The Lake Shore people handled twenty special trains of 200 coaches and sleepers, and carried between 12,000 and 15,000 passengers without a hitch or a jar in the arrangements.

was made to secure figures for all varieties of industry, the investigators confining themselves chiefly to agricultural implement and iron working laborers. As these two industries are among the best and oldest in the State it was considered that an inquiry among them would give an idea of how the better THE Grand Army of the Republic, now classes of workmen live. No less than 8,838 workmen were visited

and questioned upon such subjects as to whether they owned the houses in which they lived; if there were incumbrances on their property; if they carried life insurance, and to what amount; the critical life insurance, and to what amount; the extent of their wages and of their savings; whether or not they owned pianos and sewing machines, and a variety of other queries. It was found that out of the 8,838 to whom these queries were put, one earned \$40 a week, 8 from \$30 to \$40, and 125 from \$20 to \$30, while at the other end of the pay-roll were a dozen boys who reselved but \$2 a week, and 322 more with \$3 or less. About 15 per cent. re-ceived \$15 or over, and more than 17 per cent. less than \$7, while the average for the whole number, married and single men, was \$10 06, and that for the married men, \$11.50. The average total amount for a year was \$467, the married men averaging \$525. This is not a very large annual inome on which to support a family, and yet 69 per cent. of the families visited owned sewing machines; 67 per cent. took news papers and magazines; half of the entire number were subscribers of daily papers,

A fourth of the whole number of men were insured, the average amount being nearly \$1,500, and 40 per cent. saved money last year. 




