MR. BRYCE SAVES FROM GALLOWS

Pittsburg Murderer Given Respite at Request of British Ambassador.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 26.-William McLeod McDonald, the Scotchman who was to have been hanged here today for the murder of Bessie Smith, his common-law wife, is still alive, thanks alone to the intercession of Right Hon, James Bryce, the British ambassador at Washington. After Governor Stuart had refused to listen to the appeal of James W. Drape, a wealthy local Scotchman, Andrew Carnegie, who had been interested, and well known men, Governor other Stuart granted a stay upon the personal appeal of Ambassador Bryce. In doing so Governor Stuart declared that he believed the man should suffer the death penalty, but that he could not ignore the request of Great Britain's representative. Governor Stuart's respite is until April 28. In the meantime Mr. Drape and other Scotchmen are raising a fund, which will amount to \$1,000, for the purpose of employing attorneys, and defraying the expenses of a new trial, which they hope to have the courts grant. The claim will be made that McDonald is insane and that he did not have a proper trial.

In support of the insanity plea the fact will be prominently brought out that even since the move was started to have a respite granted for him, Mc-Donald attempted to interfere on the grounds that the woman's ghost had visited him in his cell and declared that her death must be avenged.

The crime for which McDonald was sentenced to die was a particularly atroclous one. On Sept. 18, 1907, Mc-Donald discovered a letter in the possession of the woman with whom he had been living for several years and with whom he had eloped from England.
