect them to be. The great pressure of the times has necessarily affected our revenues, and hence the Missionary fund particularly has sustained loss, in consequence of which we have not been able to meet all demands.

4th. The Religious Services connected with Conference have been deeply interesting, and we trust profitable. Four of our young Brethren, who had honourably finished their Ministerial probation, were publicly received into our regular Ministry. It was an impressive service; and our earnest prayer is, that God would bless them, and make them a blessing.

Having given you this brief information, we submit to you a few considerations respecting the all-important duties of the Christian life.

Let us be truly devoted to God. What is any Church without this? and what can it do for God's glory, land the salvation of man? Just as a Church is minus in this, it is unreal, and outward only; and in the same proportion, it fails to accomplish the end of its existence. Warm and deep devotedness to God lise and must ever be the true life of the Church. Spitituality

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nand iality of mind; and nearness of soul to God, gives reality, efficiency, and glory to the Christian Church. Let us, dear friends, never forget this; and therefore offer our bodies and souls a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable unto God, which is our reasonable service.

Let us be holy. We are called unto holiness: to be perfected in love. Clean hearts, right spirits, and the bliss and usefulness they involve, form our glorious heritage as the people of God. Oh! how much happiness we might enjoy; how much elevated above the world we might live; how sublime and heavenly might be our spiritual state; and what blessings we might prove to each other, and to precious souls, if entire holiness were the experience of all who are members with us! This would enable us to enjoy ourselves in God, and be blessedly useful to our families, to the Church, and to the world.

Let us have the welfare of the Church at heart, and zealously promote its interests. We know that the prosperity of the Church consists in the revival and spread of vital religion. The Church must be extended: souls must be converted: the truth must prevail: and the song of salvation must ultimately sound through the earth. God has chosen his Church as the great instrument, in connection with the influence of his Holy Spirit, to accomplish his gracious purposes, relative to the conversion and happiness of fallen man. Let us, dear friends, feel our position; and in the exercise of every talent and all our means, act our part in helping the Church in her mission of mercy to man.

Let us be importunate and fervent in prayer. This is necessary; for, whatever we do beside, with a view to promote the work of God, without the efficacy of

prayer, we cannot have great success in our religious operations; but, if we fervently and believingly pray in connection with our zealous and persevering efforts to promote true religion in the world, we enlist the influence of the Holy Spirit upon all we do.

Dear Brethren, be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know your labour shall not be in vain in the Lord. May the God of all Grace bless you in body and soul, and prosper you in all good, is the prayer of our hearts.

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Address of the Canadian Conference

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Of the Primitive Methodist Church,

TO THE ENGLISH CONFERENCE.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Grace be multiplied unto you, and the Israel of God. It is with no ordinary degree of pleasure that we again present you our Annual Address, from this distant field of the Master's work; the more so, as we still look up to you as our Parent, and feel the close relation existing between us. It is a source of pleasure to us to remember your past success: the difficulties you have surmounted: the privations you have endured: the sacrifices you have made, and the trophies you have won, which will be only fully known when the great Shepherd shall appear.

It inspires us with confidence to look our trials in the face, when we call to mind the origin, the growth and the present status of Primitive Methodism throughout the world. Our past year, in the Canadas, has been marked by the greatest financial difficulties of the last half century. Nearly all our Institutions in the New World have tottered under the pressure, and many have fallen. Our Church in common with others, has been burdened, and is still struggling with difficulties. We are looking to Got to help us, and shall follow the "Cloud," knowing that He will shall us, and that right early as Alex mature deliberation, our Conference tappointed two of our Ministers, Bros.

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Barrass and Boyle, to visit your Conference, as our Representatives, and get your sanction to allow these brethren to visit your work, hold public meetings, set the peculiarities of our Church before the Christians of England, and receive their pecuniary support for our Missions. England is noted for its Missionary spirit, and it will still retain that character until the affrighted spirits of darkness seek their own place, and Jesus reigns the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

Notwithstanding the panic which has convulsed our country, we have made progression numerically. You will be pleased to hear, that after supplying all deficiencies, we report an increase of 309 members. To God be all the praise. We regret to report that one of our senior Ministers, who has long laboured in word and doctrine among us, and whose praise is in all the Churches, is compelled, through mental infirmities, to retire from the actual work: we refer to Father Wm. Lyle. We trust that God will yet, for years, protract his invaluable life, that he may assist us by his counsel and presence; and then, Aaron-like, be gathered to the land of the blest. We have lost a young Minister, who could not live upon the small income of a Primitive Methodist Minister, and therefore has gone elsewhere!

The important grant from the English Missionary Society has enabled us to assist our young and struggling Missions, which otherwise could not subsist. The genuine results arising from the labours of our Missionaries on those Stations cannot be fully known until the Saviour gathers His people into the rest which remains for the people of God.

we are still under the necessity of casting ourselves empon your for further help; and pray that God may

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elves may assist you in all things, according to His will. The appointment of Bro. John Davison as Missionary Secretary and General Book Steward has been of signal benefit, and we hope that the coming year will be still more so.

Our Conference has been the most agreeable. The Members assembled have been remarkably united: oneness of feeling has characterised the Session: love and peace have abounded. General and deep sympathy with our present embarrassment has been expressed by all present; and the earnest prayer of the Conference follow the Deputation to visit you shortly.

And now, dear Fathers and Brethren, our object is the same as yours,—to bring a revolted world back to God: to bind up the broken-hearted: to loose the captive: to strengthen the weak: to save the lost: and to stud the crown of Jehovah-Jesus with imperishable gems—the souls of human beings. We wish you great and manifold good from the riches of God's grace. May you abound and increase in all power, and wisdom, and love, until the Master shall say, "Well done, good and faithful servants, enter ye into the joy of your Lord."
