The close of past week's ore shipping operations in the Rossland camp saw the year's production to date pass the 300,000 ton figure. With almost three menths to run before the expiration of the year, it is apparent that another advance of 50,000 tons will be made in the annual production. THE SUGGESTED SHUTTING UP OF SKATING RINK IS UN-POPULAR.

SUM REQUIRED FOR IMPROVE MENTS IS NOT COMPARA-

steps will be taken to stave off such genuine calamity, especially in view of the fact that the outlay necessary to keep the rink open is not prohibitive when the possibilities of the institution as a revenue producer are considered. The directors of the Rossland Skat

ing Rink company met yesterday afternoon to go into the subject. A report was received from John Anderson, mechanical engineer, in which he recom mended a minimum expenditure of \$1,600 before the opening of the rink this ter. The directors were not in a position to devise means for raising this sum, and an adjournment was taken until today. In the meantime a cable message to Mr. Purgold, of Liverpool, was dispatched, offering to convey the assets of the company to him if he would assume the debenture indebtedness and make the improvements desired. A re ply to this offer is expected today.

From all sources comes a strong pro test against the idea of shutting down the rink, which is admittedly the finest and most commodious in the interior and a genuine source of healthy recreation during the winter months. More over, a Winter Carnival is an impos sibility without a rink.

The rink is considered a revenue prothe Rossland Curling club included 80 members, each of whom contributed \$10. while the receipts from skating and lockey must have been many times greater than the aggregate income from curlers. It is understood that in addition to paying for improvements made winter and all operating expenses, the rink company retired \$1.000 worth of the debentures at local banks. In view of these statements it is surprising that there should be any hesitation about expending the sum of \$1,600 on the institution at this juncture, especially as the citizens would thereby be deprived of about the only available means of recreation during the winter. It has been suggested that the memhers of the curling club be induced to purchase a share in the rink company maining uniss but if the curlers can be induced to put \$20 for the shares the sum required will be forthcoming from this source. The large percentage of consumers settle or receipt of these accounts, and the few who ignore them are looked up. Re-peated failures to elicit a response mean the shutting off of the light. The city can follow the same system. At present no monthly accounts are rendered, and riost people forget the account when not reminded. Exception is taken to this idea on the ground that it would require an additional clerk at the city tall, but the objection is met with th suggestion that one of the score of accountants who would gladly undertake the work should be engaged for three or four nights about the end of the month to send out the bills.
