TELEPHONE FEDERATION

On call of the president, a meeting of the Leeds and Grenville Rural Telephone Federation was held in the town hall, Athens, on Thursday last. The drifted condition of the roads prevented distant companies from sending delegates, but there was a good representation as follows:

Lyndhurst—A. B. White, Ziba Jackson.
Crosby—E. J. Halladay, Charles Kerr.

A. G. & R.—George Taplin.
Plum Hollow and Edoia—George Tackaberry, S. Hollingsworth, A. Palmer, A. R. Brown.

Mallorytown and Lyn—Mr Taylor. Representatives of the different companies gave brief addresses dealing with their operations for the past year, and these showed that perfect harmony existed throughout the Federation and that a feeling of buoyancy and confidence existed. All have arranged for further extensions of their lines in the spring. Mr Taylor of Lyn had not previously attended a meeting of the Federation, but was favorably impressed with all he had learned of its nature and purpose and ventured the opinion that the Lyn and Mallorytown company would view with favor uniting with it. This line would connect with the A. G. & R.

Following a discussion of the advantages of incorporation, the matter of issuing a county directory was taken up and it was decided that 1500 copies should be printed as soon as possible.

On motion of Mr Wood, seconded by Mr White, it was resolved that hereafter each company shall be entitled to a representation at Federation meetings of two delegates, one to be the president or his proxy and one to be appointed by the company.

On motion of Mr Taplin, seconded by Mr White, Messrs C. A. Wood, T. R. Beale and G. F. Donnelley were appointed a committee to draft by-laws to be submitted at next annual meeting of the Federation.

The meeting then adjourned to call of the president.

At Glen Elbe, on Friday morning 10th, Christopher Wiltse passed away. Deceased who was a son of the late Alvin Wiltse, was born 57 years ago. POWER OF A WORD.

Why France Changed the Name of the "Life Saving Belt."

A vivid illustration of the power of mere words over human beings was once brought to the attention of French people by Franciscus Sarcey.

After the wreck of the Bourgogne many passengers were found floating drowned with life preservers on. These life preservers were fastened upon the bodies, but round the middle instead of under the arms, and the greater weight of the upper part of the body had tipped the head under water and the person of course was inevitably drowned.

Now it appears that the greater number of the persons so drowned were French. The French term for life preserver is ceinture de sauvetage, or "life saving belt." This word ceinture suggests to the mind in its moments of disorder and unreadiness, such as a great catastrophe brings, the idea of putting on a belt, and as a belt is put round the waist and nowhere else the frightened person instinctively adjusts the life preserver close about the hips.

The result is that as soon as the person so provided falls into the water part downward, and the head is plunged beneath the surface.

The word "belt" therefore, was the cause of the loss of many lives in the Bourgogne disaster. Sarcey accordingly proposed to counteract the fatal effect of the French word by renaming the article and calling it a brassiere, which is a kind of waist, and by bringing the word bras, or arm, to mind to teach people to put a life preserver on just underneath the arms.—Chicago Record-Herald.

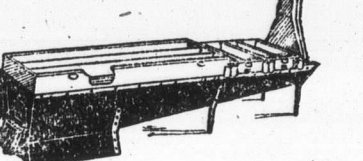
