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#### Important Notice.

The attention of all persons who may contemplate making Bequests to any Religious Charitable Institution is respectfully called to the following section :-

I. VICTORIA, chap. 36, sec. 9.

"And be it further enacted, That no will shall be valid unless it shall be in writing, and executed in manner hereinafter mentioned, (that is to say), it shall be signed at the foot or end thereof by the Testator, or by say, it shall be signed at the foot or end thereof by the Testator, or by some other person in his presence and by his direction; and such signature shall be made or acknowledged by the Testator in the presence of two or more Witnesses present at the same time; and such Witnesses shall attest and shall subscribe the Will in the presence of the Testator; but no form of attestation shall be necessary."

N. B .-Wills executed prior to the 1st January, 1838, are not affected by the New Act; but any alteration therein, or Codicil thereto, must be executed in the manner before mentioned.

#### Constitution.

#### (ADOPTED 1879.)

I.—This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.

II.—The objects of the Convention shall be to maintain the educational and missionary operations of the body, and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

III.—The membership of the Convention shall be composed as follows:—

1. Each of the Baptist Associations in Neva Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention five of its own members as delegates to represent it therein.

2. Each Church connected with any of the above-named Associations, and contributing annually towards the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars contributed to those objects during the year; but no Church shall be entitled to send more than five delegates.

3. Every ordained Baptist Minister cennected with one of the Churches above mentioned, either in the relation of pastor or member, shall be a member of the Convention.

4. Any member of any of these Churches who shall have contributed towards the objects of the Convention fifty dollars at one time, previous to the 27th of August, 1879—or one hundred dollars as one time, after that date, shall be a life-member of the Convention.

5. The President and Faculty of Acadia College, being members of any of the Churches above mentioned, shall be ex officio members of the Convention.

IV.—The Officers of the Convention shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Assistant-Secretary; all of whom shall be elected annually frem among the members, except the Secretary, who shall be elected triennially.

V.—The Convention shall meet annually, at such places as shall be agreed on by the body, and shall commence its session on the first Saturday after the 18th of August, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

A special meeting of the Convention may be called at any time by the President, on a requisition signed by the Officers of the Convention and the Secretaries of the three Boards, viz.: of Governors of Acadia College, of Foreign Missions, and of Home Missions, in the Convention.

VI.—There shall be a Board of Home Missions and a Board of Foreign Missions, appointed by the Convention, each consisting of fifteen members of the body, five of whom shall retire each year in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. Five members shall form a quorum of each Board.

VII.—The Convention shall, once in three years, appoint six new members of the Board of Governors of Acadia College in place of six who will then go out of office, in rotation, in accordance with the resolution passed by the Convention in September, 1850, and with the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, 14 Vic., cap. 37.

VIII.—The Convention shall also appoint a Ministerial Education Board, and a Board for the management of a Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, each of which Boards shall consist of nine members of the Convention, three of whom shall retire annually, in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. The members shall form a quorum for each Board.

IX.—Vacancies occurring in the Secretaryship, or in any of the foregoing Boards, may be filled by the Convention at any session.

X.—This Constitution shall not be altered or amended except by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting; written notice of the proposed alteration or amendment having been given at the last preceeding annual meeting.

#### Rules of Order.

- 1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Persons invited to a seat may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.
- 3. No persons shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.
- 4. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.
- 5. The government of the body, and the regulations of its proceedings, shall be strictly in accordance with parliamentary usage, so called.
- 6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

#### FIFTH SESSION.

Monday Afternoon, Aug. 25th.

The Convention assembled at 2 o'clock. Prayer was offered by Rev. E. J. Grant, of Dartmouth, N. S.

Discussion of the report of the Home Mission Board, was resumed. The sixth section, referring to the French Mission, was adopted. The seventh clause, relating to Student Missionaries, was spoken to by J. E. Masters, Rev. G. E. Good, and passed. The eighth clause, having reference to Manitoba and the North West, was adopted, and the correspondence in possession of the Home Mission Board on the work reported in this clause, ordered to be referred to the Committee on the Communication from the Baptist Union of Canada.

The remaining clauses of the report were considered at

length, addresses being given by Rev. G. F. Miles, Rev. T. Todd, Rev. J. H. Coy, Rev. Dr. Hopper, Rev. C. Goodspeed, H. H. Bligh, and adopted. The report, as a whole, was adopted, and the report of the Treasurer, Rev. C. Goodspeed, also passed.

On motion of Dr. Rand, it was ordered that Rev. C. Goodspeed, M. A., be requested to furnish for publication in the Messenger and Visitor, copies of the excellent sermon

preached by him before this Convention.

The Annual Report of the Finance Committee was presented by Rev. Dr. Day, for Nova Scotia, Bro. John March, for New Brunswick, and Rev. A. H. Lavers, for P. E.

On motion of Wm. Cummings, resolved that the report of the committee be adopted.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. W. B. Bradshaw, of Billtown, N. S.

#### SIXTH SESSION.

Monday Evening, Aug. 25.

The session opened with prayer by Rev. J. B. Woodland. Minutes of last session confirmed. After singing, and prayer by Rev. J. A. Gordon, addresses were given by

Rev. J. B. Woodland on: "The Needs and Encouragement to Home Mission Work."

Rev. H. N. Parry: "How can Pastors Assist the Board in carrying on Home Mission Work."

C. Goodspeed, Hon. Dr. Parker, Wm. Cummings, T. R. Black, Arthur Simpson, A. W. Masters, C. B. Whidden,

J. W. Spurden, together with the present members of the Finance Committee.

The report of the Board of Management of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, was submitted by Rev. J. W. Manning, Secretary, and Rev. Dr. Saunders, Treasurer, and passed. (Index.)

The Secretary read a letter from Rev. Dr. Bill, relating to union with the Free Baptists. On motion of Rev. G. O. Gates, resolved to refer this letter to a committee of five, viz.: Rev. Dr. Hopper, Rev. Dr. Saunders, John March, Rev. I. J. Skinner, Rev. S. B. Kempton.

Closed at 10 o'clock with prayer by Rev. A. W. Barss.

#### SEVENTH SESSION.

Tuesday Morning, Aug. 26.

Convention opened at 9 o'clock, Arthur Simpson, Esq., Vice-President, in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. T Corey, of Havelock, N. B. Minutes of last session confirmed.

Bro. H. H. Bligh presented the report of the committee to devise a plan for further support of aged and infirm ministers. After brief discussion it was resolved that the report of this committee be referred to the Board of Management of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund for their consideration, and to be reported upon next year.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. Dr. Armstrong, seconded by Dea. S. Selden, supported by Rev. T. Todd, and unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

Having learned with deep regret that the Rev. I. Wallace, General Missionary in the employ of the Home Mission Board of the Maritime Provinces, has recently been stricken down by very serious illness while prosecuting his evangelistic work, this Convention does hereby express its high estimate of the value of his services as an earnest and faithful minister and missionary of the cross; and also the Christian, sympathy and fellowship entertained for him by this body; and, moreover, that it is the fervent prayer and hope of this Convention that our Heavenly Father will spare our dear brother to us and to his beloved family, and enable him ere long to resume service in proclaiming glad tidings of salvation to sinners, and to labor for many years in extending the kingdom of Christ in these Provinces.

By request of the Convention Rev. T. Todd offered prayer for Bro. Wallace.

Leave was granted the Foreign Mission Board to with-

draw the section of its report relating to reinforcement of the Missions.

The Annual Report of the Board of Governors of Acadia College was presented by T. A. Higgins, A. M., Secretary, and X. Z. Chipman, Esq., Treasurer.

Colin W. Roscoe Esq., read his report as Auditor to the Board of Governors. These reports were considered section by section, and adopted after discussion by several brethren.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. Walter Barss.

#### EIGHTH SESSION.

## Tuesday Afternoon, Aug. 26.

Convention resumed business at 2 p. m., the President in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. H. Hughes, of Fredericton, N. B.

On motion of Rev. J. W. Manning, resolved that the report of the committee to devise a plan for further support of aged and infirm ministers be printed in the Year Book. (Index).

Rev. A. Cohoon read the report of the committee appointed to consider the communications from the Baptist Union of Canada, the correspondence with the committee of the Baptist Union of Canada, and the letter from Senator McMaster.

After addresses on this report by J. March, Rev. D. McKeen, C. E. Knapp, Rev. C. Goodspeed, Rev. Dr. Hopper, Dr. McVicar, Rev. A. Cohoon, H. H. Bligh, Rev. Dr. Saunders, and others, the report was referred to the committee for further consideration.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. W. J. Swaffield, of Harvey, N. B.

#### NINTH SESSION.

## TUESDAY EVENING, Aug. 26th.

President took the chair at 7 p. m. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. E. Fillemore, of Turtle Creek, N. B. Rev. G. O. Gates, on behalf of Committee on Travelling Arrangements, presented a bill of \$5.50 for printing certificates for use of members, which was ordered to be paid.

Addresses on Education were given by Dr. MacVicar, of Toronto Baptist College, who spoke to the following proposition :-

The Relation between Education and permanent success in Church life and work, is fundamental and indissoluble;

Dr. Welton, of Toronto Baptist College: McMaster Hall in relation to a trained ministry for the Dominion;

Prof. Wortman, St. John Seminary: Our Academies supply a need in the education of our youth, and should receive the sympathy and support of our people;

Dr. Rand, of Acadia College: The claims of our educational institutions on our churches.

On motion of Dea. S. Selden, the thanks of the Convention were unanimously given by rising vote, to the church and people of Moncton for their attention and hospitality to the delegates during the present Annual Meeting, and to the choir for the excellent music furnished.

Thanks were also voted to the various lines of railways, steamboats, and coaches that have granted reduction of fares to our delegates.

The following report of the committee appointed to consider the report of the Finance Committee of Convention, was read by Dr. Rand:-

Your committee having carefully considered the subject committed to them, are of the opinion that there are good reasons for encouragement in the results arising from the labors of the Finance Committee in connection with the Convention Funds. We are, however, much impressed with the importance of awakening a deeper and wider interest and sense of responsibility in this behalf among the Pastors of our churches. To this end your committee recommend that the churches embraced within the Convention be arranged in groups and a pastor be designated in each group, whose duty it shall be to aid the Finance Committee in developing the systematic benevolence of these churches. In pursuance of this recommendation your committee suggest the following groups and pas-

The sections of the Foreign Mission Report not already passed, were taken from the table and adopted, and the report as a whole, on motion, approved.

The report of the Committee on Communications from brethren of the Upper Provinces, was again read and after amendment by vote of the Convention, was adopted as follows:—

Your committee to whom the communications from the Canada Baptist Union, the Committee of the Union, and from Hon. Wm. McMaster, have been referred, find the brethren of the Union therein indicate their earnest and unanimous desire to co-operate with the brethren of the Maritime Provinces in the work of our common Lord, especially in the Mission work of Manitoba and the North-West, and that they also invite the suggestion of methods by which a closer union could be attained.

Your committee therefore recommend that this Convention express its willingness to consider the advisability of forming a General Society, composed of delegates from the churches throughout the Dominion, to be entitled the Baptist Union of the Dominion of Canada.

They suggest as suitable objects to be managed and controlled by said society: General Home Missions in Manitoba, the North-West, British Columbia, and among the French in the Province of Quebec, Theological Education, the Distribution of Religious Literature in the interests of the Denomination, and such other subjects as may be deemed desirable.

They further recommend the appointment of a committee to discuss with similar committees to be appointed by the Conventions of Ontario, Quebec, and Manitoba, the details relating to the organization of such a Society and report to this Convention at its next Meeting; and further, that the Home Mission Board be instructed to co-operate with the Committee appointed by the Canada Baptist Union at its late meeting at Brantford in prosecuting the work in the North-West for the time being.

The report of the committee on Dr. Bill's letter in reference to union with the Free Baptists, was submitted by Dr. Hopper, to the effect that the committee recommended the passing of the following resolution:—

Resolved, That a judicious committee be appointed by this body to meet with the approaching Free Baptist Conference, to enquire what cooperation, if any, may be practicable in Foreign Mission work.

After some discussion the report was adopted on motion

of Rev. J. H. Hughes.

The report of the committee on the State of Religion in the Denomination, was taken from the table and adopted. (See index.)

Bro. B. H. Eaton presented the report of the Committee on the Constitution, which was adopted as follows:-

Your committee on the Constitution beg to report as follows:-They recommend

1. That sub-section 1 of section 3 read thus:

- (1) Each of the Baptist Associations in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention, two of its own members as delegates to represent it
  - 2. That sub-section 2 of section 3 read as follows:
- (2) Each church connected with any of the above named Associations, shall be entitled to send its pastor and one other member to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and one additional delegate where the membership of the church is not less than 150, and a fourth delegate where the membership is not less than 250. The whole number to be sent by each church not in any case to exceed four, including the pastor.
- 3. That sub-section 3 be omitted from the Constitution and the following substituted therefor:
- (3) Each Board connected with the Convention may send three of its members as delegates to represent it in the Convention.
  - 4. That sub-section 4 be rescinded, and the following substituted:
- (4.) Life-membership in the Convention shall be limited to those who have already become life-members by contribution, as heretofore provided.
  - 5. That the following clause be added to sub-section 5:
  - (5). Also the Missionaries in the employ of our Foreign Mission Board.
- 6. That in Section V. "19th" be substituted for "18th," thus making this section to stand as formerly.

All which is respectfully submitted;

Your committee, in accordance with Section X of the Constitution, hereby give notice that it will be moved at the next meeting of the Convention that the several amerdments in the Constitution, above recommended, be adopted by the Convention.

B., Resolved, That in the opinion of this Convention the effort to publish in our own country suitable papers for our Sunday schools, such as the Canadian Record, Youth's Visitor and Gem, should be regarded with favor and commended to the support of our churches.

On motion of Rev. J. W. Baneroft, Resolved, That the Finance Committee be instructed to close its accounts on the first of August, and the Treasurers of the various Boards on tenth of August, and that no supplementary reports of money received be presented to convention.

On motion of Rev. J. E. Goucher, it was Resolved, That this Convention request the Board of Governors of Acadia College to take such action in respect to the arrangement made by the Nova Scotia Legislature in the matter as shall obtain a recognition of the compact of 1865, and secure our rights in the premises

On motion of Rev. T. A. Higgins, Resolved, That the churches of this Convention be requested to take a collection on the third Sunday of September, 1884, for the purpose of aiding ministerial students in going to Toronto for study in McMaster Hall; the proceeds of such collection to be forwarded to Rev. J. H. Castle, D. D., 401 Sherborn street, Toronto, Ont.

On motion of Rev. A. Cohoon, Resolved, That 4,000 copies of the Year Book be printed under the supervision of the Publishing Committee, to be paid for out of the funds of the respective Boards of the Convention, and distributed among the churches according to their membership, and that the time of publishing the Year Book be limited to nine weeks after the closing of this annual meeting.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Saunders, seconded by Professor Keirstead, *Resolved*, That it be a standing rule of this Convention that the President shall deliver an address on his retirement from office

The Treasurer of the Convention presented his report, which was adopted

On motion of Judge Johnstone, the thanks of Convenvention were unanimously given to Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., for the dignity and ability with which he has presided at this annual meeting.

Minutes of this session read and approved.

On motion, adjourned to meet at such place as may be selected by the committee appointed to locate the Convention, and at the time fixed by the constitution.

## Report of the Foreign Missionary Board.

Report of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, for 1884.

The Board of Foreign Missions in presenting their annual report to Convention again desire to

#### EXPRESS THEIR DEVOUT GRATITUDE

to Almighty God for the many tokens of His favor which has rested upon their work during the past year. Among these must be recorded:

The preservation of the lives of all our missionaries, and their families, and the missionary helpers, and the large degree of health they have been granted:

The safe return to their native land of Brother and Sister Churchill, and their two children, and the amount of labor they have been enabled to perform in visiting churches and Associations since they reached our shores:

The success which has attended the labors of our missionary brethren in the breaking down of barriers which heretofore have resisted their best efforts, in the planting of new sub-stations, and in the conversion of precious souls:

The raising up of fresh recruits to reinforce the mission, in the

person of two young ladies, at a time when further help is very

The sustaining of the missionary spirit among the members of our churches at home and the measure of liberality they have shown whereby the work has been carried forward and the financial obligations of the Board have been met.

Commencing the year with an empty treasury, it was only to be expected that difficulties of the greatest character should appear from time to time throughout its course. Yet every month has called forth an expression of thankfulness and renewed confidence in God, as they have inscribed upon the hither side of their altar, "Ebenezer," and on the farther side, "Jehovah-Jireh."

From whatever point the work of the past year is viewed, your Board believe the protecting and fostering hand of God will be seen, and therefore they are encouraged to press on with new consecration and more devout zeal in that cause which stands first upon the roll of christian effort.

#### AT HOME.

The chief business of the Board has been the consideration of plans for raising the funds required to meet their engagements as they matured; of the various questions growing out of the work and its extension, as presented in the correspondence of our missionaries; and presenting to the people personally at special meetings, as well as the annual gatherings of the churches, such information in regard to the extent and character of our undertakings as would enable them to realize their duty in con-

#### FINANCIAL.

Last year the financial condition of the Board was very clearly set forth in the reports of the Board and its Treasurer, and much that was then written might be re-stated as now applicable to that most important factor in the foreign misssonary enter-

Facts as they are developed in the course of this report will show that during the Convention year 1883-4 the work has steadily increased; and this will cause many hearts to rejoice. But the expenditures have also increased. Will that fact kindle a like emotion? And why should it not, since it affords a new opportunity for the cultivation of a spirit of enlarged benevolence? Let it be remembered that during the first years of our mission the disbursements actually made were less than the contributions; and it is to the gracious providence of the Lord of Missions, who, in seasons of prosperous increase, had thus laid by in store, that the Board was able to project measures and carry them into effect in the years which followed. Had we during those years been compelled to rely on the annual receipts

alone, the work of establishing stations and sending forth laborers could not have been prosecuted. But, as is now well known, the surplus of the former years has been exhausted long ago, and the facts and figures presented to Convention in this report clearly set forth the imperative necessity that exists for immediate, general, and greatly increased contributions. If the mission is to be supported, the missionaries now employed retained at their posts, and new laborers sent forth, the contributions of the churches must be enlarged at once, and in a constantly increasing ratio as time rolls on. The question of all others which demands an immediate answer is this, "Shall we forfeit the trust we have in charge, and abandon the heathen to their superstition and idolatry, when the Lord is graciously bestowing evidences of His approval by opening new districts which He desires, nay, commands, us to enter and occupy "until He comes"?

If the answer to this be, "In the name of the Lord we will go up and possess the land," then must our people individually inquire of the Lord what of interest, and labor, and sacrifice He demands to secure so great and glorious a result, and in the same spirit as Saul of Tarsus, when he cried, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

In ninety-nine cases out of every hundred where such an honest inquiry is made, the answer will come back into the soul, "Pray, and give." But immediately comes the consideration of the when and how of giving, so as best to get all the tithes into the storehouse of the Lord.

This question of Systematic Benevolence is one of vital importance to the interests of our Foreign Mission enterprise, since a reduction in the amount of contributed funds must, in the nature of things, lead to a restriction of our operations. This alternative is so opposed to the very object for which the organization exists that it cannot be entertained as a matter of serious consideration; for, as fast as success crowns the honest efforts of our missionaries and their assistants, it becomes our duty to provide increased means to extend the knowledge of Jesus Christ to those whom it has not yet reached. On the other hand, receipts which at one period are adequate to meet all the exigencies of a growing work, and at another are equal to only one half of the obligations already entered into, must produce such an alternation of dilation and contraction of effort as to seriously interfere with the steady advance of christianity in the field we have undertaken to cultivate.

It has been the policy of the Board not to push the enterprise any faster than the means at the disposal of our people reasonably warrant, nor to incur debts which cannot be honorably met as they mature. Yet the spirit of religious enterprise, which is necessarily involved in the idea of foreign missionary effort demands that plans should be laid, work undertaken suitable to produce the desired result, and an unfailing supply of funds to

meet the demands made upon the treasury for work, which is nothing if not progressive in its character.

In the present condition of our churches, it is evident to those who will give the subject careful thought that

#### LIVING AGENCIES ARE NECESSARY.

Appeals for assistance sent forth from time to time through the religious press, and circulars sent direct to the churches may be, and are, of use, as secondary and auxliary to these living agencies, but they do not and cannot accomplish the great object of providing an unfailing supply of money. Nor should this subject he regarded as one the demands of which can be met by a spasmodic effort to meet a temporary emergency. The requirements of the Board are at all times urgent, and call for the best services of the best man or men that can be obtained. Such an agency, however, can never take the place and do the legitimate work of the pastors of our churches. To them the Board must ever look for that training of the people to deeds of beneficence which alone will produce the spontaneous outpouring of the Lord's money for the Lord's work. An agent's chief business for some time to come would be the diffusion of missionary intelligence, the cultivation of a genuine missionary spirit, and the preparation of pastors to become their own agents within the scope of their respective fields of labor.

But until such an agent is found and duly set apart to his work, there is much that ought to be done, and which can be done to aid in keeping up the supply of money required to sustain the operations of your Board.

### WITHIN THE SPHERE OF THE PASTORATE,

one of the most useful and interesting methods of promoting missionary zeal and raising missionary funds, is the establishment of the regular monthly missionary concert. At such a gathering the pastor is afforded an admirable opportunity for calling the attention of his people to the magnitude and Scriptural character of our missionary operations, to the condition and extent of the heathen world, to special undertakings of the Board in the various branches of its work, and to the responsibilities resting upon all christians to aid in the furtherance of the truth as it is in Jesus. He can show that to curtail these arduous operations, or to draw back from the onerous obligations which rest upon us, would be as disastrous both at home and abroad, as it would be sinful in the sight of Him who has said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature;" that the promises of the Saviour forbid our desponding; that our duty to Him who died for us, our duty to our own souls, and our duty to our missionary bre hren, our duty to the converts God has already given us, our duty to the millions of our fellow men who are perishing in their sins-facts the most impressive and overwhelming, from which we cannot escape, whether regarded

in the light of time or eternity—require us to respond worthily and promptly. He should urge that in view of the lack of adequate funds to prosecute our undertakings, the people should lay to heart their dependence upon Him who has bestowed upon them all that they possess, and earnestly implore Him to prepare them and all our people for the happiness of those who at the last shall be found to have been faithful servants.

## WITHIN THE CIRCLE OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL,

also, much may be accomplished. As an evidence of this the Board calls attention to the response of Sunday school workers to the appeal of the Board for contributions towards the support of helpers, boarding children, teachers, preachers, colporteurs and other deserving objects of beneficence, commending them for the special care and support of the young. The result indicates that if properly cultivated the expense of native assistants, and the cost of educating students at the Seminary, can be entirely met by the freewill offerings of the youth of our schools and churches.

There were also many personal contributions for general purposes, which need not here be given in detail, but for which the

Board desire to express their thanks.

In the foregoing statements where the amounts are left blank no contribution has yet come to hand. Where the purpose for which the funds were used is blank, the words "general purposes" might have been inserted. Sometimes there were two applicants for the same work, in which case the question was decided by awarding it to the locality where compliance with the request would stimulate missionary effort, and the disappointed one was urged to work for some other object. In other cases objects were selected which do not exist, or which are limited as to their extent. Thus the request accompanying a contribution that it shall be appropriated for the support of a child at a given place carnot always be complied with, from the fact that the missionary has no child that can be designated to the person,

school, or band making application. In every case it is best to leave the designation to the Board or its appointed officers, with the request that information shall be given as to how the gift has been applied.

The great interest exhibited by the young in response to the demands made upon them is very gratifying to your Board, and although some may feel disappointed in not receiving more consideration at the hands of the Secretary,—whose best endeavors, however, have been given to this part of his duties, involving as it has a very extended correspondence,—the Board confidently appeals to Sunday school workers to carry on the movement so auspiciously begun until all the youth of our churches are united in forwarding the missionary enterprise. Should such an enlarged development of the missionary spirit among the young take place, the widening out of the work on the foreign field, so constantly called for, will be easily accomplished.

Early in the coming year the Secretary expects to be in possession of the name of every person at the several stations, who, in any way, receives aid and support from the mission funds. He will then issue a circular to the schools and bands showing the objects to which contributions may be designated. Meantime all who propose to continue their special contributions for the objects herein reported, should notify him of the fact so that they may not be designated to others.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$7,080.81. Of this sum \$3,701.84 came into the treasury through the Finance Committee of Convention, or as donations direct from the churches; \$2,365.06 was the contribution of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies, and \$1,013.91 from mission bands and Sunday schools for specified objects.

The expenditures amounted to \$8,076.71; \$565.07 of the W. M. A. S. amount belonged to last year's account, and was practically a balance in hand, although not received in time to be so accounted. It is therefore evident that the expenditures exceeded the receipts by over \$1,500. The Treasurer's report will more fully present the financial position of the Board.

One of the chief difficulties with which your Board has to contend is the want of money at an early period in the Convention year. Whilst the expenditure is steady and regular, the income is mainly the result of extraordinary efforts put forth by the pastors and churches as the year is drawing to a close. It is undoubtedly a ground for congratulation if your Board can present to the representative body of the denomination in its annual gathering, what may be termed "a clean sheet," after having had the balance on the wrong side all the way through the year's operations; yet your Board would respectfully remind the body that there is a more excellent way, namely, the removal of half the burden which they are compelled to carry, by making the contributions at stated and regular times, in such amounts as

will meet the obligations of the Board as they mature. As a guide to the brethren in this regard, it may be stated that at the meetings held during the first weeks of November, February, May and August, the quarterly remittances to the missionaries are ordered, which include, not only the salaries, but the contingent expenses of carrying on the work in all its departments at the several stations.

#### LEGACY FUND.

During the past few years the attention of the board has been called to cases in which bequests have been made to them by friends deceased, of which no official notice has been given, and of the benefits of which the denomination has been deprived. Other cases have occurred where the wishes of the testator have failed to be carried out by reason of informalities in the execution of the will. In referring to this matter your Board would urgo two things: 1st. That every friend of Foreign Missions do himself the justice to see that his gifts come into the possession of the Board, thus making him his own executor. 2nd. That when any one determines to make a devise or bequest, he shall take the necessary precautions to make it in correct form, and execute the instrument in which it is contained in a legal manner. Appended to this report will be found a brief, but good form of bequest.

In September last information was received from the executors appointed under the will of the late Mrs. James Powers, of Ohio, Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, that your Board were made her residuary legatees.

In July last O. M. Taylor, Esq., executor under the will of the late Daniel Wood, of Middleton, Nova Scotia, informed the Board that a bequest of fifty dollars would be paid over during the current year.

A bequest of fifty dollars made by the late Benaiah Morse, of Bridgetown, to your Board, has not yet been paid, although correspondence has been had with the executors for nearly two years, in addition to the work of a delegation.

The full interest upon the \$20,000 securities which form the Jacob Bradshaw Memorial Fund has been regularly collected and paid over to the donor.

In the month of March last the venerable and esteemed President of the Board presented fifty copies of his "History of the Baptists," for the benefit of the Foreign Mission fund. The Secretary will send a copy to any purchaser, free of postage, upon the receipt of two dollars. This reference is made with a view of giving expression to the thanks of the Board for the generous gift, and if possible to realize the intentions of the donor.

#### REINFORCEMENT.

The gradual extension of the work upon the foreign field, opening up new avenues for more systematic operations; the ne-

cessity for establishing christian schools in connection with each of the stations, and the valuable auxiliaries they have proved to be in furnishing teachers who, under the guidance and instructions of the missionary, have learnt to love Jesus and desire to teach others of His saving power; the certainty that missionaries and their families must at stated periods return home for rest and recuperation, all point to the fact that our mission must be reinforced from time to time, by men and women whose hearts God has wrought upon to devote themselves to His service in this important section of the Master's vineyard. In the present circumstances of our mission, also, there are special reasons why further help should be received from the home field. For over two years Brother Sanford has been separated from his wife and family, and the time is fast approaching when he must leave his station at Bimlipatam for this country. The additional strength afforded by sending out Brother Archibald, nearly two years ago, enabled Brother Churchill and his family to return home, but his occupancy of the Bobbili station weakened the station at Bimlipatam by the withdrawal of Miss Hammond, upon her marriage with Brother Archibald, and Brother Sanford was for the second time left alone. The valuable results to be secured by Zenana work has therefore been seriously interfered with, and it has been a subject of serious consideration by your Board what course should be adopted to meet the loss sustained at this station and to secure the assistance so much required.

The applications of two young ladies for appointment to the foreign field, and their endorsement by the Central Boards of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies, appeared to present a solution of the question, and they were, therefore, after much deliberation, examination, and prayer, accepted by your Board. Circumstances, however, have arisen which may call for a change in the action of the Board in this regard, and they are thus prevented from giving to Convention a statement of what may be done to reinforce the mission during the next Convention year. The needs of the field are great and pressing, but action can only be taken as the Lord prepares the way and presents men and women whose views on dectrinal matters are in full accord with those of the body, and who give evidence of possessing aptitude for the When the present difficulty is removed the Board will feel justified in going forward, not only to appointment, but to the equipment and sending forth of those who may be needed to fill the vacant places.

### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY AID SOCIETIES.

The financial aid rendered your Board by these organizations exceeds that of any previous year, and for this they merit the thanks of the body. But it is in the strong missionary spirit they have shown, and the missionary zeal they have infused into the people wherever they have undertaken to labor, that their strength as aids to the Foreign Mission Board is most felt and

recognized. Most helpful have they been in the past, and for the future whatever form their organization may assume, whether they continue as heretofore centres of missionary interest in the respective provinces, or become a united society, with one Executive, its branches extending throughout all the land, their influence will undoubtedly widen until they have enlisted the sympathies of all their sisters at home, and in their progress will accomplish a world of good for the benighted women of India.

Their reports, which are intended to be appended to this, give a full outline of their purpose and work. We bid them "Godspeed."

### ON THE FIELD.

It is expected that the missionaries will supply reports giving more in detail the work on the foreign field than can be brought within the scope of the board's report. Therefore it will be but a cursory glance at what has been undertaken and accomplished by our missionaries that will be here attempted.

Should the reports not come to hand in season, it is hoped that sufficient of interest will be found herein to awaken anew the arder of those who hear or read, and enlist their sympathies more than ever for those who labor and those labored for in the Lord.

### STATION WORK.

The work at the several stations comprises preaching, Sabbath and day school work, teaching native helpers and conducting Bible classes, and visitation of and conversation with people at their homes or places of business.

At Bimlipatam regular religious services are conducted in the mission-house on each Sabbath, and at stated occasions during the week. There are also three other preaching stations in the town where three native helpers, respectively, regularly conduct service on the Lord's Day, the attendants being mostly boatmen and fishermen. Two other preaching places have been established at villages about two miles out, where on Sabbath evenings the people come together to hear the Word. In one of these villages the people are asking for a chapel and school, and have expressed their readiness to meet part of the expense.

The Sabbath school, with an average of sixty in attendance, formed into six classes, meets in the morning. On Wednesday evening an English Bible class and prayer meeting is held; and on Thursday afternoon a Telugu prayer meeting, for all who reside on the compound, and the pupils of the school. Four Eurasian girls, members of the English Bible class, were baptized during the year, and one of them, Miss Eva de Praser, has, with much activity and zeal, carried on a house-to-house visitation, telling of the love of Jesus. They all had to endure much persecution, both before and after their public profession of faith in Christ.

At Chicacole, in addition to the regular religious services at the Mission House, street and bazaar preaching and conversation, school and Bible class instruction, etc., a service has been conducted weekly at Old Chicacole, and, at the new chapel in the centre of the town of Chicacole, since its purchase from the London Missionary Society. Two day schools are conducted by teachers under the direction of Mrs. Hutchinson.

At Bobbili, the regular Sabbath services and Sabbath school instruction, at the compound, with preaching at the town school-house and on the streets, have occupied mainly the time and attention of the missionaries.

But added to all this variety of effort, the missionary has the full care of the church in a deeper sense than can be realized by his brethren at home. He is, emphatically, the shepherd of his flock,—eye, and voice, and hand, in requisition at all times,—watching, cheering, comforting, leading, tending, and restraining.

Nor is this all. The property he has secured, the buildings he has reared, the homes he has founded, are his only as steward. They represent to him the hard-earned dollars and cents of his brethren and sisters in his native land, freely bestowed that centres of usefulness might be established in the land of the stranger. The conduct and management of the several compounds, with mission and native helpers' houses, schools, buildings and chapels, call for a large amount of his best time and thoughts, and with this burden alone he must at certain occasions be almost weighed down. In view of all that has been accomplished by our missionaries in the midst of such varied and pressing cares, and such responsible duties during the past year, your Board desire to record their grateful acknowlegements to God and to them. As the situation is understood by the brethren at home, a heartier sympathy, a more eaanest prayer, a wider and more cheerful benevolence, must result.

### TOURING.

Next in importance to the cultivation and bringing to some degree of perfection the fruits of christianity in the hearts and lives of the people of the community in which the missionary resides, and, indeed, lying parallel to this continuous occupation and concentration of the missionaries' efforts, is the duty of going forth to those who are beyond, whose condition of ignorance and superstition is ever sending forth the Macedonion cry, "Come over and help us." Until the nucleus of a christian church was formed at each of the stations, and converts from heathenism had been gathered together and instructed in the truths and doctrines of christianity, and men had been raised up to carry the lamp of life to their perishing brethren, such scattered labors could not be conducted with any hope of early practical results. Here and there a ray of divine light might have entered the prison house, and the shackles of idolatry might have been loos-

ened from a human soul by the "fire and the hammer," but little could have been done toward leading the soul out into the the light and liberty of the gospel. So it came about that not until last year was an opportunity afforded our missionaries of extending their labors, in anything like a systematic manner, beyond the immediate vicinity of their compounds, or the towns in which they are situated. The work so well begun last year has been more formally and thoroughly prosecuted during the year now closing. In hundreds of villages "the truth as it is in Jesus" has been proclaimed by our missionaries and the native preachers under their charge. A brief reference or two must suffice to show what has been done in this section of missionary effort.

Brother Hutchinson made his first gospel tour early in October last. Ten days were spent upon the field, during which time he visited thirty-one villages, in some speaking several times. He was accompanied by Juggian and Sookriah, each of whom took part in the speaking. Thus, one would address the people on "The Creation and Fall of Man," the next on "The Birth and Life of Christ," and the third on "Salvation, and How to get it." In all the villages but three the people listened with attention and respect. The Holy Spirit seemed to have prepared the way before his servants' feet. In November, with five helpers, he spent eight days on the field, visiting the district east of Chicacole. In December sixteen days were spent with his assistants in visiting the country to the north-west, to the foot of the Ghauts. During this tour the people of over one hundred towns and villages were permitted to hear the Word, and everywhere the missionary was received with respect, and his messages listened to with attention. In February the fielding covered fourteen days, the missionary visiting all the villages from Akalatampara, via Heriandelam to the town of Botteli, sixty miles from Chicacole. After Mr. Hutchinson's return his helpers remained on the field six days longer, preaching and distributing portions of scripture and tracts.

These items are taken from the record of one missionary, but, as will more fully appear from the reports of the missionaries to be appended hereto, they only indicate the extent of this class of work which has occupied the time and energies of all our faithful laborers, as the season and relief from the special home duties of their respective stations permitted. Interesting extracts might be given of particular tours made by brother Sanford with his five native helpers, assisted by brother Archibald, Miss Hammond, and the boarding girls; by brother Churchill in the more remote and darker parts of the Bobbili district, with his two zealous assistants; and since his return, of similar work by brother and sister Archibald. But sufficient has already been said to indicate the great extent of the field and the assiduous efforts which have been put forth to scatter the good seed of the

kingdom.

### OUT-STATIONS.

During the year three new out-stations have been established. The most important of these is undoubtedly that at Kemedy, which was formerly our northern station, but was abandoned for Chicacole, on account of the failing health of the then resident missionary and his family. Here a property has been purchased, and the buildings upon it are used for the residence of the native helper and his family, who have been appointed to the charge of the work, and as a place of gathering for religious worship, by those who may accept Christianity. The town has a population of 15,365 and the Zemindari 280,132. From this point also the Savara people, a population of about 100,000, can best be reached. The appointment of Sookriah to the charge of this station appears to be very satisfactory, and it has the hearty approval of your Board. The cost of purchase has been assumed by the Tabernacle Sunday School, Halifax.

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Sookriah is an Oriyah man, who studied in Behampore (Hindu) College. He was baptized by Bro. Hutchinson on October 4th, having previously been connected with the London Missionary Society. His wife was baptized some years ago at Berhampore. Both were welcomed into the fellowship of the Chicacole Church on the afternoon of his baptism. They had been for two years constant in their attendance upon the meetings and had contributed regularly to the funds of the church. He was at once put to work at itinerating and proved to be a valuable assistant.

At Urlam, some distance east of Chicacole, near the coast, a preacher has been stationed. He and his wife at present occupy a house placed at the disposal of the missionary by a Miss Laval, only the outlay of a few rupees being necessary to make it suitable for their residence. The helper's name is Juggayah.

The third out-station planted this year is at Pedda-Penkie, a few miles east of Bobbili, where a piece of land has been obtained, and Kotiah, and Niela, his wife, were to take up their residence there as soon as arrangements could be made for their accommodation.

### SCHOOLS.

Among the first signs of the preaching of Christ Jesus having taken some hold upon the minds of the people, is the desire they express that their children may be taught to read and write, and that the missionary will open a school for that purpose. Although this is no evidence that the truth has affected their hearts so as to produce a change in their religious habits and lives, yet it does show that the people realize to some extent that this new religion brings with it some blessings which the old did not afford, for now, as in the days of our Lord, it is the poor to whom the gospel is preached, and when those who have lived in the grossest darkness come to understand that even for them there is a possibility of light beaming in upon them, though they

may see in that possibility only a means of improving their social condition and ameliorating their temporal wants, the channel is opened through which the rays of the Sun of Righteousness may illuminate their spiritual natures. It is because of the opportunities afforded the missionary of making the young acquainted with the truths of revealed religion that they so readily respond to the early demands of the people for the establishment of schools.

At each of our stations we have schools in a general state of efficiency. That at Bimlipatam for boys and girls, has been under the management of Miss Hammond, now Mrs. Archibald. Upon her removal to Bobbili early in the spring, it was reorganized, one of the boarding girls, who had previously passed a satisfactory examination in the Third Standard of the Course of Instruction prescribed for Government schools, going in as second teacher.

At Chicacole the boys' and girls' schools are separate. Both are under the direction of Mrs. Hutchinson. Here too, one of the boarding girls, has been given a place as instructor.

At Bobbili there were two schools, one of which was for the Gadaba children. They were under the management of Mrs. Churchill, until her return to this country, when they were handed over to Mrs. Archibald, who, with the remaining boarding girls, are carrying on the work.

In addition, schools are conducted at Comanapilli, Tekkali, Kimedy, Urlam, and among the Saura tribe, who inhabit the

villages at the foot of the Ghauts.

At first it was necessary to carry on these schools by the aid of heathen teachers, but gradually, as Christians could be obtained whose attainments fitted them for the work of teaching, the services of men who refused to yield to the claims of Christ, although possessing some knowledge of the plan of salvation, were gradually dispensed with. As the conduct of schools, from the outset of our mission, has been regarded merely as a means to the end that the knowledge of Christ might be more widely disseminated, the securing of Christian teachers has been one of the first points towards which our missionaries have directed their energies, with this result, that the Lord has raised up for us, a staff of young men and women, who have received their education in our mission schools, and who, having themselves learned of Jesus, are now qualified to enter upon the work of teaching others. Thus at Chicacole, Nersimhulu, after three terms in the Seminary at Samulcotta, took the place of Subbrow, the heathen head teacher, and Ruth, Cassie, and Nelly take their places as assistants at the three stations. Only at Bobbili is a heathen teacher retained, and his place will be filled by a Christian as soon as the right man is found. Possibly one of the young men now taking their last year at the Seminary may feel his heart turning toward this work.

### EDUCATION OF NATIVE HELPERS.

In the progress that has been apparent to your Board, they have learned that two objects have steadily to be borne in mind, toward which their best efforts, and that of the missionaries must be constantly engaged. The first of these is to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ to all who will open their ears and their hearts to its teachings. To this end the living preacher is sent forth with the word of life, and by this means the blessings of salvation are placed within the reach of multitudes who are perishing. But if nothing more than this be done, no permanent and wide spreading result can be reasonably anticipated. The heathen are generally in a condition of painful intellectual weakness. The converts are surrounded by people weak like themselves-superstitious, idolatrous, vicious. To leave the converts to themselves would be to leave the light of Christianity in a condition where it would soon become dim, if not utterly extinguished. On the other hand, to continue our labors with no end in view but the preaching of the gospel to them, would be to place upon our people the burden of supplying all the preachers necessary to reach the millions in idolatrous darkness, a course which would be manifestly impracticable. Regard must therefore be had to another object, viz., that of enabling the native converts to sustain and carry to completion the work which we, by our missionaries, have commenced. In other words, we must labor to build up and establish a native ministry. Christian converts must be taught to read, and their children and the children of others must be instructed to as wide an extent as circumstances will permit. Until such instruction is given, bibles, tracts and religious literature are useless. And even when the people are taught to read, their minds do not readily take in the plan of salvation, and still less do they comprehend the system of practical duties which the gospel enjoins. It follows, then, that to accomplish the purpose we have in view, we must be prepared to teach and train a corps of native preachers, whose duty it will be, as soon as openings occur, and their attainments in christian knowledge and experience warrant, to take charge of the converts, bring them into church relations, and form centres for more extended operations. however, has to be exercised that the ordaining of preachers is Great care, not done hastily. The converts must be tested, their faults corrected, their ignorance dispelled, and their principles established, before they can judiciously be sent away beyond the direct influence of the missionary.

To do this work in a more systematic and thorough manner than it could be done by the missionar is on the several compounds, the theological Seminary at Samulcatta was established by the Ontario Board, and arrangements of a generally satisfactory character were mutually agreed upon by our missionaries and the principal of that institution, by which

our students would be given the advantages such a school is designed to bestow. During the past year three students were sent from Bimlipatam, five from Chicacole, and two from Bobbili. The last, Kammiah and his wife, turned out to be entirely unfit for the work and position of christian leaders and teachers, and were therefore dismissed. The others, some of whom had attended the previous year, showed marked abilities, and won the esteem and confidence of those in charge. When they returned to their respective stations they at once entered upon systematic work under the direction of the missionaries.

It will be readily seen that this branch of our foreign mission work is of vital importance, and calls for the prayers and sympathies, as well as the financial support of our people at home.

From time to time, during the past year, the question of a closer union with our Ontario brethren in Seminary work has occupied a large place in the consideration of your Board and its missionaries. At the Canadian Telugu Conference held at Cocanada in January last, a basis for such union was considered, and sent to the two Boards for their consideration. Up to the present time no official correspondence has been had with the Ontario Board upon the subject. The basis is one that involves a large outlay of money, and the assumption of responsibilities which your Board in its present financial difficulties does not feel justified in assuming, especially as the present arrangement of paying by fees appears to be satisfactory to those in charge of the institution, and involves as large an outlay as the resources at the command of the Board appear to justify. Should Convention, however, deem it prudent to enter into closer relations with our Ontario brethren in this matter, the Board will give to its suggestions their best consideration, and act as circumstances may

The basis of union as submitted to the Board is in the following terms:

I. FINANCIAL. (a) The Boards to pay an equal share in providing buildings, teachers, school furniture and apparatus, and in all expenditure on account of repairs to such buildings, etc.

(b) In regard to board, lodging, clothing, school books and all expenses personal to the student, the Boards to pay pro rata according to the students sent.

II. GOVERNMENT. (a) The Principal of the school shall be nominated by the Conference of missionaries, and appointed by the joint action of the Boards at home.

(b) The Seminary to be under the government of a Board consisting of two members of each mission, appointed by their respective Boards, and the Principal, who shall be Chairman.

### GENERAL.

On October 25th, 1883, our faithful and well-beloved sister, Miss Carrie A. Hammond, was united in marriage to the Rev. I.

C. Archibald. The ceremony took place at Bimlipatam, in the presence of all the resident missionaries.

Early in April the native Association held its second annual gathering at Chicacole. A large representation was present and a most profitable season was enjoyed.

The necessity for increased prayerfulness cannot be too frequently nor too strongly urged. But to the

prayers must be added the property of the church. Prayer must sanctify the offering of property, and property must endorse the sincerity of prayer, while both find a common acceptance through the Redeemer's blood.

### Report of Missionaries.

### BIMLIPATAM.

(For the year ending June 30, 1884.)

REV. R. SANFORD.

Mrs. Sanford, in Nova Scotia.

MISS C. H. HAMMOND, (Mrs. I. C. ARCHIBALD), part of the year, i. e., until February, 1884.

Our report will embrace but a few points. Our method of work is sufficiently well known to render it unnecessary to rehearse details, as though that method had never been reported. You naturally ask what has been accomplished? Mave souls been saved? Has the church been built up? Has the gospel been widely and lovingly proclaimed? To each of these questions, through God's grace we are enabled, we trust, to give answers which are in a measure satisfactory.

The most deeply interesting feature of the work is that which the Lord has been pleased to do among the Eurasian people. During the entire year the Spirit's power has been manifest, in a quiet way; and we have rejoiced in seeing a number put on Christ publicly as His law requires. Only a few weeks since, a man and his wife from Vizagapatam came in impressed with their duty to follow Jesus. Before their return ten days after, they had the joy of obeying Him in baptism. There are others also who are looking Zionward. The Lord will bring them in

ere long, we trust.

One especially cheering fact is this. Those who come seem impressed with the importance of going to work for Christ, both on behalf of their own people and the Telugus. Having been familiar with the language from childhood, it is comparatively easy to communicate the good tidings which they themselves have received. Some have gone to other places to reside. Three young women who live in this vicinity, assist in the Sabbathschool, house-to-house visitation, and also conduct religious efforts at regularly appointed places among the heathen women. They are an excellent help. Their devotion to Christian work afford us great encouragement.

Quite recently the Eurasian and Telugu Christians, -members

of our churches, residing in the town of Vizagapatam, numbered This state of things requires that we should look after our interests there. It is under cortemplation to visit that town occasionally during the months to come. Hitherto we have avoided doing so, under the consideration that the town is not destitute of mission agents. It seems evident that the Lord is preparing the way for others to come. During a long time past, both Eurasian and European residents in these parts, although having a form of godliness received from Roman Catholic and Church of England teaching, with few exceptions, have been a stumbling block before the natives. Well might they say, as they often do,-"We do not see that the Christian religion is any better than our own." If, however, they have set before them an exemplification of practical piety, the gospel is likely to win its way more readily to their hearts. We feel this is one of the stepping stones to success in evangelizing the heathen who live in these large commercial towns.

Although we have not expended especial effort, nor do we anticipate doing so, yet the Lord has shown us that this department must not be neglected. It yields fruit, which, with the blessing of God, will turn to good account. In our reports hitherto we have not made any distinction between Eurasian and Telugu converts, because the time has not come to establish separate churches.

It is with deep gratitude we observe how God has opened the way before us, and has caused the leaven of His truth to spread in the midst of determined opposition.

### JEYPORE.

An important change recently has taken place in reference to work there. After consulting those in charge of the Bobbili station we proceeded to put that work in connection with the Bobbili field. Bimlipatam is fifty miles further away than Bobbili. We continued the financial support of the work there until the end of the year. About two months since the three surviving members out of a company of seven Christians whom we had there at one time, were received into the church at Bobbili; three others were baptized and two couples married by Brother Archibald. While noting these facts let us bear in mind, that work in that region has not failed. The prospect now is brighter than ever before. Let us rejoice with our good sister, Mrs. Scott, of Truro, whose generous yearly donations enabled us to begin and carry on Christian effort in that dark region. A fire has been kindled which will not go out. God does not allow the prayers and offerings of His believing ones to be spent in vain.

Our work generally seems to be in a fairly prosperous condition. We are not content to rest satisfied with present methods or results. If any improvement is suggested we are ready to

Our native preachers are regularly engaged in work on the

field. During the latter part of the year especially they have made short tours, returning to their homes in order to take part in the Sabbath services. Several preaching places are occupied regularly on Sabbath evenings. All the towns and villages within a pretty large radius have been visited repeatedly.

### CHICACOLE.

(June 1st, 1883 to June 30th, 1884.)

REV. J. R. HUTCHINSON. Missionaries. MRS. J. R. HUTCHINSON.

This year has, through the blessing of God, been one of advance

(a) In Numbers. More have been added to the church than in any previous year since the establishment of the station.

(b) In extension of the work. Kimedy has been included in the list of equipped out stations.

(c) IN EXTENSION OF FACILITIES FOR WORK. A most valuable addition to the Chicacole mission property has been acquired in the former London Mission chapel. The Akalatampara church has built a house of worship. A permanent foothold has been secured in Kimedy, by the purchase of a well situated property.

(d) In acquaintance with the field, as regards its people, condition, and needs.

(e) In the Language. As our only means of making plain the Way, a thorough knowledge of the vernacular is all important. Through the blessing of continued good health, and by dint of much hard study, the language begins to grow pliable. A commencement has also been made in Savara.

(f) In the manifestation of a deeper and truer interest in the work on the part of the larger number of our native helpers.

Sutana, (Moncton, S. S.), Paulus, and Cunchaya, (Bible Colporteur), have dropped out of the list—the two former voluntarily; the last dismissed by the Superintendent of Colportage of the Bible Society for neglect of work.

Herriama's attention and time being fully occupied with a sick husband, she finds no opportunity for Bible work.

B. Bahara is a man of about 50, and has usually more ailments than energy. But he fights the good fight of faith bravely at times. I have felt surer of his hearty co-operation during the past year than ever before. He has worked regularly and well, preaching the word in season and out of season, far and near, often under difficulties. He speaks both Telugu and Oriyah with fluency, has a fair knowledge of the Shastras, and is a good man for a self-conceited Brahmin or loud-voiced Komatee to tackle. His views of Christian doctrine, if not broad or deep, are luminous and well adapted to his hearers. He is known and respected over all the country.

Gorahatte is a man of about 45, and an Oriyah. Much has already been written about him. The past year's suffering has reduced him to a mere shadow. His disease seems to have almost healed outwardly; but it is active within. His "labour of love and patience of hope" are touching. He still watches with a true shepherd's care over the little flock which the Master has committed to his charge. "My heavenly home is bright and clear" is the tenor of his conversation in the Lord.

Sookrya is also an Oriyah. A Christian for years he only recently followed his convictions on baptism. He is about 25 years of age, has a wife and one child, is intelligent, earnest, and pos-

sessed of more "push" than the ordinary native. He promises to make a useful and helpful man.

Jaggaya is a converted merchant. He is a poor speaker, a dull thinker—but still a steady going, faithful fellow. When he entered upon his present work he could not read the titles of the books. He knew the alphabet and could read and write a little in his own line of business. Many things—age, spectacles, stupidity that had apparently gone to seed and produced a second crop—were against his learning more; but he has tried hard, and is now well on in the second book. His sales are not large, but they are honest and sure.

Shanthama is a fairly educated woman (in the Hindu sense) of about 40. She speaks both Telugu and Oriyah and is the widow of a former preacher. Owing to ill-health her work is of a desultory nature. She plans more, I fear, for her now marriagable daughter than for the Master's kingdom.

From an intimate acquaintance with these brethren I believe that they all have had a true change of heart.

A brief account of the year's work at the stations and substations will be of interest. These are,

### CHICACOLE,

a town of some 16,000 inhabitants. Here are the mission house, chapel, and school buildings.

The event of the year in the history of the little church has been the purchase of a chapel. This was built some 20 years ago at a cost of about Rs. 2500, by the London Mission. From various causes their then flourishing church has dwindled away to nothing. The chapel was fast going to ruin when the Society resolved to sell. Having had timely intimation of this the missionaries, with the consent of the Board, opened negotiations for the building. These resulted in its purchase for the sum of Rs. 900, to be paid on transfer of the property by deed. Possession was had on March 1st.

The building required immediate and extensive repairs. Kind friends in Bimli, Chicacole, and Kimedy subscribed Rs. 257 and the work was undertaken at once. May 31st saw the old chapel completely transformed into a substantial and pleasant place of worship at a cost of Rs. 315.

The main part of the building measures  $21\frac{1}{2} \times 55\frac{1}{2}$  feet; the vestry,  $21\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  feet. Around three sides is a verandah 10 feet wide. The total length of the building is 113 feet. The compound contains about  $\frac{1}{2}$  acre of land. The situation is all that could be desired—being almost on the *chouk* or main business centre of the town.

We desire to express our gratitude to the N. S. Central Board of W. M. A. S., for their prompt vote of \$200 in response to our request for aid in purchasing the chapel.

The year's services have been well attended. Many of our prayer meetings were precious seasons. I have usually taken

the Sabbath morning preaching service. Tammiah, the second teacher in the boy's school, has rendered valuable assistance in connection with the other services.

The church has its deacons and clerk, and now only lacks a native pastor. The right man has not come yet. The church has raised by collections and monthy offerings during the year the sum of Rs. 59.

Some cases of improper conduct on the part of certain members, have been dealt with by the church. The spiritual condition of the church is in the main encouraging. Some of the new converts have manifested a marked growth in grace.

The Sunday school has been large and interesting. Average attendance for the year 47. A Saturday evening teacher's Bible Class has been maintained.

At the request of Mrs. Sewell services were held for many months of the year with the Collector's servants and others in Old Chicacole. The attendance has ranged from 12 to 36. We pray that these gatherings may be blessed.

The Association of the native churches of the mission held in the Chicacole Chapel on April 5th, 6th, and 7th, was deeply interesting. About 45 native Christians were present representing four churches.

The schools at this station are two in number. The girls' school is small but is doing good work. Ruth is the teacher. The boys' school is now under Nersimhulu as first and Tammiah as second teachers. The average attendance for the year is 27.2. Both teachers are Christians, and one is well qualified for his work. The school promises to be more efficient in future. Both schools are under Mrs. Hutchinson's supervision. In connection with them she has done considerable visiting in town.

### AKALATAMPARA,

a village of about 800 inhabitants, is situated some eight miles N. W. of Kimedy. Fourteen Christians compose the church here, and reside in this village, or in Comminapilli, across the river. The Naidu of the village is a Christian. B. Bahara is pastor. Sunday and week-day services are held regularly in Akalatampara, and occasionally in Comminapilli. A Sunday School maintained throughout the year has averaged twenty. A collection is taken weekly and the communion is observed monthly. Two members have been excluded during the year. There are several inquirers.

The past year has witnessed in Akalatampara the building of the first christian chapel in the Purla Kimedy district. It is small, but sufficient for both the present and future needs of the church. The cost (with a thatch roof to be replaced by tiles,) was Rs. 118. Of this amount the church members gave over Rs. 26, the school grant Rs. 32, and the Board and others the remainder.

The school at this place has been prosperous. James is the

teacher. The attendance ranges from 15 to 20. A school started a year ago in Comminappilli has also prospered under the care of Narayanadass. It drew a grant of Rs. 22.

### KIMEDY

is a town of about 15,000 inhabitants, situated inland at the foot of the Ghauts, 42 miles from Chicacole. In February of the present year a native house and plot of ground was purchased for the sum of Rs. 82. In March Sookrya removed there with his family. A small building on the ground purchased is used for Sunday services. There are about a dozen regular attendants and a number of inquirers. Two of these seem sincere. The prospect of success in this town is good. It is a pity the mission property here was ever sold. The Roman Catholics are getting a hold in the town, and we must secure a site for a chapel as soon as possible.

### TEKKALI,

a town of some 7,000 inhabitants, is near the sea coast, 36 miles N. E. of Chicacole. It is a hard place, filled with heathen temples. Those who assert that no new temples are being built in India, should visit Tekkali and Kimedy.

Ten of the Chicacole church members live here. Gorahatte is the Christian teacher. The Christians are Oriyahs and Savaras. Regular Sabbath and week day services are kept up. The collection box contained Rs. 8 when opened last month. Two are awaiting baptism.

Gorahatte's school has been discontinued for about a year, owing to his poor health. The Oryiah school of 16 boys is now being taught by Ruthnia, a christian young man.

Two pieces of land were donated in trust to the mission—one in town for a chapel; the other out of town for a burial ground. In pursuance of a decree of the Civil Court, with which I was unacquainted, in the Ranee's case of some three years ago to recover property donated to Gorahatte when a Hindu, the former piece was taken possession of some months ago by the court officials. The sum of Rs. 100 less court fees was paid Gorahatte as compensation.

I have arranged for Sookrya and B. Bahara to visit Tekkali at regular intervals during Gorahatte's continued sickness.

I have visited the above named places in person several times during the year and write these notes from observation.

My attempt to settle a native helper at Calingapatam failed. Paulus abandoned the work at the last moment.

Of these all but the last named spent the year at the Seminary. Their progress was very satisfactory. Pedda Nersimhulu will remain at the station as head teacher of the boys' school, while the others return to Samulcotta in July. The average cost of maintainance last year, including two Seminary terms and vacations, was about Rs. 75 per head.

Luchmeya is a new student. He was baptized in May, '82, since which time he has learned to read and write, aided by his wife Martha, formerly a boarding girl of Mrs. Armstrong's. He is a lover and diligent student of the Word, and bids fair to make an earnest and practical worker for the Master.

### BOARDERS

are, Soorya, a rapidly improving lad of 14, (St. Martins, N. B., S. S.), and Utchima, an aged widow. Two young girls are shortly expected as bearders, one of whom is a Savara, Venkia's

BOARDING DEPARTMENT. MIRIAM, LIZZIE, SUSIE, YERRICAH, CHINNIE, RACHEL, CHITUN, and his wife YELLOWMONI. My report of direct mission work is a brief one, covering, as it

does, only half of the year.

From the date of our last convention till the end of February my time was mostly spent at Bobbili or in touring among the villages in the Bobbili field.

### STATION WORK.

During the rainy season our work was mostly confined to Bobbili and the villages in the immediate vicinity, several of which were frequently visited by myself and native helpers.

At Bobbili a daily morning service was held, conducted by myself and native helpers. At this service a passage of Scripture was read, remarks made and prayer offered. A female prayer meeting on Wednesday afternoon and a general prayer meeting on Thursday afternoon, was also held, at which several persons from town and elsewhere were sometimes present.

The Sunday service was changed to afternoon and an effort made to establish a Sunday morning service at the school house in town. Sometimes quite a number would be present, and at other times none would come, in which case we would go into the streets and bazaars. On week days the native helpers have gone regularly into the town or to the villages near, and I have frequently accompanied them. The reception accorded has been much as in former years. Many have listened, some with interest, while others have opposed. On the whole I think the feeling toward us is becoming more friendly as the people come to know us better.

### SCHOOL WORK.

Mrs. Churchill's girls' school in town was continued to the time of our departure from the station, with varying success. Toward the end of the year, when Mrs. C. was able to visit among the parents, the attendance was much better. Constant visiting is necessary to keep the children at school, but in this way Mrs. C. was able to reach many of the women at their homes.

The school on the compound was also continued. The Gadaba boys, for whom this was principally intended, were with difficulty induced to attend regularly. Some of our servants' children also attended the school. Both schools were united in a Sunday

school on Sunday morning.

### TOURING.

In October a short tour of four days was made, during which twelve villages near the road leading to Bimlipatam, were visited. In some of these considerable interest was manifest.

In November another tour was made among the villages north of Bobbili, along and near the main road. During the twenty days thus occupied, I visited personally more than sixty villages, and several others were visited by the native helpers.

Some of these had previously been visited by us, and in each our reception was uniformly respectful. In many others no Christian teachers had ever been seen. In a few, near Paravatipooram, and along the main road, some had read our books and had heard something of the truth.

In December another tour of ten days ending on New Year's day was made among villages west of Bobbili, near the hills. During this tour twenty villages besides Salur were visited.

Just before leaving Bobbili in February in company with Bro. Archibald, a short tour of three days was made and several villages east of Bobbili were visited.

The principal object of this trip was to secure land in one of the villages on which to build a house for one of our native helpers.

### COLPORTAGE.

Not much was done in this direction owing to our not having the proper man. Some books and tracts were distributed through a young man not a Christian, to whom we gave them, allowing him to get for them what he could.

### DEPARTURE.

On the 28th of February the work was handed over to Bro. Archibald and bidding good-bye to Bobbili, the scene of much that has been trying and yet at the same time of much mercy and some encouragement, our faces were turned toward the home land for needed change and recuperation.

Through the kind care of our Master, after a pleasant voyage, we reached Halifax on the 16th of May. While we have been made sad at times by the changes that have taken place in the removal of many old friends, yet our hearts have also been gladdened by the warm welcome accorded to us by our Board and by our people at home. Since our arrival most of our time has been occupied in attending five of our Associations, besides which I have spoken at sixteen places on our mission enterprise. During the coming year I hope to spend a good portion of my time in visiting our churches and presenting to them the needs of our Foreign Mission work.

G. CHURCHILL.

Hebron, N. S., August 11th, 1884.

I have had charge of the work at this station for so short a time that I shall not be expected to add much to the report of Bro. Churchill.

My chief work during these four months has been the study of the language, in which, by the aid of a good munshi, I have made fair progress.

I have had many Christian conversations in my study with people from different parts of the field, and have gone into the

town and to adjacent villages quite frequently to preach Jesus Christ and him crucified. On these occasions I have been accompanied by Mrs. Archibald, our native helpers, and one or more of the Christian boarding girls. Almost invariably we have had a good hearing, and our hearts have been encouraged. The attendance of the heathen at our Sunday school and preaching services on Sunday mornings, has been larger than we anticipated. The attendance at the day school has not been large. As a means of reaching the people with the gospel it appears to accomplish but little.

Several matters outside of what might be called mission work have received attention. Land on which to build a house for one of our preachers has been secured at Pedda-Penkie, a town well located for work, about ten miles east of Bobbili. Some timber has been purchased and is being made ready, but as the balance cannot be bought just now at a reasonable rate, the work of building has been postponed until near the close of the year.

Kotapand, in the Jeypore country, has been recently transerred from the charge of the Bimlipatam station to Bobbili, and is now

the first out-station of our work.


Pedda-Penkie bids fair to be our second out-station. vadhi Putnaik, the Jeypore colporteur and preacher, was with us for a month, and learned much that we trust will make his work on behalf of his countrymen more effective for good. Chitun and his wife, Yellowmoni, who are boarding here, are from that country. Their native tongue is Oriyah, but they can speak considerable of Telugu, and are learning to read and write it.

Our Bible Woman is giving all the time she can spare from her family duties, to work among the women of Bobbili and the near villages. She is a capable woman, and we are looking for blessed results from her work. She is now usually accompanied

by Lizzie, one of the boarding girls.

We have two students for the Seminary at Samulcotta for next year-Subraidu and Nellie-who will be married early next month. During the vacation the former has been a great help and blessing to us and the work. He appears to be sound on the manual labor question. When he finds coolies at work he often takes hold and helps, and at the same time tells them of Jesus, whom he loves. The people are noticing the difference between his spirit and that of the older helpers in this respect. In his preaching also there is more life and gospel truth. He has a living interest in the salvation of his countrymen, which few of our native helpers in India manifest.

We have made some changes in our buildings which appeared to be necessary to secure more and better accommodation. The wall which divided the two rooms of our town school house has been removed, and we have now a room quite well suited for our services. On the compound a new stable has been built, and also a small building in which to store the rice in husk for the use of

the boarding girls and native Christians. The old stable has been thoroughly repaired and converted into a dwelling house. The house of the native preachers has also been re-roofed. One hundred and sixty three yards of mud wall has been built around a part of the compound which was previously uninclosed. More than thirty white ant hills have been dug up, so that now, in this vicinity, cobras, scorpions, and other venomous reptiles have fewer lodging places than formerly.

The last monthly meeting of our Christians was full of encouragement. Some hopeful cases were brought to our notice. A good many people are listening attentively to our message. Mrs. Archibald's Bible classes have been doing excellent work, and the blessing of God has attended the truth communicated.

# Fourteenth Annual Report of the Central Board of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies of Nova Scotia.

The past year will ever be noted in our history as a Society, it being the time when we began to walk alone, or, in other words, to act as Societies on the same basis as our sisters in the United States and the Upper Provinces. The plan thus far has worked well. Money has been sent into the treasury as freely as before and appropriations have been made in accordance with the wishes of Societies, or donors, and also to the best judgment of the Central Board, guided by the estimates kindly furnished by the Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board. The Treasurer's account shows that the amount received from all sources is largely in advance of last year. This in itself is encouraging, and taken in connection with the success which has attended the labors of our County Mission Agents, warrants us in indulging the hope of still greater success in the future. The following ladies have consented to act in this capacity :- Mrs. Jos. Kempton, for Lunenburg Co.; Mrs. J. T. Eaton, for Annapolis Co.; Mrs. P. R. Foster, for Shelburne; Mrs. W. E. Hall, for Digby; Mrs. J. C. Morse, for Digby Neck; Mrs. C. H. Martell, for Colchester; Mrs. G. Botsford Smith, Cumberland. Mainly through the exertions of these sisters twelve new Societies have been formed, as follows,—at Chester, Chester Basin, Bridgewater, Mahone Bay, East Onslow, Lower Stewiacke, Evergreen, Annapolis

Co., Margaretville, Annapolis Co., New Ross, Lun. Co., Lawrencetown, Annapolis Co., Walton, Hants Co., and Sable River, Shelburne Co. It will be seen by this list that a large portion of eur Prevince is still unprovided for in this way. Hants, Queens, Halifax, Kings, Cape Breton, &c., need help from this source. Will not some sisters join this pioneer band, and thus do good service to the noble cause we so much love?

The Central Board is very sorry that so many of the Societies failed to respond to their request to fill in the printed slips sent them during the past quarter. The Secretary is therefore unable to give a full and correct statement of the standing of the Societies. Our paying Societies number 53 this year, and from these but 30 returns have been received, and of these only 20 were answered in full. In these 30 churches alone upwards of two thousand sisters are members, but of this number we find only 743 giving two cents a week to send the Bread of Life to the perishing millions of heathen. Think of it. Who so poor but they can spare that small sum for other things.

Nine Mission Bands have reported themselves, and a good record they give, but we should be sorry to know that these are the only ones in our Province, as, from the good work they have done, we see what a power the children hold, and what they may accomplish when deeply interested and wisely directed—this last item perhaps the more important of the two. These nine helpers to our cause alone, report 470 members.

Four life members have been added to the list this year,—Mrs. G. Botsford Smith, and Mrs. W. D. Corbett, of Amherst, Mrs. C. H. Martell, of Onslow, and Miss Jessie E. Chipman, of Bridgetown.

In the spring of this year a box of articles for the use of the missionaries was sent from their numerous friends in these Provinces. It was received by them in June, and gave much satisfaction to all concerned.

In October of last year our Missionary, Miss Hammond, was married to Rev. I. C. Archibald, leaving us without a representative in Telugu. But not for long did this sad state of things continue. The Lord put it into the heart of a young sister to offer herself to fill up the vacancy. Miss Wright came before the Nova Scotia Central Board, was subsequently accepted by the Foreign Mission Board, and during the past summer has attended the Associations and visited some Societies, thereby creating a deeper interest in Missions, and making for herself hosts of friends who will not forget her when she is far away at her chosen life work. It is much to be regretted that no more time could be employed in this way, as far more interest will attach itself to the letters which may be received from our sister and appear in our papers, from the fact that she was once personally known, if even in so imperfect a manner as merely by a glance of the eye or grasp of the hand. Soon after Convention this dear sister

will leave her home and friends, but your responsibilities in connection with her will still remain. The Central Boards of these three Provinces look to the sisters for the means to sustain the work we have undertaken in their name. But beyond and above this, the Lord expects your prayers as well. See to it that your place in the monthly meeting is filled. Come prepared to give, as well as to receive a blessing; and if some self-denial is occasioned by this course, so much the better. "Two cents a week and a prayer" from each member of our churches would accomplish more than we think. We say churches, not societies, for surely each member of the former should also feel it their duty to become of the latter.

Our dear missionary friends, Mr. and Mrs. Churchill, with their two children, arrived at their home in May, for much needed rest. Their presence has added greatly to the interest of our W. M. A. meetings, at the Associations, and elsewhere.

Letters received from Mrs. Hutchinson and Mrs. Archibald give grounds of encouragement that the good seed sown by them in faith and watered by prayer, shall, in the Lord's appointed time bring forth good fruit to his glory. Sisters, have you anything to do with this? In closing our Report we commend the following sentences, taken from a sermon by Rev. J. McLaurin, missionary to India, to your prayerful consideration:

"Now, what do we want of you? We do not want your money without your prayers—money without prayer is a poor, hard, soulless thing. Not the few words you utter as you shuffle out of bed in the morning, or the few sleepy words spoken as you roll yourselves in at night. Such prayers do not reach the ceilings of your rooms, but we want the prayers which come from the deepest depths of your hearts—'the heart's desire.' We want them so strong and fervent as to project a spiritual atmosphere away across the intervening thousands of miles to India—prayer that we can feel there."

We would still continue to urge upon our sisters and societies the support of our missionary paper, the *Missionary Link*. It is readable from the first word to the last, containing a great amount of interesting intelligence from the different stations in India, and at such a reasonable price as to bring it within the reach of all.

# Fourteenth Annual Report of the Central Board of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies of New Brunswick.

We can scarcely realize that a year has passed since we penned our last report, but the time has gone with its improved and misimproved opportunities for earnest work for the Master.

No change has been made in the membership of the Board, excepting the resignation of Mrs. William Scott, one of the members of Portland church, who has been, since the organization of the Board, one of its best members. Through foul as well as fair weather she was ever in her place; her cheerful countenance, her words of counsel, and her eloquent silence, have been a stimulus and a great support to those who have had to carry more prominent burdens. We cannot part with her without placing on record some words of our appreciation of her inestimable worth; nor could we endure to see another fill her place, only we know her failing health will not admit of her continued work in this department.

Our regular meetings have been pleasant. Plans have been laid and carried into operation, which we have already found to be of the Lord's ordering. We refer especially to the monthly public meetings held in the various churches, and also to the Associational meetings. These have all had the special benediction of our Heavenly Father. We have had His promises verified to us, and have found indeed that as our day so our strength has been. From these meetings have gone out an influence for good that will live when we are mouldering in the tomb.

Five societies have been organized, others have been revived, and a number of individuals not yet connected with any society pledged to enter this field and work until the Master calls them home. They have been made to see that already too much of their time has run to waste.

Appended to this report will be found a list of non-contributing societies, and as we come to their doors we would stand aside while the sweet voice of the Master asks, "Lovest thou me? Lovest thou me?" And while some may be grieved at his repeated asking, He will continue to say, "Feed my sheep," "Feed

my lambs." We do trust that before another year has passed, those long bolted doors will be opened and from glad loving hearts from within will be sent to our perishing sisters in India the bread of eternal life.

The old Societies that have stood through all the ups and downs, have not fallen behind in their contributions. We are happy in being able to say their contributions have exceeded by one hundred and twenty-five dollars that of any previous year. But oh, how small compared with what the work demands, and especially this year, when, in addition to the work already undertaken, we propose to send out fresh recruits to aid our weary workers, who find the field so large and the laborers so few.

Many have, and will, join us in a warm welcome to our dear sister Churchill. Her return home has already been a blessing to our Societies, and we trust will continue to be so. Her labor of love out on that far off field for eleven years should be rewarded by a pleasant rest; but she has not commenced to rest as yet. May the dear Lord give her continued health and strength.

We would ever remember with thankfulness the work done by our dear sister Sanford, who, for nine years, labored so successfully among the heathen, and who, in failing health, returned to us two years ago. We are glad to learn that her health is somewhat recruited.

Mrs. Hutchinson, at Chicacole, has two interesting schools, one of boys and one of girls. During the winter quarter the attendance was 46 boys and 20 girls. The latter school is at present in charge of Ruth, one of the former boarding girls, who is now paid a salary of five rupees a month. Narayanah was also employed during a portion of the year at a salary of five rupees a month. The other teachers were Subbrow, a heathen, whose place is now filled by Nersimhulu, one of the Seminary students, and Tumiah, who fills the place of second teacher at a salary of seven rupees a month. These two are christians. Mrs. Hutchinson has also started a boarding department with two girls. She is also doing a good deal of visiting among the women at the homes of the pupils.

At Bimlipatam there is a very flourishing school. It was under the direction of Mrs. Archibald until she removed to Bobbili in March. She had as her head teacher, M. Anthony, and also M. Sithamariah, a heathen, who was dismissed at the close of the year. After Mrs. Archibald's removal, Cassie, one of the boarding girls, took his place. This school numbers from 50 to 60 pupils, and about the half of these were from the Mala, Madaga, and Sudra castes. None of these have ever attended the schools before. None of the pupils pay school fees. Their parents are very poor, and the missionaries are desirous of reaching their hearts by being kind to the children. There is a growing interest on the part of the parents. Seven copies of the Telugu

New Testament were presented to the boys during the winter months as rewards for learning the Sabbath School lessons, and also for committing the first three chapters of the Gospel of

At Bobbili, Mrs. Archibald has a good school. The teachers are Vissim Razu, a heathen, and Miriam and Nellie, two boarding girls. She has now in the boarding department Susie, Lizzie, Yerricah, Chinney Mutty Yellamah, and two from Jeypore, whose names have not been sent. She has also an interesting Bible class, started in April with eleven members. By request of the Telugu Conference she has been preparing a catechism for the children. This work is about complete.

A very casual glance over the work will give one to see that there is no idling by our missionaries whether at home or abroad. And is it their duty more than ours to work for the Master? They do not look at it as a duty, but as a delightful privilege thus to be engaged. And now let us see to it that we do our part in aiding them in every possible way, for the work is ours as well as theirs, and if we are faithful in our department, we, with them, will come at last rejoicing bringing in the sheaves.

I also give, bequeath and devise to the Board of Foreign Missions of the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, one certain lot of land with the buildings thereon, standing (here describe the premises with exactness and particularity) to be held and possessed by the said Board, their successors and assigns forever, for the purposes specified in the Act of Incorporation.

# Report of the Executive Board.

The sixth annual report of your Home Mission Board is herewith submitted.

At the beginning of the year the outlook was by no means promising. Two formidable obstacles stood in the way, and seemed to shut out all hope of advance. These were lack of money and lack of laborers. Believing, however, that of all our denominational work Home Missions is the most important, inasmuch as it is the basis upon which all our other work rests, your Board determined to go forward, trusting in God and in

#### FINANCES.

As the raising of funds had been entrusted to the Finance Committee, your Board did not feel themselves at liberty to do more than to keep their work and its needs before the denomination. This they did, first by a printed appeal sent to the pastors or clerks of all our churches in the three Provinces, and afterwards through the *Christian Messenger* and *Visitor*.

Full reports of the monthly meetings have also been published, together with extracts from the quarterly reports of the missionaries, and other information calculated to keep the denomination informed concerning the work. The missionaries themselves have frequently published statements concerning the progress of their work on their several fields.

Arrangements were also made to have a member of the Board at each of the Associations to represent our work. In one case, that of the Western N. B., this arrangement was interfered with and the brother was not present.

Wishing to keep the expenditure of the year within the income of the previous year, hoping thereby to come out without a debt, and desiring at the same time to aid deserving fields not assisted last year, such of those formerly receiving aid as were thought most able were urged to endeavor to get on, either without help or with considerably less than formerly. By this means, and the exercise of the strictest economy in all other ways, the expenditure has been kept down to \$4,696.15, yet no field has been abandoned that could not struggle on without aid, and no deserving applications from new fields have been refused. The income, \$4,392.74, has covered the debt of the past and the expenditure of the year now closing, within \$265.87.

This could not have been done, however, had the Board been able to find pastors for several important fields, such as Andover in N. B, River John, in N. S., and Montague, in P. E. Island.

The reduction of these grants, moreover, is helping to keep the salaries of our missionary pastors down to distressingly low figures, which we deeply regret. It may seem to some that the Board had better confine its aid to fewer fields. But how can we give all to a few and leave the others to perish? If all the strong churches would do what they are able, ample provision could be made for the weak ones.

#### MINISTERS FROM ABROAD.

When the question of ministerial supply was considered, it became apparent that unless some men could be obtained from other countries, many of the mission, and other fields must remain pastorless for some time to come. It was decided therefore, to ask the assistance of Rev. John Brown, late pastor of Wilmot church, N. S., now of Melksham, England, in procuring some men from that country. Brother Brown responded most heartily to our request, and inserted a letter in the *Baptist*, of London,

which called forth letters of enquiry from sixteen ministers. A number of them have expressed a willingness to come to the Provinces, but so far only two have been accepted. Mr. W. Powell, who had just finished his course at Pontypoole college, reached Halifax about the middle of Jure. He was sent to the Port Medway field, where he has since been ordained and called to the pastorate. Rev. W. R. Waters will probably reach N. S. sometime in September or early in October. The Board are proceeding with great care in this matter, and this accounts for the small number that have been accepted. Having made a beginning it is their purpose to go on until the supply of ministers more nearly equals the demand.

#### GENERAL MISSIONARIES.

Knowing that some time must elapse before the lack of laborers could be supplied, your Board decided to employ one or more General Missionaries, so that our mission fields might not be wholly uncared for. Correspondence was opened with brethren thought to possess the qualifications. One of them, Rev. I. Wallace, A. M., feeling that God was calling him to this department of His work, promptly responded to our call and was appointed General Missionary, at a salary of \$700.00 He entered the employ of the Board Nov. 1st, 1883. His labors have been confined chiefly to seven churches, viz.: Tusket, Kempt, Greenfield, Port Medway, Seal Harbor, Isaac's Harbor and New Harbor. In all of them his labors were greatly blessed in the ingathering of members to the churches and otherwise strengthening and building them up. On Sunday, July 6th, while preaching at New Glasgow, where he stopped on his way to River John, where he was intending to labor for a short time, he was stricken down by disease, and by the time he had reached his home he was so ill that for some time his life was despaired of. He is now slowly recovering, though it is doubtful if he will ever be able to labor in the ministry again.

Your Board are now convinced that two or three men should be constantly employed as brother Wallace has been. With the approval of the Convention they will make such appointments so soon as the right men can be found.

#### GROUPING.

Considerable attention has been given to the preparation of a plan, showing how the weaker churches should be grouped, so as to provide all with regular pastoral care in the most economical way. This work has made it painfully apparent that in some counties our churches are most unwisely grouped, if, indeed, they can be said to be grouped at all. Too often the stronger of what would naturally be a group of churches under one pastor, secures to itself the services of a minister residing at a distance from them, for a portion of the time, and their weaker sisters

near by are left to look out for themselves as best they can. By this means some of the weakest of our churches are so isolated that they cannot be assisted by the Home Mission Board except by a very large outlay.

Regarding this as a matter of very great importance, your Board recommend that the Convention urge both churches and ministers to co operate with the Board so that as soon as practicable all our churches may be wisely grouped.

#### THE FRENCH MISSION.

The examination of the committee referred to in our last report confirmed the Board in the opinion that a change would be beneficial, both to the missionary and to the field. A committee was accordingly appointed to make known the views and wishes of the Board to Brother Normandy. Having expressed himself as willing to take another field, he was appointed a mission of three months to the four little churches in Kent Co., N. B., where there is also a large French population. He met with a condial reception from the churches, his labors were blessed, several were baptized, and he has since settled with them as their pastor.

Correspondence has since been opened with Rev. A. L. Therrien of the Grand Lign Mission, with the view of securing another missionary for the field in Yarmouth and Digby counties. The names of two brethren have been given us, but the Board are not yet satisfied that either of them would be suitable for our mission. If the Convention approve, they intend to prosecute their search until a suitable man is found.

#### STUDENT MISSIONARIES.

Hitherto the Board has done little more than recommended students to fields of labor during their vacation, leaving the question of remuneration wholly with the people among whom they labored.

The recent changes in our educational work made it necessary that more certain remuneration should be offered, or our students at McMaster Hall would not be likely to return to labor with our churches during their vacations. After a careful consideration of the whole question, it was decided to offer work at regular mission pay to all our ministerial students at Toronto, Wolfville, and St. John. Under this arrangement four from McMaster Hall, six from Acadia, and four from St. John Seminary, have been appointed to missions in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. As their missions have not yet been completed it is thought better not to report part of their work but allow the whole to go into the report of next year.

This undertaking has added considerably to the labors of the Board, especially in the way of correspondence, and it is feared that it will add considerably to the expenditure. We have

been encouraged to undertake it, however, by assurances given by officers and members of the Ministerial Education Board, that they would advise that at least a portion of their funds be handed over to us to assist in supplementing the amounts received from the fields.

### MANITOBA, AND THE NORTH WEST.

In the matter of aiding the work in the North West but little advance has been made. The grant of \$300.00 per year has been continued to the Preston field on which the Rev. J. A. Marnie still labors, and \$100.00 has been promised to assist the Emmerson church in making up the salary of their pastor, should they find themselves unable to do so when one shall have been secured.

The Board has watched with much interest the movements of our brethren in Ontario and Manitoba, in reference to this important question. They have also received communications from the committee appointed by the Baptist Union held in Brantford in May last. This correspondence is now referred to you.

Having dwelt at some length on matters that seemed to require fullness of statement, it would extend our reports beyond proper limits to speak of each of the fields separately. We therefore give what in our opinion is all that is necessary, a tabular statement showing the fields assisted, the amount of aid granted, the brethren who have labored on them, and their labors and results so far as they can be tabled. The "Remarks," though brief, will, we believe, indicate correctly the present condition of each field.

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#### SUMMARY.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the appropriations of the year, including the general missionary, amount to \$3,849.05, divided as follows: To Nova Scotia \$1,867.07,; to New Brunswick \$1,169.48; to P. E. Island, \$512.50; and to Manitoba \$300. The 44 brethren who have labored under the direction of the Board have ministered to 82 churches, performed 1211 weeks of labour, preached 3493 sermons, attended 2346 other meetings, made 9429 religious visits, distributed 26,160 pages of tracts, baptized 375, received 98 by letter and experience, and organized three churches.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

While the expenditure has been less than some former years, the number added to the churches both by baptism and letter is greater than any former year. In the matter of building and repairing meeting houses and providing parsonages, encouraging progress is being made on several fields. A few of the fields are too large and will have to be divided or supplied with an assistant missionary at an early day. Some are becoming

#### SELF-SUPPORTING.

Port Elgin paid in full the expense of the mission there last summer, and is now taking care of itself. It greatly needs a settled pastor. Dartmouth, for some years a beneficiary of the Board, and at the first very weak, is this year paying its own way, and contributing more than heretofore to the Convention Fund. Shelburne declined to receive aid after the first quarter, because a large reduction was made in the grant. They are now sustaining their own work. Osborne has declared its intention of being self supporting next year.

A grant of \$30.00 for six months was voted to Tower Hill, Charlotte Co. N.B., to assist Brother Rideout, but no reports have been received and the grant has not been paid.

#### SPECIAL DONATION AND LEGACY.

The Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., has donated to the Board fifty volumes of his History entitled, "Fifty Years with the Baptists." They will send a copy to any one desiring it, for \$2.00

O. M. Taylor, Esq., of Middleton, has informed the Board that the late Daniel Wood, Esq., of that place, had bequeathed \$50.00 to their funds.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's account, the legacy of \$300.00 from the estate of Mrs. James Powers has been received.

#### CONCLUSION.

As five full years have now passed since Home Missions became a part of the work of the Convention, or since New Brunswick and Nova Scotia united in this work, it may be well to consider one or two questions.

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I. Has the union been unfavorable to New Brunswick, as it was feared by some that it would be?

We see no reason for thinking so. (1.) Because each year the expenditure in New Brunswick has exceeded, by considerable the yearly expenditure of the late New Brunswick Home Mission Society, excepting the years 1871 and 1875, and in one of the years since the union, the expenditure has exceeded by upwards of \$300.00 even the best of these two years. (2.) Because the expenditure in New Brunswick has each year been in excess of the receipts from that province.

II. Has the union been unfavorable to Nova Scotia?

We do not think so, for none of the work then in hand has been left to suffer, and at the least the former rate of advance has been maintained.

III. Shall we be content with the same rate of progress for the next five years?

By no means. This work is the basis of all our work, and if we want to advance as a denomination we must push it rapidly forward. Before five years have passed all our fields now held should be under careful cultivation, and our principles be planted in many places where now they are almost unknown. "Let us go up and possess the land, for we are able."

# Report of the Governors of Acadia College,

AUGUST, 1884.

On June 5th of this year, the friends assembled in large numbers to enjoy the usual Anniversary Exercises of Acadia College. The interest of the occasion appears not to flag; and, as on other years many of the visitors expressed themselves as highly gratified with the indications of life and progress.

Dr. Welton, of McMaster Hall, was called upon to lead in prayer, which was followed by appropriate music; and then the orations of the graduating class were listened to:

1. "The Genesis of Scepticism in Thought," Enoch H. Sweet, of Newport, N. S.

2. "Education, a Natural Process, directed by Human Art," H. Bert Ellis, of Fredericton, N. B.

3. "Supremacy of Law in the British Constitution," Benjamin A. Lockhart, Lockhartville, N. S. Excused.

4. "The Harmony between the Artist and his Work," Miss-Clara B. Marshall, of Lawrencetown, N. S.

#### MUSIC.

5. "The Classical and Modern Theatre," Frank R. Haley, of St. John, N. B.

6. "The Origin and Permanence of Civil, Social, and Religious Law," Frank M. Kelly, of Collina, N. B.

The essays were regarded as fully maintaining the reputation of the most successful Anniversaries of former years.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Senate of the University, the following gentlemen were then presented to the President, by Rev. W. H. Warren, A. M., Secretary, pro tem, of the Senate, and received the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, viz: H. Bert Ellis, Fredericton, N. B.; Frank R. Haiey, St. John, N.B.; Benjamin A. Lockhart, Lockhartville, N. S.; Clara B. Marshall, Lawrencetown, N. S.; Enoch H. Sweet, Newport, N. S.

Honor Certificates were presented to Mr. F. R. Haley, for extra work in Classics, and Mr. F. M. Kelly, in Philosophy. The degree of Master of Arts, in course, was conferred upon Mr. Walter Barss, of the Class of 1880.

The President also announced that the Senate had conferred

the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity upon Rev. D. M. Welton, Ph. D., and the honorary degree of Master of Arts upon Mr. L. E. Wortman, of the St. John Seminary, N. B., and Mr. J. P. Chipman, of Kentville, N. S.

Addresses were delivered by Dr. Welton and others.

These public exhibitions of College training, however pleasing and satisfactory in themselves considered, give but a faint idea of the real work performed. The development of power to take sober and practical views of life and its obligations, the strengthening of ability to grapple with the difficult questions which must meet us all along the journey, are of far more importance to the aspiring student, than any skill in marshaling words so as to please the public ear.

In this higher work of education, Acadia College is accomplishing much for the denomination, and we trust for the world.

Sixty-three students have been under training during the past year: six in the Senior Class, thirteen in the Junior, sixteen in the Sophomore, nineteen in the Freshman, and nine partial course students.

The work of the students for the most part has been performed in a very satisfactory manner, professors and students alike giving their strength and energy to the questions under discussion.

Since our last Annual Report, some changes have been made in the curriculum of study. The Senate of the University have given matured thought to the wants of our growing country, and it is believed that something has been accomplished in the way of providing for those wants.

In addition to the usual course in Mathematics, Classics, Science, History and Literature, there is now provision for a course in the Principles and Practice of Education, the aim of which is:

(1) To teach the history and philosophy of this subject to all undergraduates, as an important part of a liberal education.

(2) To secure on the part of those who are to fill directive positions in society, an intelligent view of the relation of education in all its departments, to the progress of society.

(3) To qualify students for the higher positions in the public school service.

(4) To accord Academic sanction to teaching as a learned profession, that it may the more speedily secure the rights to which it is entitled.

It must of course require time to work out results which will attract public attention, but at present the prospects are very encouraging.

Dr. Rand, who was selected to fill the chair referred to, has entered upon his work with his usual ability and energy; his instructions are highly appreciated by the students, and the Faculty heartily co-operating in this new feature of College training, are sanguine that future good will be manifest.

Mr. Albert Coldwell, A. M., who has been for two years Instructor in Natural Science, has been appointed Professor in this department. This appointment, it is believed, will meet with general approval.

In accordance with the action of Convention last year, the Theological department has been dropped from our University work, ample provision having been made for the Theological students of these Provinces at McMaster Hall, in Toronto. Rev. Dr. Welton, accordingly resigned his post at Acadia, and has accepted a Professorship at McMaster Hall. So far as we are able to judge from the experience of the past year, this arrangement will give general satisfaction. It is sincerely hoped and believed that Acadia College will not cease to be Christian because it has ceased to be Theological. Religious duties are still pressed home upon the attention of the student. On Sunday mornings, before the time of public service, there is a Prayer Meeting by students of the College and the Academy, and a similar one for the students of Acadia Seminary. On Wednesday evenings there is a religious meeting intended for all who may wish to attend. There is a weekly Bible Class conducted by one of the Professors and a monthly Missionary Meeting led by Christian students in turn. Besides these direct efforts, it is to be taken for granted that in the treatment of many questions that come up for discussion, the principles of religion and the teaching of the Bible must be recognized, and made to perform no unimportant part in moulding the mind and heart for life's work and duty. He whose being is charged, so to speak, with gospel grace, can hardly deal with any subject marked on a College curriculum without bringing God in somewhere, and preaching Christ either by word or by example, and the First Horton Church would willingly testify to the fact that both Professors and students were deeply interested in the work of grace enjoyed during the year at Wolfville, and rendered valuable assistance therein. Besides those in the Ladies' Seminary, to whom reference is made in the report of Miss Graves, seventeen of the others who united with the Church last year, were students either in the College or in the Academy. So we may conclude that the Institutions at Wolfville continue to be Christian schools.

The Board would call the attention of the Convention and of the entire denomination, to the fact that this work to which we have committed ourselves, is emphatically a progressive work. To remain stationary, to be contented with past or present attainments is to fall behind rapidly and lose the ground already taken. Sixty students now ought to mean a hundred and twenty in a very few years, and we naturally look to our schools, academies, pastors and churches to co-operate in furnishing this material. To inspire the young with a thirst for knowledge in the higher departments of it should be the ambition of every one who wishes well to his country, but especially of those who

know that "wisdom's ways are ways of pleasantness and all her paths are peace."

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"Advance" must be our motte. More students and more money are needed to make this present watchword a future reality.

Two years ago we reported a heavy and increasing indebtedness, the largest portion of it having arisen from the outlay of rebuilding after the destructive fire of 1877.

A year ago, at Halifax, we reported this indebtedness provided for and thought we were able to thank God and take courage. The provision referred to, however, was largely in pledges, many of them payable in instalments, reaching over a term of years. And while some of these pledges have been redeemed and the debt actually lessened by that amount, yet the condition of business throughout the country has not been favorable for collecting large amounts. Much remains to be collected, and meanwhile interest on the debt has to be paid, and the Board is still vexed with the question of "ways and means." The most economical management can hardly bring the annual expenditure within the income. And it is no secret to the members of the Board at least, that the time is very near, if it is not even now upon us when there must be a larger expenditure even if there is no increase in the number of Teachers. The salaries paid to the professors are too small. They are not equal to what men of their ability and experience might reasonably expect; and your Board would thus publicly express the hope that the time is near when a more adequate remuneration will be given for the able services

All the details of Finance are fully dealt with and explained in the reports of the Treasurer and of the Agency Committee.

## REPORT OF AGENCY COMMITTEE.

The Report of your Committee rendered a year ago, and published in the Year Book for 1883, showed the entire amount of College indebtedness, on construction and current expense accounts, including the deficit for the year ending August of that year, to be \$33,781.84; and the amount, then subscribed on account of this debt to be \$30,249.00. This left a balance of \$3,532.84 unprovided for. Your Committee, however, having received authority from the Board, confirmed by Convention, to further prosecute their work and to retain the services of an agent in connexion therewith, promptly assumed this balance and guaranteed the amount. An appeal then made to Convention resulted in the subscription of sums amounting in the aggregate to \$1,275.00, and our agents Messrs. Denton and Webber have obtained since Convention further new subscriptions, amounting to the sum of \$2.219.00.

We have also been able to place to the credit of this account, during the year, in addition to all these sums subscribed, cash payments amounting to the sum of \$420.

The following is a statement of the entire amount of indebtedness on construction and current expense accounts at the beginning of the College year, and of sums received in cash and pledges, to date, to liquidate the same:

While the statement which your Committee is thus happily able to give, is a matter for congratulation, it must not be forgotten that the Board must still continue to appeal from time to time to the enlarged benevolence and earnest sympathy of all the friends of the College in connection with the great work—ever increasing in importance—entrusted to them.

Many of the above subscriptions are unconditional, but, for the most part, they are made payable by instalments covering a period of three years. During the past four months the attention of your Committee has been directed chiefly to the collection of overdue instalments and amounts subscribed unconditionally. Indeed, Mr. Webber was engaged and put in the field chieffy with that object in view. In this a measure of success has been reached. The amount collected and paid into the Treasury on Indebtedness account, to date, is \$11,274.83, the particulars of which will appear in the report of the Treasurer. This sum, it will be seen, is about one-third of the whole amount subscribed, and a little more than one-third of the entire amount of the Indebtedness account. It will be seen by the Treasurer's report, also, that so much of the Indebtedness account as consisted of floating liabilities and amounts overdue for Professors salaries,&c., has been fully paid, and that the sum of \$5,043.99 is now in the Treasury ready to be employed in paying off mortgages. In addition to this amount, one of the subscribers to the Indebtedness Fund has intimated his readiness to pay at call on this account \$1000, so soon as that amount shall be needed to pay off the mort. gage of \$8000 on "Chipman Hall," and another subscriber has

intimated a like readiness in respect to the sum of \$200. Your Committee recommend that immediate effort be made to collect the small additional amount required to pay off this \$8000 mortgage.

Your Committee would cail special attention to the fact that a large portion of the subscriptions to Indebtedness account now outstanding pay no interest whatever, while the Board must continue to pay interest on the mortgages which these subscriptions were intended to liquidate, and they suggest that an effort be made to induce subscribers to make payments promptly in order that this burden of interest may be removed.

We may say in general that the prospects are brightening. Notwithstanding all the adverse circumstances, the general depression in business and consequent scarcity of money, continued progress is being made. Generous friends have contributed nobly towards current expenses. More has been received from the Convention Fund during the past year, than in the year previous. The Treasurer hopes soon to be able to remove the mortgage from Chipman Hall.

With various encouraging tacts before us we appeal again with some confidence to all, in fact, who know that education is essential to our growth as a denomination, to give us their sympathy and support till our institutions shall be amply endowed and fully fitted to meet all the educational needs of the country.

To further the collection of outstanding subscriptions and pledges, and to secure new ones, without the expense of an agent, a Committee composed as follows, has been appointed to act for the Board in the several localities, viz: (1) For Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queens, Rev. A. Cohoon; (2) Halifax and Lunenburg, E. D. King; (3) Annapolis and Digby, Rev. W. H. Warren; (4) Kings and Hants, Rev. S. B. Kempton; (5) Cumberland and Colchester, Rev. D. A. Steele; (6) Antigonish and Guysboro, C. B. Whidden, Esq.; (7) Cape Breton, Rev. J. W. Bancroft; (8) Westmoreland and Albert, Rev.D. G. McDonald; (9) York and Carleton, H. C. Creed, Esq.; (10) Kings, N. B. and Queens, N. B., Rev. I. J. Skinner; (11) St. John, Rev. W. J. Stewart; (12) Charlotte and Sunbury, I. B. Oakes, Esq.; (13) P. E. Island, Rev. J. O. Redden.

But besides these brethern asked to do special work, we would request the pastors of all the churches to bear in mind the future needs of our own denomination, and to help provide for those needs by looking out for the young people in their congregations who have average ability, and seek to awaken a desire for knowledge if it be not already kindled, and then direct their

thoughts to our institutions of learning, either in Nova Scotia or in New Brunswick.

In this way, you may confer a great blessing upon the families so reached, and perhaps, upon all the interests represented in this convention.

#### ACADEMY.

The condition of the Academy has been very satisfactory during the past year, in everything except in the numbers in attendance and consequently in funds. Our report of last year stated that the teachers of that department had resigned, and that Professor Tufts had been invited to take charge of the school. E. W. Sawyer, A. B., of the class of 1881, and who pursued a further course of successful study at Harvard University, has been associated with Mr. Tufts, in the work, and has had entire charge of the boys in the boarding department. The supervision has been thorough and satisfactory. Good order has prevailed.

Mr. W. F. Kempton and Mr. F. R. Haley have also been employed to give assistance in the teaching of certain classes.

The Principal reports that it has been a worn of critical reports.

The Principal reports that it has been a year of quiet, a good spirit prevailing, and very commendable industry upon the part of many of the pupils. This was especially noticeable in the case of the Junior Class.

The number of pupils during the year was 53. From Nova Scotia, 50; New Brunswick, 2; Cape Breton, 1. This shows a little increase in number so far as Nova Scotia is concerned, but some decrease from New Brunswick, P. E. Island and Cape Breton. Reasons altogether apart from the efficiency of the school, can easily be found for this decrease. The teachers have all been thorough and efficient in their work. Nineteen of the pupils of the Academy are reported as ready for matriculation in the full college course, and three partial course students.

Mr. Tufts, in addition to his work as Principal of the school, and teacher in Latin and History, has had entire charge of the Finances of the Academy and Seminary. And it is hoped that his engineering skill, in this department, may keep the ship afloat, till some of the weighty cargo is thrown overboard. Mortgages make dangerous freight, and they need to be well insured too. These incumbrances must be removed before we can have real and continued prosperity.

#### ACADIA SEMINARY.

This school continues to commend itself to the Governors of the College, and to all the friends who know its history and work. The record is good. The pupils speak well of their teachers, and the teachers speak well of their pupils, and the Wolfville community speak well of both.

Miss Graves' report to the Board in June, 1884, will speak for itself. She says:

"At the close of the Fifth year of the existence of Acadia Seminary, as a distinct institution, I am pleased to submit the following statement in regard to the attendance, finances and general condition of the school.

"The total enrolment for the year is 76, a number not as great as seemed to be indicated at the close of last year, yet encouraging when compared with the general average of attendance for the past four years, which has been 70. Of the number in attendance, 8 are from New Brunswick; 4 from Cape Breton; 1 from the United States; 29 from Wolfville and 34 from other parts of Nova Scotia. Of the number enrolled, 40 different pupils have boarded in the Seminary Building. The greatest number resident in the building at any one time has been 32. Of the 76 students enrolled, 49 are in the regular course, and 27 have pursued selected studies. The present graduating class number 4, two of whom graduate in the Classical, one in the Literary, and one in the Literary and Musical Course.

"The department of Instrumental Music has numbered 41, and in the winter term it is necessary to employ an assistant.

"The pupils in Vocal Music have numbered 29, in Drawing and Painting 23, in French 38.

"Considering the number of boarders, the low price of board, and the increase of price for provisions and for service, the financial condition of the institution may be considered favorable, although there is not a gratifying balance on the side of income to report, as in the two preceding years.

"The prospects for the coming year are very encouraging. Already many rooms have been engaged by new students, and by their present occupants, a large proportion of whom are planning to return.

"We have reason to expect, that at least ten students will persue the studies of the Senior year, preparatory to graduation next June.

"On many accounts, this has been the most satisfactory year of my connection with the Seminary."

In addition to the kindly sentiment which has uniformly pervaded the school, and the spirit of conscientious labor, it has been a year of rich spiritual blessings. Although in each of the preceding years God's presence has been manifested in the conversion, and in the leading of souls to a public confession of Christ, this year we have been signally blest.

With scarcely an exception, the young ladies boarding in the institution have committed themselves to the cause of Christ. Seven have united with the Church he e, and it is hoped that the others will unite with their respective churches at their homes.

Hoping that the prosperity, which has attended us thus far, is but an earnest of the future, for the Seminary, I respectfully submit the above report.

#### LOSSES BY DEATH.

It is our painful duty, on this occasion, to call to mind some heavy losses which this Board, in common with the entire denomination, have sustained, since we met in convention a year ago. No one year, since the College was founded in 1838, has made such changes with the roll list of the governing body, as the one just closed.

On the 20th November, 1883, D. R. Eaton, Esq., for seventeen years a faithful and painstaking member of the Board, was suddenly called away to his rest. His cheerful presence and earnest words are well remembered, and our loss greatly felt.

February 4th, 1884, Rev. S. W. DeBlois, D. D., who filled the office of Governor, and discharged the duties of Secretary for about twenty-six years, was removed from among us. During all these years he was seldom, if ever absent, when the Board was called together. And we would record our appreciation of the valuable services rendered to the Institution and the denomination by our departed brother.

On the 22nd day of February, 1884, another of the long-tried and faithful friends of the College, and in fact of all denominational work, fell out of the ranks. Avard Longley, Esq., of Annapolis; for years he was the representative of the county. His knowledge of parliamentary usage, in the transaction of business, was frequently of great advantage to the Board, of which he was a member for about twelve years. On the floors of the House, as well as in the meetings of our own body, he gave his influence in behalf of the interests of Acadia College. In his removal the denomination has sustained a heavy loss.

Rev. J. A. Durkee, not a member of the Board, but of the Senate of the University, which is closely allied with the Board, was called away to his home above, on the 15th February, 1884. A young brother of great devotion and promise. Had his life been spared, he would doubtless have given us great assistance in all our denominational work.

But we may say in reference to all these losses, the Lord sees not with our imperfect vision. His plans and purposes take in a wider range, and we know that His ways are just. We acknowledge the worth of all these brethren, who have gone from us. We tender our heart felt sympathies to the friends, who are left to mourn, but thankfully add, "We do not sorrow as others, which have no hope. For believing that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also, which sleep in Jesus, will God bring with Him."

# Obituary Report.

The report on obituaries, a year ago, commenced by a grateful acknowledgment of the fact that there was really no work for the committee to do. The ministerial ranks, throughout the entire limits of the Convention, had remained unbroken during the year. And, so far as New Brunswick is concerned, a similar report might have been presented this year. For this mercy, we desire still to praise the Lord, and bless his holy name that so many are left to proclaim the unsearchable riches of Christ.

Many highly esteemed brethren have, however, been removed from among us, during the year just closed. And it is somewhat remarkable that, although the list is longer than usual, they are all, with one exception, limited to one Province, that of Nova Scotia.

The length of the list will admonish us to be as brief as possible, but any omissions from our imperfect records, can be of but little account to those whose complete record is already on high.

I. Departed brethren from the ranks of the ministry.

#### STEPHEN W. DEBLOIS,

a native of Halifax, N. S. A graduate of Acadia College of the class of 1846. He first chose the profession of law, and devoted seven years to the study of that subject. But while engaged in this pursuit, a letter from a young friend, then studying at Wolfville, where a work of God's grace was in progress, found its way to the young law student in Halifax. It told of something better than law, of God's abundant grace in Christ. It turned the current of his thoughts, and, by the aid of the Spirit of God, changed the course of his life.

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Law was abandoned as a study and as a profession, and the law student became a Bible student. After a course of theological study at Newton, he returned to his native Province, accepted a call from the Baptist church in Chester, N. S., and was ordained to the gospel ministry in that town in the year 1854. He was highly esteemed and greatly blessed in his labors there. A revival work commenced shortly after he entered the field, and many additions were made to the church during the year.

In the autumn of 1855, however, after the death of Rev. T. S. Harding, Bro. DeBlois was invited to become the pastor of the First Horton church, He accepted the invitation and entered upon his work there in December 1855, where he continued pastor till the time of his death, that is, for nearly 29 years. Five hundred and twenty-six persons were received by baptism during

this pastorate. For a large portion of this time, in addition to his ordinary work, he also discharged the duties of the office of Secretary to the Board of Governors of Acadia College.

Genial in disposition, mild in temper, and obliging in manner, he made many friends, and, we may add, very few, if any enemies among the people with whom he mingled. He probably held a deeper place in the affections of his people during the last few years of his life, than at any former period. As a preacher he was practical, earnest, and sometimes eloquent. The gospel was preached, and it was very rare that the simple plan of salvation through the atonement of Christ, was not, in some way placed before the people, whatever the text might be. And a personal appeal to the unconverted, even at the risk of frequent repetition, marked the close of every sermon.

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In the year 1857 the degree of M. A. in course, was conferred upon him, and in 1881 the honorary degree of D. D. In 1878 he was chosen President of this Convention, at Fredericton, N. B.; honors soon to be cast aside for higher rewards.

For some years our brother's health had been failing. In May of 1882 the church offered him a season of rest, which he thankfully accepted, and sought by change and other means to build up his shattered constitution. In March of 1883, slightly improved, he resumed his work, and, although by this time his sight was so impaired that he could not read even the largest print, he continued, with the most determined energy, to preach to the people, during a considerable portion of that summer. But the contest proved to be an unequal one, and on the 4th of February, 1884 the battle ended. Death was victor, so far as the body was concerned, but we trust that the happy spirit entered into rest. Very quietly, without a struggle or a groan, the end came.

He died in the 57th year of his age, respected and loved by the denomination, and he will be greatly missed in our annual gatherings. May the Lord comfort and support the sorrowing widow and only son, left to mourn their loss, and send forth laborers to fill all vacant places.

#### DR. EDWIN CLAY.

This brother was born in Lincolnshire, England, in 1821, but came, early in life, to Prince Edward Island, with his father, who was a surgeon in the army. He was led by bodily affliction to see his need of Christ, and yielding his heart to God while still young, he became a very bappy follower of Jesus.

He was ordained to the gospel ministry in 1853, and a few years later he graduated as a medical doctor from the University of New York. He labored as a pastor for a time in the United States, and afterwards in Carleton, N. B., also practising medicine at the same time.

In 1870 he was appointed Dominion Immigration Agent at the Port of Halifax.

Through the attention given to the medical profession and the claims of the Dominion agency, Dr. Clay has been prevented from seeking any settlement as pastor, for a number of years. And yet he has continued to be a preacher of the gospel all his life. His warm and genial nature, impulsive disposition, and ready utterance, made him a most effective speaker on any subject which he chose. And when the love of God, in Christ, was his theme, few could listen to his utterances without being moved. Perhaps he was by nature and training better fitted for special occasions and revival times, than for the continued and laborious work of the pastor.

In the autumn of 1883 Dr. Clay received some injury by a fall, while away from his home. From this time his health rapidly declined, until the 14th of March, 1884, when by the rupture of a blood vessel of the brain, he became suddenly unconscious, and was soon released from his prison chains to go, we trust, to the better land. He died 63 years of age, and his death was felt to be a great loss, not only to his family and friends, but to the community at large.

#### REV. J. A. DURKEE,

a native of Yarmouth, N.S. A graduate of Acadia College in the class of '73, ordained to the work of the gospel ministry in Milton, N. S., the same year that he graduated, 1873. Labored there for some time with much acceptance and success. after spending some time in study at Newton, he returned and accepted the pastorate of the church at Paradise, N. S., where he was held in high esteem. After only a short stay at Paradise, he accepted a hearty and unanimous invitation from the large and influential church of Guelph, Ontario. In accepting this invitation our young brother probably took more burden upon his shoulders than he was able to carry. He had not the strength for so large a place. With a great amount of nervous energy, and ambition to accomplish much for the Lord, but with no fund of physical force to draw upon, he sank beneath the responsibility, and was compelled to resign and come home for rest. After only partial recovery he became pastor of the church at Lockport, N. S. His power of thought, devotion to his work, and singleness of purpose, won the esteem of all with whom he came in contact. But it soon became evident to his friends that the frail body and sensitive nerves could not long stand the wear and tear of pastoral work.

After many alternations of hope and fear, the machinery at last gave out, and on the 15th of February, 1884, our young, and much esteemed brother Durkee, was set at liberty from his sufferings, and entered the rest. As a friend, he was true, as a christian, devoted, as a preacher, faithful, and sometimes powerful. In his removal we sustain a great loss, and pray that the young widow and four fatherless children may be both provided

for and comforted.

#### ARTHUR N. ROSCOE,

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a native of Cornwallis, N. S.; early brought to God and consecrated to His service. Feeling that it was his duty to preach the Gospel of Christ, he attended the institutions of Wolfville some ten years since. Diligent in the pursuit of knowledge, he gained the approbation of his teachers. Genial and obliging in his manner, he won the affection of his fellow students.

Ordained to the work of the gospel ministry at Port Medway, in 1880, he afterward spent some time in study at Newton. Health began to fail, and he sought to recruit by travel and change of air.

During some portion of 1882 he was preaching for the church of St. George, N. B.

But all the while there were the evident signs of wasting energies. For the last two years he had been at his home in Cornwallis, simply waiting for the call. "Suffering much and yet always resigned." Knowing the end was approaching fast, and yet not alarmed; anxious to serve in an active sense, but almost as willing to serve by passive submission to the will of the Father.

But on the 22nd of July, 1884, this young man was released from the conflict. Only 31 years of age, with excellent natural ability, and a consecrated heart, there had been bright prospects before him for a useful and happy career. But such was not the will of the Master. And while we will not attempt to explain the mysteries of Providence, in removing so many, before their work appears half done, we can and will adore the matchless grace, that makes them willing to live or to die for the glory of God. Such, we believe, was the condition of our young brother, Arthur Roscoe. May the friends receive comfort, and the vacant place in the ranks of our God be soon filled.

### REV. E. B. COREY.

A native of New Canaan, N. B. Born September 5th, 1837. Brought to Jesus at the time of a revival of religion under the labors of the late Rev. James Wallace in the year 1858. Entered upon the work of the gospel ministry about nineteen years ago. Ordained at Point de Bute about three years after, where he was instrumental of great good. Afterwards he labored successfully in Cumberland County, N. S., for about eleven years; during which time he baptized between two and three hundred, and was instrumental in establishing new churches in various places.

Under the direction of the Home Mission Board, he removed to Alberton, P. E. I., where he labored faithfully, enduring great hardships and protracted bodily afflictions.

His last pastorate was at Tryon, P. E. I., where he was eminently successful, having baptized over fifty during the last year. April 17th, 1884, ended his sufferings and toils. After a short illness of only about four weeks, during a portion of which he

was partially unconscious, he passed away. He died highly esteemed, deeply loved, and lamented by his church and by all who knew him.

He has left to mourn their loss a widow and three children. To these we would extend our warmest sympathies, and unite in the prayer, that the Father of the fatherless, and the widow's God, may support and bless them.

2. Departed brethren not of the ministry, but filling important positions in the denomination.

#### D. R. EATON, ESQ.

Bro. Eaton was baptized by the late Rev. A. T. Hunt, and became a member of the 1st Cornwallis Church, December, 1847. From that time till his death he manifested a warm and lively interest in all that pertained to the extension of the kingdom of Christ. "Tender hearted, true and brave," his pastor wrote of him shortly after his decease. First in Cornwallis and afterwards in Parrsboro, he conducted a very large and prosperous business. Far seeing and judicious; at the same time truthful and honorable in his dealings with others, he came to be extensively known and as widely respected. Provision for the comforts of those in his employ at Eatonville was not regarded as complete until there was a place for the children to study and the parents to worship.

His interest in religion was not local and circumscribed, but reached out to all denominational enterprises. A member of the Board of Governers for some seventeen years, he became deeply concerned for the prosperity of Acadia College, and looked upon the professors and students as his personal friends.

He was at our last annual gathering, the picture of health and vitality although intimate friends then knew that his health was not vigorous. Very rapidly after that the disease advanced, and very suddenly and unexpectedly on the 20th of December, 1883, while on a visit to his old home in Cornwallis, he was summoned away from all earthly toils, as we trust to the heavenly reward. The church of which he was a member, Acadia College, this convention, and in fact the entire denomination, have sustained a great loss in the sudden removal of this brother from among us. But God's plans are wise and beneficent and we know all will be well.

#### AVARD LONGLEY, ESQ.

A native of Annapolis, N. S. For many years a faithful member of the Baptist church in Paradise, N. S. One to whom the church looked for counsel and upon whom they leaned for support in all times of difficulty. To whom the pastor could always go in every emergency and feel confident that he was not resting on a broken reed.

A man with more than ordinary ability and information.

Deeply concerned in the welfare of the Province and Dominion. Closely identified with all political questions, since the time when the late Judge Johnston was the leader of the party, with which he identified himself. For many years a representative of Annapolis County, first in the local and afterwards in the Dominion Legislatures. He did not enrich himself from the spoils of political strife. And remembering his position in the church, of which he was a member, and in the Nova Scotia Western Baptist Association, and in this convention, where his voice has often been heard, and of which he was the president in the years 1876 and 1880, we are proud to be able to say, but with no reference whatever to any political parties, we believe, that Avard Longley's enemies, if he had such, can not point to any public act of his that was unworthy of an honorable politician, or of a professed follower of Christ.

He was true to his principles as a Baptist and defended our educational interests on the floors of the Legislature. During all his contact with men of other habits, he has remained true to his principles of Temperance reform. Some of his addresses on this burning question have been pronounced equal to anything, minus the wit and mirth-making anecdote, that has been heard from even the professional Temperance lecturer.

But during the last year or two he was compelled from failing sight, to take a less active part in public matters. In the winter of 1883, he endured a painful operation, in the hope of complete or even partial recovery. But the Lord leadeth the blind in a way that they know not. He often provideth better things for

his own than they anticipate.

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Long years of total darkness were not in store for him. For on the morning of February 22nd, 1884, suddenly, unexpectedly, he was taken, as we trust, where they need neither the light of the sun or the moon; for the Lord God is the light thereof. And there is the promise that they who enter, shall be like their Lord; for they shall see him as he is. Our loss is great, but there are others who feel it more, and our remembrance of these departed friends must be mingled with tender sympathy for those who are left to mourn.

# Report on the State of the Denomination.

Your Committee are aware that this Report should be prepared with great care. The statistics of our gains and losses, and of our present numerical strength, are not its most important feature. Large additions may be made to our churches by baptisms, whilst the very foundations of future growth are being sapped; and there may be but few gains to membership when these foundations are being laid deep and broad. This report should embody a careful study of tendencies and the direction

of their progress, and of the hardening habits of our people. It would thus enable us to sight approaching danger, and take measures to overcome it in its weak beginning, as well as to plan intelligently for the best interests of our body and the cause of our Lord.

Although this Report can claim little of this ideal excellence, it is to be hoped that more attention may be given it in the future.

The statistics of the churches, presented in their letters to the associations, are as follows:

We call attention the following statistics, showing the average length of pastorates in our chatches. They are nearly correct for N. S. and P. E. I., and so proportionally, we presume, for N.B.:

It thus appears that only about one quarter of our pastors have been settled longer than four years and one half, while less than half have been more than two years and one half. In a denomination like ours, where such freedom exists in methods

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of work, we are sure the average leagth of pastorates is too short to permit a man to do his best and most permanent work. The fact that the average pastorate is so short, also, indicates much which is just ground for grave anxiety. We cannot attribute this to less ability on the part of our pastors to meet the demands of continuous ministry to the same people; for we believe this true of fewer than in the past. Be the reason a restless desire for change or an impatient longing for immediate results, or be it a lack of power for sustained co-operation with the pastors which leads to discouragement and consequent severance of the pastoral relationship; the short average of pastorates is none the less a matter for deep concern.

Another matter of most serious import is the dearth of ministers, which is becoming more felt all the year as our Home Mission work is pushed, and new fields open. Think of it! 18 vacant fields in N. S., 28 in N. B. and 4 in P. E. I.; 13 more in N. S., 4 in N. B., and one in P. E. I. about to be left vacant as soon as the students, who are acting as temporary supplies, go back to their studies. On the occupation of these fields our growth as a people depends. We cannot leave them destitute and not fail in a sacred trust from God. But how are they to be supplied? It is true, we may import some brethren from England. But we must depend upon our own churches chiefly for the men who can most effectively do our work. We believe the men will be forthcoming from our churches only as the general spiritual life of our people is high and earnest. We must remember also that much depends upon our institutions of learning and should unite in prayer for a general increase of spiritual power.

It is difficult to tell whether there is an increase in the number of students for the ministry. There are some more licentiates reported from the churches, but the young men pursuing a course of study for this end are all too few.

It is true, that we have reason for rejoicing, that additions to our churches by baptism is larger than for some years. And yet the net gain has not been large, while the wide variations in the increase of different years seems to show a want of steady growth. This is more marked as we study the statistics of associations, and most marked of all as we observe the increase of the churches. We rejoice in the revival power which has fallen on some areas. But we regret that there is not more of the continuous additions which mark a church ever at work. We believe there is some advance here, and that the churches are not so fitful in their activity as in the past. But we have to guard against the relapse from fitfulness into inactivity. Nothing but the most vigorous effort on the part of pastors and the more devoted of their people can secure the change from fitfulness to persistent work. For this your Committee are sure all should strive.

Another matter calling for consideration, is the large number

of non-resident members. In the associations from which we have had returns, over one-seventh of the membership are nonresident. It is a bad index of the discipline of the churches when so large a proportion of those who go out from them are left to stray about in hesitation, and it is a bad index of their spiritual condition, when so many desire to live with only a nominal church membership. The improvement in this matter is but slight, if at all.

There is a good deal of suggestion of increase of intelligent and abiding interest in our great denominational objects, in the fact that the contributions from our churches, which had declined from 1876 to 1879, have, since that date steadily increased from

\$4,394 to \$16,156.

It is also a matter for thanksgiving that our churches are manned by men who hold toold truths with unshaken confidence,

and who are growing in intelligence and devotion.

On the whole, your committee believe the outlook to be full of promise-of a promise, however, which can be realized only by devotion and self-denial. May God give grace to meet the large obligations dependent upon the truth we hold, and the opportunities which open their doors so widely on every side.

# Other Reports.

### Report of Committee "to devise a Plan for further support of Aged and Infirm Ministers."

Your committee was appointed at the last session of this Convention, "to consider the subject of the support of our Aged and Infirm Ministers, and to develop as far as practicable, a scheme

to be presented to the Convention at this session."

In 1869, the Committee on obstuaries reported truly to this convention as follows: "It is time that the Baptists of these Provinces were awake to the necessity and duty of at once providing something like a proper support, both for infirm and disabled ministers." Fifteen years have since elapsed, and no "proper support" has yet been provided. The churches have been appealed to, subscriptions have been solicited, the subject has been brought to the notice of the people by the reports of the Board of Management of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, and otherwise, and yet up to the present time the amount provided annually for this purpose has not exceeded \$285, a sum insufficient to maintain properly one unfortunate recipient.

What the Baptists of these Provinces have failed to do for their ministers, this scheme proposes to give the ministers an

opportunity of doing for themselves.

#### CONSTITUTION AND MANAGEMENT.

1. The name of this fund shall be "the Ministers' Superanuation Fund of the Baptist Churches."

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2. Ordained ministers, licentiates and students for the ministry, of twenty-one years or upwards, may become beneficiary members of this fund, by the payment of a sum or sums as mentioned in Article 11 and 12.

3. The fund shall until otherwise provided for be managed by

the Board of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund.

4. Beneficiary members shall be divided into five classes and

shall be known as first, second, third, fourth and fifth.

5. Members of the first class comprise all those who shall have made not more than ten annual payments to the fund, or a sum or sums equivalent thereto, computing the value of the payments at five per cent. compound interest.

These shall have no claim whatever upon the fund.

6. Members of the second class shall comprise all those who shall have made not less than eleven nor more than twenty annual payments, or a sum or sums equivalent thereto, computing the value as in the first class.

These shall have no claim to a superannuation allowance, but may at any time demand and receive from the fund the amount actually paid in, without interest, after which they shall have

no further claim upon the fund.

7. Members of the third class shall comprise all those who shall have made not less than twenty nor more than thirty annual payments, or a sum or sums equivalent thereto, computing the value as in the first and second classes.

These on ceasing to pay shall have a right to claim at any time, a superannuation allowance of not less than ten per cent. per annum, during life, upon the amount actually paid in by

them, or its equivalent without interest.

8. Members of the fourth class shall comprise all those who shall have made not less than thirty-one nor more than thirtynine annual payments, or a sum or sums equivalent thereto, computing the value as in the previous classes mentioned.

These on ceasing to pay, shall have a right to claim at any time during life, a superannuation allowance of not less than twenty per cent. per annum, upon the total amount actually paid

in, or is equivalent without interest.

9. Members of the fifth class shall comprise all those who shall have made not less than forty annual payments, or a sum or sums equivalent thereto, computing the value as in the previous classes mentioned.

These shall have a right to claim a superannuation allowance, of not less than thirty per cent. per annum, upon the total amount actually paid in by them, or its equivalant minus the

10. Members of the third, fourth and fifth classes, as well as

those of the second class, may at any time demand and receive from the fund the amount actually paid in by them, but without any interest or allowance for interest, upon giving three months notice, and the legal representatives of members of all the classes shall upon the death of the beneficiary, and upon like notice, be entitled to receive from the fund the said amount, that is to say, the amount actually paid in to the fund by such beneficiary, without any allowance for interest thereon, or for money paid in as or for interest, in cases of endowment for arrears.

11. The annual payments shall be not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars for each member, and in all cases payments shall be made in even multiples of five dollars.

12. Any member may cause himself to be endowed for years in arrers, as far back as the age of twenty-one years, by paying the total amount of such arrears, with interest compounded at five per cent. per annum, but in receiving back moneys either as annuities or otherwise he shall never be entitled to claim, but upon the amount or amounts paid in as principal, and the same rule shall apply to his legal representatives.

From the above plan it will be noticed that many years must elapse before it can be fully matured and developed, and in the meantime resort will have to be made to the fund now administered by your Board, which fund your Committee trust will be more rapidly and largely increased than heretofore.

In order, however, that our ministers, who have arrived at or are nearing middle life, may be induced to avail themselves of the proposed scheme, your Committee have provided therein that they may endow themselves for as many years in arrears as they may choose, back to a point not beyond the date of their majority, and in this way obtain the advantages of an even start, and place themselves in the same position in relation to the superannuation fund as those joining it at an early age.

Your Committee have deemed it advisable to prepare a scheme that would be almost or quite certain to prove self-sustaining. If, however, upon trial it should prove more than self-sustaining, the beneficiaries will be sure to obtain the advantage of the overplus by receiving an increased percentage, as the whole scheme will be under the control of the present Board, whose desire will be to deal as generously as possible, and we trust there will be no apprehension on the part of intending beneficiaries of their not receiving full compensation for their money.

The percentages above specified are reckoned on the minimum basis, in order to make the scheme safe and independent, and the Board will have the power to increase the benefits just as soon and as rapidly as the funds of the scheme will warrant.

At the same time your Committee thought it would be far preferable to make the right to claim fixed and certain at a mininum rate, rather than leave it all to the judgment and discretion of the Board, and to the circumstances and conditions of

the individual cases, so that every member of the fund should feel that at a specified period he would be entitled to a specified sum as a matter of right, and not in any sense as a matter of favor. On behalf of the Committee,

Your Committee had a meeting with representatives of the African Baptist Church at Halifax, and made through them enquiries into the faith and practice of the churches united in the Association in question. We satisfied ourselves that they are of the same belief and order as those represented in this Convention. We gave it as our opinion that their Association should remain a distinct body, and seek admission to this Convention. This met the views of the coloured brethern. Action, as will appear by the accompanying letter, has been taken by that body, and a request is now before you to admit the A. B. Association into this Convention. Your Committee recommend that this be done.

# Report of the Committee appointed to Supervise the Publication of Dr. Cramp's History of the Baptists.

TO THE BAPTIST CONVENTION OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Your Committee have to report that the work which they were appointed to supervise has not been carried on, and consequently they have had no duty to perform. Toward the end of the month of April, we received a letter from Dr. Armstrong and Mr. G. W. Woodworth, the persons who undertook the publication, from which we make the following extracts:

"The undersigned regret much to have to inform the committee that it is not in their power to proceed with the publication of Rev. Dr.

Cramp's History of the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces of Canada, as proposed by us and authorized by the Baptist Convention of said Provinces last year at Halifax.

"The main causes which have prevented the publication are: (1) After extensive correspondence since the Convention, it was found that to furnish fifty first class illustrations (fifty was the least number promised) would many times exceed the amount we had calculated on. We had no authority to publish without the illustrations; and deemed poor ones worse than none. (2) The general depression in respect to matters of business and finance, pressing hard here, rendered it hazardous, if not impossible, for us to enter upon the publication of said History.

The copy of said History, as it was received by the first named be low, (Dr. Armstrong), is in his hands, and awaits the order of the Convention."

Inasmuch as the Convention accepted the proposals made by these gentlemen, and our sole duty as a committee was to supervise the work, we could do nothing but allow the matter to rest till the present time, and report the facts to Convention.

We beg to recommend, however, that the manuscript of the History be placed in the custody of the Governors of Acadia College, to be kept in a place of safety, until such time as it may be deemed practicable to have the work published.

# Convention Scheme.

# Report of Finance Committee.

In presenting this Fifth Annual Report, the committee would call the attention of this body to the fact that the past year has been an exceptionally hard one for the poor, and those in moderate circumstances. The low prices obtained for the products of the forest and the field, combined with the general commercial depression that prevailed, rendered the collecting of funds more difficult than during the previous year. The contributions of persons on whom the hard times rested most heavily, usually make up the greater part of Convention Funds. Your committee had hoped that the lack from this quarter would be supplied by those who possessed an abundance of this world's goods. But in this they were mistaken. Some of the larger and richer churches, too, during the year, have expended large amounts

either in purchasing property or in repairing what was already possessed, and from this cause their contributions may have been somewhat lessened.

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In view of the foregoing facts, and that the same special effort was not made to increase the donations to Acadia College as was put forth the previous year, it should not be a matter of surprise if the gross receipts had fallen a little below those named in our last report.

During the year the Finance Committee for Nova Scotia devoted the greater part of his time to the work of visiting or corresponding with the churches embraced in the Convention. Private individuals were also appealed to personally or by letter. The results of these efforts were only partially seen in the receipts of the year. They will undoubtedly bear fruit in the future.

Some of the churches in Nova Scotia have done better than they ever did before. Several have fallen behind their contributions of last year. Some have contributed to the Fund for the first time. Others that gave small amounts have failed almost entirely this year.

In New Brunswick, although the ordinary contributions are a little less than those last reported, the amounts collected for the Book Room and the College make the totals very near the same. In view of the large amounts raised for the N. B. Seminary and for other local objects, your committee are pleased to be able to report as favourably as they are now doing.

The Prince Edward Island churches have continued to do well. Notwithstanding the sad lack of pastors on the Island, and the financial depression in which the inhabitants largely share, the churches are determined to move onward until the one dollar per member is obtained. From present appearances they will be among the first to reach that standard.

From the success which has crowned the labours of the committee during the past trying year, they are still persuaded that if all the pastors of our churches will lead their people forward in the matter of benevolence, as some are doing, there will be no necessity for the employment of special agencies, and there will be no lack of funds to carry forward successfully all our denominational enterprises.

The following is a summary of the committee's accounts, and a list of the churches which contributed to the benevolent objects embraced in the Convention Scheme:

### ERRATA.

OMITTED FROM THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF ACADIA COLLEGE.)

Before recording the great losses sustained from the ravages of death, we would note the resignation of Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., as a member of this Board at the last meeting of the Convention. This devoted brother served some years as one of the Executive of the Nova Scotia Baptist Education Society, before Acadia College was brought into existence by that Executive in 1838. The College was managed by that Executive until it was transferred to the Convention in 1849, when Dr. Bill was appointed one of the first Governors. He was continued as a member of the Board of Governors, without any interruption, until he tendered his resignation in August, 1883. As one of the Executive of the Education Society and then as Governor of the College, his official connection with our institutions at Wolfville has extended over a period of fifty years. No other person has rendered so long a service. Many long journeys were performed by him from time to time to attend official meetings and always at his own expense. Successful agencies in behalf of our institutions of learning were prosecuted by him in the Provinces, in the United States and in England, the latter country having been visited in 1849 and in 1874. One of the prominent features of Dr. Bill's active life has been to promote in all practical ways the welfare and progress of our institutions.

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Now that his advanced years seem to render it prudent for him no longer to hold official connection with this Board, we depart from our usual custom in order that we may, in view of this record, express our gratitude to God for the abundant and long continued labors of Dr. Bill in the interests of Christian Education, and our sincere regard for the personal welfare of our honored brother.

Whereas, The field of our operations in Christian work is rapidly enlarging, and the calls for help becoming daily louder, and

Whereas, All our Boards are straitened and hampered for the want of funds even to sustain the work of the Lord in its present state efficiency, and

Whereas, The majority of our people have not as yet recognized their obligations to God so far as worldly prosperity is concerned, therefore Resolved, That the Association hereby recommend the pastors and officers of the churches of which it is composed, to adopt some practical means of arousing a greater spirit of benevolence among the individual members of our congregations; and that we know of no safer or better rule in this matter, than what is found in the law of the Lord as revealed in the Old Testament, which enjoined at least a tenth of all increase to be devoted to His service. Although in the New Testament this law is not positively enjoined, yet inasmuch as the Gospel as a re-

velation is in advance of the law, more beneficial to the world at large and designed by its Divine Author to be spread abroad till it fill and cover the earth, our benevolent contributions through which this increase must come, instead of falling below the standard named in the law, ought rather go beyond. One-tenth of all increase is hereby recommended to our people as a means to bring both temporal and spiritual prosperity.
