Doherty, and both were taken from the waters of the Matapedia by Mr. Thomas, manager of the Bank of New Brunswick at Sussex.

The details of the capture of the largest of these salmon have now reached St. John through a courier de foot on the trail from Campbellton to St. John.

**Italian Shoots Com Patriot During Drunken Row Four Times and he is in a Very Serious Condition—Still at Large**

**A DRUNKEN SPREE**

STOCKTON, Aug. 9.—As the result of a drunken row, one of a party of about twenty five Italians was shot at four times by one of his companions at about 11:30 o'clock last night at Beechwood, which is on the St. John River, a short distance from Centreville. The Italian is not expected to recover, and murder will probably be the outcome of the affair.

The reports which have reached Woodstock are as yet meagre, but it has been learned that the crowd of Italians have been engaged in the construction work of the C. P. R. Sunday afternoon, it appears, they all began drinking, and by night every one of the Italians was very much under the influence of liquor. Late Sunday evening a row occurred over some unknown matter, and ere much time was given for consideration, one of the Italians took aim and deliberately shot at one of his companions with a revolver four times in quick succession. **KING MANUEL TO VISIT ENGLAND IN OCTOBER**

Will Afterwards Stop in Paris and Madrid on the Way Home

LONDON, Aug. 9.—According to the official arrangements for King Alfonso's foreign tour next winter His Majesty will leave here for England November 23 on board Queen Alexandra's Yacht Sea Royal, escorted by the Portuguese cruiser Don Carlos I, and a squadron of British warships. After leaving England King Edward passes eight days in Paris and three days in Madrid. No mention is made in the program of a visit to Germany.

**WILL CELEBRATE WHEN LAS. SPIKE IS DRIVEN**

St. Leonard's to Hold Festivities Next Month on Completion of International—Mr. Malcolm Reports good Progress Being Made.

Mr. Thomas Malcolm, the contractor for the construction of the International Railway from St. Leonard's to Campbellton, was in St. John last week on his return from Portland and other places in Maine. When Mr. Malcolm left the north, the work on the railway was progressing favorably and he expected to have the road completed about the middle of September. When the last spike of the railway is driven at St. Leonard's, it will be accompanied by appropriate ceremonies to mark the completion of the road. Mr. Malcolm said the rolling stock for the railway, including locomotives and passenger cars, had all been ordered and a considerable quantity was already on the ground. The prospect for traffic on the new railway look very encouraging, though the development of the new country to be opened up has barely begun.

Mr. Malcolm spoke of the devastation worked by forest fires and said the "cost" of keeping them under control during the dry season was very heavy. The actual loss from fire, he said, on the North Shore, would not amount to very much.
