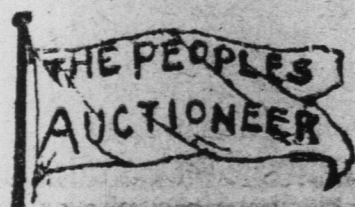

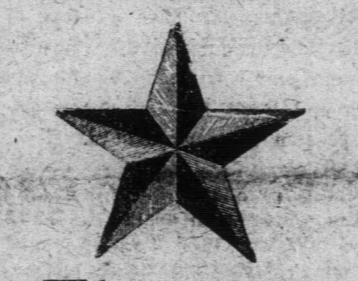

Better Sure Than Sorry.

A few weeks ago a two-year old boy, whose position as the grandson of St. Gaudens, the famous sculptor, made him a figure in the world's news, got his hands on some strychnine pills and swallowed one. It was so large that it stuck in his throat, but the baby traveled over to a table and actually managed to clutch a glass of water in his little hands and wash the pill down. He died in convulsions before anything could be done.

I suppose some millions of mothers shuddered as they read that story and promised themselves that no such thing should ever happen to their babies.

And yet it will. Into some of those very homes the same tragedy will probably come. Where do I get such a terrible prophecy? Why, from that surest prophet of the future—the past.

I doubt if a day, surely not a week, went by in the last year in which a similar tragedy did not occur somewhere in this country.

I doubt if there is one among my readers who does not personally know at least one family which has suffered such a loss. I know of two.

In some of these cases there could be absolutely no blame attached. For instance, I know of one in which a doctor's child, who had been carefully

taught not to enter his father's office, slipped in and helped himself to a large quantity of cathartic pills which were not at all poisonous, but which were fatal to him because of the size of the dose.

In other cases there is a carelessness which is so bitterly punished that it excites our pity far more than our blame.

Of course all children ought to be taught not to touch pills or anything of that sort without permission, but the best child will have his off moments, and so this training should be supplemented by unremitting care not to leave danger around.

Don't keep poisons unless you absolutely have to. When you must label them with some striking label, and put them on a separate shelf which is unquestionably out of the reach of children, or better still, lock them up. Children have been known to reach shelves which their elders thought perfectly safe.

Nor is it poisons alone which ought to be kept out of a child's reach. Many medicines which would be harmless taken in small doses, might be fatal if a child helped himself in wholesale.

And one more caution. Never throw away a bottle with anything in it, especially poisonous. Not long ago, several children were poisoned by drinking something they found on a dump. So rinse out your bottles before you throw them away. You owe that precaution to other people's children.

Household Notes.

To get rid of ants' nests pour petroleum over them.

Old fruit stains can often be removed by oxalic acid.

To keep the hands white, wash them with oatmeal water.

A new kind of washable cotton thread for embroidering is called ratine.

Always iron pongee on the wrong side over a heavily padded ironing board.

To curl an ostrich feather, sprinkle it with salt and shake in front of a hot fire.

To keep a kitchen table white, wash it first with vinegar, then scrub it as usual.

Natural or "unpolished" rice is far more wholesome than the shiny-white kind.

Apple water ice is a pleasant change from ices made with other fruit flavors.

A tablespoonful of vinegar added to a pot roast will make it more palatable and tender.

To keep white paint bright, rub it with a clean kerosene cloth after the ordinary cleaning.

Young peas may be candied when tender, just as mint leaves or rose leaves are candied.

Horse-radish is better scraped than grated, and should be prepared just before it is needed.

A drop of oil of lavender on the arms and neck is sometimes a protection from insect bites.

The prettiest trimming for children's summer dresses of linen is a hand-embroidered scallop.

Never rub soap on a stain without first wetting it and partly washing it out in cold water.

Two tablespoonfuls of ammonia added to the bath makes it very refreshing in hot weather.

Jelly should be lifted from the preserving kettle with a silver or enameled ladle or a cup.

A girl with clever fingers can make good little shirtwaist bows out of her brother's cast-off ties.

Every housekeeper does not know that ice creams can be flavored with tea, just as they are with coffee.

Sew a bit of velvet inside the heels of your shoes, and it will save a good many holes in your stockings.

Never wash the face directly after exposure to the burning sun. Use cold cream instead and wash later.

Put ripe watermelon into dice, sprinkle with sugar and a little orange juice. Serve ice cold in a tall glass.

To make gas mantles last longer, dip in a glass of vinegar for a moment and dry thoroughly before using.

Recent Up-to-Date.

Egyptian Priests Used Slot Machines 2,000 Years Ago.

(From London 'Tit-Bits'.)

This is but one of the many interesting cases of the antiquity of modern inventions, related by Mr. H. E. Dudeney, in the 'Strand Magazine.' It is astonishing, but nevertheless true, that more than 2,000 years ago Egyptian priests were using a penny-in-the-slot machine, the mechanism of which was practically identical with that of the machines to be found on every railway station to-day. The ancient machine, the inventor of which was Hero, was used for supplying sacred water at the doors of the temples. A coin was dropped from the top, fell on one end of a balanced horizontal lever, which being depressed to a certain angle the coin fell off, and the lever, being weighted, returned to its seat, and this cut off the supply.

The taximeter was in use about a hundred years ago, and was sold in various qualities in Leadenhall St., London, at from 25s. to 35s., while not only the modern telegraph but also wireless telegraphy was foreseen as long ago as 1633, when Henry Van Etten suggested, in a little book called 'Mathematical Recreations,' that a person in London might communicate with one in Prague, Germany, by the help of "Magnes," (presumably magnetism). Van Etten suggested that if each of the persons had a needle touched with Magnes, and secret notes or alphabets they would be able to move the needle and indicate letters, and thus convey messages.

Much Money Goes.

TO SUFFRAGETTE CAMPAIGN FEED.

London, August 4.—It has been ascertained that the accounts of the Women's Social and Political Union for the first six months of 1913 show that more than \$55,000 has been received during the period toward the principal fund of the union, known as the quarter million pound fund.

At the close of 1912 this stood at \$706,000. To June 30, 1913, the total was more than \$760,000. For the first quarter of the year the receipts varied from \$1,500 to \$1,750 a week, but since April they have been steadily rising.

The total receipts for June were close upon \$17,500, a record amount. During June \$4,000 was collected at the Pavilion Music Hall meetings.

Police Women of Chicago on Duty.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Chicago's ten police women, clad in modest blue tailor-made suits and wearing silver stars and hats with blue bands, went on duty to-day. Their work will be mainly to look out for women and children.

The details of their duties have been worked out by a committee of women social workers and the Chief of Police. The Chief had considered assisting the police women to stations in the red light districts, but it was decided they would be of greater service in the public parks and other places of recreation.

The police women will visit the public dance halls, excursion boats, beaches and railroad stations and will try to keep young folks off the street late at night. They will obtain information rather than make arrests, although on occasions they may be called upon to arrest some one.

Whether the police women shall wear brass buttons and carry revolvers and clubs will be decided after the civil service examinations for the positions.

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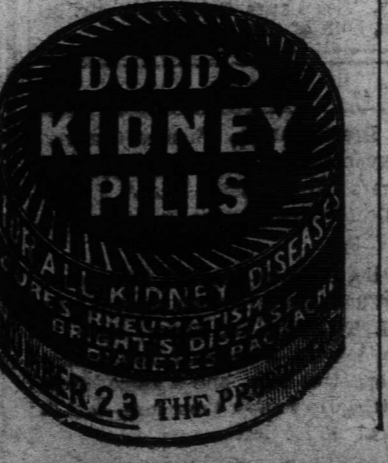

This Date in History. AUGUST 11. First Quarter. Days Past—222 To Come—142. CARDINAL NEWMAN died 1890, aged 89. English cardinal, whose ostracism from the evangelical school may be dated from 1828. He wrote "Lead Kindly Light" in 1833, and was formally received into the Roman Catholic Church in 1845. Like Pascal, he had the intellect of a sceptic and the soul almost of a mystic. As a Christian poet he ranks high and his works are perfect in expression and exhibit in rare combination strength and grace. PRESIDENT CARNOT born 1837. Became President of the French Republic in 1871 holding the position till 1894 when he was assassinated at Lyons. FIRST STONE OF WATER ST. PAVEMENT LAID 1899. I do not ask to see the distant scene. One step enough for me. —Newman.

Notes and Comments. In the report of the Board of Trade, the Council engages in some speculations as to the effect of free entry of our fishery products into the United States. Here they are: "The duty on salted codfish was 3/4 cents per pound. If the full effect of this reduction reaches the consumer, it does not seem reasonable to suppose that it will occasion any very marked increase in consumption, or any excessive demand for our codfish. Again, we do not, to any appreciable extent, put up our codfish in the neat and attractive manner to which the United States consumers are accustomed. The business of preparing codfish for market in New England ports is a highly specialized one, which will take some years to learn. But we can at once supply the raw material in the shape of salt bulk codfish. For two years past the Gloucester merchants have bought from us considerable quantities of salt bulk codfish, in the fall and winter months, in order to supply the requirements of their trade, and we may confidently expect that this demand will steadily increase." The demand is probably due to the large increase of immigration into the United States of people from the

A Menace to The Public. An Open Letter to Messrs. Bowring Brothers, Limited. S.S. Prospero. August 6th, 1913.

We, the undersigned, residents of Newfoundland, and of the United States, passengers on the steamship Prospero, respectfully call to your attention certain conditions now existing on the steamship Prospero, which are a menace to public health and welfare. On each trip of the Prospero numerous persons, men, women and children, suffering from various diseases, are carried by this steamer between St. Anthony and other ports of call. Many of these persons are suffering from tuberculosis and other contagious diseases, yet they are in no way separated from the other passengers, and no accommodations are provided where they may receive proper care and attention during the trip. We call to your attention two examples this trip where your other passengers have been subjected to great and unnecessary risk of disease. (1) A man suffering from cancer of the lip was allowed to occupy a stateroom and enter the dining saloon and use the same napkins, towels, dishes, etc., as the other passengers. (2) A woman in the last stages of tuberculosis was brought on board the steamer at St. Anthony and was placed in the saloon, where she remained for over thirty-six hours coughing and spitting. This woman was not provided with a sputum cup, and the saloon in which she lay connects directly with the dining saloon. We are informed that on the trip prior to this one, a woman, taken on board in the same condition and placed in this saloon, died there. These are the conditions of which we are cognizant in the First Cabin, in the stateroom matters must be worse. We therefore ask that your Company provide on this steamer accommodations where those sick and suffering from contagious and infectious diseases can be separated from the other passengers. It was also the opinion expressed in those numerous petitions, largely signed by fishermen, who asked for an election last fall, and which after being questioned in the House of Assembly by the Premier, Sir Edward Morris, was endorsed as the opinion of the Supreme Council of the Fishermen's Protective Union at the annual sessions held at Bonavista last December. In reference to the same matter, Sir Robert Bond, the leader of the Opposition, said in the House of Assembly, when presenting a large number of these petitions: "It is very evident, sir, from the number of the petitions and the numerous signatures attached thereto, that there is at present a widespread feeling of alarm in this country as regards public expenditure, and every one of them supports the position that I have taken in this House in reference to public expenditure since the opening of this session."

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. SHELBURNE, To-day. Joseph McGill, the well known ship-builder, is dead. EAST FREETOWN, Mass., To-day. Six women and a man were drowned and three others were saved when a motor boat sank at Long Pond last night. SYDNEY, To-day. A fire on Sunday morning gutted the Y. M. C. A., and most of the lower floor occupied by MacKenzie & Giffen, Men's Furnishers, whose loss is between twenty and twenty-five thousand dollars. The damage done to the building is between five thousand and ten thousand. LONDON, To-day. The third attempt of the suffragettes under command of Sylvia Pankhurst to take Asquith's house failed yesterday when the militant leaders were captured by the police after night. The arrest came after the meeting when Pankhurst mounted Nelson Column and in fiery words asked the sympathizers to follow her. She started down Whitehall, surrounded by women and preceded by a flying wedge of dockmen. Squads of police were drawn across Whitehall at the Horse Guards. Militants attacked this line with such a dash that a few of them penetrated. The first crowd became fierce and the police used clubs. Pankhurst and five of the women were then arrested. Disheartened at the arrest of their leader the mob suddenly dispersed.

BERLIN, To-day. These are the despatches between Emperor William and King Roumania Winemunde: "Your telegram which reached me to-night is a great, real joy to me. I offer my sincerest and heartiest congratulations on your splendid success, for which not only your people, but also the belligerent States of all Europe have to thank you for your wise and truly statesmanlike policy. Frisco Exhibits Meant a Charge of \$1,250,000.

London, Aug. 5.—The question of British participation in the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915 gave rise to a debate in the House of Commons this afternoon.

Some criticism was expressed on the action in this connection, and the suggestion was offered that private enterprise might supply the impetus necessary to secure adequate British representation which the government declined to furnish.

Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in a lengthy statement explaining the official attitude of the British Government in the matter stoutly maintained that the decision of the Cabinet not to participate was

entirely due to commercial considerations, and had nothing to do with the controversy over the canal tolls.

British Foreign Secretary, who repudiates in the House of Commons, the charge that the British Government refused to countenance the San Francisco Exposition because the United States proposes to exempt the country's own coastwise shipping from the levy of tolls in the Panama Canal.

Sir Edward Grey said: "The British Government came to the conclusion that under present circumstances it would not be justified in asking the country to incur the heavy expenditure required for participation in the exhibition. This expenditure was estimated at least at \$1,250,000, and such a sum would be quite out of proportion with any commercial advantages likely to result from it."

No Trade Desire to Participate. "Inquiries in the commercial circles of the United Kingdom have not shown that there was any active desire to participate."

"The conditions for participants laid down by the Exposition authorities prescribe that exhibits should be distributed among a series of international pavilions, thereby rendering it impossible to secure an effective national display."

"The question was considered and dealt with on these grounds, without any reference to the question of Panama Canal tolls."

The British Government had done nothing to discourage participation in the Exhibition by the self-governing British Dominions.

Mr. O'Connor Doubts Big Expenditure. Mr. T. P. O'Connor questioned the estimate made by the government as to the expenditure and said that Great Britain's expenditure at Chicago had amounted to only \$300,000, while at the Japanese, the German, and the French Expositions it had attained only \$600,000.

Sir Edward Grey pleaded that conditions were not the same at San Francisco, and that the Government's estimate had been reached by inquiries made on the spot.

Mr. Alpheus Clophas Morton, a Scottish member, suggested that in view of the Government's "disinclination to help the exhibition," private individuals or the City of London might take the matter up, as was the case at the French Exhibition of 1889.

Sir Edward Grey, in reply, stated that so far as the government was concerned, the matter had been very carefully investigated by the Board of Trade, but the Government would not think of doing anything to discourage participation in the Exposition by private individuals. He would, he said, communicate with the Board of Trade to see if it was ready to assist exhibitors desiring to participate.

Scandal Hunters Got Their Answer.

London, August 6.—So many questions have been asked lately in all quarters as to whether the names of prominent men had been suppressed in connection with the sensational raid on "Queen Gerald's" flat in Piccadilly, a short time ago, that the Home Secretary, Reginald McKenna got upon the floor of Parliament

yesterday and said there had been no influence brought to bear by the Home Office in keeping the facts of the case under cover.

The newspapers for a week past have been full of letters asking why it should be alleged that the names of some well-known men and at least one member of Parliament are being shielded, and various other insinuations have been made. For instance, in one letter in The Globe, occurs the following paragraph: "The names are thought to be known, but they have not yet been uttered. Perhaps the only documentary proof which could bring the guilt home to the right quarters lies at the Home Office in Mr. McKenna's keeping. Supposing the secret dossier to contain the name of one of Mr. McKenna's colleagues, is there any assurance, any probability even, that he has exercised merely on judicial grounds, his power to secure the withdrawal of a prosecution which would have involved the publication of that name?"

Lady Barlow, Lawrence Houseman and others have been calling on Mr. McKenna to give up the names, but without result. Finally yesterday Noel F. Buxton, a radical member and others asked the Home Secretary about the case during the session in the House of Commons. Mr. Buxton began by remarking that the prisoners had pleaded guilty on all the charges, but that as the girls found in the Gerald flat were all characters long before they came under the influence of the woman in question, and as the facts indicated "white slavery" the judge did not think himself warranted, therefore, in sentencing her to more than three months' imprisonment in the second division. He then asked directly if any names had been suppressed.

Mr. McKenna replied aggressively and in a very irritated mood that "there was no suppression of names. It is quite true that there were certain names in a diary which was found on the premises, but the mention of these names would not, and could not be relevant to the charge."

"So far as I, and the charges made against me personally are concerned, I was not aware of any names until after the trial was over."

J. Canadian Brigade For The British Army - Manoeuvres.

Ottawa, Ont., August 5.—That Canada should send over to England in 1914 a Canadian brigade to the divisional and army manoeuvres is the proposition being urged upon Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, from all parts of the Dominion. The brigade would be under the command of the Militia Minister himself, and a staff of distinguished Canadian officers is also part of the plan urged.

The scheme suggests that the brigade should consist of four battalions of infantry and a composite corps consisting of cavalry, artillery, and service corps, etc.

Make Brigade From Various Regiments. The brigade would then be made up as follows: One battalion of Highlanders, composed of representatives of the different Highland Regiments from all parts of the Dominion. One battalion of Fusiliers and Guards chosen from the different Fusilier and Guards Regiments of the Dominion. This battalion would be known as the "Beaverskin Battalion."

One battalion composed of the representatives from the different Rifle Regiments of the Dominion. One battalion composed of representatives of the other infantry regiments to be known as the "Scarlet Regiment." Then representatives of the other arms of the service, cavalry, artillery, army service corps, and other units.

The brigade would thus be representative of all the different arms of the Canadian service, and those to be taken would likely be chosen by the recommendation of the officers of the regiment.

The officers to be taken would depend upon the recommendation of the officers commanding their district, and would depend upon the interest they have taken in their regiments.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. A two hours' conference between President Wilson and Secretary Bryan, and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, brought about no change in the attitude of the administration toward Mexico. The President took the Senators into his confidence far enough to outline the following: John Lind, his special envoy to Mexico City, does not bear any solution of the present situation, but goes to continue this government's efforts to induce the Provisional President Huerta to redeem his promise for a free constitutional election, that under no circumstances does the administration propose to recognize the Huerta Government, that Lind has gone to Mexico City to be the eyes and ears of Washington administration on the ground, and to explain the attitude of this government.

When he has fully familiarized himself with the situation, and that the withdrawing of Ambassador Wilson, and the sending of Lind, the President planned to have a man on the ground who was in sympathy with the administration. It was made clear that the purpose of the conference was to establish a more frank and intimate relation between the Senate and the administration in the development of the Mexican policy and furtherance of this. President Lind, answered many pointed questions, while he disclosed no definite plan for the pacification of Mexico; the implication remained that upon Lind's reports would depend to a large extent the future policy of this country. There was practically no talk of lifting the embargo on importation of arms into Mexico which some members of the committee believe would put a speedy end to the difficulties. The Senators who expected to be informed of a definite plan or a formal message Lind might be bearing, in the Mexican Government, were disappointed.

The President told them upon the arrival of Lind in Mexico City there would be transmitted through the Charge d'Affaires in Mexico City as well as to foreign governments generally, an explanation of Lind's mission. This explanation, as developed at the conference, is expected to be a reaffirmation of the American Government's attitude during the last few weeks of favoring efforts to secure temporary cessation of hostilities in Mexico, so that a constitutional election may be held. It was reiterated after the conference that Lind's mission was to proceed to be left largely to his discretion, after he had talked with William Bagard Hale, and other close friends of the administration, who are familiar with the situation in the Mexican capital.

Freighter Smashes Wallard Canal Gates.

St. Catharines, Ont., Aug. 4.—The steel freighter Lehigh, bound for Montreal with coal, crashed into the fore gates of Lock No. 23 of the Welland Canal at Thorold on Saturday afternoon, smashing the upper portion of both gates and bending them over sufficiently to allow the force of water from the upper level to wash the big boat over the remaining eight feet of the gates into the level below.

In making this the steamer dropped fourteen feet low first, shipping a quantity of water. Righting herself the Lehigh was swept the full length of the short level below to Lock No. 22, which the steamer Fairmount was just leaving.

Many Tragedies Mark English Bank Holiday.

London, August 4.—Five girls who returned recently to Ireland from the United States to visit relatives were drowned on Saturday at Strandhill, near Sligo. They are Lizzie Ford, Margaret Fraile, Lizzie Murtagh, Mary Ann Murtagh and Lizzie McNulty.

The girls were bathing, when Lizzie Ford, who was a good swimmer, dared the others to go further out in the stream. A strong current was running, and all were carried away and drowned despite efforts made by a policeman who jumped into the water to rescue them.

Child in Cage With Snakes.

St. Thomas, Ont., Aug. 8.—A pretty fair haired girl eight years of age, was taken in charge yesterday, by the Elgin county authorities at Almer where the child had been on exhibition at the "Mamie Haba Show" which has been in that town all week, and the spectators were shocked when they paid their fee to see a frightened looking child sitting in a cage surrounded with big snakes, including rattlers and copperheads.

The usual position of the child was a crouching one as she had been told to keep her eyes on the reptiles. The two men in charge of the show were William Ford, father of the child, of Baling, near London, and Chas. Cox, her uncle, of London, both were arrested. They will be sentenced on Saturday. The child has been travelling on the road for six weeks and was compelled to sit in a canvas bag about five feet deep and five feet square for 11 hours a day, with the reptiles. The little girl was brought to St. Thomas and placed in a children's shelter.

Fire on Major's Path

HOUSE RAZED TO THE GROUND. On Saturday evening the house and contents of Robert Thomas, on the Major's Path, was destroyed by fire. Mr. Thomas was in the city at the time and the only occupant in the house when the fire occurred was Mrs. Thomas, who was in bed and dangerously ill. Reflections of the blaze attracted people who live in that section, to the scene. Their efforts, however, could not cope with the blaze, which was fanned with a strong wind, and gaining considerable headway. The building was razed to the ground, but the work of the volunteers prevented further disastrous results, as if the barn nearby had caught there is but little doubt that some of the buildings left standing to-day would have gone up in smoke. There was no insurance carried on the property destroyed, and the loss to the owner is a severe one. A fortunate happening in connection with the fire is that the sick woman was got out of the burning building although she had a narrow escape from suffocation by smoke.

Saturday evening Miss Randell entered Blair's store on Water St., and asked for goods to the value of 85 cents. As payment she presented the valueless cheque which was honored by the clerk who was busy at the time and who handed back the customer \$5.95 change. It was only when the day's rates were being made up and the cash was counted at Blair's, that the forged cheque was discovered. The police authorities were immediately acquainted of the matter and the arrest of the woman followed. To-day in court the accused was identified by the clerk who sold her the goods and she was remanded.

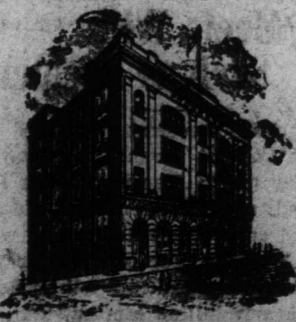

VANCOUVER, August 10.
That the Unionist Party of Great Britain and Ireland have made up their mind to accept a true public opinion of the people of Canada on the subject of Home Rule for Ireland was the statement made by Hon. Stuart Murray, M.P. for Sheffield, one of the most prominent Conservatives in the British Parliament, before he left Vancouver for Australia. In making the statement he made it on the condition that it would not be mentioned until the steamer Makura was well out to sea. We Unionists believe, he said, that the form of Home Rule for Ireland as proposed by Asquith and Redmond is the sort that will lead not only to civil war, but to the dismemberment of the Empire because it gives the Nationalists of Ireland a chance to become independent. Hon. Walter Long and Capt. Morley have such information that we have decided to send messengers to each Province of Canada to test a public opinion, and we hope to secure such a verdict as will enable us to go back to Westminster and say that the resolutions passed years ago by your parliament do not now represent the true opinion of the people of the Dominion.

LONDON, August 10.
The Times correspondent says that the treaty of peace concluded at Bucharest completely ignores the essential features of the distribution of the various Balkan races in Macedonia and consequently is devoid of all elements of permanency. Bulgaria, surrounded by five enemies, is reduced to desperation, the correspondent says, and is compelled to assent to their demands, but these arrangements cannot be regarded as final. A revision of the treaty is obviously necessary in the interest not only of justice, but of Balkan tranquility and European peace.

LONDON, August 10.
All newspapers display the utmost interest in the question between the United States and Mexico. Grave fear is expressed of an armed conflict. Universal comment is made on the probability of President Wilson's pacific administration, with Bryan, world's peace advocate, at the head of the Cabinet, will be forced into war. The general view is that Wilson's administration will force Mexico to accept Lind, which will cause an anti-American outbreak in Mexico, with the result that the American people will be hounded beyond control, and compel war in spite of Wilson's principles.

LONDON, August 10.
A group of militant suffragettes armed with horsewhips, to-day assaulted Dr. Pearson, medical officer of Holloway jail, as he was entering the prison gates. The attack was made as a protest against the treatment in jail of Miss Richardson, while undergoing sentence on three months' imprisonment for breaking windows. Miss Richardson, alleged that the doctor had threatened to deal with militants in such a way as would make them physical and mental wrecks, after which they would be confined in a lunatic asylum.

LIVERPOOL, August 10.
Two hundred fitters and fitters on the Cunard liner Lusitania, went on strike at Liverpool, yesterday, over a dispute with the boiler-makers. Forty engineers on the Mauritania also went on strike. Officials of the Cunard line say this trouble will not interfere with the sailing of the two vessels.

WASHINGTON, August 10.
President Wilson will meet the entire Senate of General Relations Committee at the White House tonight, for conference on the Mexican situation. The entire membership of ten Democrats and seven Republicans have been asked to be present.

PARIS, August 10.
All news despatches from Washington, published in France, describe the rupture between the United States and Mexico as being close at hand.

MADRID, August 10.
The situation at Barcelona, where ninety thousand workers are on strike, and 337 factories closed, is regarded by government circles as very grave. It is expected the city will be declared in a state of siege, as the strike is viewed as a revolutionary movement. The Socialists held a meeting here yesterday, and resolved to join hands with the Barcelona strikers.

LONDON, August 10.
Announcement is made from Bucharest that Bulgaria has waived claim to Port Ravida on the Aegean Sea. If this should prove true, it is considered of highest importance, and is regarded as greatly improving the prospects of genuine lasting peace.

LONDON, August 10.
The Commons, yesterday, ratified the contract with the Marconi Co. for construction of an imperial chain of wireless stations, by a vote of 219 to 133. In its essentials it is the same contract as that which, owing chiefly to error in judgment on the part of the Government, plunged Britain into a maelstrom of disreputation, calumny and seariness. Postmaster General Samuel defended the contract with consummate skill, and in his speech quoted statements made by the Privy Council and Admiralty on the need of a wireless chain. How could the Government ignore representations from the authorities responsible for the defence of the Empire? he asked. He challenged the verdict of the contract on its merits, and reminded the House that the company gave a guarantee of successful operation. The Government had the benefit of all the Company's inventions, and had the advantage of Marconi's personal experience, he said, and if it had got on at its service, it was folly to ignore its claims. Cheers from all parts of the House greeted this statement. Marconi, he said, fell most deeply over the way his honored name had been made a political catchword and almost a term of

abuse. Though partisan arguments were avoided in debate, the voting followed on party lines. Lord Cecil's hostile motion was defeated by a majority of 31, and Masterman's motion in favor of the contract, by a majority of 71. The resolution in the former government majority is explained by the absence of Nationalists and a dozen Labour members. Henry Norman abstained from voting on Lord Cecil's motion, but voted against Masterman's motion. Two other Liberals followed his example.

BERLIN, August 9.
Emperor William and the King of Roumania, to-day, exchanged congratulatory telegrams in connection with the conclusion of peace among the Balkan States.

Cathaglin in Port.

Chicken Pox on Board.
The R. M. S. Cathaglin, Capt. O'Grady, arrived in port at 8 o'clock Saturday night from Liverpool. The passage was made in exactly seven days. She left Liverpool on Saturday, August 2nd, and made splendid progress every day until Friday last when dense fog was run into, in consequence the speed of the ship was reduced for several hours. But for the fog the voyage from the Old Count would be made in 6 1/2 days. The ship brought 700 tons of cargo, 58 packages of mail and the following passengers for here in saloon—J. Barr, F. C. Bowring, E. R. Bowring, John Browning, Mrs. Browning, W. Bulmer, Mrs. Bulmer, J. O. Fraser, N. S. Fraser, Miss D. Gainsford, Robert Harbar, Miss Dorothy Harvey, G. Hawes, Mr. Hawes, Jr., E. Hills (Hon.), Mrs. Hills, Miss G. H. Job, Miss J. Job, (Hon.), Miss C. B. Kay-Shuttleworth, Miss Pettis Matcote, A. Monroe, W. Monroe, Frederick Keppel North, Master North, R. O. Patterson, Hon. ... D. Ryan and Miss Janet Stirling. In transit for Halifax are 37 intermediate and 300 steerage passengers.

The day before port was reached chicken pox was discovered on board by Dr. John, the ship's surgeon. A female emigrant passenger was ill with the disease. When the ship reached at the Allan Line pier, Saturday night, all passengers were prevented from landing until Dr. Fraser went on board and examined the chicken pox sufferer. Later she was visited by Drs. O'Connell and Brehm. The woman is being kept in a separate room from the rest of the passengers so as to prevent contagion. She will be landed at Halifax.

A concert was held on board the Cathaglin on Thursday night last. Hon. J. D. Ryan acted as chairman. A collection of £3 was taken up to be devoted to the Marine Disasters Fund.

Cannot Plead in Italian Courts—Curious Reason for Decision.
Rome, Aug. 2.—The cause of women in Italy has had a set-back. Although Italians as a whole regard the question with benevolence, almost with sympathy—readers will remember the rejoicing some years ago when Signorina Teresa Labriola was admitted to the bar. Lately her right to exercise her profession has been called in question, and the Supreme Court has just given a decision against her on a finding that may make American women smile.

They are that as, according to Italian laws, a woman cannot do anything in public life without the consent of her husband; if she were allowed to practice law her husband might withdraw his consent at any moment, even while she was pleading.

Lunenburger in Port.

The Lunenburger banker, Marlon Mosher, arrived here yesterday. She left the home port two months ago for the Grand Banks; fish were found scarce and 1,500 gals. for eighteen men were taken on the voyage; the banker reports bait scarce. She put into Annapolis for a squid battle a few days ago but could get none, hence she came here. In a recent gale the Marlon Mosher had her canvas torn. Repairs for this will be made before the voyage is continued.
