It is curious that the only memorial of John Bright is to be found in Victoria Park. It consists of a drinking fountain of polished grey granite. Free water thus commemorates cheap bread! Queen Anne's Gate there is a stone statue of Queen Anne. It is believed to have been erected in the 18th century through the loyalty of William Patterson, the founder of the Bank of England. The children of the locality were accustomed in their play to call the statue by the name of "Bloody Queen Mary" and to assail it with missiles.






