

TWELVE THOUSAND CAPTURED GERMANS

Endless Train of Huns Taken Prisoners by the French Will be Shown in the Great Film, "War as it Really Is."

"War as it Really Is,"the seven reeler filmed under fire by Captain Donald C. Thompson, is to play at the Rex Theatre under the auspices of The Brantford Daily Courier for two days, starting Monday, Feb. 26. These motion pictures show the real truth about the trenches for the first time.

Commenting upon their appearance in Toronto, the critic of "Toronto World" of Jan. 2nd. 1917, under the heading "Fine War Pictures at the Regent-New and Thrilling Glimpses of the Fighting in and Around Verdun," wrote as follows:




