A SERIOUS SITUATION.

The live stock industry of the Canadian West is at present facing a crisis unparalleled in its history. The direct cause is the enactment of the Young-Fordney tariff bill by the Government of the United Confronted by ruin, the western live stock men are appealing to all concerned to come to their assistance in finding a way out of the present serious state of affairs. The Calgary Board of Trade has passed a resolution dealing with the matter, which has been forwarded to Premier Meighen. The whole situation is placed squarely before him, and remedial a conference representing the transportation companies, farmers, stockmen and other interests concerned be held at an early date to consider conditions of the live stock market from all angles, and especially to discuss some means of credit extension to farmers and stockmen, so that they may not be compelled to throw their breeding and unfinished stock

on the market at sacrifice prices. The following extract from the Calgary Herald of these prices are like:

"W. H. Towes, Altona, Man., has received net returns of \$19.07 from the sale of seven cattle shipped in July to a St. Boniface stockyard firm, according to officially issued statement. The firm allowed \$44.71 for the stock, but the freight from Altona to St. Boniface amounted to \$15.34, nearly as much as the net returns, and the commission charges were Towes received \$16.87 for a cow weighing 1,130 pounds, or 11/2 cents a pound. A 500-pound steer brought \$7.46, a 110-pound sheep brought \$3.85; a 50-pound lamb \$5.25, another 50-pound lamb \$3, while a veal calf, weighing 120 pounds brought \$4.87. The net returns from Towes' transaction aggregated less than \$3 a head."

Not only has there been a big drop in prices since the passing of the emergency tariff bill, but there has been an extraordinary decrease in the number of cattle shipped to the United States markets. Since the bill went into effect only a few carloads have been sent across the border, and it is not only the west, but every part of Canada, that is being affected by the situation. The eastern manufacturers and businessmen are looking to the west for a market for their goods this year, and if the stock-raising industry is not restored to a better footing the purchasing power of the west will be greatly reduced. At this time last year good steers were quoted in Calgary at 101/2 cents, and good cows were quoted at 8.39 cents. At the present time good steers are quoted at 51/4 cents, or just one-half of fast year's price, while cows are quoted at 4 cents, or less than one-half of last year's price.

The finding of new markets is one of the remedies which naturally suggests itself, but the Calgary Herald expresses the opinion that if the British embargo were removed tomorrow it would be but a partial cure for the conditions that now exist. "The fact to be faced." continues the Herald, "is that the great live stock industry of the west is confronted not only by an immense immediate loss, but by an early annihilation, if a way out cannot be discovered. Canadian stockmen today are at the mercy of American buyers. No other market is available, and prices have been knocked down to the lowest point they have reached for twenty years."

At an emergent meeting of the Calgary Board of Trade, held on August 3, several remedies were suggested by C. W. Peterson, president of the Farm and Ranch Review. Among these was that immediate diplomatic negotiations should be opened with the United States in order to procure for Canada free entry for animals and animal products. He declared that even an unlimited overseas market could not for a moment be compared with free access to the Chicago market, which could completely absorb all classes of Canadian live stock. Another suggestion was that a Canadian pool should be adopted, consisting of Government representatives, bankers, breeders and capitalists. Mr. Peterson also brought up the matter of a conference at Ottawa, a resolution call-

ing for which has now been adopted. The request put forward to Premier Meighen asking for a conference is one which demands immediate attention. The very existence of one of the basic industries of the Dominion is not only at stake, but the future prosperity of the whole country hangs in the balance. It should be borne in mind that the western cattle raisers are not now ranchers on a big scale, as they were a number of years ago, but determine whether it is the minister or the copperhead thousands are medium and small farmers, whose coninuance on the land is seriously threatened. The secret has been well kept, despite the strident notes of Mr. Meighen's overseas trumpeter-in-chief, and was probably reserved as a special titbit for the delectation of the citizens of the Dominion after the premier's return.

In connection with the Imperial Conference we have, owing to the accounts which have been published of Mr. Meighen's prominent part in foreign, domestic and imperial politics, and the brilliant and multifarious services that he has thereby rendered to mankind in general, and the Anglo-Saxon race in particular, been prepared to regard him as a modern Moses leading the world out of its muddle and misery into the halcyon realms which it has vainly sought for so many centuries, but our contemporary is not satisfied with this; it places Mr. Meighen on a pinnacle never aspired to by Alexander of Macedon nor dreamed of by Solomon in all his glory. Having exalted its idol to this celestial altitude, the Free Press proclaims to all to whom it may concern that measures are urgently called for. It is requested that at the London conference "the world situation instantly changed as the result of the Canadian premier's suggestions." He would have the camp under the village system of administration such as had been established in India.

Lord McDonnell urged the Government to grant from thirty to fifty million sterling for relief measures.


