The Hon. Senator Howland, in allusion to what
had already been so very forcibly expressed
in reference to "Successful Islanders Abroad,"
related the following: While in
New York in 1869 he was waited upon by a
Captain Johnson, who informed him that he
was a native of Prince Edward Island,
which he had not visited for years, and
about which he wished to hear some news.
They conversed for hours together. Captain
Johnson stated he was in China trading,
that some time previously his ship was lying
in a harbor at China, in company with five
other vessels, one of which was in charge of
a Captain Mackenzie, from Pictou. They
were not permitted to go beyond a certain
limit by the harbor, but some Chinese
vibrating taking place, which was to last
for two or three days, the Captain of the
different vessels engaged a tug and went up
some miles for the purpose of witnessing the
same. When about to return the tug was
approaching a large island, and was
suddenly taken down by land, but were
arrested, charged with going beyond the distance
permitted by law. They were brought to
Mandarin—a very ugly specimen of
humanity—and as the evidence was being
heard they considered their case hopeless.
Johnson and Mackenzie commenced to
discuss the situation in Gaelic, and were
overheard by "His Honor." He ordered the
