Course for Provincial Land Surveyors in the Nova Scotia Technical College.

The Nova Scotia Technical College opened a short two months course in Land Surveying last year. This season to meet such a general need that the same course is going to be given again this year during the months of January and February. The course opens on Wednesday, January 3rd, and closes on Saturday, February 25th. It is conducted especially for beginners who wish to qualify as Provincial Land Surveyors and for Mine Surveyors.

It is only a short time ago that the government passed a new act regarding provincial land surveyors which carried very strict regulations concerning their qualifications and examinations. The Technical College at that time provided a course which would be just suited to the needs of young men who wished to secure certificates as land surveyors and for those who were already surveyors and who wished to study the subject further.

The splendid surveying equipment of the Technical College in the way of transit, levels, etc., will all be available for, this short course and a special instructor will devote his whole time to this work. The class will spend part of the time in lectures and recitations on the theoretical part of the work, but most of it will be spent outside in surveying and in the drafting rooms where maps of each piece of land surveyed will be drawn.

The course in the College is a very practical one. A man can learn how to make any ordinary kind of a survey much more thoroughly and quickly than by serving under a land surveyor, although he should follow up this course with practical experience in a company with or under the direction of a practical surveyor.

This course in surveying would be excellent for a road master or inspector or a young man who looks ahead to such a position when any comprehensive scheme of 'good roads' construction is carried out in the province.

The whole course of two months costs only \$1.00. Anyone who is interested in this subject should write to Principal F. H. Sexton, Technical College, Halifax, N. S., for a descriptive catalogue of the course.

The work at the last year was a great success and it is anticipated that a much larger number will attend this winter.

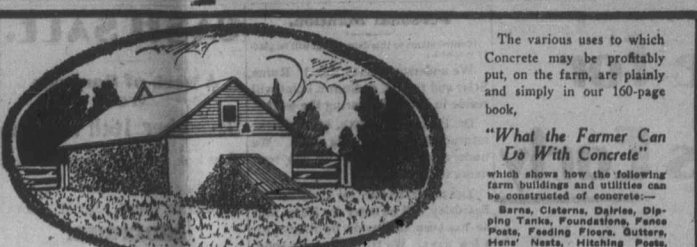

Peace Sunday.

The Nova Scotia Woman's Christian Temperance Union, through its Peace Department, sends out the following appeal for the observance of the fourth Sunday of December as Peace Sunday.

All pastors who believe that war is contrary to Christ's teachings as set forth in the Sermon on the Mount and elsewhere, and who consider that it is the duty of the Church to maintain and declare those high ideals until they are realized, are asked to help propose the cause of peace and good will among men by observing Peace Sunday—the Sunday before Christmas.

For several years this date has been observed by numbers of pastors in Great Britain and the United States, who have made it the occasion of presenting some of the various phases of the Peace movement and of advocating rational and Christian methods of settling international disagreements.

Surely in this time of multiplication of armaments, when the spirit of militarism is rife and its manifestations various, it is the plain duty of the Church of the 'God of Peace' to lift up its standard. Once a year is, in our opinion, not too often to present to Christian congregations the claim of the Peace reform and to bring home to their minds the great truth of the brotherhood of man of every race and nation, and what time more fitting for such discourses than the glad season when the whole Christian world is preparing to celebrate the anniversary of the 'Prince of Peace'.

We therefore ask the cooperation of pastors everywhere with those who are more especially working to bring about that blessed time when 'war shall cease unto the ends of the earth.'

Kaiser's War on Alcohol.

For some time past Emperor William has allowed no opportunity to escape him of uttering a warning against the dangers of excessive indulgence in alcoholic liquors, and this campaign against intemperance has been carried on most persistently and vigorously in the ranks of the navy.

A lengthy treatise in recent issues of the semi-official 'Marine Rundschau' pointed out how prejudicial alcoholic beverages are to the development of those qualities on which good seamanship depends, and, citing the success of the temperance movement in the British Fleet as exemplary, called upon the officers of the German navy to support the efforts in the same direction which are being made in this country.

It was, therefore, in pursuance of a set plan that the Emperor, at the inauguration of the new naval school at Muerwik, near Flensburg, exhorted the cadets to abstain from alcohol absolutely, and, indeed, to become members of the Order of Good Templars. The special grounds on which he based his appeal were that the next war would demand healthy men, and victory would belong to that nation which showed the smallest consumption of alcohol.

Women's Votes Needed.

Dr. Harry W. Wiley, in addressing the National Suffrage convention, held last week in Louisville, Ky., expressed himself as most heartily in favor of women's suffrage, in these words:

'I believe the country needs the women's votes, in order to make it possible that what is right in public affairs may be enacted. I have never known an organized set of women to be on the wrong side of any question. In the large undertaking before us of enacting justice and right, the women are the ones to save us.'

Facts About Kansas.

There are a half million young men and women in Kansas over twenty years of age who have never seen a saloon in that state; there is not a Kansas newspaper which publishes a liquor advertisement; one third of the counties of Kansas have not a prisoner in their jails nor a pauper in their poor houses; one-half the counties of Kansas did not send a convict to penitentiary last year; Kansas stands first in the per capita valuation of assessed property.

It is said of Dr. Arnold, the famous Head Master of Rugby, that every morning, on entering the class-room he looked his hat to the boys as he said 'Good morning, and in answer to a friend's enquiry as to why he so saluted them, he said: 'Somehow amongst those boys there is a future Prime Minister, a future Judge, Statesman, Governor, and Ruler, I salute the future men.'
