Geo. Roberts Ruined by a Fascination for Gambling.

Despondent and Penniless He Swallows Several Cunces of Laudanum— Pathetic Letter Left by the Unfortunate Man,

An Orillia dispatch of Saturday says: George Roberts, a commercial traveler, committed suicide here Friday night. The story of his death is more than ordinarily pathetic and shows to what lengths the fascination of gambling will lead a man. For years Roberts traveied all through Ontario for Millburn & Co., and no harder working or more popular man was on the road. He was only 28 years of age, fine looking and of splendid physique, standing over six feet high and weighing 220 pounds. He was doing well with Millburn & Co., but A FASCINATION FOR POKER PLAYING ruined him. He tried time and again to quit the game, only to find himself once more drawn to the table, till finally he had to give up his position, owing the firm, it is said, several hundred dollars. This was several months ago, and he foreswore poker playing for all time, but when in London a month ago he once more became its slave, and lost \$50 at one sitting. He was jobbing in cigars for Brener Bros., London, aud came here on Friday, Oct. 21. He had \$100 in his pocket and had no difficulty in getting into a little game of draw. It started in the atternoon, and wore along with varying successes till tea time, and it finally narrowed down till three others and deceased were the only players left. As three of the bottles on the dresser were labeled laudanum he locked the room and notified Dr. Beatton, coroner, of the circumstances in connection with deceased's death. This morning an inquest was held at the Orillia House. After the jury had been sworn in and had viewed the body the coroner informed them that the deceased to the proprietor of the hotel, which he thought would probably aid them in arriving at a decision, and accordingly the seal was broken. Brooklyn, N. Y., Oct. 30.—Dr. Talmage preached this morning from Jeremiah viii., 7: "The stork in the heavens knoweth her appointed time; and the turtle, and the crane, and the swallow observe the time of their coming; but my people know not the judgment of the Lord."

My text speaks of four birds of beautiful instinct—the stork, of such strong affection that it is allowed familiarly to come in Holland and Germany and build its nest over the doorway; the sweet dispositioned turtle-dove, mingling in color white, and black, and brown, andashen, and chestnut; the crane, with voice like the clank of a trumpet; the swallow, swift as a dart shot out of the bow of heaven, falling, mounting, skimming, sailing—four birds started by the prophet 25 centuries ago, yet fying on through the ages, with rousing truth under glossy wing and in the clutch of stout claw. I suppose it may have been this very season of the year—autumn—and the prophet out-of-doors, thinking of the impenitunce of the people of the day, hears a great cry overhead.



At one time it was thought that the Canadian people might have to take in their houses and lots over-night if the regular soldiers formerly stationed in this city, Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto and Hamilton were withdrawn, but had their eyes opened when the troops were ordered out of Canada shortly after the end of the civil war in the United States. Since that time the Dominion has added millions of miles of territory to itself, and yet has had no need to plead for the return of the British regular army. The fact is that so long as the Canadian people choose they can keep out of war. They have peace-loving neighbors, who mango to run a vast republic with an army of 25,000, and even that number would be unnecessary but for the unsettled condition of the Indian and border territories. FAIR PLAY FOR THE WEST.

The largely attended meeting of the bar of Western Ontario held in this city last week shows that the profession is in earnest n its modest attempt to have the authoriies provide more reasonable facilities for transacting court business outside of To-

There was perfect unanimity among those ssembled in regard to the resolution that it was in the public interest that a weekly sitting for the hearing of high court motions should be held by a superior court judge in this city, and the information from the places unrepresented at the gathering thowed that Western Ontario was virtually manimous on this score. Of the 39 places n the counties of Middlesex, Essex, Kent, Lambton, Elgin, Oxford, Perth and Huron, o which petitions for signatures by practice titioners were sent, 33 returned the petitions signed almost unanimously, and it is found that very few lawyers in the west are not in favor both of the weekly sittings and of the establishment of a law school at London. Indeed, out of a total of 304, no fewer than 232 have signed the petition—that is three-fourths of the whole. The lawyers of Chatham, one of the most important centers in the Western Peninsula, have met and passed resolutions stronger than the petition. The bar of Windsor and other leading places has also signified and other leading places has also signified its intention of giving the movement hearty support, while at the meeting Messrs. Idington, Q.C., J. P. Mabee, and Sydney Smith, Q.C., speaking for the Stratford district, said the bar there was not only at one with those who desired weekly sittings at London, but would aid in any movement to have similar facilities for the speedy transaction similar facilties for the speedy transaction of business in the cast.

The Advertiser has given its aid to the support of this most desirable agitation, and believes it will be crowned with suc-cess if those in charge of it continue to act in unity and with energy. Some people look on the agitation as merely a scheme to benefit lawyers personally. That is a mistaken assumption. The public outside of Toronto and neighborhood are vitally interested in the proposition. None of us want to go to law, but in defense of that which we believe to be right some of us have at times to ask the aid of the lawyers. If a western barrister has to go to Toronto to make every little motion that is necessary in high court procedure, he pays his way in the first instance, but no ne needs to be told that the bill has finally to be footed by his client. Thus both lawyer and client are put to much unnecessary inonvenience and expense.

Instead of the 300 odd lawyers being ompelled to go to Toronto is it not more easonable that one of the well-paid judges in that city should journey westward once a week and let the lawyers do the business

The point that we now desire to empha The point that we now desire to empha-size is this: The lawyers are virtually unani-mous, but they deserve and should receive the co-operation of every commercial and civic board. The matter should be brought before the London Board of Trade and the expose of the decadence of Mr. Carling, even among his political friends. LESSON FROM THE GREAT FIRE. The moral to be drawn from the Milwaukee fire, which involved millions of dollars worth of loss as well as a sacrifice of life, is that it is dangerous to have a large quantity of such inflammable materia as coal oil stored in the heart of a great city. Despite the fact that the wind was blowing at the hurricane rate of 50 or 60 miles an hour, it would have been possible for such a well-manned fire department as that of Milwaukee to have quenched

Let that be understood, and we can welcome the day when Canada whall be the independent architect of her own fortune, craving military supervision from no old world nation.

AN ODD OBJECTION. TO CLOSE TRADE RELATIONS.

The advocates of trade restriction in

Canada are compelled to resort to strange expedients for the purpose of maintaining their illogical position. Here is the Van cover (B. C.) Telegram warning Canadians generally, and particularly British Columpians, to beware of closer relations with any country which pursues such pernicious and destructive methods of agriculture as prevail in the United States. Of the United States system of wheat cultivation, our

States system of wheat cultivation, our contemporary says:

"Millions of acres of rich wheat land in the Northern and Western States have been rendered barren and worthless by a scourging system of agriculture, which grew wheas year after year on the same land while it would continue to yield anything, and then abandoned it to repeat the operation on fresh soil. All the best wheat lands in the United States have been damaged by this method of proceeding, much of it beyond remedy, till the average yield of wheat in the United States on good and bad land is now less than fourteen bushels an acre on the average, that is to say, is less than about half a crop."

Thirteen years ago, that is to say in 1879, the average production of wheat per acre

the average production of wheat per acr in the United States was 12.97 bushels. Now it appears, according to our western contemporary, that the average yield has dwindled from 12.97 to about 14 bushels. There has been no such disastrous falling away in the wheat yield of our neighbors as the Telegram would have us infer. But if it were true that the United States farmer are so improvident, and so utterly regard less of their best interests, as to pursue the worst system of farming, would not that be the very best argument why Canada should welcome free trade between the two countries? The less the United States farmers raise, the greater will be the demand for Canadian produce.

But we are not so very sure that
we can afford to throw stones at the
United States. There has been too
much tendency on this side of the
border to take as much out of the soil as could be obtained, and give as little as possible back. That we have a better farming country in Ontario than is possessed by the average State over the border, and wheat-growing lands in the Northwest equal to the best that there are in the equal to the best that there are used in many States, and superior to those found in many States, surely does not supply a reason why our farmers should be kept isolated from the markets that are presented to them over the border. In spite of the high tariffs that prevail on both sides of the lines Canadians now find it profitable to sell to and buy from their neighbors. If these tariffs were thrown down international trade would be enormously acceler ated, and both parties to the bargaining ated, and both parties to the harden would be very much benefited. In a country like ours, where we produce wheat that averages 23 bushels to the acre, as was the case last year, and other cereals in proportion, we need no warning against entering into an honorable trade arrangement with our neighbors. Canadian ment with our neighbors. Canadian farmers can hold their own if they have the right to make the most of their earnings, and for that matter so can any industry now in the country that is not seeking, by undue tariff advantages, to profit at the expense of the consuming public.

It is absurd to suggest that freedom of trade would promote slevenly farming in Canada. On the contrary, it would stimulate and train our farmers to produce the best. In some parts of Canada isolation has resulted in 11 intenance of primitive methods of culti-ration, to the serious disadvantage of those directly affected. But in this Ontario of ours, and in the west, as it develops, farmers, to the extent of their means, may be expected to adopt the best possible aids to their industry that are presented. What they need is a fair field and no favor. They have not had that in the past. Their substance has been taken to bolster up the millionaire combines of Montreal, Toronto and Halifax, and the bleeding process has not only injured the agriculturist, but the numerous independent industries that they sup-port in the various cities, towns and

villages throughout the country. THE GREAT HAT QUESTION.




