Ottawa, June 5 .- Parliament expected to receive news of a decision on the political impasse some time today. The intimation that it would be forthcoming depended upon what stand Sir Wilfrid Laurier would take on the coalition proposal he has been considering with his lieutenants.

LAST CONSIDERATION. All the opinions that Sir Wilfrid sought are now in his hands and he was giving them, it is understood, a last consideration today. He is expected to deliver his decision to Sir Robert Borden, the prime minister, orally. This morning the movements of the leader of the Opposition were, therefore, carfully watched, but he remained in his office at the Parliament Buildings until past noon. SUPPRESSED EXCITEMENT.

Paris, June 5.-By a vote of 453 to 55, the Chamber of Deputies, n secret session, has adopted a resolution declaring that peace conditions must include the liberation of territories occupied by Germany, the return of Alsace-Lorraine to France, and just reparation for damage done in the invaded regions. The resolution, which was accepted by the Government, also favors the creation of a league of nations for the maintenance of peace. The secret session, which was adjourned from Satur day, continued all yesterday afternoon and evening until midnight.

#### THE WAR SITUATION

All the familiar signs which heral

a great offensive are reported from the British front in France, and everything points to the near ap-proach of a resumption of fighting on a great scale in the western front. The thunder of the British guns in-creases daily in volume, while trench raids and other feintings for posi-A Significant Report.

The most interesting feature in the meagre official reports is the repeated announcement of a tremendous artillery duel in progress around the little Belgian village of Wytschaete, about five miles south of Ypres. From this point as far south as the famous Vimy Ridge, 30 miles away, the guns are roaring day and night, apparently indicating that Gen. Haig has chosen this wide sector for his next big blow. In this connection it is recalled that Gen. Maurice, director-general of military operations, predicted some weeks ago that the next British offensive

would be on a vaster scale than any which preceded it.

May Drive on Lille.

Wytschaete marks the head of a short salient held by the Germans south of Ypres. This salient is roughly three miles deep and roughly three miles deep and averages about the same extent in width Its great importance lies in the fact that it is the only high land between the British and Lille. Once in the possession of the British their guns would command the broad plain between the plateau and Lille, a distance of about ten miles. In Field of Politics.

The relative lull in the war theatres has had no counterpart in the field of politics, where events are making rapidly. The opening of the Austrian Parliament has caused something akin to consternation in the German press and the pan-Ger man organs especially are filled with gloomy predictions over the political situation in the Dual Monarchy. Their uneasiness is largely based on the fact that the German party is in a very marked minority in the Austrian Chamber of Deputies, while the fall of Count Tisza in Hungary has given renewed confidence to the Czech and other anti-German ele-

In Russia the situation remains confused and obscured by all man-ner of conflicting and sensational reports. Two events, however, hav given fresh heart to well-wishers of the infant republic. The first is the nearing arrival in Petrograd of the American commission and the second is the appointment of Gen. Brussiloff as commander-in-chief of Russia's army. Gen. Brussiloff enjoys the reputation of being not only a brilliant field commander, but a strong and self-reliant man, and his dication that Minister of War Kerensky's promise of a vigorous administration was not an idle boast.

The Junkers.
The Prussian junkers are still putting forward extravagant programs of annexations and indemnities. They have apparently abandoned the idea of a separate peace with Russia, and are now discussing the dismemberment of that country. SURVIVORS PICKED UP.

One of the enemy destroyers, the S-20 was sunk by our gunfire and another severely damaged. Seven survivors from the S-20 have been picked up and made prisoner. ### Mr. J. Ogden Armour's Message To His Countrymen---"HAVE FAITH."

Mr. J. Ogden Armour, Chicago meat packer, and member of the Illinois State council of defence and of the advisory committee of the council of national defence, recently gave the following interview to the New York Times, from which newspaper it is quoted:

"The prompt adoption by the American people of the 'business as usual' idea is going to enable this nation to prosecute war without experiencing a temporary depression such as England and France have recently recovered from," Mr. Armour said today. "Modern war requires the expenditure of huge sums of money and means maximum employment and high wages for all work-ers. Other conditions peculiar to this war make it certain that this nation will enjoy a period of business and industrial activity the like of which has never been seen, and which is assured whether the war lasts several months or several

Speaking of the possibility that overcautiousness might result from war Speaking of the possibility that overcautiousness might result from war economy suggestions. Mr. Armour said: "Economy rules will be misapplied for a while, but conditions are such that the public will soon see, if they have not already, that there is no occasion whatever for them to become alarmed. They will have more money to spend than ever before, and they will not find the things they want disappearing from the market. There is an abnormal demand for everything the workers of this country can grow or manufacture. There is work at high wares for every man and woman who warts work." work at high wages for every man and woman who wants work."

Of the billions to be lent to the Allies, Mr. Armour said: "It is a misnomer to call it a loan to our Allies. We are primarily extending them credit. Instead of sending billions of dollars out of the country, the transaction means that billions of dollars will actually be freed for circulation n this country, through purchases of our products. And in this connection, remember, the Government of the United States is now a buyer for war purposes and the dollars of Uncle Sam have already begun to pour forth to stores, facories, and farms, to pay for the expense of mobilizing, drilling, equipping and eeding the army and navy.

"Under the civilian boards gathered together by the president to direct the great work of preparation, this nation is going ahead, fortified against delay and mistakes through the intelligent application of the lessons learned in England and in France. This applies to industry as well as war. There is abundant evidence that we are profiting from the experience of Europe, and that our president and his advisers are going to prevent any industrial hitch such as prethe prosperous business conditions now prevailing in the British Isles and

national prosperity in my memory. There is not one good reason why the business of this country should not proceed in its normal course and on ever-increasing lines. There is not one reason why people should fear for the future or should permit themselves to be swayed from the certainty that they are on a sound financial basis. The per capita wealth of Americans today is greater than ever before-greater than that of the people of any nation at any time in he past or in the present. Our national wealth is past the wildest dreams of ew years back.

"Labor is satisfactorily employed and at record wages. Every day that the war lasts will find a greater demand for the labor and the brains of the wage and salary earners of the United States. Certainty of work and certainty of wages are the prime factors of prosperity. They make prosperity certain.

"Whether the war ends tomorrow, or whether it lasts indefinitely, this nuch is certain: the United States, having possession of approximately 40 per ent of the world's supply of gold, the greatest natural resources, and georaphical isolation, is certain to suffer less than any other nation in the war or in the entire world.

"The future of preparation is secure; our prosperity is founded on safe grounds, our labor situation is remarkably good, and I cannot conceive of a sane or justifiable reason why the people of the United States should become alarmed over any phase of the martial, business, or industrial situation. "The nation has been advised to economize on food. Economy means in-

telligent use without waste: it does not call for self-denial. Economy was recommended to stop the waste of the \$700,000,000 worth of food which goes into the garbage pail each year. The wave of patriotism sweeping over the country ous economy as a means of expression reason whatever for a curtailment of the use of things ordinarily needed by the people. There is need that everything be put to use. "As patriots, it is our duty to stop the wastage of food; as patriots, it is

equally important that we do not stop the ordinary purchasing on which the business and the industry of the country are founded. Hysterical economy is as much a menace to the nation as is prodigal waste. The pursuance of our normal business along usual lines is of paramount importance at this time, in rder that our nation may maintain itself on a sound economical and industrial basis from which to prosecute the military phase of the struggle for the freedom of mankind.

"Faith is the great need of the people today—faith in Providence to lend right to our right, faith in nature to respond bountifully to the wonderful effort of our agriculturists to increase the food supply, to provide a surplus for our allies, and faith in our Government, which has taken hold of the problems before it in a way that demonstrates that it is deserving of our faith.

"If I were asked," Mr. Armour said, "to give a message to the American ple—to the farmers, the wage-earners, the merchants, and the manufacturers, and all-it would be this: Be strong in your faith that nature will reward the efforts being made to produce big crops, and co-operate with our president Woodrow Wilson, in his efforts to keep the nation composed and so organized as to most efficiently prosecute war. Be confident and live your normal lives as far as possible. Make business proceed as usual.

Canada has taken upon herself grave and enormous responsibilities in connection with her many activities in the war, but there is nothing on the business horizon to warrant contraction of business energy and commercial progress. This does not mean that we should not be frugal and liv as economically as possible. Food conditions throughout the world make th necessity for that very plain to us.


