London, July 24. — No parliamentary event of modern times has so quickened the public pulse as the present political crisis arising from the vote bill, and anxiety to know the exact terms of Premier Asquith's ultimant of the peers, crowded the House of Commons this afternoon in a way not seen before in many years.

Misery and Causes Fire.

Paris, July 23.—Paris is sweltering in the worst heat wave experienced in the last quarter of a century, which is made more severe by
the phenomenal drought, not a drop
of rain having fallen for a month
past. The thermometer has risen
steadily for the past eight days from
86 to 97, the latter figure being attained vesterday.

All indications point to a continuance of the heat for several days at least, and to add to the suffering of the people, there has been a partial breakdown in the water system. Two big leaks in the main water pipes, which were discovered yesterday, necessitated the cutting off of the supply during the night.

Many deaths from the heat wave accounted the daily average being six

Many deaths from the heat wave occurred, the dally average being six until yesterday, when 11 were reported. In Fontambleau the drought was responsible for the spread of a fire which broke out in the most picturesque part of the forest, 15 acres of which were destroyed. The garrison troops were called out, and succeeded in getting this fire under control when a more serious outbreak occurred around Salamandre Rocks. The fire burned over about 1,500 acres and kept the troops busy all night before they succeeded in mastering it.


