The Italian army, on a peace foot-ing, includes 14,121 officers, 250,000 other ranks and 55,727 horses. On a war strength the army can be raised o more than one million men by adding 515,000 for the standing army, and 245,000 for the first class territorials, in addition to an unorganized but partly drilled militia force numering more than 1,000,000.

There is reported to be ample equipment for all arms of the service. Since the war broke out, with the pos-sibility that Italy might become involved, special attention has been given to the training of the unorganized forces, and those who have carefully observed this development are auth-ority for the statement that Italy is


"BAN " JOHNSON. "

The leader of the American League started the ball rolling when he said that baseball never should have been taken into the courts. This change of front of Johnson's is really amazing. From the first he championed a bitter battle against the Federals. The American League boss refused to entertain any peace proposals. War without quarter was his slogan. Johnson, however, has seen a light and is willing to take a more conciliatory attitude toward the Feds.
