#### Head of Fuel Board Says "Fill the Bins"





From the potato districts on the Upper St. John River come reports of a heavy percentage of misses in the potato fields. The reason for this state of affairs in not known but the tendency will be toward reducing the

The strawberry crop has been heavy throughout New Brunswick. The Montreal market is taking many of the berries and owing to shortage in the Ontario and Quebec small-fruit crop the price is satisfactory to the New Brunswick shipper The height of the season has not ye been reached and shipments of berries will continue for some time Sackville is a heavy shipping point, but King's County and the district about Fredericton also are shipping.

# LOTS OF BUTTER

Every man, woman and child in the Dominion consumed about twentyeight pounds of butter each last year, a report issued by the Federal bureau



#### Monster Tuna Taken in Canadian Waters

As a writer of stirring tales of the candidates in the early days, Zane Grey has made an enviable record for himbard, but now along he comes with another—a fish story—and better still, presents the proof in photograph, so that his yarn does not take on the semblance of a dream or a good but of story-telling.

Tuna, weighing nearly half a ton, are the reward of ambitious anglers who fish in Nova Scotian waters, particularly in St. Ann's Bay, off Cape Breton. Three mammoth tuna have been taken from this locality, each holding the world's record in turn. Captain Laurie D. 
