Quartz .- A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1.500 x 1.500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the tocator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.
