

CRUEL BEATINGS BY

Evelyn Thaw in Affidavit Tells of Brutal Treatment While in Paris.

New York, March 18 .- When the Thaw trial was adjourned today but four expert witnesses were to be examined before the taking of evidence

Three experts were disposed of today in a little more than an hour, so it is generally believed that the last word of evidence may be uttered in the famous trial tomorrow. In that event the summing up by Mr. Delmas for the defense will begin Wednesday morning. District Attorney Jerome will reply on Thursday. Justice Fitzgerald may proceed immediately with his charge to the jury or he may defer it after the money she thought you would until Friday. The affidavit proved a surprise only as to the sever-K. 



At a meeting of No. 1 committee, held yesterday afternoon, deputations from the Real Estate Association, the Retail Grocers and Trades and Labor Council waited on the committee and urged that telephone competition be given the people of London. Messrs. J. M. Parson and Wm. Scar-

row represented the real estaters; Mr. C. H. Lee, the grocers, and H. B. Archer, the labor men. All had been to Buffalo to see the independent phones working there. After hearing the arguments put in favor of competition, the

committee decided to send a deputation to Buffalo at the expense of the city to inspect the independent phones and report on the effects of competi-

It was argued that as the delegates who addressed the meeting had gone to Buffalo at the expense of the Ontario Long Distance Independent Telephone Company, they had probably been shown the best side of the matter by those who had the delegation in charge. Consequently it was only fair to the city of London that a report be secured by men who will proceed in their investigations on their own hook, and without being under a compliment to any company seeking a franchise in London. At its meeting last night the council sanctioned the

sending of the deputation. the action of the committee. They falling off of their opponents, got the feel as though they are under the stigma of having been influenced by the fact that their expenses were paid by the independents, whereas they claim they went about their investigations in the most thorough and unbiassed manner, and gave their honest opinions on the phone matter to the committee.
