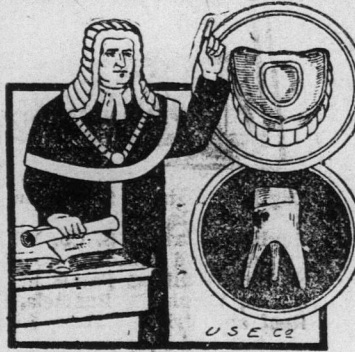

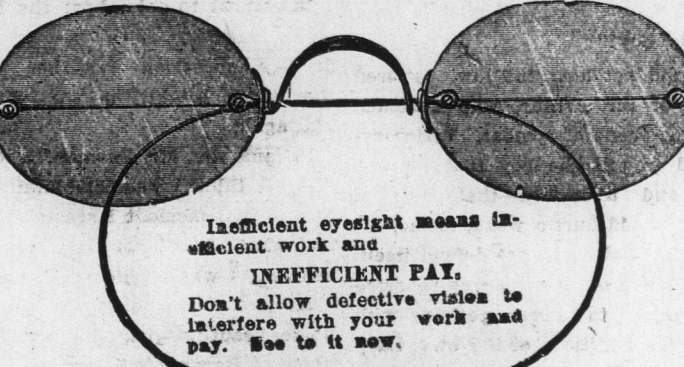

Two Newfoundland Successes.

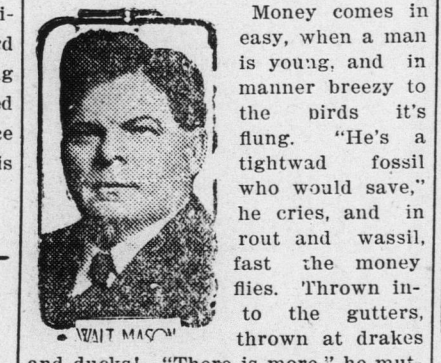

OFFICIAL.
LONDON, August 3.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
The Admiralty report a German destroyer sunk by a British submarine near the German coast on July 26th.

In the Sea of Marmora a British submarine sank two steamers, and bombarded the railway, blowing up ammunition trucks and doing other damage.

General Hamilton reports several sections of the Turkish trenches occupied by an attack on the Australian and New Zealand right. At least several Turks were killed round the works. The ridge on the crest was gained, and the position in that section materially improved.

The French Government reports German trenches captured in Artois and Vosges, and a trench lost at two points in Argonne.

The Russian Government reports 500 prisoners and six machine guns captured in the Baltic provinces, North of Warsaw very desperate fighting continues. The enemy made some progress towards the right bank of the Narw. West and south of Warsaw fighting is favourable to the Russians.

A German transport was sunk by a British submarine in the Baltic.

The Italian Government reports the capture of Mount Moleto in Carnia. On Carso a violent enemy attack was thrown back in complete disorder, and about 150 prisoners taken. A regiment of the Emperor's Jaeger was almost annihilated.

London, August 4.—The French Government reports enemy attacks repulsed in Argonne and the Vosges.

The Russian Government reports Russian retreat in Baltic provinces, and desperate fighting on the Narw, where every step costs the enemy enormous losses. Further enemy progress, after extremely sanguinary fighting northwest of Vangorod. Enemy repulsed between the Vistula and the Bug.

The Italian Government reports Austrian counter-attacks in Carnia repulsed with heavy loss. On Carso plateau renewed enemy attacks were defeated and appreciable progress made in the centre.

BONAR LAW.

COAL EMBARGO.
LONDON, August 3.
After August 30th British coal cannot be shipped anywhere except to British possessions and protectorates, according to an Order in Council issued to-day. The export of coal heretofore was reserved to British ports.

essions and countries which are the Allies of Britain. The new ruling eliminates all Allies.

LABOR'S OPPORTUNITY.
 LONDON, August 4.
 The labour of a million men is required to man the British fleet at sea. Chancellor McKenna declared at a meeting at Preston, last night, "The British Government, he said, is spending upon the Navy nearly half a million pounds daily in excess of what was spent in peace times."

WISE OR OTHERWISE.
 LONDON, August 4.
 A National Ministry has been formed in New Zealand consisting of five government, and five opposition members, according to a Reuter despatch from Wellington.

FIRM AND UNANSWERABLE.
 WASHINGTON, August 4.
 Great Britain's reply to the latest American representations against interference with neutral commerce, reject entirely the contention that the orders in council are illegal, and justify the British course as being wholly within international law. "Unavailable, either in point of law or upon principles of international equity," is the British reply to the American protest against the blockade of neutral ports, with an invitation to submit to international arbitration any cases in which the States are dissatisfied with the action of the British Prize Courts. Changed conditions of warfare, the British note contends, require new application of principles of international law. The advent of the submarine, airship, and the atrocities by German troops in Belgium are cited as justification for the exercise of extreme measures. The blockade is justified on the contention that the universally recognized fundamental principle of a blockade is that a belligerent is entitled to cut off by every means the sea-borne commerce of his enemy. The note reiterates that Britain will continue to apply the Orders complained of, although not without every effort to avoid embarrassment to neutrals, and observes that American statistics show that any loss in trade with Germany and Austria has been more than overbalanced by increase of other industrial activities due to the war. Sir Edward refers to the atrocities in Belgium, the poisoning of wells in German South West Africa, the use of poisonous gasses against the allied troops in Flanders, and finally, the sinking of the Lusitania, to show how indispensable it is that we should leave untried no justifiable method of defending ourselves.

HONORS BELGIUM'S KING.
 PARIS, August 4.
 President Poincare, in the course of a visit yesterday, to the King and Queen of the Belgians, at the village of Lee, the occasion being the five anniversary of the German ultimatum to Belgium, conferred upon King Albert the Decoration of the Cross of War. At the time he said France considered Belgium's cause to be indissolubly linked with hers.

STRASSBURG BOMBED.
 PARIS, August 3.
 A flotilla of Anglo-French aeroplanes flew over the German city of Strassburg, and dropped twenty-five bombs. The extent of the damage is not yet ascertained.

BUY BULGARIA.
 LONDON, August 3.
 Discussing the possible course likely to be taken by the Austrians and

Germans after the capture of Warsaw leads the Standard to advocate editorially that the Allies make a tremendous effort to gain mastery by influencing Serbia to make the territorial concessions desired by Bulgaria, on the theory that German forces on the south side of the Danube would overwhelm Serbia to relieve Turkey and open the road to the Black Sea and the Aegean. The Standard says the complete discomfiture of Russia, and have the greatest effect on the fortunes of the Allies. All this would be impossible, the Standard sets forth, if the Balkan States were on the side of Great Britain, Russia and France, Bulgaria being the keystone to the arch. It is not at all to the credit of French and British diplomacy, says the Standard, that this question was not settled long ago.

ALLIES AND GREECE.
 ATHENS, August 4.
 The British, French, Russian and Italian Ministers at Athens, made a collective visit to the Greek Premier today, and made united representations regarding the political situation.

NOTHING EXPECTED FROM ROMANIA.
 BERLIN, August 4.
 The warning that nothing can be expected from Roumania, is conveyed in a Tages Zeitung special this morning, by Count Ernest Reventlow. His article, which is headed, "Roumania's falling invitation" summarizes the situation thus: "Those friendly relations with Roumania, made sacred by tradition, and on the German side by firm contentment, hardly longer be considered as existing." Count Reventlow points to Roumania's refusal to permit the exports of grain or to permit ammunition for the Turks to pass through its territory, although Russia was permitted to transport munitions to Serbia. He says it had been hoped that Roumania would fulfil its treaty obligations, or keep upright, well within neutrality, but that the contrary has come to pass. Roumania's neutrality has become malevolent, he asserts, with a tendency to enter the conflict on the other side to Germany.

RUSSIAN OFFICIAL.
 PETROGRAD, August 4.
 During the last three days the enemy has made no serious attempts against us from the sector of the Narva River. In the district of Jadvano the enemy are conducting trench warfare, but in exploding mines we have continually held the upper hand. On the Pissa and Ska Rivers the whole enemy army has attacked our positions first launched against us reinforcements brought from France. Nevertheless, the enemy has not succeeded in a defeat in this sector, for it took the enemy a week to drive us back from the village of Serwatka on the right bank of the river. The Russian guard regiment, while the battle for the passages of the Narva near Novogorod, has not even begun.

Near the mouth of the Skwa the enemy, thanks to forests, succeeded in passing our side of the river, but we succeeded in preventing him from bringing his artillery across the Narva and, at the point of the bayonet, we annihilated some forces, which were deprived of the protection of their artillery. These failures compelled the enemy to withdraw from this sector the reinforcements which had come from France, and send them to reinforce the Prussian army which was moving more rapidly. This enemy was considerably strengthened by other reinforcements which came to it from the left bank of the Vistula. The enemy then directed his attention to the north, and in the direction of the Narva and the Oje is making great efforts to advance in a northeasterly direction, behind Ostrolianka. During three days of fighting, the enemy repeatedly hurled large masses of infantry against our trenches, but while suffering great losses he advanced only two or three versts, 3/4 mile. On August 2nd our troops, during a particularly desperate German attack, which we repulsed, saw the enemy's cavalry caught by his own infantry, who had been thrown back with the intention of forcing them to attack us again. The German losses there were very great.

HYDROPLANES DO GOOD WORK.
 PETROGRAD, August 4.
 An official communication issued this evening, says: Our hydroplanes attacked, near Windau, a German gunboat, and forced it to run ashore. The same hydroplane attacked and forced to retreat a Zeppelin and two hydroplanes. After the latter was brought down in the direction of Riga the other one withdrew beyond the river.

PORTUGAL IN TROUBLE.
 LISBON, August 4.
 Sensational and alarming reports are current in the capital, of no less than three separate revolutions in Portugal. Riots and assaults are of daily occurrence.

FLOODS IN IRIE.
 ERIE, Pa., August 4.
 A cloudburst over Erie city today, put out of commission the Light and Power Plants. All lines of communication are flooded in the business part of the city to the depth of five feet, causing serious property damage. Many houses were washed from their foundations, while the water reached the second story of others. Policemen and three citizens are reported drowned.

ASHORE NEAR SYDNEY.
 SYDNEY, N.S. August 4.
 The Canada Lake Transport Co.'s steamer Konora is ashore off Flat Point, exposed to a heavy sea. It is not certain whether she can be saved.

ed. During the height of last night's storm the barge Pennington, owned by the Canada Lake Transport Co., in port for coal, dragged her moorings and went ashore at the bar. The vessel's position is not dangerous.

MARINE FATALITIES.
 HALIFAX, August 4.
 The American schooner M. B. V. Chase, Capt. Tuttle, from Cheverie, N.S. to Norfolk, foundered near Scotland lightship today. The crew took to the lifeboats, and while attempting to land at Sandy Hook one of the boats was wrecked. Capt. Tuttle and one member of the crew were drowned.

Fishery Report.
 The following reports from the fishery are now posted at the Board of Trade:

July 31st.—From T. Hogan (Carbonear to Western Bay)—The total catch is 2,140 with 750 for last week. Thirty-five punts and 140 traps are fishing. There is enough caplin for bait, but no codfish with hook and line.

July 31st.—From W. White (Annapolis to Caplin Bay)—Ten whale boats, 44 traps and 65 dories and skiffs are fishing. Four schooners have arrived from the Banks and report no fish there. The catch to date is 4,419 lbs. with 1,862 for last week. There is a fairly good sign of codfish but no bait, though caplin is plentiful in deep water. Very good fishing was done in the first of the week but it has slackened off since, and trawl men are doing nothing, though they get a little from the traps when a haul is made.

July 31st.—From W. Chambers (Hr. Grace to Tring Cove)—Dogfish are numerous and very little cod is being caught as the caplin have gone. The total catch is 2,200 qts., and for last week 200. Twenty dories and skiffs and 17 boats are fishing.

July 31st.—From C. Renouf (Bank Head to Highlands)—Prospects are very poor, and the only bait obtainable is herring in small quantities. The lobster fishery is a blank. Hand lines and jiggers are the only means of fishing now. The catch to date is 1,708 qts. with 150 for the week.

Nfld. Aeroplanes Presented.

The Newfoundland Aeroplanes were formally presented to the Royal Park Flying Corps yesterday, at the anniversary of the entrance of Britain into the war on August 4th, 1914. The movement was suggested by the Patriotic Association, and when the committee to deal with the matter was formed, it was decided to raise money for two aeroplanes, if possible two of the large Gnome-Vickers bi-planes. This was supplemented by an aeroplane paid for by Messrs. W. D. Reid, H. D. Reid and R. G. Reid. The idea was to raise the money quickly so that they could be presented on August 4th. This has been done, and a message was received yesterday by His Excellency the Governor acknowledging the gift. The acknowledgment is as follows:

"Newfoundland's gifts have been announced in this morning's Times, Morning Post and other Journals. ROTTERDAM.
By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "At Good Old Swash."
Rotterdam is a mass meeting of shipping in a snarl of canals, located a few miles inside the "Safety First" line in the south of Holland. The city is named from the River Rott which flows into the River Maas at this point. These rivers are assisted in the work of rendering the neighborhood navigable by so many canals that some of them have to run under the buildings. One may take a canal boat at Rotterdam and travel all over Belgium, Holland and half of Germany unless old age interferes. The automobile business is very slow in this vicinity though some of the side canals are thick enough to ride upon by any machine which can navigate an Illinois or Iowa road. Rotterdam is one of the youngest and inexperienced of European cities. It is only 600 years old and has not been captured or plundered more than once or twice in its history. The tourist passes it by hurriedly, because none of the fantastic fatalities of the dark ages were staged there. It led a sleepy, carefree existence for hundreds of years until thirty years ago when it awoke, enlarged its harbor, built several more miles of canals in assorted sizes and became the Chicago of Holland. It now has 400,000 people most of whom only wear one pair of trousers at a time and regard wooden shoes as a curiosity. It has a ten-story office building which is regarded with more wonder by the inhabitants of Europe than all the old churches of the other Dutch towns; and it is the fourth greatest seaport in the world. A third of Germany's imports come to Rotterdam first and then go up the Rhine. In fact the Rhine in Rotterdam's most valuable asset. If it had the Mississippi River at its doors it would have a million people. Rotterdam builds ships and sorts out goods for half of Europe. It is a well built city with many fine buildings and it contains a large number of statues of famous Rotterdamers. It has produced no great artists or generals, but it did produce Erasmus who was a crank and kept harping on education some few hundred years ago at a time when the rest of the world was turning its attention almost exclusively to war.

Household Notes.

When buying fancy buttons for a washing garment choose a kind that has shanks, and attach to the article with a tiny safety pin on the wrong side. The buttons can then be removed quite easily before the garment is washed.

An elderdown quilt will wash beautifully. Wash it quickly in a warm lather. Rinse in several warm waters; dry quickly, and shake frequently to keep the down evenly distributed. Squeeze round the bottom occasionally as the water runs down.

To make strawberry jam, gather the strawberries when ripe and put to them a little juice of strawberries; then add them to their weight of loaf sugar, pounded and sifted. Put them into a preserving pan, and boil over a clear fire for twenty minutes. Put them into pots or glasses for use.

It is possible to fry chicken or stewing age if treated in the following way. Clean and cut it up as for stewing. Put it on and stew until thoroughly done, take it from the fire, and allow it to cool and to lie in liquor over night. When ready put it into a pan and fry in butter until brown.

In packing the picnic lunch, it is better if each sandwich is wrapped separately in oiled paper, the fruit put into a box by itself, and the sweet packet alone, so that each thing will retain its flavor and not be confused with everything else, as it is bound to be if all are packed helter-skelter into a basket.

There are paper dishes, decorated and with disks that fit, so that several courses be served on the same plate by changing the disks. All these are serving dishes of paper, which you can bake pies or scalloped dishes. There are sauce dishes of paper, lined with paraffin. All these will save labor in hot weather.

When a knife comes out of its handle it can be mended in the following way: Fix the handle firmly in an upright position, and fill the hole with finely powdered resin. Hold the rough end of the knife in the fire until it becomes quite hot, then push it into the resin in proper position and leave until firmly fixed.

AT THE NICKEL.

Boat Strikes Sunker.

CREW BARELY ESCAPE.
While running to the land for shelter from a strong northeast breeze which sprung up suddenly on Tuesday afternoon last, the little fishing boat Irene, owned by Mr. Isaac Eastman, of Lady Cove, T.B., struck a sunken near the Petty Harbor Motion, and sank almost immediately. The skipper with his two sons, who comprised the crew, barely escaped with their lives. The little boat had been fishing off Cape Spear and on the approach of the storm was put for the land under double reefed canvas. Several other boats which had been fishing in the same vicinity were also making for the land, and one of these in passing the Irene near the Motion took the wind out of her sails, with the result that the little craft fell away and was carried in on the sunker. A tremendous sea was running at the time and only with great difficulty did Mr. Eastman and his sons get into the rodney which they had in tow. With only one oar they kept their little boat's head to the sea until they were rescued in a motor boat which put off from the shore to their assistance. They were taken to Petty Harbor, and after being treated hospitably there, were driven to town, arriving here about 8 o'clock Tuesday night. Since his arrival here in town Mr. Eastman has been informed that his boat floated about three hours after she sank and that the fishermen of Petty Harbor towed her into the beach. He is hoping that the little craft is not much damaged and that with the replacing of a few planks the Irene may be repaired so as to continue the voyage. The loss is a serious one to the poor man, who had on board 10 quintals of fish, a caplin seine, fishing gear and supplies for two or three weeks, together with a few dollars in cash. The crew saved nothing except the clothing and oil skins in which they stood. They are now staying at the Seamen's Institute and will be looked after by the authorities.

CHOLERA IN AUSTRIA.

ZURICH, To-day. The number of cases of Asiatic cholera in the Austrian empire on August 3rd, totalled 629, according to an official announcement made today at Vienna. Among those succumbing to the disease was General Von Zeigler.

SHOT THREE SERGEANTS.

LISBON, To-day. Political feeling has completely disorganized the army classes between Royal and Republican supporters and other factions. Yesterday a Quartermaster from the engineers' barracks, shot and killed three sergeants of his regiments and then committed suicide. The sergeants, members of a secret society known as the White Ants, had denounced the Quartermaster as belonging to the Republican faction which is charged with conspiring against the present government.

THE FIGHT FOR WARSAW.

LONDON, To-day. After having tried for three weeks to force the Russians to evacuate Warsaw and the Polish salient by encircling movements from the north and pressure from the west, the Austro-Germans have commenced attacks on the fortress of Ostrolenka and those of Lenna and Ostrolenka to the northeast and Ivanogrod to the southeast. Berlin claims to-night that the Russians have been driven back to the advanced defenses of Lenna, and that the Warsaw has been crossed near Ostrolenka and that the Russians have fallen back into the outer lines of Warsaw, which the Austrians are attacking, and that the Austrians have captured the western part of the fortress of Ivanogrod and thus what should prove the decisive battle for the Polish capital begun in earnest. In the meantime Field Marshal Von Mackensen is slowly advancing from southern Poland, and the Bug in an effort to cut off the Russian armies which apparently are making a leisurely retreat from Warsaw and the western lines, while General Von Below, in his wider encircling through Courtland, has reached Kupischki fifty miles east of Lenna on the Vinnograd railway. Although the operations of Von Mackensen and Von Below appear most dangerous, serious threats to the retreating Russian armies, the Russian General Staff is paying more attention to Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, who has been trying with more or less success to force the line of the Narva. Here the Russians are offering a more stubborn resistance, and according to an official despatch from Petrograd, in two battles of three days have succeeded in checking the German advance, inflicting heavy losses. The Russians also admit severe casualties. When the despatch was sent, the third battle was in progress. Berlin claims that in this battle the Germans have been successful and have forced the crossing of Narva near Ostrolenka. On the whole the Russians, according to official reports, are making an extremely orderly retreat. Quiet is settled down along the western front except in Argonne and Vosges, where the German attempts to recapture lost ground or take new trenches have failed, according to a French communication. New moves of the greatest importance are anticipated in the near east. The Ministers of Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy have had a conference with the Greek Government. A despatch from Paris says an Italian officer recently arrived at British headquarters in the Mediterranean to arrange for this.

DESTROY TURKISH VESSELS BUT SAVE THE CREWS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. A statement issued by the Admiralty relative to operations in the Black Sea, says our sailors destroy Turkish vessels because they carry coal and petroleum, materials of war, but take every measure to save the crews. The vessels are cannonaded only when they fail to halt after they are signalled. In these cases where sailors prefer to regain shore by swimming in order to avoid capture, they are never shot. All who surrender are taken aboard warships and transported to Sebastopol.

ENEMY LOSSES GRAVE.

ROME, To-day. The following statement has been issued at headquarters: Our heavy batteries directed effective fire on the station of Borgo, on the railway in Val Sugana, where there is an important freight traffic. The enemy's losses in stubborn attacks on Mount Redatter in Caria, is found to have been very grave. On Carso plateau, on the night of the 3rd, passed quietly. During the morning our artillery shelled masses of infantry observed near Marocchini and columns marching along round from Ripa to Dobrovo. Our troops having resumed their advance on the left wing and centre, made slow progress, but on the right we confined ourselves to maintaining positions previously conquered. The enemy attempted vainly to recapture

Italy's Heroic Royal Admiral.

The Duke of Abruzzi's Romantic Adventures.

There is no more intrepid adventurer among Europe's Royalties than the Commander of Italy's Adriatic Fleet, Admiral Prince Luigi, Duke of Abruzzi.

A practical sailor, a dauntless explorer and mountaineer, and a noted scientific writer and lecturer, the Duke is also cousin to the King of Italy. A few years ago all the world was gossiping about his unfortunate love-affair with Miss Katherine Elkins, an American heiress.

Born at Madrid, in 1873, the Duke is the third son of Amedeo, Duke of Aosta, brother of the late King Humbert, and one-time King of Spain. Few Royalties revel so much in hardship and adventure as the Duke of Abruzzi; he is possessed of great physical strength and undaunted courage.

As a youth he entered the Navy, soon became a competent officer. In his holidays he used to go on climbing expeditions in the Alps. His first feat of note was the ascent of two hitherto unexplored peaks of Mont Blanc.

The Duke first came to the fore as an explorer by climbing Mount St. Elias, in Alaska, in 1896. The summit of this, one of America's highest peaks, had never before been reached. The ascent took thirty days, and the Duke's expedition discovered a great and unknown glacier and two new peaks.

In 1900 the Duke further distinguished himself by penetrating nearer to the North Pole than had ever been done before, beating Nansen's previous record by eighteen miles. Had the Duke's party journeyed on a better boat they would probably have reached the Pole, but they actually went on a ship that Nansen had previously discarded as being unsuited!

Of this Polar expedition a good story is told. The Duke once said: "Had our dogs not given out at a critical moment we should have got nearer the Pole." A lady who overheard this, replied, "But I always understood that Eskimo dogs were treacherous." "They are," answered the Royal explorer, "but I was speaking in a culinary sense!"

Hand Badly Frost-bitten. During this journey the Duke risked his life time and time again, and his hand was so badly frost-bitten that he had to have the tops of some of his fingers cut off. In 1906 the Duke set out to explore the mysterious mountains of the Moon, in Central Africa.

The Mountains of the Moon, or Mt. Ruwenzori, although known for ages past, had never been climbed until the Duke accomplished the feat. During the long and difficult ascent he had several narrow escapes from death. One day, whilst in advance of his followers, he slipped on some loose pebbles and slid right to the edge of a precipice.

The first man to arrive to the assistance of the Royal mountaineer nearly brought death to both, for, after throwing his coat to the Duke and trying to pull him to safety, he, too, began to slide towards the edge of the precipice. Fortunately, both were saved.

This is not the first time that the Duke of Abruzzi has seen active service, for he commanded a squadron during the Tripoli War.

MUTUAL EXTERMINATION. London, July 21.—Frederick Harrison's book, "The German Peril," published to-day, contains the following passage: "Let us not think that any kind of words, or any kind of agreement or compromise or mediation, can avail us in this fiercest trial of our English blood. Nor let us vainly imagine that the enemy will relax in his delirium of frightfulness, or spare us one pang which he can inflict on us all."

It is my firm belief that when we have driven him back to his own land (and we shall drive him back—we must, unless we are to be forever ruined), scenes of horror, almost of mutual extermination, will take place, exceeding anything we have yet known in ferocity, destruction and blood."

AUSTRALIA'S WAR LOAN. Melbourne, July 17.—The War Census Bill has passed the Federal House of Representatives. Some members were in favor of conscription.

Mr. Pearce, Federal Minister of Defence, said that the Imperial Government had requested Australia to endeavor to finance herself during the war. The twenty million loan will be put on the market by instalments. It is understood that Mr. Fisher, the Federal Premier, proposed a heavy income tax, with the exemption of incomes up to £200. Mr. Fisher told the House of Representatives that nobody would escape the war tax.—Reuter.
