



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

Lady Astor's Maiden Speech

Sir John Rees, the Co.-Unionist member for East Nottingham, in the House of Commons last night, called attention to the hardship involved in maintaining in time of peace restrictions on liberty in respect of the consumption of liquor which were willingly tolerated in time of war.

There was considerable cheer ing when Viscountess Astor caught the Speaker's eye. As soon as it was known that she was speaking members flocked in-to the Chamber to hear the first speech ever delivered in Parliament by a woman.




