Paris, Sept. 18.—Noon.—The Germans lost heavily in several counter-uttacks north and south of the Somme last night, the war office announced today. The French maintained the ground recently won, and made further progress near Clery and Berny, and on the eastern edge of Deniecourt. The French took 1,200 prisoners and ten machine guns, the statement says.

The town of Deniecourt is now completely encircled by the French. Prisoners report that enormous losses have been sustained by some of the erman formations. The statement says two battalions were almost annihilated
