

Mudford's death at the age of 78 comes as a reminder that there were strong men before Agamemno dard" was almost unknown to the present generation, but to its fathers he represented a power in the land. There were other London editors of high reputation—Sir John Robinson, for instance, at the "Daily News" had nade more than one score,—but the great editor" of the eighties and ineties was W. H. Mudford. The odicies of his paper were uncompromising, but it was not that which gave the "Standard" its reputation audford was both a born and a train d journalist, and had every detail of the trade at his fingers' ends. Hi ideals were accuracy and complete ness, and his means towards those ends were vigilance and enterprise ends were vigilance and enterprise.
He never stinted money but he also never wasted any. He built up the news services of his paper, and especially the foreign news, until it was the best-equipped organ in England. Undoubtedly the chief factor in his success was that he had a free as welling as a strong hand. The Loneliest Island in the British Empire.—The First Mail for Ten Years Now on its Way. Colony Which Has No Use for Money. For the first time for ten years a

ship from England is on the way to Tristan da Cunha. It is just the summit of an extinct volcano, peeping shove the rough water of the South Atlantic, and the road to it leads no where, so our ships do not make regular calls. The inhabitants, about a hundred, are the descendants mainly of a tiny British garrison which was placed on the Island when Napoleon was a prisoner at St. Helena. The rock became their home, they secured wives from afar, and there their decendants are now, mingled with survivors of wrecks. During the ast forty years only a dozen ships have called, so that the inhabitants stores of clothes and other links with civilisation run low.

A French ship visited the island asually this year, and found some of the inhabitants in remnants of proper lothing, some clad in skins, some entirely without clothes. They begged for clothes and bread and flour, and offered in exchange purses and bags made of sealskin and shoes made of oxskin. They have also mutton and beef to offer, for there is vegetation enough for the support of cheep and cattle. They have little, home-made boats of apple-wood, equipped with sails of home-made canvas, and in these tiny cockle-shells they row fifteen or twenty miles out to sea to meet or cross the track of a ship which may pass within their view. They need everything except meat and fish—no, not everything, for Tristan is one of the few places where money is unknown. They live entirely by change of goods, and a pile of gold overeigns would be of less use to them than a few yards of calico. What a tale there will be to tell when the irst ship from home for ten years eaches their little world!



Eldest son of the Prime Minister, he was the wonderman of his time at Oxford University. He failed in nothing that was open to him, and took every prize. His career at Oxford has never been surpassed, and seldom equalled. He won all the great honors for which he conipeted, and his charming nature, his wit and humour, his pure soul and onest mind, made him a king of the indergraduates. Called to the Bar at wenty-six, he rapidly built up a great practice, and his contemporaries felt hat this young giant was certain to end his career as Prime Minister, Lord nancellor, or Lord Chief Jutice. He as died in his thirty-eighth year, a lieutenant of the Grenadier Guards, falling gloriously at the head of his battalion in Picardy, and he could not have more nobly died.




