BUSY PATCHING UP DIFFERENCES

NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN JAPAN AND CHINA

Agreement Covering Manchuria Questions Will Be Signed Soon.

Pekin, Sept. 1.-China and Japan have concluded their negotiations o the general Manchurian questions that have been in dispute for some time.

The two countries soon will sign an agreement under which China agrees not to construct the Sinmintun-Faku men railroad without consulting Japan agrees that should the Kirin railroad be extended to the Korean border, half the capital required shall be borrowed from Japan; that Japan shall have the right to work the mines in the Fushun and Yentai districts: that Japan shall construct the extension of the Yinkow railroad; that there shall be joint exploitation of the mines in the zone reached by the Manchurian and Antung-Mukden railroads: that China shall open four trade marts in the Chien Tao district between Korea and Manchuria, the Koreans living therein to be under the jurisdiction of Japa and those residing outside to be under the jurisdiction of China, except tha Japan shall have the right to hold court in capital cases, and that Japan may move the station of the South Manchurian railroad to Mukden.

A catalogue with notes on the birds of Canada was then pul lished, giving information as to their nesting habits and distribution. This has been out of print or some time past, and a second edition with additional notes is now in the press and will be published in the near future.


